



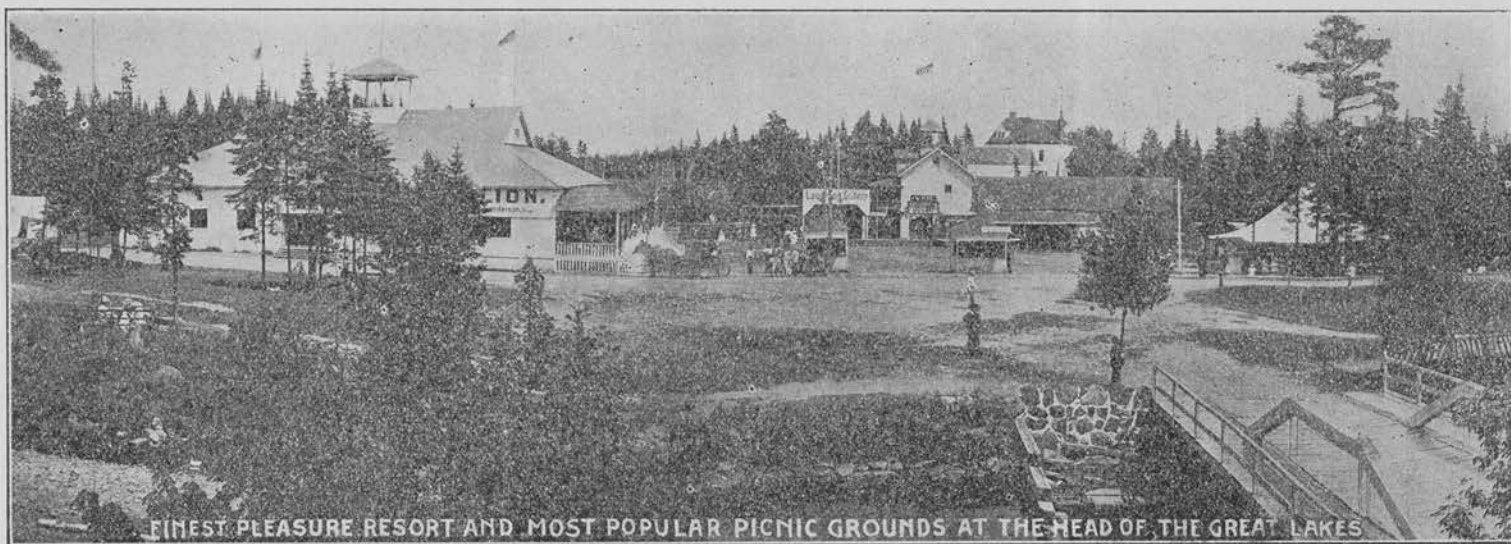

these are all right to day



# "Impromptu Irrigation"

Ansoka Minn Sept 24<sup>th</sup> 1910

Dear Mr Latham

Your letter of Sept 22<sup>nd</sup> at hand. I hardly know what reply to make. I have had a little experience with a crude form of Irrigation this dry season, and have learned a few things, but I am a student yet and have not had experience enough to teach others. what I want is light, and then more light on the subject. I had my berries and truck scattered too much and did not commence in time to get best results. I think I have a good chance to irrigate. The marsh next my field has always given me plenty of moisture and some times too much has gone down about five feet this summer and left me marooned on the sand. I got a small Gasoline Engine and force pump towards the last end of the strawberry season, and the improvement in fruit and plants was very good. had I got my outfit sooner, I would have had about  $\frac{1}{2}$  crop. from  $\frac{1}{4}$  acre I irrigated I got 500 lbs of nice berries whereas the two acres not irrigated

2nd

I got about 200 gts of inferior berries, hardly worth picking I tried water on black berries and it improved the quality and quantity of fruit, about 75 m. et. black raspberries about the same, currants gooseberries and plums <sup>Blossom</sup> were destroyed by frost. I have no Apples of bearing age

I irrigated a patch of early cabbage and got good results sold them for \$1.70 per doz where no water was applied, not worth any thing. I am now selling late cabbage that I watered but where no water was used cabbage is worthless.

I irrigated a small piece of <sup>late</sup> potatoes I do not know what the result will be until I dig them but the vines are larger and potatoes green growing yet others planted at the same time vines have been dead a month and potatoes not worth digging. I have a very good chance to practice irrigation only have to raise water eight or ten feet surface water, plenty of it. I find it a good plan to apply water in evening or towards night, and cultivate shallow as soon as surface is dry enough, or in case of berries have well mulched and evaporation does not go on so fast and ground so mulched when thoroughly saturated will remain moist some time. in the strawberry field about as essential a time a any to apply water is

Note There is much less winter killing when ground freezes up  
3<sup>d</sup> wet or root killing &c

in October the fruit buds are developing then for next seasons crop and if the ground is dry through Oct the crop will be light no matter how well the plants winter through <sup>most</sup> or how favorable a season we have I discovered this by having part of my plantation on moist ground next to water.

Now Mr Latham that's all I know about Irrigation and I think you can find others that know more about the subjece than I, and can put it in better shape, and deliver it in much more of an impressive manner. However if you want my mite and are bound to have it with a few suggestions from you I will do the best I can.

I am always after light and what I want to know how much is as a fertilizer for fruit and vegetables how it compares with yard manure. I have about 20 acres of muck with a deposit of from 2 to 6 ft. brownish light foam on top to heavy dark foam at bottom about the consistancy of putty who could I send a sample to to get at the real value? I guess your tired

Dear Friend:— Yours of the 22nd at hand. I am very glad indeed to hear from you again. I have requested our President, Mr. C. H. True of Edgewood, Ia. to give you the name of our delegate. Notice the time and place of our meeting on this letter-head. We are always glad to entertain your delegates. Kindly let us know who you will send.

We have been making some quite extensive experiments in growing the so called Everbearing strawberries for some three years past. I believe we have the best strain of everbearing tendencies that has yet been produced. Our plants are now loaded with ripe fruit. We have over three-hundred distinct new varieties that were grown from seed picked last Sept. that are now loaded with ripe fruit and others in all stages of growth. This fruit is of good size, fine color, high flavor and the bloom is not easily killed by frost. If you so desire I will speak at your meeting on the Everbearing Strawberry.

We have been working with a view to get a strong, hardy plant with good quality fruit and extra frost resisting bloom, that will fruit all through spring, summer and fall months without picking off the bloom at all at any season. We let them bear at the usual time of bearing, same as others do, and all the first, second and third runners, besides the old plant, will hang full of fruit until severe freezing weather comes in autumn.

I am sending you a sample by to-days mail. They are picked from plants that we have produced from seed picked last Sept. 1909.

My health is reasonably good and I expect to be with you at your winter meeting.
