

Your favor of the 26th inst. at hand. In answer will say in regard to taking part in presenting papers on "combating the frost and drought" I must decline. In a general way the methods formerly used such as "the Orchard in sod" and those cultivation of the Orchard" &c - will hold good for the different special locality I think, but a calamity to the Minnesota Orchard which I will call it like we had last spring with 14° below freezing. I do not believe there is any fruit in bloom will stand. Here on my place everything froze from Blueberry to the hardiest Apple.

At our County fair, of which this is the last day, there was 1 Plate of Crows, 1 Plate of Apples, 1 Plate of Plums and one other plate of a black berry which I did not learn the name, it looked like a cherry. That was all the fruits, and those had certainly been kept in some cold storage, I think, but we will not have anything like last spring again probably for many years. I hope so anyway. I will come to the annual meeting if possible but can see no way for me at present.

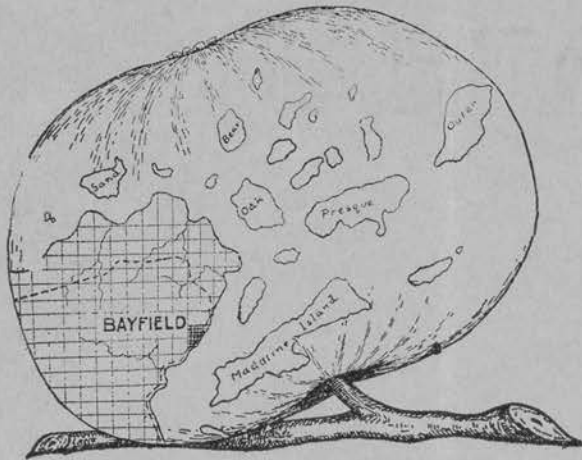

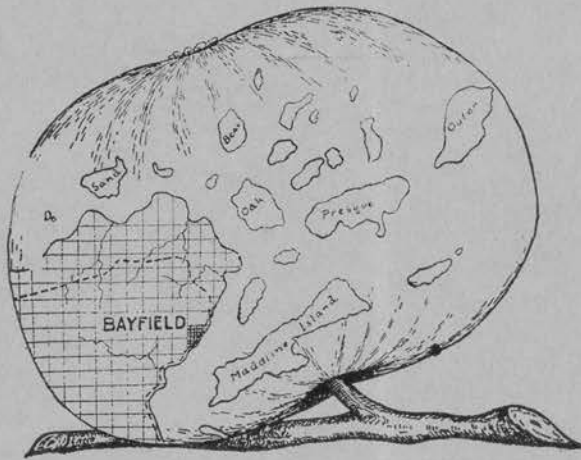

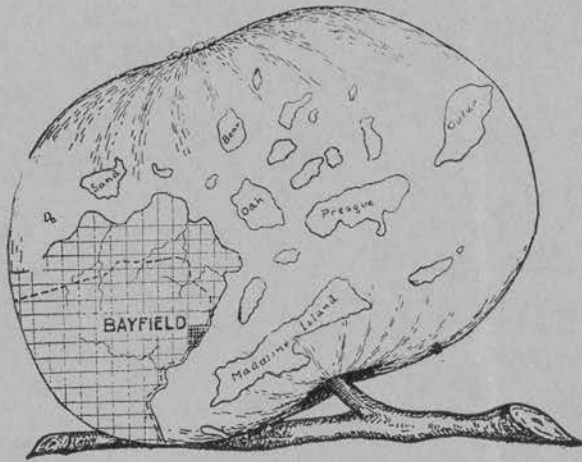
