I sold for about 2/3 what the place was worth simply because I could find no chance to get any more. So there goes the work or part of it for a life time. I am trying to forget all about it & pay my attention to my garden still there pleasant memories clinging around it that I can not. Neither do I want to Erase them. 10/1

I am indebted to that farm for lots of
anxiety & hard work perhaps a prolonged
life. Our three stalwart sons were all home
to see us last Sunday weigh about 180 lbs
each, and the two girls were here the week
before and I think they are indebted
for their good health to the milk & fruit that
they partook of that rough farm. I often
think of it - if they do not - then had I not
sojourned there and owned good cattle I never
would have enriched (in a horn) and immortalized
