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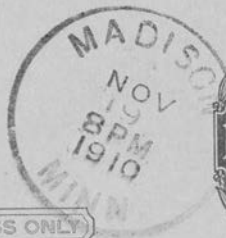

Dear Sir:-

In view of the excessive loss of timber by forest fires in Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota during the past season and the very apparent necessity for further legislation for the control and prevention of forest fires, the writer took the liberty of suggesting to Governor Eberhart the calling of a "Lake States Forest Fire Conference," to be held in St. Paul early in December, under the auspices of the Minnesota State Forestry Board and the Minnesota Forestry Association. The suggestion was approved and the matter has been taken up with the Minnesota State Forestry Board, whose *members* suggest that a preliminary meeting be held about October 18th, for the discussion of plans for the conference. I suggested the holding of this conference under the auspices of the Board and our Association simply to give it an official character in the first instance, and with the hopes in the latter instance that it would increase the membership and value of our Minnesota Forestry Association.

At the instructions of the Forestry Board, I have prepared a tentative program, which contemplates inviting the Governors of Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota, the State Forestry Commissioners, the legislative committees on forestry, the State Forestry Boards, the officers and representatives of the State Forestry Associations, and representatives of the railroads and lumbermen's associations. So far as I have heard from them they are all in favor of the plan and promise their hearty cooperation. The Forestry Boards of Minnesota and Wisconsin are preparing recommendations to be submitted to the legislatures this Winter for radical changes in the present laws, and promise to submit same for the consideration of this conference before the reports are presented to the legislatures.

In addition, Chief Forester Graves of the U. S. Forest Service, Forester Whipple of New York (which State has the best fire protective laws), and Forester Allen, of the Western Forestry and Conservation Association, (which is the most effective cooperative association in the country,) have all promised to be present. These latter gentlemen I had an opportunity to invite during the recent National Conservation Congress.

Would you be willing to spend a day or two going around among the fruit growers on the north side of the lake in the interests of our exhibit? You would probably succeed in securing some new exhibitors. Of course this service would not be a gratuitous service on your part as we are only too willing to pay for work in this direction, and while you are out, I wish you would too engage with whoever you think will handle the fruit right, at least as much as 8 bbls. of apples to be delivered either at cold storage or to the State Fair direct on Friday before the Fair opens.

I suppose you have a premium list, and you better take this along with you. Copies of the list will be sent to all the addresses you send in.

It may be necessary for some of these people to send some fruit to cold storage, and you may explain about that. Cold storage tags like the enclosed will be sent as asked for.

Hope you can take a day or two immediately to work this matter up so that all necessary arrangements may be made in season. Show them how to make entries etc.

As we are to take care of the hall this year, we can take care of several good, active, helpers, and probably you know of some that can be secured in your neighborhood. Please bear this in mind also.

Dear Sir:-

It occurs to me that it might be a courteous act if the executive committee of the Minnesota Forestry Association, of which you are a member, were to authorize the enrollment of Honorable A. O. Eberhart, Governor of Minnesota, as a honorary member of this Association, such an act being in recognition of the services which he has rendered the State in his attitude towards forestry.

I think it might also be well if we should notify the Governor in this connection that the Minnesota Forestry Association will be glad to render every possible assistance and influence toward making the National meeting of the National Conservation Association, to be held in St. Paul this Fall, a success.

In this connection would say that it might be advisable to adopt a by-law at our next annual meeting making each succeeding governor of the State an honorary member of our Association.
