My Strawberry Crab trees are the best loaded of any, and the "Duchess," next but about half as many as two years ago. The "Wealthy" is fruiting better than ever before with me. The Patten Greening Greening and Hibernial have gone back on me entirely this season as but a few scattering apples can be seen.

Nine tenth of my top-grafting proved a failure this year to my great disappointment. I lay it to the "grafter" but he lays it to bad scions. As I obtained scions from several different sections and as one or two grew of each kind I do not think it was lack of scion vitality.

wait for it.

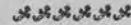

My Dear Secretary Latham, :-

I have your communication of the 7'th, asking me to render a mid-summer report no later than June 30'th, if possible and to furnish you with late photographs if I have any taken within the last year. I will try and comply with your request.

I intended to have photos taken of my spraying rig when my orchard was in blossom but the artist did not get around in time but I will have one taken as soon as possible showing some kind of a horticultural scene.

I regret to have to inform you that this section of the state will have a light fruit crop notwithstanding trees blossomed fairly well and no frost or rain to damage.

The blossoms both plum and Apple trees blossomed well but seem to be blight as I discovered the second time spraying. Not one blossom in a hundred promises fruit. My plum trees were perfectly white with blossoms while it is difficult to discover a plum. The transcendent tree is the best fruited and the wealthy, next while the usually prolific hibernal, contains but few apples maturing. Duchess same.

Strawberries are a failure with me. Even those I had well covered with straw gave entirely dried up, dead, dead as a door-nail as the saying goes. I set out 21 hundred along the first of May and not a hundred are growing of them, and I watered them several times after setting out.

I think the dry season of last year and the dry March, April and first half of May, this season is the cause for strawberry failure.

As to my top grafting and various kinds of trees that has been sent me for trial from State farm I will include in my report.

will try to arrange it that way.

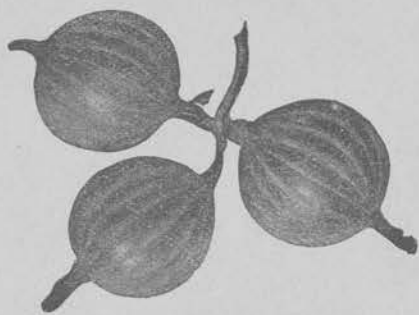
I got some cions of delicious

You see I have given away my March Horticulturist. Wish you would send me two or three extra copies. Prof. Rydger's paper on spraying makes this a very valuable number. 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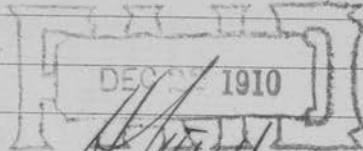

TO ALL MEMBERS:-

Dear Sir:-

The State Forestry Board has submitted to the Minnesota Legislature a bill for the establishment of an efficient State Forest Service, to include a system of patrol for timber lands. The bill provides for the supervision of the forests on the State land, including the State Reserves and all the forest protection service, shall be vested in the State Forestry Board.

The Board is authorized to recommend a State Forester, who shall be appointed by the Governor, and who shall be a technically trained forester. This removes the administration of the work from political influence as far as possible, as the State Forestry Board is composed of members appointed by the Governor upon the recommendations of various State associations.

All authority is agreed upon the necessity for a patrol of the timbered area, to be maintained by the State, on the theory that an ounce of prevention is worth many pounds of cure in dealing with forest fires.

The bill provides for dividing the timbered section of the State into not more than twenty-five "fire patrol districts," in which "District rangers" will be employed the year around, who shall assist the State Forester in carrying out the instructions of the Forestry Board with respect to preventing forest fires, the building of trails, fire lines, warning of municipal officers, railroad companies, lumbermen, and settlers, in enforcing such measures as shall be necessary to the public interest. The District Rangers shall assist the State Forester in caring for the State's timber in co-operating with the various departments of the State government.

Fire patrol districts will be sub-divided according to the topography of the country, and a "fire patrolman" will be employed to cover such local districts during the danger season only. All employes of the "State Forest Service" are empowered to make arrests and may cooperate with highway officers, game wardens and other State officers in enforcing the laws.

When in his judgment there is danger of the setting and spreading of fires, the State Forester, acting through his assistants, may require railroads to patrol their rights of way after each train, may require loggers to burn slashings, and may require settlers

to obtain permission before clearing land. Penalties are established for violating these regulations and the State officers are held responsible for enforcing them. The bill covers in detail penalties for neglect and carelessness of all classes of citizens to guard against fire, and authorizes the counties to establish auxiliary forest fire forces composed of county officials.

It is proposed that the "State Forest Service" shall be maintained by a tax of two-tenths of one mill upon the entire property of the State, which will produce a revenue sufficient to provide for a most efficient organization. The Constitution does not permit of a special tax upon the area patrolled to cover this expense, and it is inconceivable that any one will object to the nominal tax proposed as all classes of citizens will be directly benefited by preserving the forest resources of the State. Minnesota is the largest owner of timber within the State, and this expense will be a cheap insurance upon it. Forest destruction is a public calamity and forest wealth is community wealth.

We see nothing in the bill presented by the Forestry Board which can be objected to, but on the contrary, find that it contains the best provisions of the laws of New York, California, Wisconsin and Washington, with many valuable features in addition which will cover the peculiar forest conditions in this State. Its adoption will place Minnesota in the forefront of the States for an advanced forestry policy. Forest protection is the cheapest form of prosperity insurance that a timbered State can buy.

The mission of the Minnesota Forestry Association is to promote all measures in behalf of forestry in this State, and no greater opportunity has presented itself for accomplishing this than by using its utmost efforts to secure favorable action by the Minnesota Legislature on the bill recommended by the Forestry Board. Please do what you can in its behalf.
