- 35 Hanska
- 40 Sapa
- 35 Souya
- 5 Opata

This will be a rather small order and I think it will be better for you to send it by express directing to Prof. LeRoy Gady, Minneapolis, and notifying Prof. Gady of the shipment writing him at St. Anthony Park so that he may be on the lookout for them. We are going to get a lot of these plums from Prof. Hansen also, varieties that you are not offering, so to furnish the trial stations with a pretty good outfit of such as seem worth testing.
