

Friend Latham — I was not particular whether the NW Greening went into the list for top working or not. Mr Strand mentioned that as one variety that should go on that list. There were other parties who thought as I did that we could just as well have a better quality of fruit if we got to the trouble of top working after the list was adopted & there were no others who favored it but Strand. I asked him if he didn't think we better drop it off & he replied favorably to leaving it off. Of course it is a showy apple but goes to pieces about as badly top worked as piece not-grafted & not much satisfaction growing in either way. About giving the increased premium for seedlings I should think it would be all right to spend some money that way but we also ought to inspect those trees & not give any premium on a seedling that has the appearance or some probability of being hardy enough to warrant planting in some part of the State at least rather more liberally than in any experimental way. It certainly appears to me we should have the inspector take a few cions & deliver the premium to the owner in case the tree as well as the fruit comes up to the standard required and

Mr Underwoods ideas are good especially

My Dear Friend - your paper asking what I think of the 'advantages, and disadvantages, of the presentation of the State Horticultural Society at the farmers institutes'

The advantages - There is no subject introduced at the farmers institutes that should interest every man, woman, & child, as the family supply of fruits & vegetables - a 1/2 acre or an acre intelligently handled, will give the family more good living, good health, convenience, comfort, & satisfaction than any 20 acres & I might say 40 on the farm, they are all interested, or should be, the village as well as the farmer.

There are many who want something more than they get from the short talk that can be devoted to horticulture - they want to follow it up and get better posted. They may ask questions all they have time to ask while the speaker is on the floor, and at noon & at the close of the meeting surround you to ask more questions, you can answer all those questions if you have time, but quite likely you haven't got the time, & if you had the time, how much more good it will do any one who is interested along these lines, to show them in a minute, what a world of information there is in Greens fruit growing & the literature they get through the horticultural society - Their subscription should not be solicited, but they should be informed where they can get these books that are gotten up for this particular trying climate. The institute workers are sent out to do the people all the good they can, and they are not doing it if they withhold this literature. They furnish it to them when they are not only willing, but anxious to get it.
