



Dear Sir. — The flower seeds, rice
string looking plants, Chrysanthemum
reached me yesterday P.M. & I thank
you for same. While writing I
want to suggest, that as one of the
Big Apple growers, will try to get
the seconds & culls (I don't mean
worn &c, but those too small for
sale) into vinegar. I have never
been able to get one ounce of good
vinegar since I come here & I
would consider 50 or 60 cts a gal
cheap when one considers the
strings that go to make up our

vinegar supply. The Inspector is
around, I hear, often, yet it
does not fetch us the real stuff &
it does seem that with all
the apples raised in this State
alone, the home markets might
have real cider vinegar. There's
money in for the man who will
go into the business on the
"Square deal" plan. I filter
every bit of vinegar I get, into a
glass gal Bottle, & in three or
four days there are black flakes
in the bottom & it is dark looking
hence the necessity of always strain-
ing every particle you use. I get
furious over. The white vinegar

I am afraid of, tho' I do some
times get it for Salade because
it does not discolor things & too
I feel that a change of position
is perhaps better for one's ap-
petite. I wish the Minn.
State Horticultural Society all
the success it deserves. The

Replying to your letter of April 2d, I thank you very much for the folders, and I think the quantity ample for my use.

I have not yet received the 1912 report of the society.

In response to your inquiry about the Nurserymen at Fairmont, Minnesota, we have P. C. Christensen of The Amber Lake Nursery, four miles south of Fairmont, who has ten acres of ground, two to three acres of which is Nursery Stock. B. E. St. John of The St. John Nursery Company, who has fourteen acres of which two to four acres is devoted to the growing of Nursery Stock. F. A. Ward of the Royal Nursery Company, whose business if fully explained in the article I sent you.

This party formerly operated at Pipestone, Minnesota under the name of The Northwestern Nursery Company and The St. Claire Nursery Company. G. W. Finlay claimed partner of Ward, is supposed to live at 2411 Polk St. N. E., Minneapolis. This man was never a partner of Ward, but has been his salesman for several years. Ward now claims that the partnership between him and Finlay has been dissolved and that his wife is now his partner.

I am sorry to say that Ward was assisted in his law suit with me by both St. John and Christensen.

I had no interest in publishing the article in the Morris Tribune except to warn the people from being defrauded and to inform them the stock purchased from the Royal Nursery Company did not represent the quality of Fairmont grown stock.

My dear Mr. Latham:

In response to an invitation to pay his dues Mr. E. H. Ransdell tells me that he paid a young lady at the court house telling her explicitly that it was for membership in the Garden Flower Society in fact he inquired for the representative of


Dear Sir:


I am in receipt of your letter of the 19th inst.
