
Dear Mr. Latham:-

Dear Sir:

Enclosed you will find a check for \$1.00 for membership in the Minnesota State Horticultural Society. From a cursory inspection of the September issue of the Minnesota Horticulturist, I have received many hints of value, but it does seem to me that you take somewhat the New England attitude towards fruits. The writer is perhaps more familiar with conditions in the northwest districts and in California, having been born and raised in the last named state, than yourself, and would say that the great trouble with the horticultural societies of at least the middle west and east is that they follow certain traditions which have long since been discarded by growers in the progressive northwest districts.

By northwest, in this instance, the writer means places like Hood River, <sup>Idaho</sup> and Wenatchee, Washington, Bitter Root Valley, and other similar places in Montana. Why the winters in northern Minnesota are more severe than Wenatchee Valley for example, where the temperature has been 38 degrees below zero and the Department of Agriculture has issued special booklets on the snow slides and avalanches in the Wenatchee Valley district and when 40 degrees below zero is a not uncommon temperature in the Bitter Root Valley, according to Government reports, the writer must confess that he cannot see where the severe winters in the Cass Lake region of northern Minnesota come in. 15 degrees below zero is no uncommon temperature in the Hood River Valley, <sup>Washington</sup> <sup>White Salmon</sup>, according to government reports. If the Mackintosh Red, Jonathan and Delicious would ~~not~~ survive in the places mentioned in Montana and Washington, the writer cannot quite get the point, but nevertheless is looking for light and is willing to learn.

I trust that you will take these remarks in the spirit in which they are intended and will be very glad to receive further suggestions and advice.
