
Dear Mr. Latham:-

I have your letter this morning saying that Mr. Cashman will be our delegate which is very, very agreeable news. I shall write to Mr. Cashman soon.

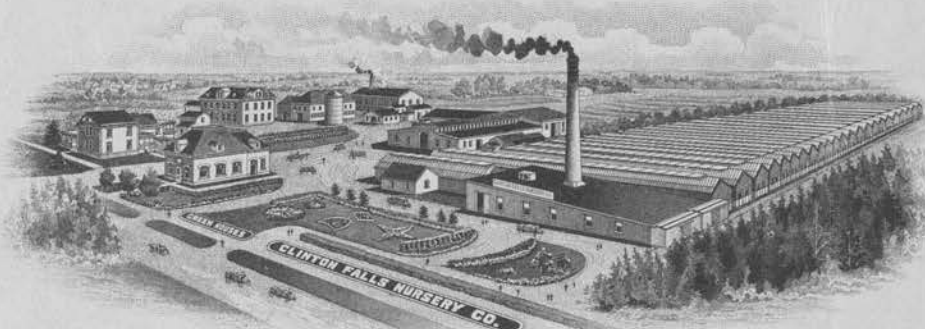

Your favor of the 31st inst. received.
The people of Minnesota should know more about their friends, the birds. Some birds, however, are a bad repute among the farmers, for instance the blackbirds and crows which destroy a great deal of corn this has caused most farmers to take little interest in birds and a great many of them destroy them whenever they get a chance. I think that if they could listen to Mr. Olmstead they would feel different about it. They would learn that most birds are really good friends. I suppose that one of the objections that will be raised is that it takes so much time to do the subject justice and that so little can be accomplished in the time that could be allotted. Personally I would like to give Mr. Olmstead a trial. If the farmers want that information they will soon make it known. The school is really the best place for desiminating this information. Mr. Olmstead is surely one of the best posted men and one of the cleverest speakers on that subject that I know of. I enjoyed his dis-course very much, the only fault I found was that he talked too long.

I would be pleased to go over this matter with Mr. Wilson and I would like it if he could be given a trial on this subject.

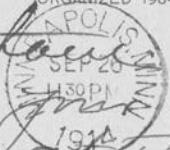

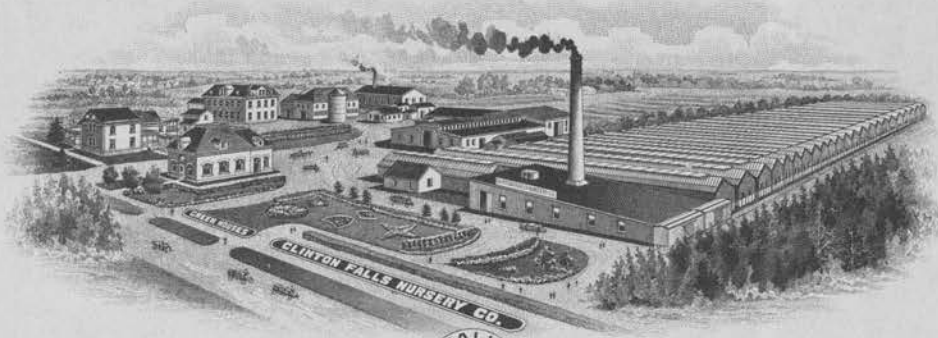

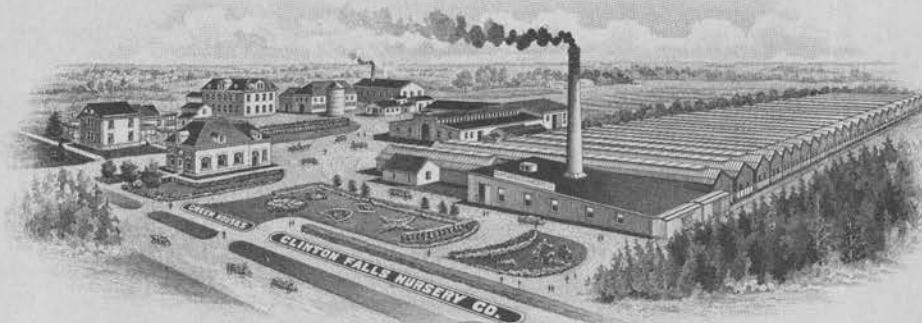

Dear Sir:-

It seems important that the status of the amateur in connection with flower shows should be determined with a greater degree of accuracy. Possibly your Society has this figured out pretty well, and perhaps your by-laws or printed regulations cover it. If so, I would be glad to have anything of this kind which you can send me.

I wrote President Chamberlain of the American Gladiolus Society and he says that an amateur ceases to be an amateur when he begins to sell bulbs or plants. I disagree with his deductions and contend that an amateur remains an amateur until an important part of his livelihood is secured from the sale of his product. Take in my own case, for instance. I am growing Gladioli on a pretty large scale, but I presume my total sales for last year would not amount to \$50.

When an amateur is putting considerable money into rare and choice stock he rather hates to turn down an order which comes to him unsolicited, and this is my case exactly, and I shall continue to believe that this does not disqualify me as an amateur. On the other hand, should I work into the business and advertise my stock for sale and obtain any important part of my income from the sale of same, I would then consider myself a professional.

I am anxious to have your personal opinion on this matter as well as any printed regulations you may supply or refer me to.

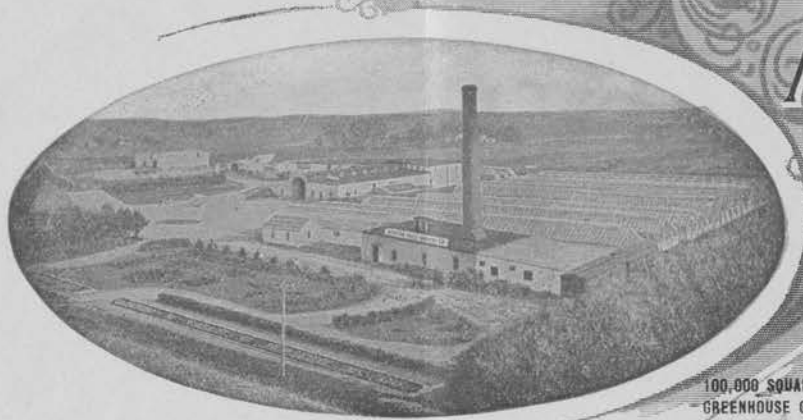

Dear Mr. Latham:

Have your letter regarding the recipe for the Prussian Tree Paint that Mr. Benham brought into your office. In reply will say that one of our salesman got this recipe from an Illinois concern and had it printed on the back of some of our cards. We have never tried it out and do not know whether it is good or not. We have always recommended painting the trees with common lime white-wash. White-wash will save them from the rabbits and does the tree no harm. In fact, I think that it protects the trees somewhat from sun scald in spring.

I think there has been a great many different tree paints gotten out by various concerns but none that I know of that have been very practical.

I was not aware of the fact that the boys were using this recipe to any extent. If they are, presume we ought to make an effort to really find out whether it is good or not. I think that if any application is made that nothing is better than white-wash. We very often wrap our trees with tar paper- that also keeps rabbits away.

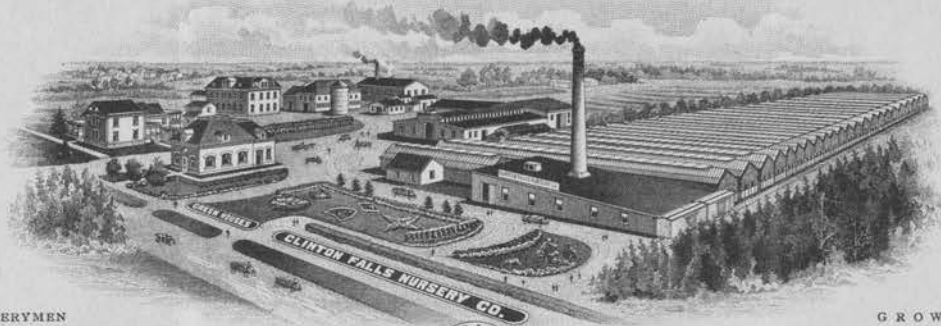

Friend Latham:

Upon digging among my papers today I find a letter from you which has not been opened dated January 7th. This letter contained the score card on which you ask suggestions.

The score card is most liberal and easy to comply with. As to Mr. Underwood's suggestion will say that it might be well to give productiveness and quality some consideration, as it might cause the planter to consider that question a little more thoroughly when purchasing the trees. It might also be incentive to the nurserymen to see to it that a salesman places only such varieties as are sure to produce and bear good quality of fruit. However, I don't think that over ten points should be given to either. But, as I said before, the score card, as you have it, would make it easier for all to make a good showing, and have no objection to its going out just as you have it.

In your circular letter of the 10th inst. addressed to nurserymen, you may send us 500 circulars of the "One Acre Orchards" to start with. It might be well to have the words "presented by" printed on bottom of circulars. We will do our best towards pushing this matter along.

I also have your letter enclosing circular issued by the Art Society. As you say, I don't think we should contribute any money for anything of that sort. I don't think the majority of the Minnesota Horticulturists would approve of it.

Also received your letter of the 9th inst. enclosing copy of letter written by Mr. A. D. Wilson, which I am returning herewith. I want to say that I feel mighty pleased about this matter. It is quite evident that Mr. Wilson is trying to push the good work along, and I hope the best of results will be obtained.
