
My dear sir:

My dear Mr. Latham, It is very kind of you to ask me to write about "Foundation Planting for Farmers" for the Minnesota Horticulturist, and I will gladly do so if I ought to do something more to "square myself" for all the trouble I put you to by not being able to lecture for you. But I should like to tell you how the matter stands and ask your advice.

Our people here discourage the professors from preparing articles for periodicals published by other states - at least on university time, unless, of course, they furnish a chance to publish some piece of research in a technical journal and no funds are available by the home university. Consequently, I should have to do this on outside time, and this would hardly be a recreation for me, seeing that my working hours for six months have been spent on a single job of writing. When I left

Doubleday he offered me a contract for \$1,500 worth of articles at 3¢ a word.

But my ideals in life are all humanitarian and educational, and I have neglected this work, in order to pour all my soul and strength into the university extension work in landscape gardening. I came into the academic life at a big sacrifice, for I was making \$5,000 a year in the commercial world, and now I am beginning to feel poor.

I should like to write the article you mention because I really believe it would do some good, but under the circumstances I wish you would release me, unless you have some funds available to pay for a special article like this.

We feel rather upset here - some of us, because of uncertainties connected with the legislature &c. I hope the Univ. of Minn. is prospering. I see that Wisconsin did not cut off state aid from her agricultural societies. I trust your society is secure for it has done splendid work and has not outlived its usefulness as some have.
