Dear Mr. Latham:-

I have your letter at hand asking me to present a paper at the next meeting of our Horticultural Society, on the subject "The Pergola," its Use, Convenience and expense." This is an important subject and I shall be glad to handle it to the best of my ability. I presume it will be best to illustrate it by one large working drawing, and of course it could well be handled by the use of a few slides, but I presume that the simple working drawing will be the most suitable.

I have a suggestion to make. Would you allow me to adopt the title of "The Pergola, its Use and Misuse, its convenience and expense?" My reason for making this suggestion lies in the fact that the Pergola, like every other feature of good design, is liable to be very much misused by the general public. There are places in which it is distinctly suitable and valuable. There are others that are out of place and the less pretentious vine arbor, or grape arbor, or even an attractive summer house is more suitable.

If you do not consider this an impossible title to adopt, I think that it would be a clearer title of what is in my mind as I see it now. Negative titles are not good, but in this case it might be possible.



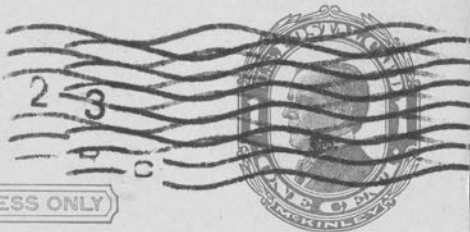
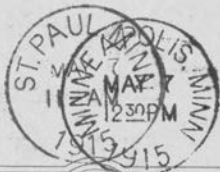
