

My dear Mr. Latham:

Please accept my thanks for copy of the letter from the Governor to Mr. Bisbee. I do not see any objection to locating the building definitely on the University Farm and that it shall be open for the use of the other State Societies. We might either go further - that the building might be used by the University Farm when not used by the Society, excepting the offices of the Society. I think we can get along with \$40,000. If there should be a slight deficiency, we can make some arrangements to bridge over until the next session of the Legislature.

If you think it advisable, I will have a talk with Mr. Spooner. I am firmly of the opinion that we should continue our fight until actually turned down. The demands upon the Legislature for appropriations grow from year to year and the situation may be worse next Session than it is this time.

Even though the committee should not make a favorable report, I would advise following it up and bring it to a vote in both branches. In the meantime, we will line up our delegation from Ramsey. I think we can get most of them to support it. I think it would be desirable to get your Garden Club to pass a resolution in favor of the measure as we did here. It creates a great deal of local sentiment.
