My Dear Bro, Thanks for yours of 26 Dec today

I am surely enjoying the way things in Texas, we had a few frosty mornings before Christmas, and 2.88 inches rain the 25th since we have had a few showers with thru 40 to 75. - While I don't like the climate or the country there is much that is enjoyable. The country has not recovered from the hard winter 5 years ago that killed all the oranges and figs, discouraged thousands of settlers, many left their ranches and all, for other states, real estate is not worth half it was then, the orange crop this year would have returned some of the prosperity, but for a freeze in Nov. that caught 1/3 the crop and so got mixed that the Fruit Association have been unable to sell at good prices and have not yet made returns. My boy is in the chicken business and can't grow his own chicken feed, Corn may bring 50 bu. price, but if cribbed the weevil gets it, can't raise clover, timothy or wheat or Alfalfa, too level, no drainage, only 49 inches fall in 8 miles to the Gulf. Can grow Sweet Potatoes & rats for the dogs, Sorghum for the cows. My boy filled his silo with Corn & cane, some of the sorghum is worthless, he has 8, or 10 bu. yield of Oranges unsold! help is 1.75 - and only white help is allowed in this district. The whole country lacks feed, the poor stock horses and mules shows this, 8000

The Farm loan Districts make Texas one district, and Houston is making a great ado about it, they have the Bank, it is to be hoped it will bring down interest which is 8 per cent every where here. The Chamber of Commerce are making a great time for Texas getting a whole District, much of Texas can grow cotton but not here, I can't see what a poor man can make a living on. Fruit farming is very uncertain from frosts, which prevail till spring. -- Well I am not booming this country but am telling the facts as I see them, across the way is a ~~75,000~~ dollar farm, sold 5 years ago having a splendid crop of oranges, the man paid \$7,500 saw it all go dead, the man he bought it of would not release the title, the man got up and left, the farm and buildings are now down, no purchaser at any price --

My 3 grandchildren have had a wonderful Christmas their celebration began Friday at the school house tree &c - and their mother rigged up a gift tree with 40 presents, most of which I brought from Santa at Minneapolis, and the children are keeping up the celebration all this week.

Hoping you, your office get and every body had a nice Christmas and will have a Happy New Year is my most fervent wish





Would it be possible for you to secure some of the plums that are a of the best flavor. I would not care to get them all of the same variety.

If possible give to the new members the back numbers of the Horticulturist beginning with the year. - Send me more application blanks as I expect to get a few new members thru the mails.

Last year I have sent ^{to the State Fruit Breeding} buds of my "Prunego" a hybrid plum, ^{Desoto Burbank} $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter. Notice in the folder that \$100 is offered by C. M. Loring for a seedling plum, the "Prunego" is larger and better flavored than the Waveta. So I think it will

deserve this \$100⁰⁰ premium, Please inform me how to apply for this premium and what to do to get it. Then I have also sent to State Fruit Breeding Farm scions of a seedling apple which is the best I ever tasted, superior to the delicious, It is an early winter apple. Is there any premium for such apples?
