The Board of County Commissioners of the County of Hennepin, Minnesota, met in the Court House in the City of Minneapolis, at ten o'clock A.M., pursuant to adjournment.

The meeting was called to order by Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, and there were present:

The Board proceeded to vote by secret ballot for the selection of a chairman for the ensuing year. Mr. Fitzsimmons named Commissioners Christensen and Hanson to act as tellers. Commissioner Matthews received four votes, Commissioner Scott being absent at the time of the balloting. Mr. Fitzsimmons declared Commissioner Matthews elected Chairman of the County Board of Hennepin County for the year 1952.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution supersedes similar resolutions passed by the County Board heretofore.

I. HOURS

- 1. The regular work day for employees except watchmen shall be eight hours.
- 2. The regular work week for employees shall be forty hours.
- 3. The average work month for employees for purposes of computing vacations, sick leave, and fractions of a month's work shall be 173 hours.

II. OVERTIME

- 1. Overtime shall be allowed and paid to any employee on the basis of one and one-half times the regular rate of pay computed on an hourly basis when overtime employment is directed by a responsible supervisor.
- 2. Overtime for an employee is defined as work beyond eight hours in any one day, forty hours in any one week, and for work done on Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays.
- 3. Overtime work will be confined to emergency necessary work and will normally be on work such as snow plowing, sanding, placing flares and danger signs, bituminous treatment, emergency repairs, and work that requires only a short time to complete at the end of the day which if not completed would require the return of men and equipment to a job which is a considerable distance from headquarters.
- 4. Overtime for all employees shall be paid as it is earned.

III. VACATIONS WITH PAY

- 1. All employees will be granted one 8-hour working day vacation with pay for each 173 hours of employment except that no employee can take a vacation during his first six months of employment, but after having completed his six months employment period, an employee is automatically credited with six days of vacation.
- 2. After five continuous years of employment, each employee shall be granted one and one-quarter days of vacation for each

month of work.

- 3. Although it is expected that vacations are to be used during the year they are earned, it is possible to save up vacation time to a maximum total of twenty-four days if it cannot be taken during the calendar year either because the department is unable to schedule an employee's vacation or due to personal reasons.
- 4. If an employee had twenty-four days to his credit, he may take a day off to avoid losing any other vacation earned.
- 5. All vacations must be arranged for in advance. Employees will be given an opportunity to select vacation periods insofar as it is possible or practical.
- 6. If a holiday occurs in the middle of a vacation, that day will not count as a day of vacation.
- 7. When a vacation is taken, only working days are substracted from the vacation time to the employee's credit. In other words, if an employee takes two whole weeks off, he will be charged as using ten days of vacation time.

IV. SICK LEAVE

- All employees shall be granted one day of sick leave with pay for each month of employment and will be allowed to accumulate credit for earned sick leave up to one hundred days subject to the following provisions:
- 1. No sick leave will be paid or credited for the first six months of employment, but after six months of employment, credit will be given in the accumulation for days earned during the first six months.
- 2. Sick leave will be granted for actual sickness, temporary physical disability, serious illness in the immediate family, or quarantine.
- 3. Sick leave will be paid only on satisfactory evidence of one of the foregoing conditions.
- 4. Accumulated sick leave shall be retroactive to January 1, 1942.
- 5. For every day of sick leave an employee earns after he has accumulated one hundred days, he will be given credit for one-half day additional vacation and one-half day of "banked" sick leave which may be used in case of a long illness lasting over and above the accumulated one hundred days.
- 6. Sick leave is charged off on a working day basis, that is,

if you are out because of illness for a week, only five days will be charged against your accumulated sick leave.

V. HOLIDAYS

1. All employees shall be granted leave of absence with regular pay on all legal holidays. These are:

Lincoln's Birthday
Washington's Birthday
Good Friday
Memorial Day
Independence Day
Labor Day
Columbus Day
Armistice Day
Thanksgiving Day
Christmas

2. In addition to the eleven holidays per year one full day per year or two half-days may be used by the departments for group recreational activities such as picnics, annual Christmas parties, etc. as the Board of County Commissioners may approve.

VI. REGULATIONS

- 1. For crews working out of the County Shop, their time shall start from the time of leaving the shop until time of returning to the shop.
- 2. All employees reporting for work who are sent home through no fault of their own shall be allowed two hours time.
- 3. All County equipment shall be manned and operated by County employees.
- 4. All County employees operating County equipment must have chauffeur's licenses when required.
- 5. Authorization to work for Hennepin County shall be made by an "Order for Employment" approved by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Committee under whose supervision a department functions and by the County Engineer or an authorized Associate Engineer. The County Auditor is hereby authorized to pay only those employees having such an authorization on file in the Accounting Department of the County Auditor's office.
- 6. All employees shall receive the first of the year an accounting of their accumulated vacation and sick leave, and at any other time upon their written request.
- 7. Copies of this resolution together with clarifying comments

shall be furnished to each employee affected by this resolution.
