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Minneapolis, Minnesota Tuesday, April 7, 1953

The Board of County Commissioners of the County of Hennepin, Minnesota, met in the Court House in the City of Minneapolis, at ten o'clock A.M., pursuant to law.

All members were present.

The meeting was called to order by George W. Matthews, Chairman.

A statement of balances in the County Revenue Allowance as of March 31, 1953, received from Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, was ordered published with the proceedings of the Board and placed on file.

Monthly reports received from George G. Roadfeldt, County Extension Agent, and from Donald C. Bennyhoff, Register of Deeds and Registrar of Titles, were ordered placed on file.

An order from the Railroad and Warehouse Commission relative to the hearing before the Commission on the request of Hennepin County for an investigation of the conditions surrounding the highway grade crossing where State Trunk Highway No. 110 crosses the right-of-way and tracks of the Great Northern Railroad, and letter from Frank J. Williams, Attorney for the County Board, relative to said order were ordered placed on file.

A letter from Frank J. Williams, Attorney for the Board, relative to the petition for the incorporation of the Village of Pines, was

read.

Commissioner Ainsworth moved, seconded by Commissioner Christensen, that pursuant to the opinion of Frank J. Williams, Attorney for the County Board, the petition for incorporation of the Village of Pines be rejected.

Motion unanimously carried.

Letters were received from L. P. Zimmerman, County Engineer, as follows:

- 1. Reporting on snow plowing operations in the northerly part of the County. A copy of Mr. Zimmerman's letter was ordered sent to the petitioners.
- 2. Reporting on the resolution adopted by the City of Hopkins requesting the opening of Fifth Street from Fourth Avenue to Washington Avenue through the County Home property.

Commissioner Hanson moved, seconded by Commissioner Ainsworth, that the matter be tabled.

Motion unanimously carried.

3. Relative to a permit for dock privileges on County-owned property at Spring Park, Lake Minnetonka, as requested by Andrew Kitcher.

Commissioner Scott moved, seconded by Commissioner Hanson, to refer the matter to Commissioner Ainsworth and that he bring in a proper resolution at the next Board meeting.

Motion unanimogsly carried.

4. Reporting on the preliminary plan and survey of R.R. Hagglund, Engineer, for the establishment of County Ditch No. 46. Ordered placed on file.

Commissioner Ainsworth moved, seconded by Commissioner Christensen, that a letter of sympathy be sent to the Eric Jensen family.

Motion unanimously carried.

A copy of an Order from the District Court appointing Lewis E. Lohmann Public Defender and fixing his salary therefor was presented and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

A letter from Geo. A. Totten, Jr., County Treasurer, requesting authority to attend the annual convention of the Municipal Finance Officers Association and for payment of his expenses in connection therewith was read and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Petitions from Mrs. Josephine M. Hyde asking that her lands be set off from School District No. 133 to School District No. 144 and from William Rambow asking that his lands be set off from School District No. 45 to School District No. 43, and letter from the School Board of School District No. 45 approving the transfer, were presented and referred to the Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings.

Requests for the commitment of two patients to Glen Lake Sanatorium were received and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

A letter from Robert F.Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, setting a date of hearing on the preliminary survey and report of R.R. Hagglund, Engineer, in the matter of the establishment of County Ditch No. 46, was read and referred to the Chairman of the County Board.

Specifications received from O. A. Pearson, Purchasing Agent, for the purchase of Bituminous Materials (M.C. Asphalt, S.C. Asphalt, and Asphalt Emulsion) and for screening, crushing, stockpiling and/or

loading gravel, were presented and referred to the Road and Lake Committee.

A letter from the Town of Eden Prairie requesting use of Countyowned equipment for eradication of leafy spurge in the township was read and referred to the Purchasing Agent and Engineer.

A letter from Carrie Spott requesting the opening of a street leading from Seventh Street South to Highway No. 18 in Hopkins was read and referred to the Road and Lake Committee and Engineer.

At 10:15 o'clock A.M., the time specified in the published advertisement for bids, O. A. Pearson, Purchasing Agent, proceeded to open bids for Road Tar and for Lubricating Oil. The bids were referred to Mr. Pearson for a report back to the Board.

O. A. Pearson, Purchasing Agent, recommended acceptance of the bid of Republic Creosoting Company for furnishing Road Tar to Hennepin County at the bid price of 16 cents per gallon.

Commissioner Christensen moved, seconded by Commissioner Ainsworth, to concur in the recommendation made by Mr. Pearson, and that Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, be directed to set aside the sum of \$4,000.00 from the Road and Bridge Appropriation to pay for said Road Tar, and that the Chairman of the County Board be authorized to sign the contract when bond is approved.

The vote on the motion was as follows: Ainsworth yea, Christensen yea, Hanson yea, Scott yea, Chairman Matthews yea.

Monthly reports for the month of March received from A. C. Ekelund Superintendent of the County Home and from Ed Ryan, Sheriff, were ordered placed on file.

Audit #1, dated April 1, 1953, received from the Board of Audit of Hennepin County, showing the cash and bank balances of the County Treasurer at the close of business on said date, was ordered published as a part of the proceedings of the County Board and placed on file.

Petitions of freeholders asking to be set off from School District No. 133 to School District No. 144 received from Harold V.

Kindseth and E. D. Rogers, Jr., were referred to the Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings.

A letter from the American District Telegraph Company requesting authority for said company to establish a telephone circuit to the receiving switchboard in the Sheriff's office was read and referred to the attorney for the County Board for a report to be made on April 28th.

Aletter from Max Winter, General Manager of the Minneapolis
"Lakers" Basketball Team, thanking the County Board for their resolution of congratulations was read and ordered placed on file.

A letter from the Northwest-Tonka Lions Club Board of Directors requesting permission to close Highway No. 7 in front of Robbins Brothers Garage at Spring Park, on June 19th, 20th, and 21st, 1953, to make it possible to stage the third annual summer "Safari" was read and referred to the highway engineer and the chairman of the Road and Lake Committee for a report.

Copies of letters written by L. P. Zimmerman, County Engineer, were received as follows:

- 1. To the International Union of Operating Engineers, St. Paul, relative to their communication of March 16th concerning rates negotiated with the Associated General Contractors covering highway and heavy construction for the year 1953. Ordered placed on file.
- 2. To Mr. Leonard F. Engwall, 3420 Highcrest, one of 30 petitioners asking for the establishment of a road on the Hennepin-Ramsey County line between Trunk Highway No. 8 and 37th Avenue N.E., advising the signers to petition the Village of St. Anthony. Ordered placed on file.

Aletter from Standard Oil Company requesting the opportunity of bidding on road oil and cut-back asphalt in tank car shipments

instead of transport lots was ordered placed on file.

An application for license to sell non-intoxicating malt liquor was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Specifications were received from O. A. Pearson, County Purchasing Agent, as follows:

- For rental of a 1/2 cubic yard power shovel, being Project
 No. 5303-3;
- For rental of two crawler tractors and scrapers, being Project No. 5303-4;
- 3. For rental of a 3/4 cubic yard dragline, being Project No. 5303-5.

The above specifications were referred to the Road and Lake Committee.

4. For bakery goods for the Hennepin County Jail.

Commissioner Christensen objected to the requirement in said specifications "that delivery must be made prior to the breakfast hour of 6:30A.M., in the case of rolls". Mr. Herbert Lunow, 2016 Bryant Avenue South, and Mr. Clare L. Franks stated that they sustained Commissioner Christensen in his objection.

Said specifications were referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Edward J. Carlson, Chief Accountant in the County Auditor's Accounting Department, discussed the matter of one day's back pay due Kenneth C. Swanson, a former employee at the County Home. A motion was made by Commissioner Hanson, duly seconded and unanimously carried, that Mr. Swanson be paid the one day's pay of \$7.16 still due him, payment to be made from the County Home appropriation.

A motion was made by Commissioner Matthews, duly seconded and unanimously carried, that three weeks plus 21 days additional pay be granted to A. C. Ekelund, Superintendent of the County Home, effective May 1st, 1953, payment to be made from the County Home appropriation.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ainsworth and duly seconded that Roy Haeg, Supervisor of Assessments, be requested to appear before the County Board at its next meeting to report on the applications of Gordon Strom, Dba Richfield Equipment Company and of Robert A. Broad, Dba Richfield News, for reduction of personal property taxes.

The vote on the motion was as follows: Ainsworth yea, Christensen nay, Hanson yea, Scott yea, Chairman Matthews yea.

Motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Matthews, duly seconded and unanimously carried, that O. A. Pearson, Budget Director and Purchasing Agent, meet with the attorney for the County Board to draw up an agreement for Hennepin County to advance the money for the opening of Queen Avenue North from 43rd Avenue toward 44th Avenue, putting in sewer, curb and gutter, water, sidewalk, and alleys between Penn and Queen Avenues and between Queen and Russell Avenues.

The matter of spraying leafy spurge in Eden Prairie referred to the county engineer and the county purchasing agent on April 7th was again discussed. A motion was made by Commissioner Scott, duly seconded and unanimously carried that the County loan to the Town of Eden Prairie an old sprayer to help check the spread of leafy spurge.

At 10:15 o'clock A.M., the time specified in the published advertisement for bids, O. A. Pearson, County Purchasing Agent, proceeded to open bids as follows:

- l. For screening, crushing, stock piling and loading gravel,
 being Project No. 5303-2;
 - 2. For S.C. Asphalt (Road Oil), being Project No. 5302-9;
 - 3. For M.C. Asphalt, being Project No. 5302-10;
 - 4. For Asphalt Emulsion, being Project No. 5302-11;
- 5. For overhualing, painting, placing, removing, and storing spar buoys and removing, painting, reconditioning, installing, and maintaining signs at Lake Minnetonka, being Project No. 531.

The above bids were referred to the Purchasing Agent and County Engineer.

A motion was made by Commissioner Christensen, seconded by Commissioner Scott, and unanimously carried that the sole bid of American Bitumuls Co. be returned to the bidder and that O. A. Pearson, County Purchasing Agent, be directed to readvertise for bids for said asphalt, emulsion, bids to be opened on Tuesday, May 5th, 1953, at 10:15 o'clock A.M.

The bid of Lake Minnetonka Dredging Company for overhauling, painting, and reconditioning spar buoys and signs at Lake Minnetonka, being Project No. 531, was in the County Commissioners' Committee Room prior to the time required in the published notice but was inadvertently delayed in being delivered to the receiver of the bids. Commissioner Christensen objected to the opening of the bid, claiming that it was not received on time.

A motion was made by Commissioner Hanson, seconded by Commis-

sioner Scott, to open the said bid on advice of the attorney for the County Board. On the vote on the motion there were four YEAS and one NAY, as follows: Ainsworth yea, Christensen nay, Hanson yea, Scott yea, Chairman Matthews yea.

Motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ainsworth, seconded by Commissioner Scott, and unanimously carried, to accept the sole bid of Lake Minnetonka Dredging Company for overhauling, painting, placing, removing, and storing spar buoys and for removing, painting, reconditioning, installing, and maintaining signs at Lake Minnetonka, being Project No. 531, at the bid price of \$7,181.00; and that Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, be directed to set aside the sum of \$7,181.00 from the Lake Improvement Appropriation to pay for said contract.

O.A. Pearson, County Purchasing Agent, recommended acceptance of the low bid of Woodrich Construction Co. for screening, crushing, stock piling and loading gravel, being Project No. 5303-2.

Commissioner Ainsworth made a motion, duly seconded and unanimously carried, that pursuant to said recommendation, the low bid of Woodrich Construction Co. be accepted for screening, crushing, stock piling and loading gravel, being Project No. 5303-2, at the bid price of \$3,600.00, and that Robert F. The Clerk to the Board presented the publisher's affidavits of publishing the notices of hearing, the County Auditor's certificate of mailing said notices, and the Sheriff's return of posting said notices. A letter from Edward J. Shannon, Assistant County Attorney, relative to the request of the American District Telegraph Company to establish a telephone circuit from its Minneapolis office in the Greaves Building to the Sheriff's office was referred to the Chairman of the County Board for a report to be made on Tuesday, May 5th, 1953.

A request from the Council of the Village of Crystal for permission to close up a part of the old County Ditch No. 18 was referred to the Road and Lake Committee and County Engineer.
