Tuesday, April 27, 1954

The Board of County Commissioners of the County of Hennepin,
Minnesota, met in the Court House in the City of Minneapolis, at ten
o'clock A.M., pursuant to adjournment.

All members were present.

The meeting was called to order by George W. Matthews, Chairman.

A budget report of the Hennepin County Highway Department received from O. A. Pearson, Budget and Purchasing Agent, was ordered placed on file.

Applications for license to sell non-intoxicating malt liquor were referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Contracts and contract bonds from Armco Drainage & Metal Products, Inc. for furnishing metal corrugated culvert pipe and from Anderson Aggregates for furnishing crushed and screened gravel were referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Plans for the bituminous surfacing of S.A.R. No. 93 and No. 19 were presented and referred to the Road and Lake Committee.

A letter from Mrs. A. Kirkpatrick asking for broken bricks, stones, and dirt from the Vince A. Day Center property for fill was read. The Clerk to the Board was requested to notify Mrs. Kirkpatrick that the County Board is in the process of disposing of the property

and will not permit anyone to enter upon the grounds because of the liability the county may be confronted with.

A letter from Mrs. Robert E. Geiger urging that the Vince A. Day Center property be used as a children's hospital was read and ordered placed on file.

A letter from Ray C. Ewald, Co-chairman, Floats Committee,
Minneapolis Aquatennial Association, relative to participation by the

County and City in the Aquatennial Parade. The Clerk to the Board
was requested to notify Mr. Ewald that the float entered last year
was not sponsored by either the City or the County but by the City
and County Employees Union.

Letters were received from O. A. Pearson, Purchasing Agent, as follows:

A letter from Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, with attached statements showing the cost of operating the Hennepin County Sheriff's Radio Station was presented and ordered held as the Board members had had no opportunity to study the statement.

An Order to Show Cause in the matter of the application of the Knutson Company to register the title to certain lands was presented and referred to the Attorney for the Board.

At 10:15 o'clock A.M., the time specified in the published advertisements for bids, O. A. Pearson, Budget and Purchasing Agent, proceeded to open bids for the following:

- 1. M.C. Asphalt.
- 2. R.C. Asphalt.
- 3. Asphalt Emulsion, Type RS-2.
- 4. Rental of a 3/4 cubic yard dragline.

All of the above bids were referred to O. A. Pearson, Purchasing Agent, for a report to be made to the Board next week.

Minneapolis, Minnesota Tuesday, May 18, 1954

The Board of County Commissioners of the County of Hennepin, Minnesota, met in the Court House in the city of Minneapolis, at ten o'clock A.M., pursuant to adjournment.

All members were present.

The meeting was called to order by George W. Matthews, Chairman.

A monthly report from Frank E. Adams, Veterans Service Officer, was ordered placed on file.

A letter from E. J. Shannon, Assistant County Attorney, submitting a warranty deed and abstract of title from Edward F. Bergstrom and wife, with claim in the amount of \$10,000.00, and suggesting that the County Board direct that the title to the real estate be registered, was read and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

A letter from E. H. Larson, Land Commissioner, submitting an application from the City of Minneapolis asking for approval of a new use for certain tax forfeited lands was read and referred to the Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings.

An Order from the U.S. Federal Power Commission Commission amending a license to fix annual charges for use of a government dam by the Northern States Power Company was presented and referred to the County Engineer.

Specifications were received from O. A. Pearson, Purchasing Agent, as follows:

- 1. For grading the Sheriff's Pistol Range. Referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.
- 2. For furnishing white and yellow reflectorized traffic paint. Referred to the Road and Lake Committee.
- 3. For electrically operated doors for the Hennepin County Shops at Hopkins. Referred to the Road and Lake Committee.

The bond of L. P. Zimmerman, County Engineer, was received and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Letters were read from O. A. Pearson, Budget and Purchasing Agent, as follows:

- 1. Notifying the Board of the acceptance of the low bid of Wilbur Bennington for furnishing bodily injury or death and property damage insurance.
- 2. Relative to the present declared valuations of certain buildings and equipment owned by Hennepin County and whether the insurance should be carried on a co-insurance basis of 80% or on a total coverage basis, and requesting that a decision on the disposition of the pending bids await the Board's conclusions.

Commissioner Scott moved, seconded by Commissioner Christensen to accept the low bid.

The vote on the motion was as follows: Ainsworth yea, Christensen yea, Hanson yea, Scott yea, Chairman Matthews nay. Motion carried.

A notice from the Twin Cities Carpenters District Council

indicating changes in the new contract effective May 1st, 1954, was referred to the County Engineer.

Contracts and contract bonds were received from the following:

- 1. Lake Minnetonka Dredging Co. for excavation and crushed rock embankment at the "Narrows" Channel, Lake Minnetonka.
- 2. Richards Oil Company for furnishing M.C. Cut-Back Asphalt and R.C. Cut-Back Asphalt.
- 3. Carl Bolander & Sons, Co. for furnishing on an hourly rental basis one 3/4 cubic yard dragline.
- 4. Petroleum Service, Division of W.H. Barber Company for furnishing gasoline and oil for the cars operated by the Sheriff's office.

All of the above contracts and bonds were referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

A letter from H. P. Sahly, member of the Plymouth Town Board, requesting assistance in putting a dust coat of oil on 18th Avenue North in the 11,000 block was read and referred to the County Engineer for an estimate of cost.

A letter from Leroy Trafton, Manager, Village of Richfield, submitting a copy of a resolution adopted by the Richfield Village Council rescinding the resolution (No. 238) adopted November 12, 1953, opposing the designation of 62nd Street as a State Aid Highway and declaring itself in favor of the plan for a cross-town highway for East and West traffic in the general vicinity of the South Minneapolis city limits, was read and ordered placed on file.

Letters were received from L. P. Zimmerman, County Engineer,

as follows:

- 1. Notifying the Board that the summer working hours for Road and Lake Department employees has been set from 7:30 o'clock A.M. to 4:00 o'clock P.M. for the period from May 15th to September 17th. Ordered placed on file.
- 2. Submitting prints showing the profile of S.A.R. No. 17 from 70th Street to 62nd Street and of S.A.R. No. 53 from 66th Street to 64th Street, together with a resolution adopted by the Village of Edina establishing the grades of these two State Aid Roads. Referred to the Road and Lake Committee meeting to be held May 20th at 10:00 o'clockA.M.

A letter from L. P. Zimmerman, addressed to O.A. Pearson,
Budget and Purchasing Agent, submitting an analysis of the specifications under which bids were received for furnishing a crawler type
tractor with front end loader shovel, was read. Mr. Strand and
Mr. Whalen of the Wm. H. Ziegler Company and Mr. Deebach of the
Rosholt Equipment Company, addressed the Board relative to their
respective machines.

At 10:15 o'clock A.M., Mr. McCubrey of the State Highway Department, proceeded to open bids for improving State Aid Road No. 117 submitted by the following bidders:

Don Gray
Park Construction Company
Mike Welch
Carl H.Peterson Company
McLean-Astleford Company

The bids were referred to Mr. McCubrey and Mr. Zimmerman for a tabulation and a report back to the Board.

At 10:15 o'clock A.M., the time specified in the published advertisements for bids, O.A. Pearson, Budget and Purchasing Agent proceeded to open bids as follows:

- 1. For truck tractor with snow plows.
- 2. For a bituminous material transport trailer.
  The above bids were referred to the Budget and Purchasing Agent for a report to be made at the next Board meeting.

Before opening the bids for the bituminous surfacing of State Aid or County Road No. 93 and No. 19, Mr. Pearson stated that an error had been made in the amount of "approximate quantities of bituminous material for mixture" called for in the specifications.

Commissioner Ainsworth moved, seconded by Commissioner Scott that the bids be returned unopened to the bidders.

Motion unanimously carried.

Mr. McCubrey of the State Highway Department, reported on the bids received for the improvement of State Aid Road No. 117 and recommended that the low bid of Don Gray be accepted at the bid amount of \$29,551.78.

Commissioner Ainsworth moved, seconded by Commissioner Scott that the County Board recommend to the Commissioner of State Highways acceptance of the low bid of Don Gray for the improvement of State Aid Road No. 117.

The Clerk to the Board presented the publisher's affidavit of publishing the notice of hearing, the Sheriff's return of posting said notices, and the County Auditor's certificate of mailing said notices of hearing. A letter was read from Viola S. Thompson, Assistant County Superintendent of Schools, recommending the granting of Mr. Puck's petition.

A certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Education of Independent School District St. Louis Park (No. 205) requesting Walter Wheeler, School Board Attorney, to appear before the County Board voicing the opposition of the School Board to Mr. Puck's petition was read. Mr. Wheeler also suggested that Mr. Puck meet with the St. Louis Park School Board to determine whether other residents of the district may wish to transfer their property from School District No. 205 to School District No. 225.

Commissioner Ainsworth moved, seconded by Commissioner Hanson that the hearing be continued to August 10, 1954, at 10:20 o'clock A.M.

Letters from E. J. Shannon, Assistant County Attorney, submitting a quit claim deed to the Minneapolis Park Board and an easement to the City of Minneapolis of a portion of the Vince A. Day Center property, were read.

J. Armand Taylor, President of the Save the Lakes Association, appeared before the Board opposing the commercialization of lakeshore property and asking that the sale of the Vince A. Day Center property be referred to a committee to be comprised of members of the County Board, the Park Board, and the City Planning Commission.

The metter was referred to the Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings.

A letter from John K. Harvey, Assistant County Attorney, addressed to O. A. Pearson, Budget and Purchasing Agent, relative to the interpretation of the specifications for the purchase of one  $l^{\frac{1}{2}}$  cubic yard hydraulic front end shovel mounted on crawler type tractor, and

submitting an opinion that the specifications are in conflict with the law, was read.
