Minneapolis, Minnesota Tuesday, January 2, 1962

The Board of County Commissioners for the County of Hennepin, Minnesota, met in the Court House in the City of Minneapolis, at ten o'clock A.M., pursuant to law.

Themeeting was called to order by Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, and there were present:

Commissioner Richard O. Hanson First District
Commissioner George W. Matthews . . . Second District
Commissioner Elwood B. Swanson . . . Third District
Commissioner Mrs. I. G. Scott . . . Fourth District
Commissioner S. E. Ainsworth . . . Fifth District

Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, administered the oath of office to the commissioners and then called for nominations for the election of a chairman of the County Board of Hennepin County for the year 1962.

It was moved by Commissioner Hanson, seconded by Commissioner Swanson and carried that the voting for chairman and vice-chairman of the County Board be by secret ballot.

Mr. Fitzsimmons designated Commissioners Scott and Ainsworth to act as tellers. After tallying the ballots, the tellers announced five votes for Commissioner Matthews. Mr. Fitzsimmons declared Com-

missioner Matthews elected Chairman of the County Board for the year 1962. Chairman Matthews then took the chair, and called for nominations for vice-chairman of the County Board for the ensuing year. He designated Commissioners Hanson and Scott to act as tellers.

After tallying the ballots, the tellers announced three votes for Commissioner Ainsworth, one vote for Commissioner Swanson, and one blank ballot. Chairman Matthews then declared Commissioner Ainsworth elected Vice-Chairman of the County Board for the year 1962.

A letter from Victor K. Funk, M.D., Medical Director, Hennepin County Tuberculosis Control Program and Chest Clinic, submitting a listing of patients in Glen Lake Sanatorium as of December 31, 1961, being continued for care and treatment of tuberculosis in Glen Lake State Sanatorium as of January 1, 1962, and requesting approval of the applications as required by 1957 M.S. Sections 251.02 or 251.03, or by Section 144.422 in cases of commitment.

Commissioner Hanson moved, seconded by Commissioner Ainsworth that the list submitted by Dr. Funk, insofar as it applies to Hennepin County residents, be approved.

Motion unanimously carried.

Commissioner Swanson moved, seconded by Commissioner Scott that effective January 1, 1962, Mina P. Wicklund, Acting Veterans' Service Officer, be returned to her former status in the Hennepin County Veterans' Service Office.

Motion unanimously carried.

A letter from Edward P. Dietrich, Ass't. County Attorney, submitting a warranty deed for right-of-way property along County State

Aid Road No. 18 was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Letters from Stanley R. Cowle, Budget Director, notifying the Board of the acceptance of various low bids, were referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Specifications for furnishing trucks, automobiles and grader and scraper blades for the Central Mobile Equipment Division were referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

At 10:15 o'clock A.M., the time specified in the published advertisements for bids, Stanley R. Minneapolis, Minnesota Tuesday, January 9, 1962

The Board of County Commissioners for the County of Hennepin, Minnesota, met in the Court House in the City of Minneapolis, at ten o'clock A.M., pursuant to adjournment.

All members were present.

The meeting was called to order by George W. Matthews, Chairman.

Annual reports of fees, emoluments and gratuities received by County officials during the year 1961 were presented and ordered filed.

Annual reports were received from Ed Ryan, Sheriff, and Donald C. Bennyhoff, Register of Deeds and Registrar of Titles, and ordered filed.

Monthly reports from Ed Ryan, Sheriff, Donald C. Bennyhoff, Register of Deeds and Registrar of Titles, and George G. Roadfeldt, County Extension Agent, were ordered placed on file.

A statement of balances in the County Revenue Allowances as of December 31, 1961, received from Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, was ordered published and placed on file.

An application for a permit to allow the consumption of intoxicating liquor in a public place was received and referred to John K. Harvey, Attorney for the County Board.

Letters from Elmer H. Larson, Land Commissioner, requesting approval for the withdrawal from sale and the classification of certain tax forfeited lands as non-conservation lands were referred to the Committee on Public Grounds, Buildings and Institutions.

A letter from Dr. Funk, Medical Director, Hennepin County Chest Clinic, submitting applications for admission to Glen Lake State Sanatorium was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Letters were presented from Philip H. Olson, 6309 South Knoll Drive, Minneapolis, and Frank Porter, 6805 Hillside Lane, Minneapolis, both being candidates to fill the vacancy on the Board of Managers of Nine Mile Creek Watershed District, caused by the resignation of Hugh J. MacMillan.

Commissioner Hanson moved, seconded by Commissioner Scott that the Board make its selection by secret ballot.

Motion unanimously carried.

Chairman Matthews appointed Commissioners Ainsworth and Scott to act as tellers.

After tallying the ballots, the tellers announced four votes for Mr.Olson and one vote for Mr. Porter. Chairman Matthews then declared Philip H. Olson a member of the Board of Managers of the Nine Mile Creek Watershed District for a term to expire on September 30, 1964.

A letter from Robert F. Fitzsimmons, County Auditor, submitting claims payable from the Contributions and Awards Fund, was referred to

the Committee on Ways and Means.

Letters were received from Stanley R. Cowle, Purchasing Agent, as follows:

Commissioner Hanson from the Committee on Ways and Means offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, This Board has determined that it is for the best interest of the County that a uniform set of rules and regulations governing conditions of employment be enacted and that the compensation of salaried County employees be based on a merit-longevity system and that the system of grade numbers, salary ranges and classifications for each position in the County Highway Department, Budget and Purchasing Department, Supervisor of Assessments, Noxious Weeds, Lake Improvement, Central Mobile Equipment Division, Water Patrol, Veterans Service Office, Land Department and Property Rental Division, Remonumentation and Hennepin County Chest Clinic be adopted as hereto attached.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the attached schedules setting forth:

- (1) Rules and regulations governing the conditions of employment;
- (2) Hourly employees classifications and pay rates;
- (3) Classification and Salary Grade number assignments, including the salary ranges listed therein, together with the Increment and Longevity Schedule procedures hereto attached, be adopted effective as of January 1, 1962.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR EMPLOYEES UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

A. EMPLOYMENT AND JOB ASSIGNMENT

1. Authorization for Werk

Authorization to work shall be made by an "Order for Employment" approved and signed by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the appropriate Board committee.

2. Job Assignments

Tob assignments shall be made by the department head and shall be made on the basis of qualifications, abilities, and skills.

Seniority will be considered, but not the controlling factor in job assignments.

3. Physical Examination

As a condition of acceptance for beginning employment, each applicant shall be required to take a physical examination to determine his physical ability to perform the duties of his job classification. Biennial physical examinations shall be required for all employees age 55 and over. The County shall designate the physician to perform the examination and shall pay the cost of such examination.

4. Physical or Other Disability

Any employee, who in the performance of his duties, demonstrates a failure to qualify physically, mentally, or otherwise for such classification, shall be assigned or transferred to a job classification within his abilities or qualifications, where possible. If such employee is unable to fill any job classification within existing classifications, he shall be retired or separated from County employment.

5. Probationary Period

Any person newly employed by Hennepin County shall be on probation for six months. Upon completion of such six month probationary period, the effective date of employment for all purposes shall revert to the initial employment date. If a probationer shall be found incompetent or unqualified to perform the duties of the position to which he was assigned, the department head may discharge such probationer any time during the probationary period. Specific reasons for such discharge shall be given in writing to the employee and filed with the County Board.

6. Suspension, Demotion, Discharge, and Promotion

The department head may suspend for a period up to and including three days, demote, discipline, discharge, or promote employees of his department. Appointments, within Board approved budgetary limitations, shall be made on the basis of qualifications, abilities, and skills. Seniority will be considered, but not the controlling factor in promotions.

7. Reasons for Suspension, Demotion, Discharge

The following are causes for suspension, denotion, or discharge:

- a) Conviction for any criminal offense involving moral turpitude.
- b) Neglect of duty, insubordination, willful violation or disobedience of rules of the department head or the County Board.

c) Inefficiency in performing duties.

d) Determination on the part of the department head, with the consent of the County Board, to permit a position to become or remain vacant. When it is determined that the position is to be refilled, such demoted or separated employee has the first right to be remployed for that position.

8. Appeal from Discharge

The department head shall give notice in writing to the employee, stating the specific reasons for discharge and shall file such notice with the County Board. The employee or his or her representative shall, upon written notice to the County Board, be entitled to a hearing within ten days of such discharge. If it is determined by the County Board that the employee has been unjustly discharged, he shall be reinstated at once to his former position, and all wages and other benefits lost during his time off shall be credited to him.

9. Seniority

Seniority is established primarily to provide employment security and to serve as a basis for required lay-offs, promotions, or re-employments. Each department head shall provide employees with a seniority list within appropriately similar classifications, which list would provide the basis for layoffs in the event such layoffs are required.

10. Retirement Policy

- a) Effective January 1, 1963, all County employees under the jurisdiction of the County Board who have reached the age of 68 during the preceding year shall be retired from County employment.
- b) Effective January 1, 1964, all employees under the jurisdiction of the County Board who have reached the age of 67 years during the preceding year shall be retired from County employment.
- c) Effective January 1, 1965, all employees under the jurisdiction of the County Board who have reached the age of 66 years during the preceding year shall be retired from County employment.
- d) Effective January 1, 1966, all employees under the jurisdiction of the County Board who have reached the age of 65 years during the preceding year shall be retired from County employment.

B. WORK PROCEDURES

1. Hours of Work

a) The regular work day for employees shall be eight hours.

b) The regular work week for employees shall be forty hours.

c) The average work month for employees for purposes of computing vacation leave, severance benefits, or fractions of a month's work shall be 173 hours.

2. Overtime

- a) Overtime shall be allowed and paid as earned to any employee except department heads and whatever employees department heads might deem exceptions. Whenever possible, however, compensatory time-off shall be granted in lieu of overtime pay.
- b) Overtime shall be computed on the basis of one and one-half times the regular rate of pay computed on an hourly basis.
- c) Overtime shall be confined to necessary emergency work, work and performance which is not possible during the regular work hours.

Coffee Breaks

Employees shall be entitled to a fifteen minute relief period each morning and afternoon which time shall be designated by the department head.

4. Employees shall be entitled to a 30 minute lunch period, which time shall be designated by the department head.

5. Absence and Tardiness

Any employee absent from work, or who, for good reason is late reporting to work shall notify his immediate superior as soon as possible giving reasons for such absence or tardiness.

6. Violation of Work Procedures

Continued abuses or violation of work procedures shall be cause for discipline by the department head.

C. COMPENSATION

1. Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages will be paid at the rates established by the County Board.

2. Pay Deductions and Procedures

- a) Pay days are semi-monthly except for overtime, which will be paid monthly.
- b) As of the date of passage of this resolution the following deductions from paychecks have been approved:

- (1) Federal Income Tax
- (2) State Income Tax
- (3) Public Employees Retirement Association deductions
- (4) Insurance Benefits
- (5) Union Dues
- (6) Savings Bonds
- (7) United Fund

The amounts and rates of these deductions are subject to determination by the County Board and other superceding entities, and subject to the approval of the employee where applicable.

3. Auto Allowance

Employees using their personal cars while engaged in County work shall be entitled to certain reimbursement subject to the approval of the department head. Two kinds of reimbursements are possible subject to necessary approvals:

- a) A straight mileage allowance of seven and one-half cents per mile.
- b) An allowance of \$1.50 per day for each day the employee's auto is officially used. This base allowance shall not be paid for more than 20 days in each month. The minimum allowance shall be \$20.00 per month for each employee required to have his own automobile available for such business periodically through the month. If this base allowance is paid, it shall be in addition to a mileage allowance which shall not exceed seven and one-half cents a mile for the first 500 miles in any one month and five and one-half cents a mile thereafter. The County Board must authorize this allowance.

4. Ensurance Reimbursement

Partial insurance reimbursement shall be made to employees using their personal cars while engaged in County work to compensate for premiums paid on liability and property damage insurance. When transportation is necessary and required in the performance of official duties on a full time basis, the County shall reimburse the employee in the amount of \$22.00 on annual premiums paid. When transportation is necessary and required in the performance of official duties but only on a part

time basis, the County shall reimburse the employee in the amount of \$11.00 on annual premiums paid. The limits of needed insurance shall be in accordance with requirements set by the County Board.

5. Severance Pay

a) Severance Pay shall be paid to employees who have completely severed their employment with the County, including those whose severance is occasioned by death. Any employee who shall have received severance pay upon termination of his employment shall not again be eligible to accrue any severance pay benefits upon re-employment with the County, except for days accumulated over and above the number for which he was formerly compensated.

- b) Such severance pay shall be based upon and measured by the accumulated sick leave and unused vacation time accruing to such employee, to be paid upon separation or retirement of the employee from County employment. Such severance pay shall not exceed 60 days of the accumulated sick leave and unused vacation time which has accrued to the credit of the employee at the date of severance of such employment, except in the case of death when such severance pay shall not exceed 90 days.
- c) Severance pay shall be computed on the basis of the average rate of pay of the employee during the last year of employment prior to the payment of the severance pay.
- d) Severance pay in the amount not exceeding \$1,000.00 may be paid to the widow of a deceased employee. All other severance pay of a deceased employee shall be paid to his estate or his legal representative.
- e) Application for severance pay shall be made to the department head, whose duty it shall be to compute and recommend the amount of severance pay due the employee and to submit to the County Board in writing this recommendation, together with the facts and figures upon which the computation of such severance is based. In no event shall any severance pay be paid to an employee unless approved by the County Board by resolution fixing the amount of such severance pay.

D. LEAVES OF ABSENCE

1. Vacation with Pay

- a) All employees will be granted one day of vacation with pay for each month of County employment except that no employee is credited with vacation during his first six months of employment. After having accumulated six months of consecutive probationary employment, an employee is automatically credited with six days of vacation.
- b) After five continuous years of employment, each employee shall be granted one and one-quarter days of vacation for each month of County employment.
- c) For purposes of computing months of employment, if an employee shall have commenced service prior to the 15th day of any month, his years of service shall be figured from the first day of the month in which he commenced service; if he shall have commenced service subsequent to the 15th day of any month, his years of service shall be figured from the first day of the following month.
- d) As of January 1st of each year, an employee automatically loses any accumulated vacation over 24 days. It is permissible to accumulate days over this 24 day limit between January 1st periods.
- e) All vacations must be arranged at least 48 hours in advance and are subject to the approval of the department head. In the case of an emergency, the department head can waive this 48 hour notice requirement. Employees will be given an opportunity to select vacation periods in so far as work requirements permit.

- f) When a vacation is taken, only working days are subtracted from the vacation time to the employee's credit. For example, if an employee takes two weeks of vacation, he will be charged as using ten days of vacation time.
- g) A minimum of four hours will be charged for each vacation leave taken except where this rule is waived by the department head.
- h) At the discretion of the department head, an employee may in an individual case be granted maternity leave for a reasonable period of time. Such leave will be without pay and without the accumulation of leave or other benefits.

2. Sick Leave

- a) All employees will be granted one day of sick leave for each month of County employment.
- b) Sick leave will be granted for actual sickness, temporary physical disability, serious illness in the immediate family, or quarantine. Immediate family shall mean the spouse, parent, or child of an employee.
- c) Payment of sick leave may be withheld until proof of one of the foregoing conditions is presented to, or accepted by the department head. A doctor's certificate must be presented, if requested.
- d) An employee on sick leave shall notify or have notified his immediate superior as soon as possible, stating the nature and possible duration of his illness. When he returns to work, an employee shall call his immediate supervisor the afternoon of the day preceding his return to work, giving notification of his return to work.
- e) An employee may accumulate 100 days of sick leave. For every day of sick leave over 100 days, he will be given credit for one-half day of additional vacation and one-half day of "banked" sick leave. The banked sick leave may be used only in case of a long illness lasting over the accumulated 100 days and shall not be used in the computation of severance pay either as accrued vacation or accrued sick leave.
- f) Sick leave is charged off on a working day basis. For example, if an employee is absent because of illness for one week, only five days will be charged against his accumulated sick leave.
- g) A minimum of one hour will be charged for each period of sick leave taken.

Holidays

- a) All employees shall be granted leave of absence with pay on legal holidays. These are:
 - (1) New Year's Day
 - (2) Lincoln's Birthday
 - (3) Washington's Birthday
 - (4) Good Friday
 - (5) Memorial Day
 - (6) Independence Day
- (7) Labor Day
- (8) Columbus Day
- (9) Veterans Day
- (10) Thanksgiving Day
- (11) Christmas Day

- b) New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Christmas Day shall be considered "major" holidays. When any such major holiday falls upon a Sunday, the following Monday shall be considered a holiday for all employees. When a major holidy falls upon a Saturday, the preceding Friday shall be considered a holidy for all employees.
- c) Holidays which fall within an employee's vacation or sick leave period will not be chargeable to the employee's vacation or sick leave time.
- d) Employees must be on the payroll on the work day immediately preceding a holidy to be eligible for that same holiday.
- e) Employees who are not full time will be paid for holidays in proportion to the time they are on the payroll. For example, a half time employee will be paid half time for holidays.

4. Election Days

- a) Every employee desiring to vote at an election shall be permitted up to two hours of time from his work for that purpose during the forenoon of an election day without penalty or deduction from salary or wages on account of such absence.
- b) Employees who are not eligible to vote or do not have any intention to vote shall report to work at their regularly scheduled time.
- c) Employees making claim for time off for voting and not easting a ballot will be subject to disciplinary action.

5. Armed Forces Training

Employees who are members of any reserve component of the military forces of the United States shall be granted leave of absence with pay, not to exceed 15 days annually, when ordered to active duty for such training periods as are necessary to their participation in a reserve training program. (M.S.1957, Sec.192.26)

6. Funeral Leave

Employees shall be allowed a reasonable funeral leave as approved by the department head. The leave shall be chargeable against accumulated vacation or sick leave.

7. Court Duty

Employees subpoensed as witnesses or called and selected for jury duty shall receive their regular compensation and other benefits less the amount received by them as juror or witness fees. For easiest processing of this policy, employee should return to the accounting office juror or witness fees less car mileage.

8. Attendance at Meetings or Conventions

The department head may authorize employees to attend conventions, meetings, training programs when he determine that such attendance will be in the best interests of the department. Expenditure of public monies relating to such conventions, meetings, or training programs must be authorized and approved by the County Board. Such attendance shall not be deducted from any leave time.

9. Leaves other than the foregoing

Leaves of absence other than the foregoing will not be authorized unless approved by the department head and/or the County Board.

E. MISCELLANEOUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Time Cards

All employees shall prepare time cards, properly authenticated by the department head or his designated assistant for periodic submission to the Accounting Office. All data relating to work time, vacations and sick leave shall be incorporated in the time cards.

2. Accounting of Leave Time

All employees will be given an annual accounting of their accumulated vacation and sick leave as of the first day of the year.

3. Workmen's Compensation Benefits and Leave Time

Any employee who, by reason of sickness or injury, received Workmen's Compensation benefits may do one of two things: (1) Either transfer the benefits to the County and accept sick leave time for the sickness or injury; (2) or keep the Workmen's Compensation benefits and receive from the County additional benefits from accumulated sick leave, vacation leave, or other accumulated leave time. In eithercase, the total weekly rate of compensation may not exceed the regular weekly wage on an employee. The advantage of alternative number two is one of using as few of one's accumulated leave days as possible.

4. Leave Benefits for Casual, Student, or Temporary Employees

Casual, student, or temporary employees shall not be considered employees entitled to benefits listed within this resolution. However, casual, student, or temporary employees shall be entitled to all holidays listed within this resolution if such employees had worked the work day preceding the holiday.

5. Employment of More than One Family Member

No more than one member of a family shall be employed at any time within a single department. The word "family" shall mean husband, wife, and their children whether by whole or half blood, or adoption.

6. Release of News Information

No employee shall give any information to any person or persons who may want to use the information for publication in any news column without the permission of the department head.

7. Late Time Cards

Employee time cards shall be turned in no later than the dates designated by the department heads. Employees not turning in their time cards by these designated dates shall not receive their pay until the following pay period.

F. MEANING OF DEPARTMENT HEAD

For the purposes of this resolution, department head shall mean the Budget and Purchasing Director in the case of the Budget & Purchasing Office and Property Rental Division, the Supervisor of Assessments in the case of the Assessor's Office, the Land Commissioner in the case of the Tax Forfeited Land Department; the County Highway Administrator in the case of the Highway Mobile Equipment, Lake Improvement, and Noxious Weeds Departments, Veterans Service Office for the Veterans Service Office, the Medical Director for the Hennepin County Chest Clinic, and the Captain of the Water Patrol for the Boat & Water Safety Enforcement Division.

EXCELANATION OF TRUTCHEST SCHEDULE PROCEDURES

- 1) Each salary grade number and range shall have six ment and longevity increment steps of three per cent each. Merit-longevity step increases shall be an administrative procedure as outlined in this resolution.
- 2) The increases in rates of pay other than the automatic cost of living increases are not intended to be completely automatic. An employee shall be eligible for these increments only if he meets the following conditions:
 - a) That, as a new employee, he meets the requirements of length of service which are six months of continuous employment for Step "B", and an additional twelve months of continuous employment in the same classification for each of Steps "C" through "G". Employees promoted to higher classifications shall require twelve months of continuous employment in the higher classification for each successive "step" increase.
 - b) That he has the recommendation for "step" increases from his division and/or department head.
- 3) The salary of an employee who advances from one grade to another by promotion shall be the next full increment step higher than the salary last received by such employee in the lower classification. Thereafter, the salary shall increase annually according to the succeeding years' rates as set forth in the grade and range chart.
- 4) The effective date of a merit increase shall be the first day of the pay period following the anniversary of employment or promotion.
- 5) In determining years of service, absence or leave within regular leave provisions as provided in the department's rules and regulations shall not be excluded in determining such years of service. All other layoffs, suspensions, or leaves of absence shall be excluded in computing years of service and shall defer the date of salary advancement for the same length of time as that of the layoff, suspension or leave of absence.
- 6) Long-term longevity increase shall be granted to an employee on the following factors:
 - a) That he has a minimum of eighteen years of service with the County of Hennepin.
 - b) That he has a minimum of three years at the top of his grade and classification assignment.
 - c) That he has the recommendation for the long-term longevity increase from his division and/or department head.

Cowle, Budget Director, notifying the Board of the acceptance of the low bids for furnishing sand to the Hennepin County Highway Department during the year 1962, of F. W. Woodrich Company in the amount of \$1,860.00 for furnishing 3000 tons of sand, Contract No. 201-21, Mapco Sand & Gravel Company in the amount of \$1,035.00 for furnishing 1500 tons of sand, Contract No. 202-21, and of Anderson Aggregates, Inc. in the amount of \$2,800.00 for furnishing 8000 tons of sand, Contract No. 203-21, your committee recommends:
