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MINNESOTA STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY

THREE HUNDRED NINETEENTH MEETING

January 23, 1950. The Board met at the College of Pharmacy, University of Minnesota, at 8:30 o'clock A.M. Members present: Vice President B. A. Deterling, Harry W. Carlsen, J. G. Pasternacki, Victor E. Feit, and Angus H. Taylor, the new member appointed by Governor Luther W. Youngdahl on December , 1949 to a full term of five years. Mr. Taylor succeeds J. Norman French, whose term as member expired January 2, 1950.

All of the above were given the practical examination. which occupied all day. Each applicant was given 15 prescriptions to compound.

January 24, 1950. The Board gave the written examination to those required to take same: seven who had taken the practical on Monday, and eight who were eligible to take only the written as they had not obtained the one year of drug store experience as vet.

One candidate, Eugene L. Price, appeared to retake the written in Chemistry as he received a mark of below 60 percent in that subject, although receiving a passing grade as a general average in the entire written examination which he took in January, 1949.

The Board also considered and reviewed the applications filed for reciprocity. Five applications had been filed and each applicant had been notified to appear in person before the Board at the College of Pharmacy, Tuesday morning, January 24. These were:

They were given the written examination in Jurisprudence required of all reciprocal applicants.

January 25, 1950. The Board gave the oral examination to twenty-seven candidates, those who had taken the practical. This occupied all morning and part of the afternoon. When this was completed, Board departed to its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel. The Board began marking the written work of the candidates.

January 26, 1950. The Board met in its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel, 9:15 A.M. Meeting called to order by Vice President B. A. Deterling.

The secretary reported that under date of January 16, 1950 he received a letter from Silver, Green and Goff, attorneys for Harry Lebow, a registered pharmacist operating a store at 3400 Nicollet Avenue, Minneapolis, Minn. This letter was brought to the attention of the Board's legal counsel and he advised that time should be set for their

appearance. The secretary stated arrangements had been made and these people were waiting to be heard. Vice President Deterling asked that Mr. Lebow and his counsel, Mr. Green, be called in.

George Sjoselius, attorney for the Board, conducted the interview and asked Mr. Green to present his case. Mr. Green reviewed the case and pointed out to the Board that he thought the sentence imposed on Mr. Lebow was too drastic in light of action taken by the court, and appealed for reinstatement of his license. No new evidence was presented.

Mr. Green then introduced Lieutenant Gladys L. Cooke of the Minneapolis Police Department, and after questioning by Mr. Sjoselius, Mr. Green made a final plea and again asked the Board to reinstate Mr. Lebow's license.

After the group had left the matter was discussed for sometime. The following action was taken:

Moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Pasternacki:

RESOLVED by the Minnesota State Board of Pharmacy, duly convened in the City of Minneapolis, Minnesota, on the 26th day of January, 1950, as follows:

Harry Lebow, having appeared before the Board on this date, personally and by his counsel, Wm. C. Green of St. Paul, Minnesota, and the Board having heard the arguments of counsel and the testimony adduced by Mr. Lebow.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the license of Harry Lebow granted to him by the Minnesota State Board of Pharmacy to practice as a pharmacist, which was suspended for a period of six (6) months from December 1, 1949, be reinstated on March 1, 1950.

Motion carried.

The Board then adjourned to continue the marking of the written work of the candidates.

January 26, 1950. Meeting called to order at 10:00 A.M. by Vice President Deterling.

The minutes of the July and October meetings were read and approved.

A copy of the financial statement for the year ending December 31, 1949 was distributed to each Board Member.

The secretary read a statistical report covering the number of pharmacists actively engaged in the practice of pharmacy, the number who are inactive, the number residing out of State, the number who have died or been dropped during 1949; the number of drug stores, the number that have closed and new stores opened during the past year; the number taking the examinations, number registered; number granted registration by reciprocity.

It was moved and seconded that the statistical report given by the secretary be accepted. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the financial statement be accepted. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the membership dues to the National Association Boards of Pharmacy, \$25; the 5th District Boards and Colleges of Pharmacy, \$15; the Association of Food and Drug Officials of the United States, \$3; and the Conference of Pharmaceutical Law Enforcement Officials, \$10; be paid out of the funds of the Board. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the fee for pharmacist renewal for 1950 be fixed at \$5; the fee for assistant pharmacist be fixed at \$3; and the fee for drug store license be fixed at \$5. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the bond premium for the secretary be paid out of the funds of the Board. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that \$2,000 be turned over to the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association for the advancement of the Science and Art in Pharmacy as provided by law. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the July examination begin on the 10th as there is a large class graduating from the College of Pharmacy, and undoubtedly the examination will run into the following week. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that all the members of the Board and its secretary be sent as delegates to the meeting of the 5th District Boards and Colleges of Pharmacy. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the Board indicate a preference as to meeting place of the 5th District Boards and Colleges of Pharmacy. Motion carried. The preference was for Rapid City, So. Dak.

It was moved and seconded that two delegates be sent to the meeting of the National Association Boards of Pharmacy, and the Conference of the Law Enforcement Officials of the United States, to be held April 30, May 1-5, 1950, at Atlantic City. Motion carried.

The secretary read a letter from Carl Hallberg, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, relative to opening a prescription pharmacy in a doctors! clinic in Litchfield, Minnesota, requesting application for a drug store license. The secretary also read his reply to Mr. Hallberg's letter. The application not being complete, no action was taken by the Board.

This being the annual meeting of the Board, election of officers was in order.

It was moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Pasternacki, that B. A. Deterling be nominated for president. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that nominations be closed. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot electing Mr. Deterling president. Motion carried. The secretary cast the ballot and Mr. Deterling was declared elected president for the ensuing year, beginning February 1.

It was moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Pasternacki, that Harry W. Carlsen be nominated for wice president. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that nominations be closed. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot electing Mr. Carlsen vice president. Motion carried. The secretary cast the ballot and Mr. Carlsen was declared elected vice president for the ensuing year, beginning February 1.

It was moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Carlsen, that Frank W. Moudry be nominated for secretary. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that nominations be closed. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that vice president Deterling cast a unanimous ballot electing Mr. Moudry secretary. Motion carried. Mr. Deterling cast the ballot and Mr. Moudry was declared elected secretary for the ensuing year, beginning February 1.

Minn. State Board of Pharmacy -- 319th Meeting -- January, 1950

It was moved and seconded that Effie M. Swanson be reelected assistant secretary. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that Earl J. Schlekau be retained as Chief Inspector. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the inspector's salary be increased to the next step (\$8.00), from \$252 to \$260 per month. Motion carried.

The matter of notebooks was again discussed, that some plan should be mapped out relative to the contents of same so that all students would be required to keep the same type of records covering their practical experience. The contents should be grouped as to unusual prescriptions in one section, for example: new items in another: drug store procedure in one section, and so on.

Some of the students were turning in very fine notebooks covering their work as apprentices in pharmacy, while others were of no value at all. Therefore, some method should be worked out so that contents would follow a uniform standard.

On motion Board adjourned until the next day.

January 27, 1950. Meeting was called to order by president Deterling.

Minn. State Board of Pharmacy -- 320th Meeting -- July 1950

July 12 and 13, 1950. The Board gave the oral examination to all those who had taken the practical work. This occupied the two days.

July 14, 1950. The Board met in its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis, Minn., at 8:30 A.M., with its counsel, George Sjoselius. Meeting called to order by President Deterling.

The secretary presented to the Board the application of Snyders Drug Stores, Inc., for a license to operate a drug store at 6630 Lyndale Ave. S., Minneapolis, Minnesota. The Board's Regulation No. 14 and its application to this request was discussed. It was brought out that Snyders were in operating drug stores at the time of the adoption of Regulation No. 14 and that they were acquiring an existing licensed Liggett drug store and wished that license transferred to them at a new location.

It was moved by Mr. Pasternacki, seconded by Mr. Feit, that the Board issue a license to Snyders Drug Stores, Inc., to operate a drug store at 6630 Lyndale Avenue S., Minneapolis, Minnesota, on the basis of application filed, dated July 12, 1950, and transfer of location of an existing licensed store. Motion carried.

It was pointed out that since the Red Owl entered the field of selling medicines in their stores, other grocery stores were meeting this competition by selling medicines, to the extent that medicines were being stocked in many grocery stores and general stores who up to this time had refrained from selling patent medicines.

It was further mentioned that if the sale of these medicines were made by all dealers, there would be no control over the distribution of these drugs and medicines, and the indiscriminate sale of these items would not be in the best interest of the health and welfare of the people of the state, if medicines were sold by persons who have no knowledge or training in the field of drugs.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the Attorney General be requested to bring proper action against Red Owl Stores, Inc., if the evidence of violation of the pharmacy act is sufficient in his opinion. Motion carried.

3:00 o'clock P.M.

Victor L. Siverson, a registered pharmacist operating a drug store at Hendricks, Minnesota, had been asked to appear before the Board, but he was unable to do so as he was in the Willmar hospital, Willmar, Minnesota. The secretary read a letter from Dr. P. E. Hermanson of Hendricks, Minn., informing the Board of Mr. Siverson's conduct and condition.

It was agreed by the Board that Mr. Siverson should be asked to appear before the Board at the next meeting, if he was out of the hospital at that time, and the secretary was instructed to ascertain this fact and so notify Mr. Siverson.

4:00 o'clock P.M.

Clair L. Flanders had been asked to appear before the Board. The secretary had received a complaint from Bert F. Supplee, operating a drug store at 3500 Chicago Ave., Minneapolis, Minn., in which he stated Mr. Flanders had been in his employ as a relief pharmacist since May 1950, that Mr. Flanders was now a member of Alcoholics Anonymous but that it was still necessary to have constant supervision over him while working in the store, and that there was some evidence that he was not adhering to the rules set for him at the time of his employment.

Mr. Flanders informed the Board he recently had joined Alcoholics Anonymous but that he had deviated from the promises he had made and on two occasions had drank. He further informed the Board he had marital troubles that were bothering him, but he felt that after August first some of these problems would be straightened out.

The Board informed Mr. Flanders that they had heard rumors of his conduct from time to time which indicated he had been doing excessive drinking which made him unfit to practice as an assistant pharmacist, thereby jeopardizing the safety of the public. The Board told him they wanted to be of help to him to straighten him out. He stated he was going to make a sincere effort to continue his affiliation with Alcoholics Anonymous on a basis that he could be helped, and that he felt he could make a comeback.

The Board advised Mr. Flanders that if further complaints were received, it would be necessary to cite him to appear before the Board to show cause why his license as an assistant pharmacist should not be revoked.

During this session the secretary received a telephone call from R. R. Rosell, secretary of the State Medical Association, informing him that at their convention in Duluth in June, Dr. Walter Gardner, chairman of their Interprofessional Relations Committee, made a report to the Council and House of Delegates on clinic pharmacies and dispensing doctors. Mr. Rosell stated that the convention asked Dr. Gardner to study this problem further and to meet with the Minnesota State Board of Pharmacy in an attempt to eliminate these practices.

In the discussion held by the Board after the secretary related the above telephone conversation with Mr. Rosell, it was indicated that our Board would be happy to meet with Dr. Gardner and his committee as soon as it would be convenient with them, and that the secretary should contact Dr. Gardner to arrange such a meeting.

Manley Brist, attorney for the State Medical Examining Board, also telephoned Secretary Moudry at this meeting to inform him of the outcome of the meeting of the State Medical Board held this day in St. Paul, and to which Dr. Ramby Rasmussen and Raymond Baumhofer, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, were cited to appear for irregularities in the handling of narcotics. Mr. Baumhofer had secured a license from the Board of Pharmacy to operate the Victoria Drug, 858 University Ave., St. Paul, Minnesota, and on the application indicated he was solf owner, but during the hearing before the Medical Board it was learned that Dr. Rasmussen was the owner of the store. Mr. Brist stated that an agreement had been reached at the meeting whereby Dr. Rasmussen was selling the store to Mr. Baumhofer.

In discussing the matter the Board asked its secretary to have Mr. Baumhofer appear before the Board on Tuesday, July 18, 1950, 2:00 o'clock P.M., at its rooms in the Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis.

July 15, 1950. The Board marked the written work of the candidates.

The date for the January, 1951 examination was set for the week beginning Monday, January 22.

The secretary read a letter from Carl A. Hallberg in regard to his application for a license to open a drug store in the Wilmot clinic, Litchfield, Minn., which he had filed with the Board.

It was moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the following motion be adopted. Motion carried.

WHEREAS, Carl A. Hallberg, a pharmacist registered in the State of Minnesota, has made application for a license to operate a pharmacy in the Wilmot Clinic Building in Litchfield, Minnesota, and

WHEREAS, from the information submitted by the applicant it appears that the floor space of the proposed pharmacy will be ten feet by eleven feet, which will make a space containing one hundred ten aquare feet, and

WHEREAS, the floor space of the proposed pharmacy does not meet the minimum requirement of four hundred square feet of space for a pharmacy, which is required by Regulation No. 17 of the State Board of Pharmacy, and

WHEREAS, the plans disclose there is no outside entrance to the proposed pharmacy space, which is also required by Regulation No. 17.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Minnesota State Board of Pharmacy duly convened in the Nicollet Hotel in Minneapolis, Minnesota, this 18th day of

July, 1950, that the application of Carl A. Hallberg for a license to operate a pharmacy in the Wilmot Clinic Building in Litchfield, Minnesota, is denied.

The Board discussed at some length the matter of dispensing by doctors, and also dispensing by nurses and office girls in doctors offices.

1:45 o'clock P.M.

The meeting was presided over by vice president Carlsen.

Raymond J. Baumhofer, a registered pharmacist, operating a drug store at 858 University Ave., St. Paul, Minnesota, appeared before the Board as requested, to explain and give information relative to irregularities in the handling of narcotic prescriptions and the dispensing of same. He stated that the doctors upstairs would telephone narcotic prescriptions and that these were never signed by the doctors. The doctors also had a nurse who would come down to store and pick up supplies and leave slips. Dr. R. Rasmussen told pharmacist employed by Mr. Baumhofer to sign the prescriptions, that he would stand back of him. The doctor was also in the store after closing hours, he having a key for the store. Shortage of narcotics was found by the Narcotic department when the store was checked, as was also the doctors. Mr. Baumhofer was asked by the Board who was responsible for narcotic shortage, and he answered he did not know. He also stated that if the Board would grant him a drug store license, he would close the store at 858 University Ave., St. Paul, and remove the drug stock to the McRoberts Pharmacy, 920 Selby Ave., St. Paul, which he was negotiating to buy.

The Board reprimanded Mr. Baumhofer for the careless manner in which narcotic prescriptions were handled in his store and warned him about complying with the law and requirements governing narcotics. Mr. Baumhofer was then excused.

Moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Feit, that a drug store license be granted to Raymond J. Baumhofer to operate a drug store at 920 Selby Ave., St. Paul, Minn. Motion carriad.

3:15 o'clock P.M.

Harry Lebow, a pharmacist operating a drug store at 3400 Nicollet Ave., Minneapolis, Minnesota, had been asked to appear before the Board relative to substitution on prescriptions. Complaint had come to the office relative to this. The Board asked Mr. Lebow if he did not know that it was a violation of the pharmacy law to substitute, and he said he knew that.

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After discussing further with Mr. Lebow relative to his policies in the operation of his store, the Board charged him with full compliance of all laws and regulations, and that he would be checked to see that he conducted his store and himself so as to be a credit to the profession of pharmacy, and that if he had to be called before the Board again, he would be dealt with accordingly.

Moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Carlsen, that the following sixteen pharmacists and two assistant pharmacists be dropped from the records, and their registrations cancelled, they having failed to renew their registrations for two years and are delinquent in the payment of dues for 1948 and 1949. Motion carried.

THREE HUNDRED TWENTY-FIRST MEETING

November 16, 1950. Special meeting called for purpose of discussing with Deputy Attorney General George Sjoselius, the Board's legal counsel, the matter of the Red Owl Company placing certain patent and proprietary medicines in its grocery stores for sale to the public, and the powers the Board might have to restrict the sale of some of the items to registered pharmacists; whether to bring legal action and if so, what would be best procedure. Other matters to come before the Board were: the present trend of placing drug racks in grocery and other retail outlets throughout the State; pharmacy legislation that might be proposed that would be detrimental to pharmacy; possibility of amending the pharmacy law in the next session of the Legislature; final disposition of charges against Edwin Shirley and Irving E. Kaplan, registered pharmacists; consideration of reciprocal applicants.

Members present: President B. A. Deterling, J. G. Pasternacki, Harry W. Carlsen, Angus H. Taylor, Victor E. Feit, and Secretary Frank W. Moudry.

The secretary reviewed the matter of the Red Owl situation up to the present time, and advised that Mr. Sjoselius would meet with the Board the following day at which time the legal aspects and powers of the Board under the pharmacy law could be discussed.

The secretary informed the Board that the College of Pharmacy at the University of Minnesota would be inspected by Dr. Elliot and Dean Deno, members of the inspection committee for accreditation of the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education, beginning November 18, 10:00 o'clock A.M. The secretary stated this committee desired to have at least one or two members of the Board of Pharmacy to be present during this inspection procedure. The secretary explained the method of inspection, procedure for rating of schools, the amount of work it entailed.

The secretary read a letter from A. L. Durkin, District Supervisor, Alcohol Tax Unit, St. Paul, Minn., relative to the sale of rubbing alcohol. This letter had been sent to the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association and dealt with the failure on the part of some druggists to comply with the labeling regulations in the over-the-counter sale of rubbing alcohol. The letter stated a survey had been made in this district to determine the extent of non-compliance, and asked assistance in impressing upon all pharmacists the importance of complying with the regulations. The regulations require: "Sales to such other persons by retail druggists must be made through a registered pharmacist who will, at the time of sale. write or stamp across the brand label in contrasting colors the words 'Sold by' followed by his (the pharmacist's) name and address of the retail drug store where the sale is made."

The secretary related he had met with Dr. Walter Gardner, chairman of the Interprofessional Relations Committee of the State Medical Association, and that he had made arrangements to have Dr. Gardner and Dr. Willard Hadley, secretary of the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association, to meet and discuss the matter of doctors dispensing and other matters pertaining to interprofessional relations between doctors and pharmacists.

November 17, 1950. The Board met at its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis, 9:45 o'clock A.M. All members present: President B. A. Deterling, Harry W. Carlsen, J. G. Pasternacki, Victor E. Feit and Angus H. Taylor.

Meeting called to order by President Deterling.

It was moved and seconded that reading of the minutes for the July meeting be dispensed with until the January, 1951 meeting. Motion carried.

The secretary brought up matter of an application for a drug store license for a new store filed by Donald D. Anderson, the same to be located in a doctors clinic building, at Snelling and Portland Avenues, St. Paul, Minn. The application gave the name of the pharmacy as Snelling Ave. Pharmacy, sole owner Donald D. Anderson, a registered pharmacist in State of Minnesota. Mr. Anderson appeared before the Board at 10:30 o'clock A.M. and brought floor plan for drug store to be located in or apart of the doctors clinic building. Mr. Anderson stated he was going to be the sole owner, that the doctors would have no interest in same, that he was renting the space where drug store was to be located.

11:00 A.M. Claude C. Kapsner appeared before the Board in the matter of reciprocal registration on the basis of his registration in North Dakota. The Board checked the application filed with the secretary, and found it in order. He was given the examination in Jurisprudence.

11:20 A.M. G. Eugene Linden appeared before the Board for reciprocal registration on the basis of his registration in Iowa. Reciprocal application had been filed with the secretary, and upon checking it was found to meet the requirements. Mr. Linden was given the examination in Jurisprudence.

The secretary read the report submitted by the secretary of the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association relative to the expenditure of the money received from the Board of Pharmacy for the advancement of the Science and Art in Pharmacy.

The secretary read a letter from James J. McSherry regarding the general sale of Boric Acid, citing the dangers in the use of Boric Acid, especially for children, in the contracting of Boron poisoning, and that this item should

be labeled with a "Caution" or "Warning" that it might be poisonous, and warning against indiscriminate use. The Board suggested that it might be well to take this up with the Executive Committee of the National Association of Retail Bruggists and perhaps the Food and Drug Administration. The secretary stated he would present the letter at the NARD Executive Committee meeting on November 27, 1950.

The matter of restricting the sale of antihistamine drugs was brought up and whether they should be restricted in their sale to drug stores only. The Board was of the opinion that these drugs should be restricted and not permitted to be sold by general dealers having a Pousehold Drug License.

The list of drugs and medicines permitted to be sold by general dealers having a license from the Board of Pharmacy to sell these designated drugs and medicines came up for discussion. This list was reviewed and the question came up whether it should be revised at this time. The secretary suggested that each Board Member be supplied with a list and to study same between now and the January meeting, at which time it would be brought up again and suggestions for changes in the list, if any.

Pharmacy legislation was discussed that might be introduces in the next session of the Legislature amending the Pharmacy law.

The secretary brought up action taken against Daniel M. Greenberg by the Alcohol Tax Unit involving the sale of Bay Rum from the Hughes Cut Rate Drug Company, 38 South Washington Avenue, Minneapolis, under circumstances which reasonably appeared it was the intention of the purchaser to procure the same for beverage purposes, contrary to law. Mr. Greenberg is co-owner of the Hughes Cut Rate Drug, and is not a registered pharmacist. Mr. Moudry stated that Harry M. Zipperman, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, owns controlling interest in the store. Mr. Greenberg plead guilty in District Court of the Umited States and a sentence of thirty days imprisonment and a fine of \$400.00 was imposed on November 7, 1950. On November 13, 1950, the sentence of thirty days imprisonment was vacated and defendant placed on probation for a period of two years. The fine of \$400.00 was ordered to stand.

The secretary advised the Board that the inspector had found the Hughes Cut Rate Drug operating without a pharmacist in charge on several inspections, and that Mr. Zipperman had been talked to and each time he promised to see that this was remedied. Mr. Zipperman owns and operates two other drug store.

It was suggested that secretary write Mr. Zipperman relative to inspector finding stores of his uncovered on several occasions, and that they would have to be covered by a pharmacist at all times, and if not, the Board would have to take action.

It was also suggested that our legal counsel check the law to find whether the law is such that proper procedure could be taken under the Pharmacy law to revoke the drug store license issued by the Board to the Hughes Cut Rate Drug.

George Sjoselius, deputy attorney general and legal counsel for the Board, was present at this time.

2:40 o'clock P.M. Edwin Shirley, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, who appeared before the Board on October 27, 1949 relative to the sale of barbiturates contrary to law, had been notified to appear at this time for final disposition of charges against him. Mr. Shirley was called in. The inspector informed the Board that he had checked on Mr. Shirley during the preceding period, that he has been working as a pharmacist at the Leamington Hotel Drug, Minneapolis, and since that time has complied with the professional practice of pharmacy.

It was moved by Mr. Pasternacki, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that no further action in this case be taken and that the file be closed against Mr. Shirley. Motion carried.

Mr. Sjoselius charged Mr. Shirley that it must be understood that if he comes before the Board again for any charge that the punishment would be severe and swift, that the Board had been very lenient in that it did not revoke his license.

3:00 o'clock P.M. Irving Earl Kaplan, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, had been notified to appear before the Board for final action to be taken relative to citation on October 27, 1949. Mr. Kaplan was called in.

Mr. Sjoselius informed Mr. Kaplan that during the period of October 27, 1949 to November 17, 1950 the Board had received no reports of any misconduct on his part, and asked Mr. Kaplan if during this time he had had any difficulty with the police or narcotic department. Mr. Kaplan answered that he had never had any trouble with the exception of this. Mr. Sjoselius charged Mr. Kaplan that he must understand that if he comes before the Board again on any charge, that punishment would be severe and swift, and that no consideration would be given. Mr. Kaplan replied he would conduct himself in every way as to be a credit to the profession of pharmacy.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Pasternacki, that no further action be taken in this case, and that the file against Mr. Kaplan be closed. Motion carried.

Mr. Sjoselius informed the Board that the stay granted the plaintiff in the vitamin case had now expired and that he had entered final judgment. The Board could now go ahead and prosecute anyone for the sale of vitamins if sold in other than drug stores. He stated that he thought there had been some talk regarding Culver appealing from judgment to supreme court. The law now stands in the vitamin case until supreme court holds to the contrary.

The secretary asked Mr. Sjoselius in regard to the legality of the sale of vitamins by mail order from other states, also through radio advertising, and was advised that if sale of vitamins is consummated outside of State nothing could be done to stop mail order of vitamins into Minnesota.

He was asked relative to vitamins labeled "for dietary purposes", "food supplement", "for non-medicinal use", and Mr. Sjoselius said Board could proceed against the sale of such vitamins.

The drawings and plans for the drug store to be owned by Donald D. Anderson, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, and located in the doctors clinic building at Snelling and Portland Avenues, St. Paul, Minnesota, meet the requirements and regulations of the Board for the opening of new stores, in the opinion of Mr. Sjoselius.

In the matter of the Red Owl Company, Mr. Sjoselius stated he would draw up papers to take this company into court for the sale of drugs and medicines in their grocery stores, and would do everything to stop the sale of drugs, and that if he would receive the help and support he did in the vitamin case, he felt the chances were favorable to win the case.

The secretary reported to the Board that Merle Sanders, president of the Snyders Drug Stores, Inc., telephoned they were negotiating for a location near the Calhoun Beach Club in Minneapolis and wanted the Board to know their intention to file an application for a license.

Nothing further coming before the Board, on motion adjourned.

- 3) A letter from Selmer Haugen, Fergus Falls, Minn., relative to new building for his clinic pharmacy.

- 4) Possible amendments to the pharmacy act.
- 5) Drugs and medicines placed on the list permitted to be sold by general dealers having a Household Drug License.
- 6) Reciprocity, and the possibility of pharmacists who had received a mark in the practical work of less than 75% between June, 1936 and January, 1947 to retake the practical to raise mark to at least 75%.

3:00 o'clock P.M. The Board's legal counsel, George Sjoselius, arrived to meet with the Board.

Mr. Sjoselius reported on the last decision in the vitamin case.

The secretary reported that he had had a conference with Dr. Wangensteen relative to the matter he was concerned about, that is publicity being given remedies encouraging self-medication with the result that patients are coming to

him for surgery but their cases have developed beyond such help. He stated that if people, when they had symptoms of illness, would not mask those symptoms by self-medication but would see a physician, there would be opportunity for helping them. He thought it might be necessary to have legislation passed to restrict harmful advertising and the promiscuous sale of medicine.

President Carlsen called meeting to order. All members of the Board and secretary were present.

Mr. Sjoselius reported to the Board relative to the conference that he and secretary Moudry had with Al. Bergerud, Homer A. Childs, attorneys for the Red Owl Stores Inc. This meeting was held in Mr. Sjoselius' office on July 19, 1951.

The Red Owl is selling a list of drugs and medicines in their stores, which they feel they are permitted to do

under the pharmacy laws of the State of Minnesota. It was felt that the only way to determine whether they are permitted to sell these drugs and medicines is to have the court make the determination. Mr. Bergerud stated he would check with the officials of his company and advise Mr. Sjøselius if they intend to discontinue the sale of drugs and medicines, or whether they would take the matter into court.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Pasternacki, that the secretary request the Attorney General to bring such action as he may deem proper against the Red Owl Stores, Inc. to prevent the sale of the following items, which they are now selling, and any other items of like kind. 

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Feit, that expenses for carrying on the case by the Attorney General and representatives of the Board is hereby authorized. Motion carried.

Persons taking the examination some years ago and registered as pharmacists in Minnesota with a general average of 75 percent or better but receiving less than 75 percent in the practical examination, in order to make them eligible for reciprocity in some states that required a 75 percent minimum in the practical at that time, the Board was interested in knowing whether the Board would be permitted to give another practical examination to those persons who desired to raise their practical mark to 75 percent or better. It was the opinion of Mr. Sjoselius, Deputy Attorney General, that the Board has no authority to give a second examination once a candidate had successfully passed the Board examination and was registered as a pharmacist.

The Board examined the plans of the space to be occupied by the Weber and Judd Clinic Pharmacy, Rochester, Minnesota, in the new Mayo Clinic Building. Weber and Judd will move their present Clinic Pharmacy from 102 Second Avenue S.W., Rochester, Minnesota, to the new location when the building is completed.

It was moved and seconded that the space to be occupied by the Weber and Judd Clinic Pharmacy in the new Mayo Clinic Building be approved. Motion carried.

Mr. Sjoselius presented a letter received from County Attorney J. H. Manion of Pipestone, Minnesota relative to a license for the Menzel drug store in Pipestone to be operated under a Trust provided in the will of Mrs. Mary Pearl Menzel, deceased. The Trust is for a period of ten years.

After considerable discussion on the matter with legal counsel, the following motion was put:

It was moved and seconded that the Board approve the issuance of a drug store license for the continuance of the operation of the store, doing business as Menzel Drugs. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the application of Snyders Drug Stores Inc. for a license to operate a drug store at 5425 Excelsior Blvd., Minneapolis, Minnesota, be approved and a license issued. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that a license be issued to the Walgreen Company to operate a drug store at 13th Ave. E. and Superior St., Duluth Plaza Shopping Center, Duluth, Minn., on the basis that they were in business operating drug stores in Minnesota when Regulation No. 14 was passed by the Board. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the secretary be instructed to have additional Pharmacy Laws printed. Motion carried.

The secretary reported that an amendment to the Civil Service law passed at the last session of the Legislature stipulated that a provisional appointment may not exceed six months, and that no one individual may have more than one provisional appointment in any twelve months, period. This would affect Stewart E. Brokaw who has been employed by the Board of Pharmacy to make ready the laboratories at the College of Pharmacy, University of Minnesota, for giving the practical work during the examination, as he was classified as a provisional employee of the Board of Pharmacy under Civil Service.

The question was brought up as to whether the Board could employ Mr. Brokaw on a contractual basis, entering into a contract with him to set up the laboratories for the practical work at a set fee per applicant taking the practical.

It was moved and seconded that the secretary be authorized to enter into a contract with parties for setting up the laboratories for the practical work. Motion carried.

Relative to the Minnestta State Board of Pharmacy not allowing credit for drug store experience gained concurrent with enrollment in a school or college of pharmacy. Some Boards interpret the vacation period between quarters of the school year as not enrollment in a school or college of pharmacy and give full credit for experience gained during that period. Mr. Sjoselius contacted the officials of the University of Minnesota to determine if the University was of the same opinion and was informed that they look upon the school year as the time when the student enters the school in the fall until the end of the spring quarter.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Feit, that the Board discontinue the issuance of letters of permission to pharmacists of other states who are seeking reciprocity into Minnesota to work as pharmacists pending the next meeting of the Board after their applications had been filed and they were found to be eligible for reciprocity. Motion carried.

The issuance of letters of permission was authorized by the Board by a motion passed in January 1944 as an emergency measure during the war.

The secretary read a letter from Henry L. Giordano, District Supervisor, District No. 12, Bureau of Narcotics, dated February 15, 1951, relative to a proposed amendment to the State Narcotic Law which was introduced in the last session of the Legislature but was not pressed for passage. There was opposition to the amendment due to the severe penalties that would be placed upon pharmacists for technical violations of the Act. The secretary stated there was now pending in Congress an amendment to the Federal Narcotic Act which, if passed, will increase the penalties; and it is expected that the amendment to the State Narcotic Act will again be presented at the Legislative session in 1953.

The Board expressed approval of the increase in penalties for the illegal sale of opium and its derivatives, and also marihuana, but felt that these severe penalties should not be applicable to technical violations that may be incurred by pharmacists and physicians in the regular handling of narcotics.

The Board discussed the advisability of registering apprentices while gaining their practical experience. No action was taken as it was felt this matter would be discussed at the National Association Boards of Pharmacy

meeting in Buffalo in August, and that delegates to the meeting could report to the Board any action that was taken on this matter which would guide the Board in determining future policy.

The Board discussed N.A.B.P. Resolution No. 6 passed at its meeting in Atlantic City in May, 1950, which requires that no practical experience be accepted for credit until after the Sophomore year in a school or college of pharmacy. As this matter will again be brought up at the N.A.B.P. meeting in Buffalo in August of this year, action was deferred until the January meeting of the Board.

Meeting adjourned until July 25.

July 25, 1951. The Board met at its rooms at 10:15 o'clock A.M. President Carlsen called the meeting to order.



July 16, 1952. The Board spent the morning arranging the practical work of the candidates preparatory to giving the oral examination. At 1:00 o'clock P.M. the Board began giving the oral, which continued to 6:00 o'clock P.M.

July 17, 1952. From 8:00 o'clock A.M. to 5:00 o'clock P.M. the Board continued to give the oral examination. A total of 47 candidates were given the oral examination.

July 18, 1952. The Board spent the morning marking the written work of the candidates.

At 1:30 o'clock the Board went into executive session, president Pasternacki presiding. The Board met in its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis.

1:30 o'clock P.M. Mrs. O. A. Strom of Jeffers, Minn. was given an opportunity to appear before the Board to discuss her intentions of again operating a drug store in Jeffers. After the death of her husband in February, 1946, who was a registered pharmacist, Mrs. Strom was permitted to continue operating the drug store by employing a pharmacist to legally cover the store. During the time she operated the store she had much difficulty in keeping the store covered by pharmacists for reasons they did not stay any length of time. necessary for the Board during that period to call to her attention that the store was not being properly covered by a registered pharmacist, and it was suggested that it might be advisable for her to discontinue operating the store as a drug store and secure a Household Drug License from the Board which would permit her to sell a limited line of household drugs as designated by the Board of All signs indicating it was a drug store were Pharmacy. to be removed and also all drugs and medicines which were not permitted to be sold, thus converting store into a variety store. Mrs. Strom operated under this setup from November, 1946 until the present time. She indicated by letter dated June 26, 1952 that she wished to open up a drug store, and felt she could secure the services of a pharmacist. The Secretary wrote her on July 4, 1952 informing her that an application for a drug store license form her at this time would be a new application and that it was his opinion she would not be eligible for a drug store license.

The Board questioned her at some length relative to the situation in Jeffers. She stated Mr. Norman French was opening up a store and that a doctor had moved into the community. She was willing to sell her building and the store but would not rent the space.

Later the Board discussed the matter with its legal counsel, George Sjoselius, and he stated an application from her would be a new application, and under the Board's regulation whe would not be eligible for a license to own and operate a drug store.

The Board then authorized the Secretary to notify Mrs. Strom that she was not eligible for a drug store license.

3:00 o'clock P.M. Mr. Henry L. Giordano, District Supervisor, Bureau of Narcotics, had been invited by Secretary Moudry to meet with the Board and its legal counsel to receive report from him on the actions involving Fred De Roos relative to the handling of narcotics. Mr. De Roos is a registered pharmacist owning and operating a drug store at 4601 Nicollet Avenue, Minneapolis, Minn.

On July 24, 1947 the Board cited Mr. De Roos to appear and the following action was taken:

"RESOLVED by the State Board of Pharmacy, duly convened at Suite 762, Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis, Minnesota, on the 24th day of July, 1947, that the license of Fred De Roos to practice pharmacy in the State of Minnesota, be, and hereby is revoked. Such revocation shall become effective immediately upon revocation by the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota of the probation upon which said Fred De Roos is now placed in the proceeding in said court entitled, 'United States of America v. Fred De Roos,' or upon the commission by said Fred De Roos of any act which is ground for the revocation of the license to practice pharmacy in the State of Minnesota."

Mr. Giordano stated he did not have all the details that Mr. Sjoselius desired because Mr. Caswell, his deputy, had handled the matter and he was now on vacation. It was agreed that when Mr. Caswell returned, he and Earl Schlekau, the Board's inspector, should prepare factual statements in regard to the case and present same to the Board to be given to Mr. Sjoselius so that he might determine how the Board should proceed.

It was moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Carlsen, that the Secretary send to Attorney General J. A. A. Burnquist a letter of congratulation on the winning of the vitamin case and expressing appreciation for the support he and his office gave the Board in the matter, and particularly George Sjoselius, Deputy Attorney General, for the efficient and capable handling of the case during the long period of litigation. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Feit, that the Attorney General be requested to bring action against the Groves-Kelco Inc., and the Red Owl Stores Inc., for the illegal sale of drugs and medicines. Motion carried.

The Board adjourned to meet again July 21, 1952.

2:30 P.M. Meeting called to order by President Pasternacki.

Mr. Bruce Idziorek had been asked to appear before the Board relative to his unprofessional conduct as a registered pharmacist. The Secretary read a letter received from Jerry Regan, a registered pharmacist operating a drug store in Shakopee, Minnesota, dated June 25, 1952, in which he related the experience he had had with Mr. Idziorek when he was employed in his store as a pharmacist.

Upon being questioned by the Board Mr. Idziorek stated that he was blaming no one but himself for his actions, that he at times drank to excess and when he did he just went to pieces. He further stated that he was now back with his wife and family and he felt that his prospects for overcoming his weakness are very good; that he had secured employment with Snyder Bros. University Drug, 400-14th Ave. S.E., Minneapolis, and that he was going to make every effort to not revert back to his former habits.

The Board discussed his problem with him at some length and listened to his story of the past few years.

President Pasternacki reprimanded Mr. Idziorek for his unprofessional conduct and he was told that if it became necessary to call him before the Board again, the Board would cite him to show cause why his license as a registered pharmacist in Minnesota should not be revoked. Mr. Idziorek felt that was fair and that a period of three to four months would determine whether he was strong enough to overcome his temptation for liquor, and if it was necessary to cite him, he felt the Board would be justified in revoking his license.

ll:00 o'clock A.M. Fred J. Kwako, a registered pharmacist owning and operating a drug store in Pelican Rapids, Minnesota, was called before the Board to explain the sale of barbiturates over the counter without prescriptions, that is refilling a prescription for pentobarbital sodium without calling the doctor for an O.K. The bottle containing drug was labeled and marked in part "Caution: To be dispensed only by or on the prescription of a physician or dentist". The original prescription was dated September 23, 1950 and was refilled five times without calling the doctor.

Mr. Kwako was tried in Federal Court, St. Paul, Minnesota, February 27, 1952. He plead guilty and after pre-sentence investigation by Federal Probation Officer he was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100.

Mr. Kwako advised the Board he had never been in trouble before, always had had a good record. There was harmony and cooperation between the doctors and himself in the town. He stated the doctor whose prescription he refilled lived in another town and he did not want to call the doctor long distance at a cost of forty cents. He admitted he had been negligent but stated he would comply with requirements in full and assured the Board his conduct in the future would be such that it would not be necessary for him to again appear before the Board.

The matter of the amount of money to be turned over to the MinnesotaState Pharmaceutical Association as provided for by law, was discussed.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Feit, that this matter be tabled. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the bond premium for Effie M. Swanson, assistant secretary, be paid out of the funds of the Board. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the week beginning Monday, January 19, 1953, be fixed as the date for giving the next examination. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the week beginning Monday, July 13, 1953, be fixed as the date for giving the July examination. Motion carried.

The Secretary reported having received inquiries from a number of licentiates of New York requesting information relative to examination and licensure in Minnesota. They were interested in securing registration in this State with the thought in mind, no doubt, of being able to reciprocate from Minnesota to any state as there is no reciprocity with New York.

The Secretary read a letter from Donald Sweeney of Minneota, Minn., a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, inquiring about ownership of a drug store, whether a license would be granted to operate a drug store by a non-pharmacist where there is an agreement for a continuing option to buy controlling interest by a registered pharmacist, but at the opening of the store the registered pharmacist would have no interest in the store. Mr. Sweeney was advised that a license could not be granted under such an arrangement. Mr. R. C. Ebert, an attorney in Brainerd, Minn., also wrote in regard to this matter.

A letter from Lehn and Fink Products Corp., 445 Park Avenue, New York, N. Y., relative to a change of formula for Lysol was read. They advised that under this new formula they were preparing to discontinue the use of the word "Poison" on the label and carton.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, that the 15 registered pharmacists and one assistant pharmacist who were delinquent in the renewal of their registrations in Minnesota for the years 1950 and 1951 be dropped from the records. MINNESOTA STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY THREE HUNDRED TWENTY-SIXTH MEETING

November 6, 1952. Special meeting of the Board of Pharmacy called by President Pasternacki for the purpose of further studying the contemplated regulations discussed at the various district meetings held by the State Association, and to transact such other business as might come before the Board.

All members of the Board were present.

10:00 o'clock A.M. Meeting called to order by President Pasternacki.

The minutes of the July meeting were read and approved.

It was moved by Mr. Feit, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, that \$2,000 be turned over to the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association for the advancement of the Art and Science in Pharmacy as provided by law. Motion carried.

Mr. Pasternacki, delegate to the meeting of the National Association of Retail Druggists, gave a report on the meeting.

Mr. Feit, delegate to the meeting of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy, gave the report on this meeting. He gave a full report on examination practices in the various states and on the types of examinations given. Mr. Feit stated he was proud of the examinations given by the Minnesota Board of Pharmacy in the light of the examinations given by other Boards.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, that Mr. Feit be commended for the fine report he delivered of the meeting of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy. Motion carried.

The Secretary read the Resolutions passed at the recent N.A.B.P. meeting.

Apprenticeship training was discussed and the Secretary suggested that the Members think about same and bring some suggestions to the January meeting.

The Secretary brought up the matter in regard to requirements governing the sale of Rubbing Alcohol, that registered pharmacist must sign his name on the label at time of sale together with name and address of drug store.

The matter of labeling Oil of Wintergreen in compliance with a regulation of the Board was discussed. This regulation requires that Oil of Wintergreen when sold over-the-counter shall be labeled "Caution: For external use only". The Secretary stated he would take same up with the medical profession and report on the matter at the January meeting. Also that it might be well to contact label manufacturers to print uniform labels for this product.

The Secretary brought up the matter regarding drugs and medicines in rest homes and hospitals having no pharmacy. Patients in those places often leave medicines behind which have been prescribed for them by a physician, particularly if barbiturates or narcotics where other people may get same. It was suggested that the Secretary get in touch with the Board of Health on this problem as that department license rest homes and hospitals.

The Secretary read letters received from Mrs. O. A. Strom of Jeffers and his replies thereto since the July Board meeting. The inspector reported she had all her stock and equipment she had had before and that she insists she is going to open a drug store.

Mr. Moudry informed the Board he had received an application from Henry Sperling indicating he was purchasing the drug store in Jeffers which is owned by J. N. French.

Meeting adjourned to Friday, November 7, 1952.

November 7, 1952. The Board spent the morning discussing and preparing material to be presented that afternoon at the joint meeting with the State Association officers and members of its legislative committee.

2:00 o'clock P.M. In addition to the Members of the Board and the State Association officers and the legislative committee members, the attorney for the State Association, Belden Loftsgarden, and the Board's legal counsel, George Sjoselius, were also present.

Secretary Moudry reviewed briefly what had been discussed at the various district meetings throughout the State relative to self-service of drugs and medicines, and stated the Board had discussed this whole matter the day before at its meeting, and had the following two regulations which they desired to present for discussion by this group.

REGULATION 18. Hereafter, the Board of Pharmacy of the State of Minnesota shall refuse to register or grant a license for any pharmacy which sells or proposes to sell therein any article of merchandise in a manner like or similar to the manner in which merchandise is sold in super-markets or other stores commonly known as self-service stores.

REGULATION 19. No pharmacist or other person employed in a store registered under M. S. 1949, Sec. 151.26 or a pharmacy shall sell to any person any drug to which such person has served himself.

After considerable discussion and questions referred to legal counsel, George Sjoselius for answer, the consensus of the group was that the regulations the Board had drafted were desirable, and the meeting went on record approving the contemplated regulations.

Legislation for the coming session of the Legislature was discussed. Amendment to the State Narcotic Act to increase the penalties for violation of the Act was presented to Mr. Moudry by Henry Giordano of the Federal Narcotic Bureau of this district. Mr. Giordano stated that the Narcotic Bureau would like to have the support of the pharmacists on this legislation.

Mr. Moudry informed the group that the income of the Board of Pharmacy was limited to the fees collected from the licensing of drug stores and the renewal of pharmacist registration. He also pointed out that the operating cost of the Board and office had greatly increased over the period of years, that operating cost was now exceeding income, and that with the program of enforcement that had been outlined by the Board expenses would be increased. The Board feels that the Pharmacy Act should be amended to increase the fee for drug store license, the examination fee, and also to include the licensing of wholesalers and distributors of drugs and medicines.

4:15 o'clock P.M. The Board reconvened in its rooms, president Pasternacki presiding.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, and duly carried, that the following Resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS the first obligation of the Board of Pharmacy of the State of Minnesota is to protect the public health as it may be affected by the preparation, sale and distribution of drugs, and

WHEREAS there are many drugs the sale of which is not restricted by law which may be potentially dangerous to the public health unless sold under close supervision by a registered pharmacist so that the purchasers thereof, particularly children, may be advised, if necessary, of potential dangers in the use thereof, and

WHEREAS the sale of merchandise and drugs by methods like or similar to methods used by supermarkets or other self-service stores permits the purchaser to select, take from stock and pay for drugs at the same time that merchandise is selected, taken from stock and paid for, thereby making it impossible for a registered pharmacist to exercise the close supervision of the sale of drugs which is necessary for the protection of the public health, and

WHEREAS the Board has determined that the sale of drugs in the manner described above is dangerous to the public health, and

WHEREAS the Board has observed with deep concern the application and extension of self-service to the sale of drugs in pharmacies;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Pharmacy of the State of Minnesota, duly convened in Minneapolis, Minnesota, this 7th day of November, 1952, that the regulations hereinafter set forth are hereby adopted and promulgated to be immediately effective:

- 18. Hereafter, the Board of Pharmacy of the State of Minnesota shall refuse to register or grant a license for any pharmacy which sells or proposes to sell therein any article of merchandise in a manner like or similar to the manner in which merchandise is sold in super-markets or other stores commonly known as self-service stores.
- 19. No pharmacist or other person employed in a store registered under M. S. 1949, Sec. 151.26 or a pharmacy shall sell to any person any drug to which such person has served himself.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carpenter that the application by Sny-Bro, Inc., dba Snyder Bros. Drug, Nathan Schapiro, registered pharmacist in Minnesota, controlling owner, for a license to operate a drug store at 1620 White Bear Avenue, St. Paul, Minn., be approved and a license issued upon compliance of requirements of Regulations 18 and 19. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the Secretary be instructed to write Attorney General J. A. A. Burnquist, directing him to bring necessary proceedings to enjoin the Red Owl Company, Incorporated, and Groves-Kelco Incorporated from selling drugs and medicines to any retailer other than a pharmacy or a general dealer having a Household Drug License. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded meeting be adjourned. Metion carried.

MINNESOTA STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY

THREE HUNDRED TWENTY-SEVENTH MEETING

December 17, 1952. A special meeting was called by President Pasternacki to meet with legal counsel for the Board, George Sjoselius, and legal counsel, officers and representatives of Chain Drug Stores who were vitally concerned with Regulations 18 and 19 and who wished to present their objections.

All members of the Board were present.

President Pasternacki called meeting to order.at 10:10 o'clock A.M. in its meeting room at the Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis, Minn.

The first to appear was the Snyder's Drug Stores, Incorporated, represented by its counsels Harry Peterson and Roy McDonald, also its president, Lloyd Berkus, and vice president E. L. Bourrett. They were asking the Board to grant a license for a pharmacy in the Highland Village area of St. Paul. They stated they had a lease and were desirous of having the license made available to them.

They further stated that Regulations 18 and 19 were objectionable to them, especially Regulation 18, which would not permit them to operate on a self-serve basis. They stated that items that were not drugs they felt the Board should not be concerned with.

They presented their blueprints showing floor plan of the store and stated their operation would be that drugs and medicines would not be on self-serve, that if drug items were picked up by customers serving themselves, at the time they were being checked out the cashier would notify the pharmacist and the pharmacist would take the drug items and ask the customer to return to the drug counter and the sale of drug items would then be made by the pharmacist or employee under his supervision.

The members of the Board asked many questions regarding the operation, and after thorough discussion the parties were told that the Board appreciated hearing their comments and it would be taken under advisement.

Representatives of Snyder's Drug Stores stated they operate nine stores and have thirty registered pharmacists, averaging three pharmacists per store, that 40% of their total sales were drugs and prescriptions, and that the sale of prescriptions in all of their stores total \$526,000.

2:15 o'clock P.M. Representatives of the Walgreen Company, Thomas Crawford of Chicago, Mr. Liben, attorney from Chicago, and Ed Perso, manager, Minneapolis, appeared before the Board to discuss Regulations 18 and 19.

Mr. Crawford stated that Charles Walgreen, president of the Company, was very concerned with these regulations and felt that they could not go along with the Board on them. They stated if they were going to compete with competition of super-market grocery stores handling many items the drug stores handle, they would have to operate in the same manner these super-markets were operating, and they felt Regulation 18 dealing with self-serve was a hardship upon them in their operation.

They presented the floor plan of a store they contemplate opening in the Richfield area.

After they had presented their objections the Board asked several questions dealing with their operation

President Pasternacki told the group the Board was pleased to have heard their comments on these regulations and that the Board would give them due consideration.

The Board then discussed the interviews by these two groups.

It was moved and seconded that no action be taken at this time, and that the matter should come before the Board when it met on January 19, 1953. Motion carried.

It was suggested that the local members of the Board meet with the officers of the State Association and the members of its legislative committee who were present when the Board formulated Regulations 18 and 19, to further discuss the regulations and present the objections that have come to the Board from the chain groups.

It was moved and seconded meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

MINNESOTA STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY THREE HUNDRED TWENTY-EIGHTH MEETING The Board met at its rooms in the January 19, 1953. Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis, 10:15 o'clock A.M. present - Vice President Victor E. Feit, Harry W. Carlsen, Harold H. Carpenter, Angus H. Taylor, and Raymond A. Callander of Duluth, Minnesota, the new member appointed by Governor C. Elmer Anderson on December 24, 1952 to a five year term beginning January 5, 1953. Mr. Callander succeeds J. G. Pasternacki of Virginia. The meeting was called to order by Vice President Feit. It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carlsen, that Victor E. Feit be elected president. Motion carried. It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, that Angus H. Taylor be elected vice president. Motion carried. A report was given by President Feit of the conference held with the officers, executive committee and advisory legislative committee of the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association on January 12 in reference to Board of Pharmacy regulations 18 and 19: also the legislative program to be presented during the 1953 legislative session. Deputy Attorney General, George Sjoselius, was present to meet with the Board in the discussion of its problems. The secretary reported that Mr. Kerr of the Minneapolis office of the Federal Food and Drug Administration had telephoned him stating that the Snyder's Drug Stores Incorporated had been found guilty of the illegal sale of barbiturates and fined \$250 by the court, and that A. J. Klenert, registered pharmacist employed in the store at 26 S. Seventh St., Minneapolis, Minnesota was also found guilty in the Snyder case and fined \$50.00. It was recommended by legal counsel that the Secretary secure copy of conviction in the above case and give to him for review. The Secretary reported that he had seen a newspaper article that the Thrifty Drug Store of Rochester, Minnesota was cited for illegal sale of dangerous drugs and that the case is to be tried sometime this spring. It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carpenter that the Secretary be authorized to negotiate for the renewal of a five year lease for the office at 3965 Minnehaha Avenue, Minneapolis, with the owner, John W. Dargavel, on the terms of the present lease. Motion carried. - 1 -

The secretary read a letter dated January 14, 1953 from Maurice P. Kerr, Chief, Minneapolis District Food and Drug Administration, in which he stated a complaint had been received regarding substitution at the Forchay Pharmacy, 2300 W. 50thStreet, Minneapolis, Minnesota, for Multicebrin. An FDA inspector had a prescription filled at the store which called for Multicebrin Capsules but upon analysis it was found that the capsules were not Multicebrin (Lilly) but were another product. Mr.Forchay was made aware of the investigation by the FDA and was firmly warned by the Food and Drug inspector as to the possibility of violations under the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act.

The Secretary was instructed to get in touch with Mr. Forchay and his pharmacist, Donald Gunner, and ask them to appear before the Board on Monday, January 26.

The application by Snyder's Drug Stores, Inc. for a license to operate a drug store at 2145 Ford Parkway, St. Paul, Minnesota, was presented to the Board. The Secretary informed the Board that Snyder's Drug Stores were negotiating with George McCall to purchase his drug store located at 127 W. Winifred, St. Paul, Minn. Action was deferred until a later meeting.

4:00 o'clock P.M. Edward J. Salk, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, appeared before the Board. He had been asked to appear to discuss his interest in the Heisler Clinic, 6224 Lyndale Ave. S., Minneapolis, Minnesota. Inquiries had come to the Board's office due to publicity released in the Richfield-Bloomington Messenger of January 15, 1953, showing a picture of the Heisler Clinic, listing the physicians in the clinic and the name of Neal Johnson, pharmacist, who is employed by Mr. Salk.

Mr. Salk stated he had no interest in the dispensing of drugs in the Clinic other than selling to the Clinic certain supplies for which he was paid by the Clinic, and further that Mr. Johnson was devoting part of his day at the Heisler Clinic filling their prescriptions and working in the Salk Pharmacy the balance of the time.

After some discussion and questioning by the Board it was learned that Mr. Salk was receiving a certain percentage of the profits of the drugs dispensed at the Clinic after all expenses were paid by the Clinic for the operation of the dispensary. Mr. Salk stated that neither he or Mr. Johnson wanted any trouble, and that they would disassociate themselves from the Clinic if it was necessary.

Mr. Salk was excused and the Board suggested that the Secretary talk with Mr. Johnson and get more information on the operations at the Clinic to determine whether same was meeting the regulations of the Board of Pharmacy.

Minn.State Board of Pharmacy - 328th Meeting - January, 1953

Mr. Sjoselius, the Board's legal counsel, reported that he was preparing cases against the Red Owl Grocery Company and the Groves-Kelco Company for the sale of drugs and medicines to non-drug stores, and that upon his return from California action would be brought.

A request for information from Harold F. Schierholt, a registered pharmacist in California, as to whether experience obtained at the dispensary at the U. S. Naval Air Base, Minneapolis, where he was employed as a pharmacist could be accepted as experience gained under the Board's requirements in the State of Minnesota. It was felt in this case he would be preceptor and apprentice, and that it did not comply with the Board's requirements for practical experience. The Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Schierholt of the Board's decision.

Amendments to the Pharmacy Act, which had been prepared by the attorney for the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association, were presented for discussion, and it was the consensus of the group that the contemplated legislation was satisfactory.

Discussion was held on Regulations 18 and 19, and it was recommended that it be held over to the executive session the following week.

On motion the Board adjourned to meet January 20 to give examinations for licensure.

January 20, 1953. The Board met at the College of Pharmacy, University of Minnesota, at 8:30 o'clock A.M. All members of the Board present.

Don Forchay and Donald M. Gunner, registered pharmacists in Minnesota, appeared before the Board. Upon inquiry they stated that a prescription had been filled in the Forchay Pharmacy, 2300 W. 50th Street, Minneapolis, Minn., calling for Multicebrin but on which they dispensed Cebrivite. They stated this was the only prescription they had filled with Cebrivite when Multicebrin was called for. They stated they had purchased 1000 Cebrivite, from a product of the Spartan Pharmaceutical Company, New York, from Drug Specialties Company, 409 Washington Avenue South, Minneapolis, about October, 1952.

They admitted this substitution was wrong, and further stated that they had disposed of the Cebrivite capsules, and that in the future all prescriptions would be filled with the product called for. They acknowledged their action was unfair to the physician and the patient, and also brought discredit upon the profession.

They were reprimended by President Feit, and they again promised that from that day forward there would be no substitution in their stores.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, that the matter be laid on the table. Motion carried.

The Secretary read another letter received from Lehn and Fink Company requesting the Board to permit the sale of their product Lysol with the new labeling, which carries no poison label, in the State of Minnesota. In the best interest of the public, the Board felt that for the present Lysol sold in Minnesota should bear the poison label.

3:30 P.M. Fred De Roos, registered pharmacist operating a drug store at 4600 Nicollet Avenue, Minneapolis, appeared before the Board. He had been asked to meet with the Board relative to his operations and conduct in the handling of narcotic prescriptions in his store.

Upon being questioned Mr. De Roos stated his store was for sale, that he intended to dispose of his store and wanted to move to a small community in South Dakota where he felt it was to his and his family's advantage to be in a small town. The Board advised Mr. De Roos that a report had been received from the Narcotic Department relative to his activities, which were unethical

and unprofessional, and that they wanted to get information so they could take such action as necessary.

After considerable discussion Mr. De Roos was told that the Board had given him due consideration in the past in regard to his activities and that he apparently did not appreciate the Board's interest in his welfare, that his conduct indicated he was not entitled to much consideration from the Board. Mr. De Roos stated he hoped the Board would not have to revoke his license and implied that he might not ask for renewal of his pharmacist registration when it was due March 4.

Mr. De Roos was excused, and upon further discussion by the Board

It was moved and seconded that our legal counsel be given the file to determine what action could be taken by the Board against Mr. De Roos. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Carpenter, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the Articles of Corporation of Nathanson, Christensen, and Nathanson in regard to the Lumber Exchange Drug, be referred to legal counsel as to meeting the requirements of Regulation 14, and that upon completion of application the Board will consider it at its meeting on February 6, 1953. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Callander, that Frank W. Moudry be elected secretary for the ensuing year, beginning February 1, 1953. Motion carried.

Mr. Johnson appeared and upon being questioned by the Board stated that he had been employed as pharmacist in the Heisler Clinic Dispensary since November 10, 1952, compounding prescriptions written by the physicians in the Clinic and perform such other duties as are required of a pharmacist in a dispensary. He also stated he managed the dispensary, purchasing drugs and chemicals, and is authorized to sign checks. Mr. Johnson told the Board he receives a weekly salary and will be given a percentage of the profits, but at the present time no definite arrangements have been made for the percentage - 1 -

of profit. He further stated that Dr. John J. Heisler implied that if he could not have the present arrangement in the Clinic with a pharmacist filling his prescriptions, he would then dispense his own drugs.

Upon being questioned further, Mr. Johnson stated that he works part time for Salk's Pharmacy, 5351 Lyndale Avenue S., Minneapolis, in addition to his position with the Heisler Clinic Dispensary. He also indicated he did not know what arrangement there might be between the Salk Pharmacy and the Heisler Clinic, but he does purchase his drug supplies from the Salk Pharmacy.

After Mr. Johnson was excused the Board further discussed the matter, and it was recommended that the Secretary confer with the Board's legal counsel, Mr. George Sjoselius, on the matter.

A special meeting called for the purpose of establishing fee for drug store license and household drug license for the year beginning July 1, 1953; also to prepare application form and license for wholesalers in drugs and medicines provided for in amendment to the pharmacy law passed at the 1953 session of the Legislature; and for other business that might be brought before the Board.

All members of the Board were present, also George Sjoselius, the Board's legal counsel.

The meeting was called to order at 2:15 o'clock P.M. by President Feit.

Frank Condon, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, appeared before the Board relative to his plans to open a new drug store in partnership with the doctor who owns the fixtures as well as the building. He presented the partnership agreement and blueprints of floor plan for the drug store. Mr. Condon stated he would own the card racks racks, cash registers, merchandise, etc., and that the doctor owned the fixtures and fountain.

The floor plan was scrutinized carefully and it was the opinion of the Board that the same met with the regulations. The partnership agreement was checked by Mr. Sjoselius and it was found that it did not contain any statement giving Mr. Condon full control over the business. He was advised to seek an attorney and have papers drawn that would adequately cover his controlling the operation of the drug store as provided by Board regulation.

The application of Louis Whalen for reciprocal registration on the basis of his North Dakota registration as a pharmacist again came before the Board. The Secretary presented letters received since Mr. Whalen appeared before the Board at its January meeting relative to his conduct in the past. This matter was discussed at some length.

It was moved by Mr. Callander, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that Mr. Whalen be granted registration as a pharmacist. Motion carried. (Three "ayes", two "no".

Inspector Schlekau was asked to telephone Mr. Whalen to appear.

The Secretary presented the application from St. John's Hospital, 403 Maria Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota for a pharmacy in the hospital. The space for the pharmacy was discussed in that it was under the required 400 square feet, but it was brought out by the inspector's report that future planned expansion would increase the space to well over the required 400 feet.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Callander, that a license be granted to St. John's Hospital to operate a pharmacy in the hospital. Motion carried.

Klenert be cited to appear before the Board at its meeting in July, 1953, to show cause why his license to practice as a pharmacist should not be revoked for violation of federal laws, 21 U.S.C. 331 and 333 by unlawfully dispensing drugs. Motion carried.

The Secretary brought up the matter of an application having been received from Paul Johnson, 350 E. Minnehaha Parkway, Minneapolis, Minnesota, for inspector for the Board of Pharmacy. The Secretary was instructed to place same on file.

Mr. Sjoselius suggested that Regulation 19 should be sent to all general dealers who have a Household Drug License.

At 3:30 o'clock P.M. Mr. Louis Whalen appeared. Mr. Sjoselius talked to him, informing him that the Board was granting him registration and license to practice as a pharmacist in Minnesota as they wished to be helpful to him,

July 15, 1953. The Board spent the morning checking the practical work of the candidates preparatory to giving the oral examination. At 1:00 o'clock P.M. the Board began giving the oral, which continued to 5:00 o'clock P.M.

July 16, 1953. From 8:15 o'clock to 5:00 o'clock P.M. the Board continued to give the oral examination. The total examined in oral were 47 candidates.

July 17, 1953. The Board met at its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel at 10:00 o'clock A.M. All members of the Board were present.

The Board discussed the problem of substitution.

11:00 o'clock A.M. H. W. Gulden, a registered pharmacist operating a drug store at 1202 Payne Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota, had been notified to appear before the Board of Pharmacy for substitution in filling a prescription on July 7, 1953, No. 69063, calling for Nembutal Capsules.

Mr. Gulden appeared, and upon being questioned by President Feit, admitted he had used another product (Pentobarbital Sodium) manufactured by the Westward Pharmacal Company, and had purchased same direct from New York.

Mr. Gulden was severely reprimanded by President Feit and the members of the Board for his unethical conduct, pointing out the harm he was doing not only to himself, the patient, the physician, but also to the profession of pharmacy. He assured the Board that from that date he would discontinue this practice in his store.

The Board also pointed out the penalties provided in the Pharmacy Act for such violations, and that if in the future he was found guilty of substitution, he would be subject to revocation or suspension of his pharmacist license.

11:30 o'clock A.M. Mr. Oscar Cooperman, registered pharmacist operating a drug store at 2500 Riverside Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota, appeared before the Board, he having been notified to do so. A prescription, No. 96385, dated May 25, 1953, calling for Nembutal Capsules, had been filled in his store with tablets that appeared to be Nembutal C, or Nembutal and Calcium. Mr. Cooperman could not give any reason why he gave tablets instead of capsules. He did admit he had substituted for Nembutal and Benzidrine in his store, stating he occasionally would receive prescriptions written for these preparations by their chemical name.

Mr. Cooperman assured the Board he would never substitute again, and that he would remove from his stock all products being used as substitutes, thus removing the temptation. He likewise was reprimanded by President Feit and members of the Board.

The Board recessed for lunch, at 12:30 P.M.

The Board reconvened at 2:00 o'clock P.M.

Mr. George Sjoselius, the Board's legal counsel, was present.

Secretary Moudry read a letter from Nash-Finch Company, 1750 Hennepin Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota, relative to wholesale licenses for their numerous branches operating in Minnesota. After some discussion it was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the Board request an opinion of the Attorney General upon the question raised by the Nash-Finch Company in their letter dated July 6, 1953, with reference to the number of licenses they are required to secure. Motion carried.

Mr. Moudry read the correspondence relative to the three applications for drug store license submitted by Osco Drug. The applications had been returned as they did not contain the information required by the Board.

Mr. Sjoselius reported that he had talked with Roy A. McDonald, attorney for Osco Drug, relative to these applications and that the matter will be discussed with the Board at its next meeting. Mr. Sjoselius reviewed the correspondence and suggested to the Board that inasmuch as this test suit was now pending no action should be taken and that he would discuss the matter with Osco's attorneys.

The applications for drug store license submitted by the Snyder's Drug Stores, Inc. were presented to the Board, they having completed the applications and answered question No. 9 that the stores would operate in compliance with Regulations 18 and 19. The Board's inspector reported that the store at 5425 Excelsior Blvd., Minneapolis, Minnesota, was not complying with Regulations 18 and 19.

The Secretary was instructed to issue licenses for all of the Snyder's Drug Stores, with the exception of the license to the store located at 5425 Excelsior Blvd., Minneapolis, Minnesota, and that this store should be informed that the license was being withheld due to non-compliance of Regulations 18 and 19.

The Board discussed with legal counsel the procedures relative to the deposition to be taken of the Board Members and Secretary in the action brought against the Board by Snyder's Drug Stores, Inc., Marquette Drug Company, Elkon, Inc., Virgil M. Elliott, doing business as Osco Drug, relative to the Board of Pharmacy Regulations 14, 15, 18 and 19.

After considerable discussion, the Board adjourned until Monday, July 20, 1953.

July 18, 1953. The Board spent the day marking the written work of the candidates.

July 19, 1953. (Sunday)

July 20, 1953. The Board met in its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel to interview applicants for reciprocal registration. This occupied the Board the entire day.

John T. Moore, seeking reciprocity on the basis of his registration in Washington, also appeared before the Board, but did not have a completed application on file.

Each of the above reciprocal candidates was given the written examination in Jurisprudence.

The Board ruled that only the U.S.P. and N.F. may be used by the candidates in the practical examination, no slide rules or other books.

July 21, 1953. The Board continued marking the written work of the candidates.

At 11:00 o'clock A.M. Loren F. Jones, registered pharmacist in charge of the prescription department in the L. S. Donaldson Company department store, 601 Nicollet Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota, came to the Board's rooms at the Nicollet Hotel and asked if he could meet with the

Board a few minutes to discuss the opening of a pharmacy by the L. S. Donaldson Company in their new location at Rochester, Minnesota.

Mr. Jones indicated he was negotiating with them whereby he could make some arrangement to have the controlling interest in the pharmacy, but nothing definite had been worked out. He further indicated that the Donaldson Company was going to make application for the license and wanted the Board to have this information.

The Board discussed the matter after Mr. Jones left.

As the Donaldson Company operated a pharmacy in their store at the time Regulation 14 was passed,

It was moved and seconded that a license be issued to the L. S. Donaldson Company for a pharmacy in their new store in Rochester, Minnesota, upon application being filed. Motion carried.

At 1:00 o'clock P.M. Edward Ajdukiewicz, a registered pharmacist in Duluth, Minnesota, appeared before the Board. He had been asked to meet with the Board relative to his conduct and the operation of his pharmacy at 2308 W. 10th St., Duluth, Minnesota

The Board's inspector reported that when checking his store previously, Mr. Ajdukiewicz seemed to be in a fog, yet he could not detect any odor of liquor. The Board'concerned and felt that he should give some explanation of his conduct. Mr. Ajdukiewicz admitted he had been drinking excessively and that it affected the operation of his drug store, but that he had stopped drinking, had closed the drug store, and was employed by Snyder's Drug Stores in Duluth, Minnesota, that he is disposing of his drug stock and other merchandise in his store to wholesalers and other drug stores. He reported his store was closed June 19, 1953.

Mr. Ajdukiewicz assured the Board he had discontinued Xdrinking and that there would be no reason for the Board to call him before it again. The Board pointed out that under the Pharmacy Act the Board has power to suspend or revoke pharmacist licenses for excessive drinking.

The balance of the afternoon was spent interviewing pharmacists who had been notified to appear before the Board to explain their filling of prescriptions for Nembutal Capsules, which upon analysis showed that the product dispensed was not Nembutal.

McAuley Olson and Robert H. Pfeiffer, partners of Olson & Pfeiffer Drug, Hopkins, Minn. J. Russell Carroll, attorney, also present

Sherman Kassmir, pharmacist and owner of Kass Drug, 330 W. Broadway, Minneapolis

Bert Leach, pharmacist and owner of drug store at 1028 Plymouth Ave. N., Minneapolis Mrs. Leach also appeared

Each pharmacist appeared separately before the Board and admitted the use of Pentobarbital Sodium instead of Nembutal and that it was substitution under the Pharmacy Act of the State of Minnesota.

President Feit and the other members of the Board reprimanded each pharmacist severely for this practice in his store, stating it was unfair to the patient, to the physician and to the profession of pharmacy, that the pharmacist is entrusted with dispensing of medicines to the public and is required, under law, to give exactly what is ordered by the physician. Each pharmacist assured the Board he would discontinue this practice and would ban any such practice by any of his employees.

In the matter of Nathan Goldstone, when questioned by the Board, he stated he did not feel he had really substituted, that he felt Pentobarbital Sodium, which he dispensed, was the same as Nembutal. He further stated that he has been dispensing Pentobarbital Sodium on all Nembutal prescriptions, and that he had not stocked Nembutal for seven years. He felt he was being honest with his customers and doing nothing wrong.

The president of the Board reprimanded him severely and pointed out how wrong he was in his thinking and surprised that a pharmacist, a professional man, could

conscientiously practice in that manner, and that he was a disgrace to the profession. Mr. Goldstone then stated he felt he had violated the law, but apparently did not feel sorry for his actions. He stated he would discontinue substituting in his store because he had to. The Board assured him he better discontinue, and that if he was brought before the Board for repetition of substitution, action would be brought against him for susstitution, action would be brought against him for suspension or revocation of his pharmacist license. Correction ordered and the was advised he would be called before the Board again in 1953 the was advised he would be called before the Board again in 1953 the Board asked the Secretary to make further investigation in regard to substitution in Mr. Goldstone's store and make a report to the Board.

The Secretary informed the Board that due to the heavy schedule for the Board during the July meeting, followed by deposition of the Board in the Snyder's Drug Stores case, the citing of Fred De Roos, Snyder's Drug Stores, Inc., and A. J. Klenert was postponed for a special meeting of the Board.

The Board adjourned at 5:50 P.M. to meet Wednesday, July 22, 1953.

July 22, 1953. The Board met in its rooms at 9:30 o'clock A.M. All members present. President Feit called the meeting to order.

The minutes of the January, February 6 and April 27 meetings were read and approved.

The Secretary reported on the financial status, receipts and disbursements, of the Board during the first six months of the year.

The date of the July, 1954 meeting was set to begin Monday, July 12, 1954.

It was moved by Mr. Carpenter, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the ten pharmacists and one assistant pharmacist who were delinquent in the renewal of their registrations in Minnesota for the years 1951 and 1952 be dropped from the records. Motion carried. The following are the names of those dropped:

The matter of securing an additional inspector was discussed. More checking of the drug stores on Regulations 18 and 19 should be done; also the Household Drug License dealers should be checked more often. In regard to this matter the Secretary read a letter from Robert V. Cuff, Windom, Minn., and Larry Fick of Park Rapids, relative to wanting inspection of stores selling drugs and medicines.

The Secretary read a letter from Paul G. Johnson making application for employment as inspector for the Board of Pharmacy.

It was moved by Mr. Callander, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the Secretary be authorized to employ another inspector, and that the choice of such inspector be left to the Secretary. Motion carried.

The Board was informed by the Secretary that at the meeting of the 5th District Boards of Pharmacy at Omaha, the matter of accepting applicants for reciprocity who have not had the required one year of legal practice as a pharmacist in the state registered, was brought up. It seemed one of the states had been doing this.

The Secretary reported that the Board's inspector had found Ortho-Gynol on counters in general stores having Household Drug Licenses. The Board's opinion was that Ortho-Gynol and Diaphragms are not permitted to be sold in such stores, and the inspector should so advise these dealers.

The Secretary informed the Board he had discussed with Manley Brist, attorney for the Medical Board, the matter of the Heisler Clinic in Minneapolis and the Wabasha Clinic in Wabasha, Minn., dispensing drugs.

The Secretary read a letter proposing a National Licensing Examination together with questionnaire that should be answered.

There being no additional information given to supplement that which had been received before by the Board to support his eligibility for registration, the Board again ruled he was not eligible for reciprocity in Minnesota.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, that the Secretary be authorized to purchase an addressograph machine, together with 5,000 plates, and filing cabinet for storing same. Motion carried.

At 5:30 P.M. the Board recessed for dinner.

At 7:30 o'clock P.M. the Board met with George Sjoselius, the Board's legal counsel, at which time further discussion was held relative to the case brought against the Board by Snyder's Drug Stores, Inc., et al.

The Board adjourned to meet again on July 23, 1953, at the St. Paul Hotel, St. Paul, Minnesota.

July 23, 1953. The Board met at the St. Paul Hotel, St. Paul, Minnesota. All members were present, also F. W. Moudry, secretary; and legal counsel, George Sjoselius. Discussion was held relative to the case of Snyder's Drug Stores, Inc., et al, against the Board, and the depositions to be taken that day.

The Board members, secretary, and legal counsel, attended the taking of depositions at the St. Paul Court House all day. At 4:15 o'clock P.M. they returned to the hotel and further discussion was held on the case.

The Board adjourned at 4:45 P.M. until next day, July 24, 1953.

The Board met at the St. Paul Hotel at 8:00 o'clock A.M., and after some discussion on the taking of depositions the Board went to the court house for the further taking of depositions. MINNESOTA STATE BOARD OF PHAF MACY THREE HUNDRED THIRTY-SECOND MEETING

October 29, 1953. Special meeting called by the president of the Board for the purpose of conducting hearings in the matter of pharmacists cited to appear before the Board of Pharmacy, and for other business to come before the Board.

The Board met in room 400 Nicollet Hotel, Minneapelis. Members present: President Victor E. Feit, Angus H. Tayler, Harry W. Carlsen, Harold H. Carpenter, and Ray Callander.

9:45 o'clock A.M. Meeting called to order by President Feit.

The minutes of the July meeting were read and approved as corrected.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Callander, that \$2,000 be turned over to the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association out of the funds of the Board of Pharmacy for the advancement of the Science and Art in Pharmacy. Motion carried.

The Secretary reported on a resolution passed by the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy at its meeting in Salt Lake City, Utah, August 15-20, 1953, pertaining to Boards of Pharmacy to sponsor refresher courses.

The Secretary discussed various matters with the Board, such as the Michigan Supreme Court decision in the sale of drugs and medicines, which now permits general retail dealers to sell packaged medicines; Pennsylvania and New Jersey cases relative to the sale of drugs and medicines in grocery and other outlets; an article in the N.A.R.D. Journal against self-service in drug stores.

The Secretary also reported on a case brought into court in Austin. A grocer in Austin sold Phillips' Milk of Magnesia to our inspector and was found guilty by the court and fined \$10.

The list of drugs to be permitted to be sold by licensed dealers was gone into at some length.

The Secretary reported that the next meeting of the Board for examination in January, 1954, was scheduled to begin on the 18, and the July meeting on the 12. TWO HUNDRED

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The Secretary brought up the matter of increases in salary for two of the employees of the Board, namely: Irma Webb Smith, Clerk-Stenographer I, and Earl J. Schlekau, Law Enforcement Inspector II. No step-up had been given Mrs. Smith since employment in December, 1952, and none given Mr. Schlekau since July, 1952.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Callander, that the salary of Mrs. Smith be increased by two step-ups of \$5 each, or a total of \$10 increase per month effective January 1, 1954. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Carlsen, that the salary of Mr. Schlekau be increased by two step-ups of \$8 each, or a total of \$16 increase per menth effective January 1, 1954. Motion carried.

Board adjourned to meet the following day, Friday, October 30, 1953.

October 30, 1953. 10:00 o'clock A.M. - Meeting called to order by President Feit. All members of the Board were present, also the Secretary of the Board and legal counsel, George Sjoselius. Marion Noteman, court reporter, and Agent Caswell of the Minneapolis branch, Bureau of Narcotics, were also present.

Fred De Roes, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, eperating a drug store at 4601 Nicollet Ave., Minneapolis, cited to appear before the Board.

Mr. De Roos was sworn in and took the stand to answer the charges in Citation served upon him on October 9, 1953, which are as follows:

Mr. Sjoselius, Board's legal counsel, conducted the hearing and a transcript of the case was made.

3:00 o'clock P.M. Alex H. Altshuler, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, owning and operating a drug store at 171 N. Dale, St. Paul, Minnesota, appeared before the Board in answer to a citation served upon him on December 30, 1953, why his license as a pharmacist should not be revoked because of unprofessional conduct.

Mr. Altshuler was sworn in and took the stand to answer the charges in citation, which are as follows:

4:00 o'clock P.M. Meyer S. Furman, a registered pharmacist

in the State of Minnesota, appeared before the Board for final action to be taken in his case which was heard before the Board on January 28, 1952.

The Secretary read a letter dated January 6, 1954, from the Hennepin County Probation Office, Court House, Minneapolis, Minnesota, signed by Glenn J. Nelson, Probation Officer, advising that Mr. Furman had been honorably discharged from probation on November 24, 1953, and that the sentence imposed by the Court on November 26, 1951 has been indefinitely suspended. WHEREAS, Said Meyer S. Furman has been honorably discharged from his probation in the Hennepin County District Court and has, so far as the Board is informed, conducted himself honorably as a citizen and pharmacist, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Minnesota State Board of Pharmacy duly convened this 20th day of January, 1954, that the license of Meyer S. Furman to practice pharmacy shall not be revoked.

On motion meeting adjourned.

January 21, 1954. The Board met at the College of Pharmacy, University of Minnesota, at 9:00 o'clock A.M. to give the oral examination. The oral was given to twenty-five candidates and occupied the entire day, until 5:00 o'clock P.M.

January 22, 1954. The Board met at the College of Pharmacy, University of Minnesota, at 9:00 o'clock A.M. to continue giving the oral examination to the balance of the candidates, ten applicants.

At 11:30 A.M. the Board met in its rooms at the Nicollet Hotel to begin marking the written work of the candidates.

2:00 o'clock P.M. Nathan H. Goldstone, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, appeared before the Board in response to a letter sent him by the Secretary on January 14, 1954, relative to substitution on prescriptions in his store. Mr. Goldstone apologized for his attitude and action when he appeared before the Board on July 21, 1953. He stated he had discontinued substituting on all drugs, both on prescriptions and over counter sale, and that in his store there would be no more substitution of any kind. President Taylor and members of the Board pointed out his responsibility to the public in his practice as a pharmacist, and informed him that a repetition of substitution, which brought him before the Board in July, 1953, he could expect his license to be revoked.

3:00 o'clock P.M. Paul Dix appeared before the Board in response to a letter sent him by the Secretary on January 19, 1954, relative to his drug store not being covered by a registered pharmacist during all the hours it is open for business.

Mr. Dix stated he was not a registered pharmacist but that he had been in the drug business with his father for many years, and that he had had not only years of practical experience but had taken Drew's course in pharmacy, but never became registered. The Board told him that the law required a pharmacist to be in charge of a store all the hours it is open, and while he has had considerable experience, he could not perform the duties of a

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pharmacist, and when the store was not covered, it was a violation of the Pharmacy Act.

Mr. Dix indicated it would be a terrific hardship on him if he had to pay the price pharmacists were now asking. The Board pointed out to him that if he secured the services of some young pharmacist, they felt he could develop the business so that it would be profitable. Mr. Dix stated he would make an effort to secure such a man, and in the meantime, he assured the Board the store would be covered at all times.

Byron A. Farley, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, operating a store at 1579 Grand Avenue, St. Paul, cited to appear before the Board.

Mr. Farley was sworn in and took the stand to answer the charges in Citation served upon him on April 13, 1954, which are as follows:

"Unprofessional conduct as follows: That you, the said Byron A. Farley, conducted yourself in a manner unbecoming a person licensed to practice pharmacy in the State of Minnesota and in a manner endangering the public health, more particularly as follows:

Benepe to Harry Carnis, 1601 Charles Street, St. Paul 4W, Minnesota, dated June 19, 1952, bearing number N 72804 for 50 one-fourth grain morphine tablets, was filled by you on June 19, 1952. That thereafter you, in violation of the laws of the State of Minnesota and of the United States of America, without authorization, refilled said prescription at the following times and for the following amounts:

That thereafter you, in violation of the laws of the State of Minnesota and of the United States of America, without authorization, refilled said prescription at the following times and for the following amounts:

Mr. Farley was not represented by legal counsel.

At the completion of the hearing Mr. Farley was excused from the room and asked to wait outside.

The Board then discussed the matter further.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, that no further action be taken by the Board against Mr. Farley, but that he be severely reprimanded for the loose manner in which he had handled narcotics in his store. Motion carried.

Mr. Farley was called back into the room and President Taylor informed him of the Board's action. Mr. Farley was severely censored for his careless dispensing of narcotics in violation of the law. He assured the Board he would comply with all the requirements in the future.

Mr. Caswell reported on the Bureau of Narcotics preliminary investigation of irregularities in the handling of narcotics by Gerald J. Schauff, a registered pharmacist, who owns and operates a drug store at 3359-36th Avenue South, Minneapolis. Mr. Caswell felt the Board should have this information at this time.

The Board's inspector, Cady S. Corl, reported on his investigation of the drug store owned and operated by John J. A. Mausbach, a registered pharmacist in Minnesota, at 71 E. Broadway, Little Falls, also relative to his arrests for drunkeness. It was felt by legal counsel that unless these complaints are for violation of the Pharmacy Act, the Board has no authority to bring action for personal conduct outside of operation of the drug store and practice of his profession.

The Secretary was instructed to write the Chief of Police of Little Falls asking for copies of convictions against John J. A. Mausbach for the past ten years.

The Secretary reported that the drug store owned and operated by Fred De Roos, whose pharmacist registration was revoked as of January 1, 1954, had been sold to H. F. Timmons on April 1, 1954

Nothing further coming before the Board, it was moved and seconded that meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

Special meeting called by the president of the Board to take necessary action relative to Summons and Complaint filed against the members of the Board and its Secretary by Snyder's Drug Stores, Inc., Walgreen Company (Illinois), Elkon, Inc., Virgil M. Elliott, doing business as Osco Drug.

The Board met in Parlor H, Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis. Members present: President Angus H. Taylor, Harold H. Carpenter, Harry W. Carlsen, John S. Harms, and Ivan E. Peterson of Grand Rapids, Minnesota, the new member of the Board appointed by Governor C. Elmer Anderson on May 7, 1954 to fill unexpired term of A. V. Rutter of Duluth due to his having resigned as a member.

The Board's legal counsel, George Sjoselius, was also present; and Henry Moen, Secretary of the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association, and Beldin H. Loftsgaarden, attorney for the State Association, were asked to sit in for the discussion relative to the litigation on Regulations 14, 15, 18 and 19.

10:10 o'clock A.M. Meeting called to order by President Taylor.

It was moved by Mr. Harms, seconded by Mr. Carlsen, that the reading of the minutes for the May 3, 1954 meeting be dispensed with. Motion carried.

The members of the Board and Mr. Sjoselius and Mr. Loftsgaarden discussed action brought against the Board, and the attorneys were to prepare and file an answer.

The secretary read from the June issue of the Minnesota Food Guide, where on page four, a full page ad carried announcement to the grocery trade that pharmaceutical items could be sold in Minnesota food stores. The ad listed a number of drugs. The secretary informed the Board that he had received this copy from Mr. Ed Straus, secretary of the Minneapolis Grocers' association, the day before, and that Mr. Straus wanted a statement from the Board to be published in his Bulletin as to whether the items listed in the Minnesota Food Guide were permitted to be sold by food dealers.

The Board discussed the items at some length and felt that they all came under the classification of drugs under the Pharmacy Law of the State of Minnesota.

At your request we have examined the list of "pharmaceutical items" published on page four of the June, 1954 issue of Minnesota Food Guide.

All of the "pharmaceutical items" so listed in the Minnesota Food Guide are drugs which may not be legally sold in food stores unless the owner of the food store has a license issued by the State Board of Pharmacy under authority of Minnesota Statutes 1953, Section 151.26.

We enclose a copy of list of items which may be legally sold in food stores provided that they are not sold for medicinal use.

In addition to the items named in the list referred to in the preceding paragraph, the following items may be legally sold in food stores: cosmetics, shampoos, tooth paste, shaving creams, hair permanents, hair tonics and creams, deodorants and other toilet articles of a similar nature.

MINNESOTA STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY

THREE HUNDRED THIRTY-SEVENTH MEETING

October 29, 1954. Special meeting called by the president of the Board to discuss and consider several important matters to be brought before the Board.

The Board met in Parlor H, Nicollet Hotel, Minneapolis. Members present: President Angus H. Taylor, Harold H. Carpenter, Harry W. Carlsen, John S. Harms, and Ivan E. Peterson.

10:00 o'clock A.M. Meeting called to order by President Taylor.

The minutes of the July meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary brought up the financial status of the Board at the present time. He stated the Board had a balance as of September 30, 1954 of \$32,972.48; that the receipts from January 1 to September 30 totaled \$35, 354.30; and the disbursements for the same period totaled \$25,392.39. The Secretary also stated that the present payroll totals \$1,803 per month.

The Secretary brought up the matter of employing an attorney outside of the Attorney General's office in order to go ahead with the case against Red Owl Company and Groves-Kelco Inc., also litigation in the case of Snyder's Drug Stores, Walgreen Company, Elkon Inc., and Virgil Elliott doing business as Osco Drug. After some discussion it was the feeling of the Board that we should ask for a special assistant attorney for the Board.

The matter of Watkins agents advertising vitamins for sale was discussed, as was so-called food supplements known as Nutrilite, Numanna, Derit Energy Wafers, which the Board feels come under the classification of Vitamins. It was felt further discussion be held when the Board would meet with its legal counsel in the afternoon.

The Secretary discussed with the Board the matter of inspection of drug stores and other retail outlets where drugs and medicines are being sold.

The Board discussed the matter of amending the State Narcotic Law at the coming session of the Legislature, which begins in January, 1955, so as to conform with the Federal Act relative to accepting code ine compound prescriptions over the telephone.

The Secretary brought up for discussion the matter of a regulation governing manufacturers of medicines within the State of Minnesota in regard to supervision by pharmacist or chemist, sanitary conditions, and so forth. It was suggested that this matter be given to legal counsel to advise whether the Board had any powers in that matter.

The Secretary brought up the matter of new lighting in the office of the Board of Pharmacy located at 3965 Minnehaha Avenue, Minneapolis. He stated that at the present time there are but two light fixtures, which do not give adequate light. The Secretary presented a light survey made by the Northern States Power Company and its recommendations.

It was moved by Mr. Carlsen, seconded by Mr. Harms, that the Secretary be authorized to negotiate for new and adequate Lighting in the Board of Pharmacy office. Motion carried.

The Secretary brought up for discussion the matter of regulations governing vending machines for medicines, vitamins, and so forth; is Board empowered to pass such regulations, and could they be included in Regulations 18 and 19. The Secretary stated he would write other Boards of Pharmacy, or inquire of Pat Costello, Secretary of the National Boards, if there are any states that have regulations on vending machines.

The matter of analysis of drugs was brought up and the Secretary stated he had talked with Goodwin Joss Laboratories relative to analysis of samples that would be purchased from drug stores and other retail outlets, and also to Frank DiGangi of the College of Pharmacy in regard to having analysis made at the College of Pharmacy by a student as laboratory technician under his supervision. A letter from Goodwin Joss Laboratories was read setting forth cost of analysis. It was suggested by the Board that we use the services of Goodwin Joss Laboratories for the present.

12:30 o'clock P.M. Board recessed for lunch.

Re-convened at 1:15 o'clock PlM.

George Sjoselius, legal counsel for the Board, was present at the afternoon session.

The matter of the application from Snyder's Drug Stores for a license for a new drug store was brought up. The location of the store is 417 E. Hennepin Ave., Minneapolis, Minnesota. Earl Schlekau, inspector for the Board, read a report on his investigation of the new store, which was open for business. He stated he had made purchases of drugs on self-service. Mr. Sjoselius read a letter he had received from Roy Macdonald (attorney) of the Snyder's Drug Stores, which had been sent to the Attorney General's office. Included with this letter was a list of items which were on self-service in this store, and a number of these

items were drugs. The Board checked the drugs that could not be sold under self-service. Mr. Sjoselius stated he would call Mr. Macdonald and advise him as to which items could not be on self-service and for him to consult with the officials of Snyder's Drug Stores in regard to same and then advise whether they would comply. Mr. Sjoselius stated that when Mr. Macdonald calls and if he gives his word that the drugs would not be sold under self-service, that that was sufficient. Mr. Sjoselius said he would advise Secretary Moudry as soon as he heard from Mr. Macdonald. (Mr. Sjoselius later called Mr. Moudry and told him Mr. Macdonald had assured him that the drugs would not be sold under self-service, and asked that license be issued.)

Mr. Sjoselius advised the Board that he had received notice from Mr. Macdonald that the Snyder's Drug Stores, et al, case set for trial will come up in January, 1955. It was pointed out that the January, 1955 examination to be given by the Board of Pharmacy for licensure was set for the week beginning Monday, the 17, and hoped there would be no conflict.

The Board asked Mr. Sjoselius in regard to bringing action against the Red Owl Company and Groves-Kelco Inc., and he stated he is working on it but has not been able to complete the papers for the case. He hoped to have it in court before the Legislature convenes.

The Board informed Mr. Sjoselius that vitamins were being advertised by the Watkins Company's agents and were being sold by the agents, also Nutrilite was being sold by agents of Mytinger and Casselberry Company of California. The Board felt that they were vitamins under the Pharmacy Act and decision by the State Supreme Court. Mr. Sjoselius stated that he felt action should be brought against these companies.

The matter of special assistant attorney being appointed for the Board to take care of the pressing litigation was discussed with Mr. Sjoselius. Due to the heavy demands upon him in his position as Deputy Attorney General, he recommended that we ask that a special assistant be appointed for the Board, also that he would commsel with him on our problems. The Board instructed the Secretary to make this request of the Attorney General.

The Secretary read a letter received from the Chief of Police of Little Falls, dated October 4, 1954, in regard to John Mausbach, a registered pharmacist operating a drug store in Little Falls.

The Board discussed the matter of the new label on "Lysol", which does not contain the word "poison" as the manufacturer of this product claims that the new formula is not poisonous. It was the consensus of the Board that if "Lysol" was not poisonous and was permitted to be so labeled under the Federal Food and Drug Administration,

that the Minnesota State Board of Pharmacy should not require the manufacturer to have special labeling using the "poison" label for this State.

On motion duly made and seconded and carried, meeting was adjourned.
