FRIDLEY TOWNSHIP: (Manomin County; Manomin Township): T.30 N.,R.24 W. A fractional township comprising only about 16 square miles. Established by the legislature of 1857 as Manomin County. In 1869-70 it was united with Anoka County as Manomin Township. In 1879 the name was changed to Fridley, for Abram M. Fridley, who came to Long Prairie in 1851 as agent for the Winnebago Indians. He was a representative in the legislature in 1855, 1869-71, and 1879.

He introduced the free homestead bill in the House, which became law in 1862. Grow spoke at Anoka in the political campaign of 1859.

HAM LAKE: Lake (5-80). T.32 N.,R.23 W.,sec.16,17,20,21. Wet. Meandered. 194.70 acres. Named from its shape.

HAM LAKE TOWNSHIP (Glengarry Township): T.32 N.,R.23 W. Organized 1871. It had been previously called Glengarry, a Scotch name which its Swedish settlers found difficult to pronounce; the county commissioners therefore changed the name to Hame Lake, for the lake in sec.16,17,20,21.

The name was copied from Lake Itasca at the head of the Mississippi. It was later applied for many years to the N.P.Ry. station near the former Itasca village. Both the village and the ry station have been abandoned. The settlement of five or six houses was evacuated because of Indian scares in the early sixties.

The name of Rum river, which Carver in 1766 and Pike in 1805 found in use by English-speaking fur traders, was indirectly derived from the Sioux. Their name of Mille Lacs, Mde Wakan, translated Spirit lake, was given to its river, but was changed by the white men to the most common spirituous liquor brought into the Northwest, rum, which brought misery and ruin, to many of the Indians. The map of Long's expedition in 1823 has these names, Spirit lake and Rum river. Nicollets map, published in 1843, has "Iskode Wabo or Rum R." this name given by the Ojibways, but derived by them from the white men's perversion of the ancient Sioux name Wakan, being in more exact translation "Fire Water." More frequently, as noted by Gilfillan, the Ojibway name for Rum river was taken from their name for the lake and meant simply the Great Lake river. The Cronin map calls it Brandy River and Missayguani Sibi by Beltrami; Franquelin's map, 1688, R. des Francois ou des Sioux; Henepin's map, 1683, R. de St. Francois; Nicollet, Isko de Wabo or Rum River; Carver, Pike, Long, Owen, Allen --Rum River; Schoolcraft, Missisawgaiegon or Rum River.
