The defendant, William Lust, appeared in Court on the 11th day of September, A. D. 1913, and filed a request to be permitted to plead guilty to the charge of Grand Larceny in the Second degree, as charged in the complaint and warrant against him, that a preliminary hearing was had and he was bound over to await the action of the Grand Jury upon such charge. Upon his appearance in Court counsel was duly appointed to aid the said defendant in his defence, and upon his appearing in Court he entered a plea of guilty to such

charge, whereupon, the defendant was duly sworn and the following proceedings were had:

By the Court:

- Q Your true name is William Lust? A Yes, sir.
Q How old are you? A 21.
Q 21? A Yes, sir.
Q Where were you born? A Gary, South Dakota.
Q Gary? A Yes, sir.
Q Gary, South Dakota, what is your nationality? A German.
Q German; are your parents living? A Yes, sir.
Q Where do they live? A In Chaska.
Q How long have they lived at Chaska? A Five or six months I think.
Q How long have you lived in Chaska? A Why, I stayed with the folks all together, here, about a month.
Q And where did you come from to Chaska? A From Minneapolis.
Q How long were you in Minneapolis? A About four years.

Q Are you a married man? A How is that?

Q Are you a married man? A Yes, sir.

Q How long have you been married? A Since the 14th day of June.

Q Last June? A Yes, sir.

Q Have you any children? A One child.

Q Where were you married? A In Minneapolis.

Q Have you ever been convicted of any crime before?

A Not in stealing.

Q Well, any crime?

A Well, I was sentenced to the State institution down here at Redwing for skipping school.

Q And from what place were you committed? A Minneapolis.

Q How long did you remain at Redwing in that institution?

A I went there on the ^{14th} ~~14th~~ day of March, 1910, and came out the sixth day of March, 1911.

Q You didn't run away from the institution? A No, sir.

Q When were you arrested and put in this jail here in this county?

A The 14th day of last month, I think.

Q The 14th day of August? A Yes, sir.

Q Have you any trade or occupation? A Yes, sir.

Q What is it? A Carpenter.

Q How long have you followed that trade? A Ever since I was big enough to drive a nail.

Q What employment did you have at the institution at Redwing?

A Carpenter.

Q You have no other trade or occupation? A No, sir, except driving team.

Q Now, you have made a request to enter a plea of guilty to the charge of larceny in the 2d degree, as charged in the complaint and warrant entered against you?

A Yes, sir.

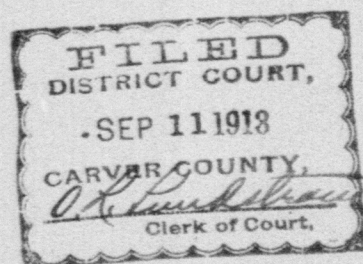
Q You are satisfied to enter that plea at this time?

A Yes, sir.

Q Have you anything to say now why sentence should not be pronounced upon you for the offence with which you have been charged and of which you have been convicted?

A No, sir.

By the Court: It is adjudged and determined that William Lust is guilty of the crime of larceny in the second degree, to which he has entered a plea of guilty, and, as a punishment for such offence he be committed to and confined in the County Jail of Carver County for a period not exceeding fifteen days. You are now remanded to the custody of the sheriff, who will execute the sentence so imposed upon you.

At the preliminary hearing in the above entitled matter, held at the Court House, in the City of Chaska, Minnesota, on the 2d day of September, A. D. 1913, before the Honorable A. F. Young, a Justice of the Peace in and for said County of Carver, the following proceedings were had:

A P P E A R A N C E S :

John J. Fahey, Esquire, appeared as counsel for the State, in his capacity of County Attorney of said County;

Francis L. Mukel, Esquire, appeared as counsel for the Deft.

Case called and complaint read.

By Mr. Mukel: Now, Your Honor, before we hear any evidence under this complaint, I want to enter an objection as soon as the County Attorney finds the section of the Statute under which the complaint is based. # # Objection withdrawn.

E D W A R D R A D D E , the complaining witness, called as a witness on the part of the State, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

Direct Examination.

By Mr. Fahey:

Q Your name is Edward Radde, is it?

A Yes, sir.

Q Where do you live, Mr. Radde?

A Waconia.

Q Waconia, Carver county, Minnesota?

A Yes, sir.

Q How long have you lived at Waconia?

A Well, I lived there pretty near all my life.

Q How old a man are you?

A Thirty six.

Q Thirty six, what business are you engaged in there, Mr. Radde?

A I am marshal.

Q Were you at Waconia on the 24th of August, 1913?

A Yes.

Q And were you at that time marshal of the Village?

A Yes.

Q Did you see this defendant here, Elbert Johnson?

A Yes.

Q What time of the day did you see Mr. Johnson there?

A It was between three and four o'clock.

Q Between three and four o'clock in the afternoon?

A Afternoon.

Q Of the 24th of August; well, now, did you have any conversation or talk with Mr. Johnson that day?

A No, not any.

Q Didn't have any talk with him?

A No.

Q Where did you see him?

A I seen him come out between the buildings.

Q What buildings were they?

A Between the drug store and John Zemann's ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ restaurant.

Q Now, the drug store and John Zemann, their places of business are located on one of the main streets of the Village,

are they?

A Yes, sir.

By the Court: I didn't get that; between the drug store and what?

A John Zemann's restaurant.

Q And that was between three and four o'clock of the afternoon of that day?

A Yes.

Q Well, you saw him come out; where did he go when he came out from between those places?

I
A He walked down the street.

Q Which direction was he walking?

A I was walking east.

Q You were walking east, what direction was he going?

A West.

Q Did you meet there at the street?

A Yes, I met him.

Q Well, what happened then when you met on the street?

A I took hold of his arm and told him to move out the same way he came.

Q Well, what further happened?

A Well, he turned around and walked off.

Q He turned around and walked off, in what direction did he walk?

A He walked east.

Q He walked east, yes; did he say anything when you took hold of his arm?

A No, he didn't say anything.

Q Well, then, what happened next?

A He walked a ways till in front of Zemann's place there, then he says, I don't know whether I will move, I says, "Just keep on a-going", and shoved him; he walked on again; then he walked until pretty close by the drugstore, then

he says, "I'll be God damned if I move for you." I shoved him, then he turned around and struck at me, I caught his arm, then he hit with the left arm, just struck over my left arm, then he caught me in here.

Q Well, he caught you in where, so that the Reporter will get that down?

A Right in the ^{shirt} ~~shoulder~~ here.

Q In front?

A Yes, then I turned around and I hit him.

Q How many times did you hit him?

A I hit him four or five times, and I says, "Will you move on or not?" And he says, "Yes, sir, God damn you, I'll move and you son of a bitch will move too," then he ran away and ran up to the wagon and pulled out a gun and came after me and took a shot at me.

Q Well, what, how far was his wagon from the place where this trouble occurred?

A Well, that was from that corner to the drug store and then a little ways up the street.

Q Well, was it a block or more than a block?

A No, it was two lots, they are 55 feet long.

Q So that would be about 110 feet?

A Well, up to the wagon it was a little more.

Q Well, about how far?

A Oh, about 130 feet.

Q About 130 feet; well, then, he ran up to the wagon, you say, and he took a gun; what kind of a gun was that?

A Well, I didn't see the gun then, I didn't examine it close but it was a single barrellled shotgun.

Q Well, when you saw him with the gun in his hands, what did you do?

A Well, I waited until he come around a telephone post, then ^{off the walk} I jumped ~~in and walked~~ behind the buildings and I ran.

Q Well, go ahead, then tell what happened?

A Then he came to that corner where I jumped in and I was down the alley, I jumped over a fence and broke down and fell, the fence broke down with me and I fell just the time the shot went off, too.

Q Just as you fell the shot went off?

A Shot cracked.

Q Did any of the grains of shot strike you?

A No.

Q Did they strike any part of your body?

A No.

Q Did you make an examination to see where the grains of shot went?

A We did afterwards.

Q And where did those grains of shot go?

A They were in the barn, some of them. We found marks in the barn there.

Q And did you find any shot any other place?

A No.

Q In the fence?

A No, not in the fence.

Q Not in the fence. Well, now, the barn, that was in what direction from the sidewalk?

A Well, pretty near in a straight direction.

Q Pretty straight east or west or north or south?

A South.

Q That barn was back in between in the alley, was it?

A Yes.

Q And how far away was this barn located from the sidewalk?

A The barn, that was 155 feet long, the lots are, I don't know how wide the barn is.

Q Well, about how far would the barn be from the sidewalk?

A Well, about 140 feet.

Q About 140 feet; and about how far away was the fence from

A Well, that was on the end of the barn, on the south end.

Q Well, would that be 130 or 35 feet?

A That would be 150 feet.

Q Well, is the barn nearer the sidewalk than the fence?

A Yes.

Q Well, how did he happen to hit the barn?

A Well, they was pretty near in a straight line, I just passed the barn close by.

Q Passed the barn close by?

A Between the two barns.

Q And you passed the end of the barn and you came to the fence, did you?

A Yes.

Q And as you were going over the fence that shot was fired when you broke down?

A Yes.

Q Well, did you feel any of the grains of shot going over your head or near your body?

A Well, I couldn't just say that I heard them, but, of course I fell down and sprawled on the ground and rolled over back of the barn right away.

Q Well, then, you were farther,--about how many feet south of the barn where the shot ran?

A Well, about four feet. something, farther east.

Q And about how much further south?

A Well, from the front end, well, the width of the barn, I think it is 16 or 18 feet.

Q You were further south, then, about 16 or 18 feet?

A Yes.

Q Now, you made an examination of the barn there and saw the shot, where the shot struck?

A Yes.

Q And that was the end of the barn just where you had passed

was it?

A Yes.

Q And about how far away from where you were was it where the shot struck the barn?

A Well, that was the width of the barn?

A Well, about 16 or 18 feet?

A 16 or 18 feet, I couldn't say.

Q That is, you were farther south, but how much farther east were you or was it about in the same line?

A About four feet.

Q So the end of the barn that was struck was practically in the same line that you were in, is that so?

A Yes.

Q From this man that fired the shot?

A Yes.

Q Now, when that shot was fired where did you go then after the shot was fired?

A I went down back of the ice house back of my brother's place, Fred Radde's, in the alley.

Q Did you see Johnson after that?

A In the alley, I didn't see him, not while I was standing there.

By Mr. Mukel: Just a moment, we object to any testimony of anything Mr. Johnson did or said after he fired the gun as claimed by the witness or after he fired the shot as claimed by the witness; anything after that can't be proved or

disproved in an attempt to commit an assault.

The Court sustained the objection.

Q Now, Mr. Radde, you say then of course that the first time you saw Mr. Johnson was he was walking along on the sidewalk?

A He came out between--

Q He came out between two buildings?

A Came out between two buildings.

Q And when you encountered him on the sidewalk, you told him to move out of town, is that so?

A Yes.

Q And then after you told him to move out of town, you and he had a little scrap there on the sidewalk?

A Yes.

Q And after that he went to his wagon, you saw him go to his wagon, did you?

A Yes.

Q And take a shot gun out?

A Yes.

Q And you saw him come towards you with that shotgun, is that so?

A Yes.

Q And you ran in between, in the alley, and just as you were going over the fence, the shot was fired?

A Yes.

Q And some of the grains of shot from that gun rained in that barn right close to where you were going over the fence?

A Yes.

Q And that happened on when, on what date?

A The 24th of August.

Q The 24th of August, 1913?

A Yes.

Q Where?

A Waconia.

Q Waconia Village, in what county?

A Carver county.

Q Minnesota? A State of Minnesota.

Cross Examination.

By Mr. Mukel:

Q Was your face or your back toward Mr. Johnson when you heard that shot?

A Well, I jumped over the fence--

Q Just answer the question, were you facing him, or was your back to him when you heard the shot?

A My back was to him.

Q Yet you say he fired the shot at you?

A Yes.

Q How do you know that he did; did you see him shoot?

A I heard the shot and I looked when I fell and I seen him.

Q When you fell you saw him?

A Yes.

Q Then he didn't fire the shot while you were falling?

A He fired that shot.

Q Hum?

A Yes, he fired the shot.

Q You say the shot after he fired out of that gun lodged in the barn?

A Some of it.

Q How do you know the shot that he fired at that time lodged in the barn?

A Well, we went over there and looked and saw they was fresh marks.

Q Had you gone over to that barn to see whether there were fresh marks there before?

A No.

Q Then you really don't know positively whether he fired the shot or not?

A Yes, I know positively he fired the shot.

Q You know positively that he did?

A Yes.

Q What were you doing on the 24th of August, this year, Mr. Radde?

A I was marshal.

Q Did you perform any other function on that day?

A No.

Q Didn't you umpire a game of baseball that afternoon?

A Yes, I umpired a game of base ball.

Q How long did you stay at the ball game?

A It was ten minutes after three when that was out.

Q Ten minutes after three; did they have beer at the ball game?

A No, sir.

Q They didn't; and the first time that you saw Mr. Johnson was about in front of Zemann's drugstore, was it?

A He came out between there.

Q Between Zemann's drugstore and the grocery store?

A No, Diessner's drugstore and the restaurant.

Q What direction is that from your brother's butcher shop?

A That is east.

Q How far?

A Well, about eighty feet.

Q What direction and what distance was Mr. Johnson walking from that point where you first saw Mr. Johnson?

A Well, that was about 130 feet more or less.

Q What direction?

A That was east.

Q Was the Catholic church of Waconia east of where you first saw Mr. Johnson?

A Yes.

Q How close was the Catholic church?

A It was a block off.

Q A block west of the church; who spoke first, you or Mr. Johnson?

A I did.

Q You told him to get out of town, did you?

A I told him to turn around and move out the way he came, get out of town.

Q What did you say that for?

A Well, he looked suspicious.

Q You didn't attempt to arrest him then?

A No.

Q You didn't tell him he was under arrest; you didn't arrest him?

A No.

Q When you told him to move out of town, did you put your hands on him?

A I put my one hand on his arm.

Q Did you do it gently or violently?

A I did it gently.

Q Well, why did you do it?

A I took hold of him that way to turn him around.

Q You did that gently?

A Yes, he turned around himself.

Q What did he ~~then~~ do?

A He started to walk on.

Q How far did he walk?

A Walked till in front of Zemann's restaurant.

Q That's about a distance of 80 feet?

A No, fifty feet.

Q Then what did he do?

A Well, he says, "I don't know whether I'll move or not." I says, "Just keep on going."

Q Did you follow him up?

A Yes.

Q And how close were you when you said, "Keep on going"?

A About eight feet.

Q And did he keep on going?

A No, he didn't; I just took and shoved him a little.

Q And that's the second time you shoved him?

A No, the first time I just took him by the arm.

Q And where was it you took him by the shoulder and pushed him off the sidewalk?

A Then.

Q Well, how far did he go from where you first moved him?

A Walked another fifty feet.

Q Did he stop again?

A He stopped and says, I'll be God damned--

Q No, no, never mind that, what did you do?

A I shoved him, followed up and--

Q Did you put your hands on him?

A Yes.

Q What did you say to him then?

A I says, Just keep on moving.

Q Where was it that you claim he grabbed you by the shirt, front of the shirt?

A That was right ~~after~~ that when I shoved him there and told him to keep on moving.

Q And what did he say to you?

A He says, "I'll be God damned if I move for you."

Q And you pushed him?

A I did, yes.

Q And he reached around--

A He hit at me.

Q He didn't hit you?

A No, he didn't; I caught his arm.

Q Then what did you do?

A I grabbed him by the other hand by the collar and he grabbed me the same time by the collar.

Q By the shirt?

A By the bosom.

Q Then you struck him?

A Yes.

Q Where did you strike him?

A I think I hit him on the nose.

Q The first time?

A Yes.

Q Where did you hit him the second time?

A I think on the head.

Q Front part?

A I think it was on top.

Q How many blows did you strike him?

A Four or five times.

Q Did you strike him very hard?

A No, I did not.

Q Just look at the defendant and tell us whether you struck him in the eye; did you notice that his eye became discolored after you struck him?

A I didn't see him afterwards.

Q You didn't, not at all?

A I saw him in the hall, yes.

Q What hall?

A Well, he ran up to the wagon from there on yet and got the gun.

Q Well, after you heard the shot and fell over the fence, where did you go?

A I went back of the barn.

Q How long did you stay there?

A I didn't stay there very long, about five seconds.

Q Where did you go from there?

A I went down back of the ice house.

Q Then where did you go?

A I went back in the butcher shop.

Q What did you go there for?

A To get me a gun or something.

Q To get you a rifle?

A A gun.

Q What was you going to do, Mr. Radde?

By Mr. Fahey: Objected to as immaterial.

The Court sustained the objection.

Q Then after Mr. Johnson fired the shot when did you next see him, or after you got to the butcher shop when did you next see Mr. Johnson?

A I seen him in the alley.

Q Didn't you see Mr. Johnson a couple of miles out on the country road?

By Mr. Fahey: Well, I object to that as not proper cross examination, and immaterial.

By the Court: Objection sustained; we have nothing to do with that that happened on the road.

Q Did you arrest Elbert Johnson that day?

A Yes.

By Mr. Fahey: Objected to as immaterial.

The Court sustained the objection.

Q Do you remember of having a conversation in one of the saloons in Waconia on that day relative to the way this thing happened?

A I don't understand.

Q I say, do you remember having a discussion, a talk about this fracas or fuss with Mr. Johnson at one of the saloons at Waconia that day?

A I didn't go in no saloon.

Q You didn't?

A No, sir.

Q Do you remember having a talk with anybody that day and telling how this happened?

A I don't remember.

Q Do you remember having a talk with Mr. Riehl, the editor of the newspaper?

A That was later.

Q Well, what day was that?

A That was the same day, but it was after the shooting.

Q Certainly, you couldn't have discussed it unless it occurred, but you remember talking with Mr. Riehl about it, do you not?

A I didn't talk with Riehl about that at all.

Q You didn't?

A No.

Q I will ask you, Mr. Radde, what your object was in chasing and driving this man out of town?

A Well, he was looking suspicious, acting suspicious.

Q He didn't commit an offence, did he, up to the time, up to the time that he came after you with the gun?

A I don't know, I didn't see any.

Q There had been no complaint lodged against him, or you instructed to arrest him?

A There was no complaint lodged against him, no.

Q Nobody asked you to arrest him?

A No.

Q Isn't it a fact, Mr. Radde, that you struck Elbert Johnson on the back of the head the very first thing, and that's where you struck him first?

A No.

F E R D I N A N D P E I T Z , a witness called on the part of the State, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

Direct Examination.

By Mr. Fahey:

Q Mr. Peitz, you are a resident of Waconia Village, are you?

A Yes, sir.

Q And how long have you resided there?

A About 11 months.

Q About 11 months; were you in Waconia Village on the 24th of August?

A Yes, sir.

Q 1913? A Yes, sir.

Q Did you see any trouble there that day?

A Well, trouble, I saw this shooting business.

Q You saw a shooting?

By Mr. Mukel: Will you speak a little louder, Mr. Peitz, please?

Q You saw the shooting affray, did you, there?

A Yes, sir.

Q Did you see this defendant here, Johnson?

A Yes, sir, I seen him in the street.

Q Well, what was he doing on the street?

A Well, the first I seen him he walked way in back of Henning's store and then he came back and he looked around the corner and he walked down the street.

Q Well, go ahead and tell what further you saw?

A Then I didn't keep track of him any more, and, all at once I seen him come running back up to the wagon and grab out a gun and run back again, and he went back to Henning's little shed there and as soon as he got there he raised up the gun and fired off a shot.

Q He raised up the gun and shot?

A Yes.

Q And what direction did he shoot?

A Shot towards the south.

Q Did he shoot into the alley then?

A Why, he shot from the street towards the alley.

Q Did you see Radde there?

A Why, I seen Ed standing at the corner of this little shed there.

Q Was that before or after the shot was fired?

A That was before the shot.

Q Did you see Radde run?

A Why, I seen Ed run just about the same distance when I seen the other fellow grab the gun, I looked down and seen Ed run down towards the alley.

Q And then you saw the defendant here ran down to the alley with the shot gun?

A Why, yes, he ran down to the corner of that little building in the alley and there's where he fired the gun.

Q And he pointed the gun down the alley?

A Yes, sir.

Q And that was all you saw?

A That was all I saw.

Cross Examination.

By Mr. Mukel:

Q You saw the flash of the gun, Mr. Peitz?

A What is that?

Q Where were you standing when you say you saw the shot?

A I just happened to look out of the window.

Q Out of what building?

A Of my own house.

Q What street is your house on?

A That's on, I guess they call it Main street.

Q On what side?

A That's on the north side of the street.

Q The street runs east and west, does it?

A Why, this street runs east and west, yes, sir.

Q And your house is on the north side?

A My house is on the north side.

Q Now, were you at the front window or the side window?

A Front window.

Q Downstairs? A Downstairs.

Q How many front windows has your house got?

A Two downstairs.

Q And were you at the easterly or the westerly window downstairs?

A Why, I was at the east window, the windows are pretty close together.

Q But you looked out of the easterly window, did you? When you saw this you didn't go out of the room at any time, you saw it all thru the window?

A Yes, sir.

Q Where was Mr. Johnson when you first saw him?

A The first I seen him was at Henning's corner around the store.

Q And then you say you saw him going to his wagon?

A Why, no, he came and he walked back of the store.

Q No, but I mean, you say eventually you saw him go to his wagon?

A Why, sure I did.

Q You saw him take a gun out of the wagon, did you?

A Yes, sir.

Q How far from Henning's corner was his wagon?

A Why, he was standing at the , just at the other corner.

Q Right across the street?

A Why, it wasn't across the street, it was between the street just his horses were stopping up close to the walk.

Q To the sidewalk leading from one crossing to the other, and his horses were about midway of the junction of the street?

A Yes.

Q And whereabouts was Mr. Radde at that time? Did you notice he was following Johnson up going to the wagon?

A I didn't notice that.

Q You won't say that he wasn't?

A What?

Q Then you saw Johnson come back past Henning's and go down to where when he fired the shot?

A Why, he walked down to Henning's little shed, he has got a storage shed.

Q Then is there a vacant space right west of Henning's shed?

A Yes, sir.

Q About how wide?

A Well, I couldn't say whether it is half a lot or so wide.

Q Well, at any rate there is a small open space along the street?

A A small vacant space.

Q And that's west of Henning's little shed?

A West, yes.

Q You saw Mr. Johnson approach that point and raise his gun?

A Yes, I did.

Q And did you see Mr. Radde about the same time?

A The only time when I seen Ed was just at the corner when he sprang back of the alley.

Q At the corner of this little shed in this vacant space?

A Yes.

Q And where was Johnson?

A Why, Johnson stood right at the corner and raised up his gun and fired.

Q Well, did you notice where Mr. Radde was when he fired?

A No, I couldn't see him.

Q How close to the sidewalk was it, is it reasonably level, it is a cement sidewalk?

A White cement walk.

Q And is it reasonably level, I mean going east and west there isn't an incline is there?

A Why, I couldn't say, it might be a little.

Q But, if it is, it is a small fraction of a foot, it is practically level?

A You mean the ~~XXXX~~ lot?

Q No, I mean the sidewalk itself?

A Well, it is pretty level.

Q Was Mr. Johnson back to you when he shot, or did you see the gun barrel too?

A Why, I seen him sideways.

Q Well, are you prepared to say at what angle he held the gun, would you say that he held it perfectly level or elevated or lowered?

A Why, he raised up the gun pretty level.

Q He raised it up about level, did he, and shot?

A Yes.

Q You won't say that he shot in the ground, will you, that he left it down low enough to shoot in the ground?

A No, he couldn't.

Q And you won't say he elevated it and shot in the air; to the best of your recollection he held it level and shot from the sidewalk?

A Yes.

Q Did you have any talk with Mr. Radde about how it occurred?

A No, sir.

Q Did you hear Mr. Radde tell ~~anybody~~ anybody how it occurred?

A No, sir.

By Mr. Mukal: If you are going to close I want to recall Mr. Radde for a question I overlooked.

E D W A R D R A D D E, recalled for further cross examination by defendant, testified as follows:

Cross Examination.

By Mr. Mukal:

Q After this little fuss occurred between you and Mr. Johnson,

he started off the sidewalk, did he not?

A Which, after shooting or when?

Q No, no, after you hit him several times he went toward he went toward his wagon, stepped off the walk and went toward his wagon?

A No, he kept on the sidewalk.

Q And you kept following him?

A I walked after him.

Q Well, about how close to his wagon did you get, Mr. Wade, before you saw him get the gun?

A Well, I was just a few feet past that salt shed.

Q Well, I don't think we understand the distances about where those buildings are located, just tell us about how close to Mr. Johnson you were?

A About 80 feet.

Q And how far had you followed from where you struck him, how many feet did you follow him before you stopped and retraced your steps?

A That was about forty feet.

Q He ran, did he?

A He ran.

Q And you walked? A I walked.

Q Did you see anybody else around the wagon?

A No.

Q Do you know what he did after you went back in the alley to the butcher shop?

A I seen him back in the alley afterwards, after I was in the butcher shop.

Q And do you know how long a time after that he left town?

A No, I couldn't say, exactly. I didn't see him leave.

THE STATE RESTS.

W A L T E R P. K U S S E R O W , a witness called on the

part of the defendant, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

Direct Examination.

By Mr. Mukel:

Q Your name is Warren Kusserow?

A Walter.

Q Walter Kusserow; where do you live, Mr. Kusserow?

A Waconia.

Q Carver county, Minnesota; do you know a man Elbert Johnson?

A I do not.

Q Do you remember the first time you saw him?

A Yes, sir.

Q When was that?

A That was out here in the country, at Lobetz's.

Q Was that near Waconia, or was it nearer Chaska?

A Well, it was about two and a half miles out.

Q When did you see Mr. Johnson the first time?

A The first time I saw him was when he came out of the wagon.

Q No, no, what day or dates?

A Let's see, I don't know what date it was now.

Q Well, was it on Sunday, last Sunday, the 24th of August, this year?

A Yes, sir.

Q Who was with you when you saw Mr. Johnson?

A Why, Mr. Harvey.

Q Is that Frank Harvey?

A Frank Harvey, yes.

Q Who else?

A And Ed Radde and Hank Braun, Henry Braun, Peter Weinzerl.

Q Did you hear any discussion or conversation that occurred-withdrawn. Was Ed Radde, the town marshal of Waconia, with you?

A Yes.

Q Was he in your presence all the time that you were in the presence of Mr. Johnson on that day?

A No.

Q Out there in the country that you referred to?

A Oh, out in the country.

Q Yes?

A No, he wasn't.

Q Oh, Ed wasn't out there?

A Yes, he was out there but he wasn't very far from me.

Q Well, I don't mean in the immediate presence, but he was right there on the ground?

A Yes, sir.

Q Did you hear any ^{remarks that were} ~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ made in the presence of Mr. Johnson and Mr. Radde by anybody of the parties ~~XXXX~~ that were with you that day?

A Why, yes.

Q Well, just tell us what was first said and by whom directed to the Johnsons.

A Oh, right out there?

Q Um, hum?

A Well, gosh, I don't know what it was no more; well, one thing Weinzerl says, We got you now.

By Mr. Fahey: Just a moment, I object to what Mr. Weinzerl said.

By Mr. Mukel: What I wish to establish is this: any conversation that was had between any member of the party that was with Ed Radde and made in Ed Radde's presence and in Mr. Johnson's presence, the defendant, will be binding as far as Mr. Radde is concerned, it will be ~~making~~ a declaration that will be binding regardless of whether made by Mr. Johnson or himself or any one of the parties. If anyone had made remarks to indicate this man's innocence,

and Mr. Radde let it go uncontradicted, it would bind him.
By Mr. Fahey: Objected to as incompetent, irrelevant and immaterial and not determining his guilt or innocence at this time. We are simply determining whether there is probable cause to believe he committed that crime.

By Mr. Mulek: We can ~~deetermine~~ arrive at that point by going into the matter.

The Court sustained the objection.

Q Did you hear any conversation on that day, August 24th, between Ed Radde and Elbert Johnson?

A I did not.

Q Were you close enough to them, or either of them, to have heard any remarks that they made?

A Where do you mean, in town or--

Q I mean out on the country road there?

A No.

Q You were not close enough?

A No.

Q Did you hear Mr. Radde shout to Mr. Johnson?

A Yes.

Q Did you hear what he said?

A No, I didn't.

Q You didn't hear what he said?

A No.

Q You don't know what he said?

A Yes.

Q What did he say?

By Mr. Fahey: Just a moment, you didn't hear what he said?

A Why, no, the only thing was Halt, that was all I heard.

Q Is that what Mr. Radde said?

A Yes.

Q And what did Mr. Johnson answer?

By Mr. Fahey: Well, I object to that as immaterial, it does--

n't make any difference what took place; you are going into something that took place after this assault occurred.

Objected to as incompetent, irrelevant, and immaterial.

By the Court: You may answer that; objection overruled.

Q You can answer, Mr. Kusserow.

What did Mr. Johnson say?

A I didn't hear him say anything.

Q About how far from Mr. Johnson, was Mr. Johnson in the wagon that day when you saw him?

A Yes.

Q About how far were you from him when you first saw him?

A Well, about half a block, I think.

Q About half a block?

A Yes, something like that.

Q Well, can't you more approximately answer it in feet or yards; what is a block, 300 feet, or what do you mean by half a block?

A Well, I think it was about maybe 120 yards, something like that.

Q About 120 yards, and that's when you heard Mr. Radde shout halt?

A Yes.

Q Did you hear Mr. Radde say anything else besides that?

A I did not.

Q Did Mr. Radde and the rest of the party move toward the road, or toward the wagon after the--

By Mr. Fahey: Objected to as immaterial.

Question withdrawn.

Q And you didn't hear any discussion of any kind between Mr. Radde and Mr. Johnson out there on the road, then?

A No.

Q Was you deputized that day by Mr. Radde to go out with him?

By Mr. Fahey: Objected to as immaterial.

The Court sustained the objection.

Cross Examination Waived.

F. J. HARVEY, a witness called on the part of the defendant, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

Direct Examination.

By Mr. Mukel:

Q Mr. Harvey, where do you live?

A I live at Waconia.

Q Do you know Elbert Johnson, the defendant in this case?

A Yes, sir.

Q When did you first see him?

A I seen him right in town.

Q In town, you mean in Chaska?

A In Waconia, right in Waconia.

Q When did you first see him?

A A week ago Sunday, right in town.

Q Was anybody with him when you saw him?

A Well, he was next to his rig when I saw him.

Q Sir?

A He was next to his rig, next to their wagon when I saw him.

Q Did you see him later in the day, out in the country?

A Yes, sir.

Q Was anybody with him then when you saw him?

A Well, there was two of them.

Q Were they both in plain view, they were together, were they?

A They were together, yes, sir.

Q Who was with you when you saw Mr. Johnson out in the country?

A Well, there was Weinzerl---

A Peter Weinzerl?

A Peter Weinzerl.

Q Ed Radde?

A Ed Radde, Henry Braun.

Q Fred Radde?

A I didn't see him.

Q Was Fred there?

A I didn't see him.

Q Was Walter Kusserow?

A Walter Kusserow was there.

Q Did you hear any discussion while you saw the Johnson's out in the road, between Elbert Johnson and Ed Radde?

A No, sir.

Q Never heard any talk between them at all?

A That is, told him to halt, that was all, told them to halt and hands up, not a word said.

Q Speak a little louder.

A There wasn't a word said; he told him to come along with him, with Ed, that was all.

Q Was that what Ed said?

A Yes, took him along.

Q Were you right close to Ed all the time that you were out there?

A No, no, sir.

Q Well, how were you arranged, or where were you?

A Well, I was about, oh, about 30 yards away from him.

Q From who?

A From Ed.

Q And how far were you away from the Johnson's when you first saw them?

A Out there?

Q Um, hum?

A Well, where I first saw him was about, I should think, about a hundred yards away from them, and I moved close to them.

Q Did you hear Mr. Johnson answer anything to Mr. Radde?

A I don't know.

Q You don't know whether you heard it or not?

A No, I do not.

Q What, if anything, occurred between Mr. Radde and Mr. Johnson while you saw the Johnson's out on the road there?

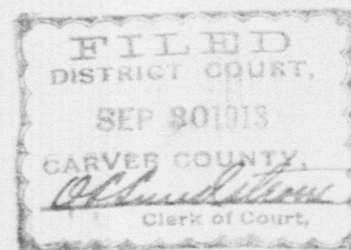
By Mr. Fahey: Objected to as immaterial.

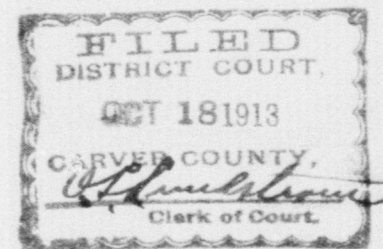
