COMMUNICATION FROM MEADE POST.

The following communication was read:

HALL OF MEADE POST NO. 2, G. A. R., OREGON CITY, OREGON, February 20, 1884.

To the A. A. Gen. Department of Oregon, G. A. R.:

I have the honor to report that at a regular meeting of Meade Post No. 2, G. A. R., held on the evening of February 20, 1884, Comrade John G. Pilsbury resigned the office of Representative to the Department Encampment, which resignation was, on motion, duly accepted, and Comrade M. C. Athey was placed in nomination, and the ballot being spread resulted in his election, he having received a majority of all the votes cast for Representative to the Department Encampment, and you are hereby notified that Comrade M. C. Athey is the duly accredited Representative to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Comrade John G. Pilsbury.

Department Commander Caukin ruled, that as Section 3, Article VII., of the Rules and Regulations require previous notice of an election to fill vacancies in Post officers to be given, and this rule not having been complied with, the election of Comrade Athey was irregular and he could not be admitted to a seat in this Encampment.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

Department Commander G. E. Caukin then submitted the following report:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF OREGON, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, PORTLAND, OREGON, February 21, 1884.

COMRADES:

It is with feelings of mingled pride and pleasure that I now submit to you my Annual Report, believing that after listening to a recital of the progress of our Order in this Department, you may not only feel rewarded for your exertions in the past, but be encouraged to make still greater efforts in advancing our glorious cause and augmenting the membership of our beloved organization.

Details of work accomplished during the year will be presented in reports of the various Staff Officers, of which a synopsis only will be given by me.

The number of Posts has been increased during the year from 11 to 23, and the membership from 427 to 750.

The field, as left by my predecessor, was ripe for the harvest. News of the progress of our Order in the older States reached this distant coast and sent an electric thrill to all our hearts. The reunion of old soldiers and sailors in July was a grand success, and not only brought Posts and comrades into closer relations, and led to more frequent visits of Posts and warm greetings to visiting comrades, but aroused attention in localities where no organization existed, leading to inquiry and correspondence, and resulting in the formation of Posts. And the comrades generally have seemed to consider themselves, one and all, members of a grand recruiting party, all working for the advancement of the Order.

By combining all these influences a most gratifying result has been reached, in which I feel a justifiable pride as having occurred during my incumbency of the office.

I extend my hearty acknowledgment of the services of Senior Vice Department Commander Babcock for instituting Post 16, and supervising inspections; of Junior Vice Department Commander Cooper for instituting Posts 21 and 22; of Aide-de-Camp Hamilton for instituting Posts 15 and 17, and for inspections; of Aide-de-Camp Athey for instituting Post 18; of Comrade Bantz, of the Council of Administration, for instituting Post 23; and all other Department and Staff Officers for their zealous and hearty co-operation in carrying on the work of the Department.

To the gentlemen of my personal staff I feel under special obligation for their uniform kindness and courtesy, and for the zeal and devotion to the principles of the Order with which they have performed the duties of their respective offices.

I desire to thank publicly Comrade Z. T. Wright for his prompt and cheerful performance of the duties of Assistant Adjutant General to the time of his resignation; and Comrade A. F. Sears for his very able performance of the duties of the same office for the remainder of the term.

Comrade Davison has performed the arduous duties of the office of Assistant Quartermaster General in the most faithful and efficient manner, manifesting unusual devotion to the welfare of the Order.

To Comrade Neer, Department Inspector, I feel under especial obligations. He has given largely of his time to the performance of his duties, in which he has shown an intelligence equaled only by his zeal and energy.

I also wish to commend Comrade Northup, Judge Advocate; Comrade Stearns, Chief Mustering Officer, and Comrade Allen, Special Aide-de-Camp, for their performance of the duties devolving upon them. I hope that my successor may be as fortunate in the selection of his personal staff.

The Assistant Adjutant General will call your attention to the action of the National Encampment at its session in 1882, authorizing each Department to fix its own basis of representation in the Department Encampment, with his recommendation on the subject.

The Assistant Quartermaster General will, in his report, call your attention to the fact that Officers' Rank Badges can now be furnished on requisition, along with other supplies, through department headquarters, and to the matter of fixing the price of all supplies of Posts.

Nothing is more conducive to the welfare of the Order than a thorough inspection of Posts at proper intervals. The Inspector will recommend to you such action on this point as his experience and observation have suggested to him, to which I call your special attention.

The Judge Advocate's report will inform you of the incorporation of the Department, as ordered by the Council of Administration.

In addition to the recommendations made in reports of Staff Officers, I would urge upon all Post Commanders to take measures at once to supply each member of their respective Posts with a copy of the Rules and Regulations, that they may be able to inform themselves of their duties as members of the Order.

I would recommend that some arrangement be made by which the Department Commander can visit, during his term of office, each Post in the Department. Such visits arouse great interestamong the comrades and give occasion for holding open meetings, where the families, friends and neighbors of comrades are brought together, and through the social features of such gatherings become acquainted with and interested in the objects and aims of our organization.

Right here I wish to call your attention, one and all, to the "Ladies' Relief Corps," as auxiliary to Posts of the Grand Army. Through this organization our wives, mothers and daughters, as well as all loyal women, can become participants with us in the social part of our work, and in dispensing the practical charity that we profess. Their loyalty has been as well proven as that of the sterner sex, whose duty called them to face death on the field of battle. I would recommend the formation of a Ladies' Relief Corps in connection with each Post in this Department.

To my comrades of the Department I tender my most sincere thanks for their good will and earnest support, without which the success of the past year could not have been achieved, and most earnestly entreat them to continue their efforts in support of the new Department Commander.

When you honored me, one year ago, by electing me your Department Commander, I pledged myself to be faithful to the trust confided to me, and to perform the duties of the office to the best of my ability. How well my promise has been fulfilled I leave to the verdict of my comrades, trusting that in the spirit of Fraternity and Charity they will look leniently on my faults.

And now, my comrades, with a heart filled with gratitude for the high honors you have conferred upon me, laying down this emblem of power at the close of this Encampment, I will, from my place in the ranks, ever respond to the call of duty in such a manner as to prove that my love of the Order remains as fervent in the future as in the past.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL.

Assistant Adjutant General Alfred F. Sears then submitted the following report:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF OREGON, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, PORTLAND, OREGON, February 20, 1884.

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Comrade:—In compliance with the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, I herewith submit my Annual Report for the year ending February 20, 1884:

The name "Pleasanton," selected by Post No. 15, being that of a living person, was disapproved by the Department Commander, as being in conflict with Article III., Rules and Regulations. No reports having been received from this Post for third and fourth quarters of 1883, it is recommended that some Department or Staff Officer be detailed to visit Cottage Grove and endeavor to put the Post in working order, or, failing in that, to take up their charter, rituals, and books of record.

Of the twenty-two Posts in good working order, nineteen have made their reports for the fourth quarter, ending December 31, 1883, and the remaining three have been organized since that date.

The nineteen Posts that have reported show a membership of 684—a net gain of 268 from December 31, 1882, to December 31, 1883.

The following is an exhibit of the membership, together with the net gains or losses, for the past year, of all Posts in the Department, as shown by reports to this office to December 31, 1883:

The above table shows the comparison between December 31, 1882, and December 31, 1883: Fifteen Posts show net gains; four Posts show net losses, during the year.

Adding Post 11, mustered February 19, 1883, with 11 charter members, to the previous year, and Posts 21, 22 and 23, mustered since January 1st, 1884, with 31 members, the net gain has been twelve Posts and 225 members since last Annual Encampment.

Post Commanders in general have shown laudable promptness in forwarding their quarterly reports and per capita tax—particularly for the fourth quarter of 1883.

The Council of Administration have held one meeting during the year.

The National Encampment, at its session in 1882, authorized each Department to fix the number of representatives in its Encampment, amending the third clause of Article II., Chapter 3, page 12, by striking out all to the words "but each Post," in the last line, and inserting, "members selected by ballot by the several Posts, in such ratio as may be determined by a two-thirds vote of the members present, and voting at any previous Annual Encampment." I would recommend that the ratio of representation in this Department be fixed at one for every twenty members in good standing, and one additional representative for a final fraction of more than half that number.

In conclusion, while tendering my sincere thanks to all the officers of the Department, the official staff, and the officers and comrades of the various Posts for their efficient co-operation, it is my duty and it gives me great pleasure, though I regret its necessity, to especially acknowledge the assistance, indulgence and courtesy I have received directly from your hands in the performance of my official work. Without such assistance I must have resigned the position, for business duties had left me but little time to bestow on the office I had accepted at your hands.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT INSPECTOR.

Department Inspector D. D. Neer then submitted the following report:

DEPARTMENT HEADQUARTERS, G. A. R. INSPECTOR'S OFFICE, PORTLAND, OREGON, February 20, 1884.

A. F. SEARS,

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Assistant Adjutant General.

Comrade:—I have the honor to submit herewith a tabular report (Form E) of such Posts in this Department as myself, with the aid of Assistant Inspectors, have been able to reach, or could spare the time to visit.

At this time I would suggest that great care be taken in the appointment of Assistant Inspectors. The Commanders of Posts from which they are selected, or a qualified Department officer, should thoroughly examine a comrade in the ritualistic work before recommending him or them to fill so important a position. They should go properly clothed in the uniform of the Order, and be ready at all times to demonstrate the work, or answer any ordinary question relative to Post work.

I would also recommend the division of the Department into Inspection. Districts, with an Assistant Inspector in each, who shall make it his special business to inspect the Posts in his district, when notified so to do by the Department Inspector. The Department Inspector should, in person, inspect every Post in the Department at least once a year, and provision should be made by this Department Encampment for the payment of expenses for such inspection. From my own experience I feel that the money would be well expended; for the comrades, though not under arms, like to feel that they have competent officers, and those who take interest enough in this grand work of ours to be present occasionally and see that the work is done in a manner to make it interesting, and as becomes old soldiers; also to add to the intelligence of our Grand Army thousands who as yet have but a meager knowledge of the great importance and the principles involved in our beloved Order.

The real condition of Posts should be sought out and a full report of the same forwarded to the Department Inspector, who should, without coloring or tavoritism, make such criticisms as he deems necessary, and the same be presented to and published in the proceedings of the Encampment. If this be done it will be an incentive to Post Commanders to be more strict in the discharge of their duties, thereby creating an interest that will be plainly

felt and seen before another year has passed away.

I am pleased to state that in all cases where Assistant Inspectors have visited Posts there has been no lack of courtesy on the part of Post Commanders to furnish all facilities for a thorough inspection of their Posts. So far as my personal visits are concerned, which have been quite a number, I can only speak in the highest terms of both officers and comrades, while I have been well and handsomely entertained upon all occasions where time was had to make any preparations. And in this connection I feel it but an act of justice to make special mention of the royal manner in which the Department Commander and myself were entertained by Cushing Post No. I4, of Astoria. No pains were spared to make the evening's pleasures and exercises as enjoyable as any I ever participated in. All credit is due to both officers and comrades for their untiring zeal in bringing about and to completion such a grand entertainment. May they live long and enjoy the best wishes of all who participated, and the Grand Army of the Republic in particular.

I would, before closing, most respectfully call the attention of Post Commanders to the secret work of our Order, and the necessity of keeping close watch over their rituals, always bearing in mind the obligation they have taken in regard to the secret work of the G. A. R. In one case I found the rituals of a Post all written up, in pencil, with the secret or unwritten work of our Order. I sincerely hope that it will not be attempted again, as I feel that our interest in this work is mutual and should be protected by all alike.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the Department Commander, the members of his official staff, Assistant Inspectors, Post Commanders and comrades for the many kindnesses I have received at their hands.

Having discharged the duties of my office conscientiously, I now most respectfully submit this report in Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

Know all men by these Presents, That we, G. E. CAUKIN, Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Oregon; F. J. BABCOCK, Senior Vice-Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Oregon, and J. C. COOPER, Junior Vice-Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Oregon, to said positions duly elected at the

Annual Encampment of said organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Oregon, held in the city of Portland, Oregon, on the 22nd day of February, A. D. 1883, and being citizens and residents of said State of Oregon, and hereunto duly directed and authorized by said organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, do associate ourselves together, under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oregon, as a corporation for the uses and purposes as follows:

- I. The name of this corporation shall be "THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, DEPARTMENT OF OREGON."
 - II. The duration of this corporation shall be for fifty years.
- III. The object of this corporation shall be to foster and cherish fraternity and charity among its members, and loyalty to the government of the United States.
- IV. The estimated value of the property of said organization is one hundred dollars, and the sources of income and revenue are the "per capita tax" imposed annually on each member of said organization, and the profits derived from the sale of supplies and badges to the different Posts and members of said organization.
- V. RESOLUTIONS.

Junior Vice-Commander Cooper presented the following preamble and resolutions, which were read and on motion, adopted:

WHEREAS, The infirmities of the veterans of the late war for the Union are beginning to press heavily upon many of them, and very many who heretofore have been able to eke out a miserable existence must soon have help, or give up the battle of life and the struggle to keep out of the poor house; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we ask Congress to pension all soldiers and sailors of the late war, whose present disabilities can be established without question, and that they be requested to take immediate action in this matter.

Resolved, That we ask Congress to pass a law, granting a pension to all veterans who have passed the age of sixty-four years.

Assistant Quartermaster General Davison presented the following resolution, which was read and on motion, adopted:

Resolved, That the Assistant Adjutant General be instructed to forward a copy of the foregoing resolutions, relating to pensions, to the several Departments of the Grand Army of the Republic, and also to each of Oregon's Senators and Representative in Congress.

Senior Vice-Commander Babcock presented the following resolution, which was read and on motion, adopted:

Resolved, That the Assistant Adjutant General be instructed to procure the printing of one thousand copies of the Proceedings of this Encampment, together with a complete Roster of all the Posts in the Department.

Assistant Adjutant General Wright presented the following resolution, which was read and on motion, adopted:

Resolved, That a special committee of three be appointed by the Department Commander, to see what can be done in the way of securing special rates and working up an excursion to attend the National Encampment to be held at Minneapolis,

The Department Commander appointed the following comrades as the special committee on the foregoing resolution: Comrades F. H. Lamb, N. S. Pierce and A. E. Borthwick.

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Comrade Sears presented the following resolutions and moved their adoption:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment are due, and are hereby tendered, to the citizens of Salem, and especially to the Comrades of Sedgwick Post No. 10, for courtesies and hospitalities extended to this Encampment.
