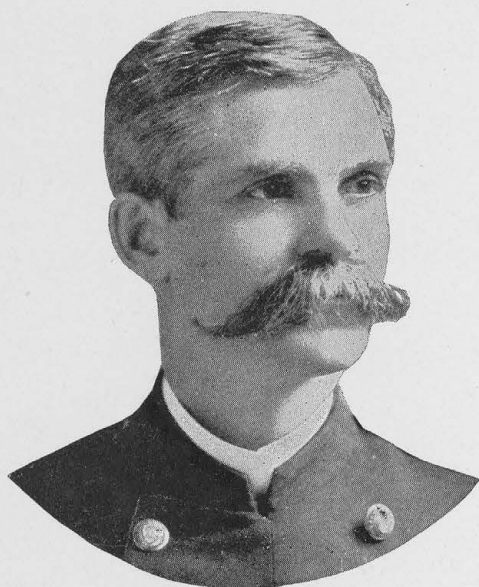

Report of Department Commander.

SALEM, OREGON, Feb. 11th, 1892.

To the Eleventh Annual Encampment Department of Oregon, G. A. R.:

COMRADES: According to a custom established heretofore by my predecessors, I now have the honor to submit to you for your consideration and information, my report as your Department Commander for the term of 1891, now about to close.

On assuming command of this Department on the 10th day of April last, I found the number of Posts in good standing in the Department to be as follows:

I cannot avoid calling the attention of the Department to the large number now on the suspended list, being 315, or about 10 per cent. of the comrades of the Department that are now borne on the suspended list. This ought not to be the case; there is a great amount of indifference upon the part of the comrades and officers of the Posts in this matter, for there is no doubt in my mind that if the proper effort was made by the officers and comrades in the several Posts this large percentage of suspensions could be greatly reduced. It is true that the increase for this year has been larger, owing to the changes made in reporting from quarterly to semi-annually.

I would suggest that each Post appoint a special committee to take such action as it may deem advisable for the good of the Order in bringing comrades back into good standing upon the rolls of their respective Posts.

THE OFFICIAL STAFF OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The Assistant Adjutant General, R. S. Greenleaf, during the past term, has no doubt performed a larger volume of business than any of his predecessors. To give you an illustration of the clerical work of this office during the past ten months, I submit to you the following detailed statement:

On assuming the duties of his office he brought into force a rare executive ability, thereby establishing a thorough system of properly filing and indexing all communications and promptly answering the same regardless of whom they were from. For example, to show the thoroughness of his system, the reports for the first and second terms of the A. A. G. and the A. Q. M. G. went forward to National Headquarters twenty days after the close of each

term without a single delinquent Post being reported. This is indeed a very creditable showing of his efficiency. He has made a courteous and pleasant officer, always approachable and having a thorough control of his feelings, and under trying circumstances he has always had the same pleasant disposition and courteous answer for all. To Comrade Greenleaf I shall hold myself under lasting obligations, for to him, more than to all else, am I indebted for the successful conduct and smoothness of this Department during the past term. The work of this office must be done for the loyalty one feels for our organization and not for the small pittance of a salary that is now paid to this officer. The same amount of work performed in any civil position would be entitled to a compensation of at least \$1200 per annum. I regret that I have not more suitable means at my command to reward Comrade Greenleaf than my humble gratitude.

Also the work performed by the Assistant Q. M. G., D. H. Turner, during the past year has been done with the smoothness and painstaking interest which has always characterized this comrade's work wherever he has been assigned to duty in our Order. His office shows the following results:

This shows an economical administration of the funds of the Department for the term and it has been the determination of these officers to economize in all the expenses of their departments. To Comrade Turner I am also very grateful for the manner in which he has co-operated with the officers of this Department.

There have been two regular inspections held during the term under the competent supervision of the Inspecting Officer, D. Carlos Sherman. He has performed his work well and promptly inside of the limit of time in which the General Orders have prescribed his returns to be made to these headquarters. His reports are models of neatness and correct in all the details that calls for the highest commendations of his efficiency.

DISSENSIONS.

It has been a source of considerable pleasure to me that I have not been called upon to act as Reviewing Officer in the matter of any Court Martials, which speaks well for the harmony of this Department. Several minor matters have been referred to these headquarters for opinions which were in their turn transmitted to the Judge Advocate General, H. H. Northrup, who has rendered valuable and intelligent service in his department. His report will be submitted at this time for your consideration.

I feel as though I have been indeed fortunate in having so thorough a corps of efficient officers around me and I shall always look back upon my term as your Department Commander with a great degree of pleasure as well as upon my associations with these comrades.

VISITATIONS OF POSTS.

I have made a strong effort to visit all of the Posts of this Department so far as my private interests would permit and I have succeeded in visiting 26 of the Posts throughout this Department.

The Junior Vice Department Commander, C. P. Holloway, has visited eight Posts east of the mountains and has performed good work and I wish to express to Comrade Holloway at this time, my warm appreciation for his

faithful co-operation in all of the details during this year. I have always found him ready and willing to respond to the call of duty, all of which he has discharged with rare executive ability, to my thorough satisfaction.

Whenever it has been my good fortune to be able to meet with my comrades in their several Post rooms, I have received a true and loyal welcome, and I shall always remember with pleasure the many pleasant visits that I have had with them in their Post rooms and their family circles. I have always found the latch string out and a disposition on the part of all to see how much they could do to make my visits pleasant.

I found that it was next to an impossibility to visit with all of the Posts in this Department owing to the various dates upon which they held their respective meetings. Everywhere that I have visited the Posts while in session, I have found the comrades willing to learn and trying to conform to the Ritual, but owing to a misunderstanding of that work, I found it very imperfectly performed and I have tried to illustrate to the comrades the proper mode of conducting the muster in service and they all seemed to have a different understanding of the work after it had been exemplified to them. I find that too little attention is paid by the mustering officer at the time the new Post is organized; a little more pains taken on the night of the muster in of the Post would save a large number of errors that creep in and continue in their future workings.

MEMORIAL DAY.

This day has been very generally observed during the year throughout this Department. Each coming year this day seems to grow stronger in the hearts of the people, until now, it has become a National Day of patriotic devotion to our dead. The Chaplains of the several Posts are careless in the matter of transmitting a detailed report of the ceremonies held by their Posts and in their localities on this day to the Department Chaplain, thereby failing to assist him in making up a clear and comprehensive report to be submitted to the Encampment upon the general observance of the day throughout this State.

I think that the custom adopted the day preceding Memorial Day last year, of several details of comrades appearing before the children in our public schools and giving short addresses upon Memorial Day and its patriotic sentiments is a wise one, and should be continued each year hereafter, for the seeds thus sown of patriotism and reverence for the flag of our country will have beneficial results upon the rising generation and accomplish a great amount of good.

DEATHS.

Our Encampment will this year miss from the ranks of its able counselors the familiar form of its Past Commander, F. J. Babcock, who died at his home in this city. In this department and in civil life he was, as at the front during the war, brave and loyal to his comrades and friends.

The death rate in this Department is small when we consider that only 26 deaths occurred during the year, out of a membership of 2,107, but this cannot last long, as old age and disability are fast overtaking the once sturdy boys of '61 and '65, and our death rate must grow larger with astonishing rapidity in the future.

THE. COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

During the month of May last our distinguished Commander-in-Chief, Comrade W. G. Veazey, paid an official visit to this Department and a large number of comrades gave him a reception in G. A. R. Hall at Portland. He regretted that his time was so limited that he was not able to visit other parts of the State; he seemed pleased with the prospect and the interest taken in our Order.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

I regret that I was unable to visit the National Encampment in person, but I so stated at the time of my election to this office at the Tenth Encampment; I felt as though all of the spare time I had should be devoted to the visiting of my own Posts in the Department. Our Department was ably represented by Comrades Cooper and B. B. Tuttle, who no doubt will submit their detailed reports to you at this time of such matters as will interest you.

WOMEN'S RELIEF CORPS.

This Department has been ably managed this year by the President, Mrs. D. C. Lounsbury, and her able corps of officers; it has afforded me a large amount of pleasure to meet with a large number of the corps throughout the State, and I have found them of great benefit to the Post, and it seems as though the time is fast approaching when the large amount of the work of our Order must be assumed by these loyal women. They have made a noble showing this year, when you consider the size of the Department in the way of relief.

This is indeed a grand showing for our Auxiliary.

SONS OF VETERANS.

I have been unable to visit this organization as much as I would like to have done. I learn from the commanding officer, Col. Melvin, that the camps in this locality are taking hold with new life and they promise to grow stronger from now on, and I would suggest that the Posts throughout this Department co-operate with them as much as possible and assist them by their presence and support.

RELIEF.

This Department has expended for relief from its Post funds during the year the handsome sum of \$1,677 45, and it is safe to say that double this amount has been expended from the Private Fund of the Comrades, as daily applications are made for temporary relief which is always responded to by comrades. I have made a special effort to place the Indigent Soldiers' Relief Bill, or the bill that is better known as the Northrup Bill in a familiar manner before the Posts and the County Courts of the State, and for that object I addressed a series of questions to the Judge Advocate General, H. H. Northrup, and he clearly answered this and the same was published in circular letter No. 4. I also sent copies to each County Judge in the State, together with a series of questions as to the working of the bill and out of 28 counties I received reply from 22, which makes a very creditable showing as to the benefits derived under the bill. I herewith attach a copy of the consolidated statements of the 22 counties for your information.

Know all Men by these Presents: That the undersigned (here fill in the name of three or more incorporators), having been duly chosen at a meeting of (name of Post) duly called and held, and being members of said Post in good and regular standing, for the purpose of making and subscribing Articles of Incorporation to incorporate said Post as a corporation, do hereby declare:

I. That the name of this incorporation shall be (here state name).

SIR AND COMRADE: I beg to submit the following as my official report:

I have no official knowledge of any Post being mustered into the Department during my term of office, other than that afforded by General Orders Nos. 7 and 10, dated respectively Nov. 16th and Dec. 21st, 1891, of which the following is a copy:

Prairie Grove Post No. 26, at Woods, Tillamook county, Oregon, was organized by Post Commander, J. W. Maxwell, as a Special Mustering Officer, on August 20th, 1891, with ten comrades. A. D. Sanders, Post Commander and W. R. Roberdee as Adjutant.

F. J. Babcock Post No. 30 at Beaverton, Oregon, was organized by Assistant Adjutant General, R. S. Greenleaf, as Special Mustering Officer on Nov. 11th, 1891, with eleven comrades. A. B. Cady as Post Commander and Jno. N. Fisher as Adjutant.

O. P. Morton Post No. 36, of La Grande, was mustered in with 21 comrades by Junior Vice Department Commander, C. P. Holloway, Dec. 1, 1891.

Unfortunately, my private duties since June, have been such as to seriously conflict with my duties as Mustering Officer, all of which I deeply regret, as at the beginning of the term it was my intention to bestow a goodly portion of my time to department labors. I meant to have been with you at this Encampment, but again by unforeseen circumstances, I am not even permitted to enjoy that pleasure; but my heart is with you in all the work, and I can at least say, "God be with you."

Report of Chief Mustering Officer referred to Comrades Dealy, Crawford and Miller.

It was ordered that the Encampment accept the invitation of the Superintendents of the Penitentiary and Insane Asylum and that we visit those institutions at the hour of 3:30 P. M., Friday, the 12th inst.

The Department Commander then presented for the consideration of the Encampment an appeal taken by Comrade C. D. McCoy, from the action of S. A. Hunter Post No. 37, at Mehamma. Past Dept. Commander Caukin made the point that the appeal was irregular as it was taken directly to the Department Encampment instead of taking the necessary course through the Department Commander and was not properly before the Encampment. On suggestion of the Department Commander a special committee of three was appointed, consisting of Past Commanders, Caukin, McElroy and Varney, who subsequently reported that the action of the Department Commander in assuming to rule on the question raised in the appeal was correct; that the rulings of the Department Commander in holding against the appellant on all points save one, and that the ruling that said point not decided should await evidence from the records of the Post for decision was correct.

On motion the report was adopted.

Past Department Commander Olmsted moved that a committee of three be appointed to draft suitable resolutions expressive of the cordial welcome extended to the Grand Army by the people of Salem, and to officers of the State Department for the use of the Senate Chamber for the meetings of the Woman's Relief Corps and of the Hall of Representatives for the Grand Army. Motion carried and Comrades Olmsted, Cooper and Northup appointed such committee.

Comrade Brown moved that a committee of five be appointed to draft resolutions expressive of thanks to the Relief Corps for the presentation of a Department flag and of the floral offerings. Carried and Comrades Brown, Clapp, Sears, Bucher and Cline appointed such committee.

RESOLUTIONS.

The following resolutions proposing amendments to the Rules and Regulations were then passed:

Resolved, That Section 1, Article II, Chapter V of the Rules and Regulations be so amended as to require Quarterly Reports instead of Semi-Annual Reports from Post Adjutants and Quartermasters.

Resolved, That all appeals from the decisions of the Post Commander and Posts shall be taken within four months from the rendering of the same. And all other appeals shall be taken within six months from the rendering of the decisions from which the appeal is taken.

Resolved, That the present form of Transfer and Discharge be changed by addition of certificate in blank, to be filled out by Posts to which the same may be offered, and returned by said Post to the Post originally granting the same, thus enabling Posts to complete their records. The form of certificate to read thus:

These resolutions were ordered certified to the National Headquarters for action by the next National Encampment.

RESOLUTION.

*To the Officers and Comrades of the Department Encampment,
now assembled in Salem, State of Oregon:*

Some two years ago action was had in regard to presenting by the Grand Army Posts of our National Flag (the grand old stars and stripes) to our public schools, in order that patriotism be instilled in the minds of all our children, now coming up, wheresoever dispersed.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, As our higher institution of learning, our State University has been overlooked in this matter, and as I am informed the teachers and officers would esteem it as a high honor for this Department Encampment to present a like emblem, to be placed on each one of the buildings, for the same purpose as above mentioned.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Department Commander appoint a committee of three, to procure suitable flags. Also that he cause a collection to be taken up within this body of old comrades now assembled, before we adjourn, for the purpose of paying for the two flags of our country, which are to be of good material, and not less than sixteen (16) feet long and of proportionate width.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Department Commander appoint a committee of twelve or more, and invite the ladies of the Relief Corps to take part in presenting the flags to the Regents and teachers of the University, and request them to exhibit those colors at all times of the day, except very bad weather, when they would be damaged by storms. And that these flags be presented in behalf of the Department of Oregon, and the old comrades of the several G. A. K. Posts of the State, with appropriate and fitting remarks within thirty days after the adoption of this resolution.

E. F. CHAPMAN,

Delegate from J. W. Geary Post No. 7, Dept of Oregon.

Com. Warren—I would like to ask for information whether the State presents flags to its schools? (Voices, no, no.) The people are the tax payers and are the proper ones to see to that. It appears to me that if the State has an institution of learning, it should furnish it with proper flags. I am opposed, as a member of the Grand Army, to voting for any such thing. It is the duty of the State, and not the Grand Army, to furnish the flags. (Applause.)

Com. Wright. I am surprised to hear that our State institution has not a flag. I introduced a flag resolution two years ago, at Eugene. I do not think it right or proper for us as members of the Grand Army to go down into our pockets and buy flags for that institution, unless that is the only way to get it. First, I say, interview the Regents, and see if they will not procure it

and if they will not, then we will take the matter up and buy a flag. I want the "old flag" on every school house in the State of Oregon.

Com. Caukin. Let us review again the school house order. It is enjoined from headquarters of the Grand Army that the Grand Army should so far as possible, provide a national flag for each one of the common schools of our country. This is done on the principle that the common school is the bulwark of our country and of our country's freedom. That is where patriotism is to be taught to our children. The idea is to teach patriotism in the common school. I think that the Grand Army is traveling out of the record if, before it has provided every common school in the State with a flag, it proceeds to vote money to purchase a flag for the State institution at Eugene. After providing every common school then if we have money to spare, provide for our State institutions, like that at Eugene, the University. (Cries of question.)

The question was then put and the resolution was lost.

Com. Todd—The Grand Army at Eugene have placed flags on the common schools, and I move that a committee of five be appointed to request the Regents of the University to put the Star Spangled Banner over the State University.

Com. Cline—I would suggest that there is a better way to get at that. I am a little afraid that we are meddling too much, and by and by, we shall lose our influence somewhat. There is a State Board of Education; trustees or directors of this institution, properly appointed. They are the men to talk to. I believe the Department Commander of the Grand Army should have the authority. The Board of Education appointed in charge of these institutions can correct that and I believe the Board will, by a simple suggestion of the Department Commander.

I move as a substitute, as the motion has not been seconded, that the Department Commander be requested to use his discretion in the matter.

Seconded and carried.

Resolution for a State Home for indigent soldiers and sailors. The following resolution was then passed.

Resolved, That the Legislative Assembly be asked at its next session to establish a State Home for indigent soldiers and sailors who are citizens of the State.

Com. Allen—If in order, I will make a verbal report with reference to the work of the committee appointed a year ago. The Committee had correspondence with the representative and senators in Congress from Oregon about the establishment of a National Soldiers' Home within this State. They said that the policy of the national government was not to establish any more national homes. The committee have had no work to do. We have looked over the bill presented at the last session of the legislature—H. B. No. 151, and with this bill before us, and with the experience of a year ago, we will go before the legislature which convenes January next, to do some work along this line. I ask that another member be appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of Com. Ellis.

Com. H. H. Northup was appointed on the committee to fill said vacancy.

Com. Hardesty—Comrade Winston who was appointed on said committee has not met with the committee. I suggest that as he is not present that some one be appointed in his place.

Comrade Dealy was then appointed in place of Comrade Winston on said committee.

Com. Brannin—I have seen the necessity for a Soldiers' Home in Oregon. I believe that the State ought to move in the matter. We have before us an election. There are a good many of us here from all portions of the State. Will it not be well for Grand Army men to see those whom we send up here to represent us; approach them on this subject and ask them to pledge themselves to give us a Soldiers' Home in Oregon?

Com. Allen—I appreciate the words fully in regard to looking out for our interests in the legislature. I notice that the committee are all from the western slope. I would ask that Com. Dodson, a member of the State Senate from Eastern Oregon, be added to the committee. Carried, and Com. Dodson was so added.

THE PLACE OF NEXT ENCAMPMENT.

The hour having arrived which was designated to fix the place of the next Encampment, the following proceedings were had:

Com. Fluke of Roseburg—I wish, in naming a place for the meeting of the next Encampment, for you to consider the fact you have gone to the eastern extremity of the State—Baker City—and to the northwest portion—Astoria. I ask you to come to Roseburg. We will try to do well by you.

Comrade Brannin of Pendleton—I desire to place in nomination a place in Eastern Oregon. We have a good town and a good Post. The Grand Army has never held an Encampment in Eastern Oregon. We have twelve or thirteen Posts in that section of the State and nearly all represented on this floor. We have as true and as loyal men as you will meet with anywhere. We know something of the trials that the Grand Army has been passing through in Pendleton. The time has been there, that the Grand Army was laughed at; but now it is one of the most respected bodies of the country. If you meet with us, we will receive you loyally and treat you grandly. We have an opera house with a room larger than this, in which to meet. Let the old soldiers of Oregon, who are too far apart to meet often, have a “look” and greeting from their comrades in arms. It will do them and you good to shake hands once more and “to drink from the same canteen.” (Cheers.)

Com. Borthwick of Portland—I rise at this time to second the nomination of Roseburg for the next meeting of the Encampment. I do this with the full conviction that those who go there will be well received. It is a city of roses; roses bloom there all over the valleys and the hills. It is a place to which you can go in the Spring, Summer or Winter and yet find plenty of flowers. They have there an enthusiastic Post and a fine court house which will be placed at our disposal.

Com. Stephens of Portland—I have a great respect Commander, for Roseburg; but after my good comrade arose to second the nomination, I commenced to have a suspicion that he must have a tract of land there for sale, and he wants to get the “old boys” to have a look at it. (Laughter.) I am going to

second the nomination of Pendleton. I know the people there from experience. There is not a people in the State that can entertain more hospitably than those of Pendleton.

Com. Sears of Portland—I want to say one word in favor of Pendleton. We have been at Salem now twice. We have been to Astoria; to Eugene; and to every section of the State, except Eastern Oregon.

The Posts in that section are struggling to get along, and we should encourage them. By reason of location is one reason why we should go to Pendleton. There is no question about Roseburg being a beautiful place, but in my judgment the Encampment ought to be held next time in Eastern Oregon.

Com. Allen of Portland—I want to know, Commander, what is the matter with Portland? The latch string there is always out.

Com. Caukin—I put in nomination Portland.

Com. Varney—For nearly fifteen years I was a resident of Eastern Oregon. Last year we came within four votes of getting the Encampment at The Dalles, my home. But I have moved over into Southern Oregon, and I want to second the nomination of Roseburg.

Com. Wright—I want to say a word for Eastern Oregon. I know that Roseburg will entertain us royally, but the growing Posts of this Department are now in Eastern Oregon; I think in justice to the Inland Empire we should go to Pendleton.

Com. Allen—I would like to know the purpose of these Encampments; is it to go from one portion of the State to another to build up Posts, or is it to meet in some central location where the largest number of comrades will assemble together?

Com. DeLashmutt—It seems to me that others are to be considered in connection with this matter. The Woman's Relief Corps should be consulted. Wherever we go they must go, and we ought not to pass upon a place of meeting without deferring in some measure to them.

First ballot: Roseburg, 32 votes; Pendleton, 43 votes; Portland, 35 votes.

Second ballot: Pendleton, 58 votes; Portland, 57 votes.

On motion of Comrade Allen the vote was made unanimous and Pendleton was declared to be the place of the meeting of the next Encampment.

Adjourned to meet February 12th at 8:30 o'clock A. M.

FLAG FOR UNIVERSITY.

Com. Dealy moved that the Encampment petition the next legislative assembly to cause a U. S. flag to be placed over the State University at Eugene, it appearing that there was none in use there.

The question was discussed by Comrades Dealy and Hardesty in favor of the resolution and Comrades Caukin and Ladue against it. Lost.

VISITING STATE INSTITUTIONS.

Com. Ladue reported that six cars would be in line at one o'clock or any other time that might be named, to take the comrades to visit the Penitentiary and Asylum.

Election of Officers.

NOMINATIONS FOR DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

Com. McElroy—I beg to present the name of a comrade who was from the very beginning of the war, in the service. I need not refer to his record. I name Comrade T. C. Smith of Sedgwick Post. I especially mention his record in the formation of this Department. From the beginning he was one of the movers; and from that day to this, he has been one of the most earnest comrades and workers that I know of; not only in the Grand Army, but in the Woman's Relief Corps and in the Sons of Veterans. In view of his services, I trust this Encampment will consider his nomination with favor. I place in nomination T. C. Smith.

Com. Chapman—I place in nomination Com. H. H. Northup, of Portland. His record speaks for itself.

Chaplain Clapp—I have been requested by a number of comrades to second the nomination of Comrade Northup, and I take pleasure in offering a few suggestions why he should receive the votes of the Department.

The comrade then spoke of the record of the nominee, that he enlisted in April, 1861, and was mustered into the United States service early in May, and that in June he was on hostile territory; that he made the campaign of the State of Missouri, in the command of the noble hearted Lyon; was present at the

battle of Wilson Creek where that patriot was slain; that he afterwards enlisted in and served in the 49th Mass. Regiment and participated in the siege of Port Hudson.

In 1871 he took up his residence in Portland, where he has since resided. In 1889 he was a member of the legislature, and was the author of and introduced and caused to be passed the measure known as "The Indigent Bill."

Com. Ladue—I desire to say in behalf of Sedgwick Post No. 10, that there is no comrade in this Department for whom we entertain greater respect than Comrade Northup; he was here last Memorial Day and delivered a pleasing address. We are fond of him. What I am going to say has nothing derogatory to him. But Sedgwick Post has a candidate for your ballots. We cannot but feel that Portland, having had the last honor in that direction, should waive any right that they may claim, at least for the next year. As the representative of Sedgwick Post, we are unanimous in presenting the name of Comrade T. C. Smith. I regret that I have not the military record of Comrade Smith at hand. It is a bright one. He is a Past Commander and a charter member of Sedgwick Post and we ask your consideration and support for him.

Com. Miller—I take pleasure in seconding the nomination of Comrade Northup. While I am glad that Portland can bring up good men for this office it is not anything against us. They have a great number of old soldiers in Portland.

Com. Wiley Knowls—I take pleasure in presenting the name of Comrade J. C. Cooper for Department Commander. He spent three years in the army and at one time was in the hands of the infamous Quantrell, from whom, however, he was fortunate enough to make his escape. He continued in the war until its close, and has proved himself a worthy comrade. He is fully competent. I have witnessed his ability in presiding over deliberate bodies, and have observed his ability. He has been identified with the interests of Oregon for over twenty-six years.

Com. Abe Axtel—It affords me pleasure to say at this time, that during the latter part of the rebellion, I was a member of the 179th N. Y. Comrade T. C. Smith was then a member of the same regiment. He was a veteran from the 27th N. Y. He

was loved in the regiment by all who knew him. He was a young officer and ready to do his duty. I call to mind a time when he distinguished himself for bravery. It was in front of Petersburg in April; I was present and the things that I mention are from personal knowledge. The field officers of the regiment had been either killed or wounded. Comrade Smith then lead the regiment to victory.

Jr. Vice Commander Holloway—On behalf of Eastern Oregon, I second the nomination of Comrade Northup.

Com. Henderson—It affords me pleasure to second the nomination of Comrade Cooper. All the nominees are good men, but none of them have a greater devotion to the Order than he. He comes from a section of the country where during the war it cost something to be a union man. When he was a boy, he organized the boys into military companies down in Tennessee, and afterwards went into the service. He gave all for his country.

The nominations were then closed.

First ballot: Northup, 67 votes; Cooper, 41 votes; Smith, 33 votes. The name of Comrade Smith was withdrawn by Comrade McElroy.

Second ballot: Northup, 75 votes; Cooper, 63 votes. Comrade Northup was then declared elected.

Com. Cooper—Allow me to thank this Department for the large vote they have given me, especially against such a candidate as Comrade Northup, and allow me to move to make the motion electing Comrade Northup, unanimous Carried unanimously.

SENIOR VICE COMMANDER.

Com. G. P. Sanderson—I deem it an honor to be permitted to stand before you for the purpose of placing in nomination a member of Sedgwick Post for the honor of the office of Senior Vice Commander. I present no special claim for Sedgwick Post, but in presenting the name of Comrade R. A. Crossan I ask your consideration for that nomination.

Com. Caukin—I second that nomination.

On motion the A. A. G. was instructed to, and did cast the ballot of the Encampment for Comrade Crossan for the above office.

JUNIOR VICE COMMANDER.

Com. Hollaway—I place in nomination for Junior Vice Commander a comrade well known to you all and who will perform the duties well—a comrade of Joe Hooker Post—Comrade Dodson.

Com. Ormsby placed in nomination Comrade Axtell. Nominations closed. Vote standing—Dodson, 60; Axtell, 44.

Com. Dodson having received the majority of all the votes cast was declared elected the Junior Vice Commander for the ensuing year.

MEDICAL DIRECTOR.

The Chaplain—I would like to have Eugene represented in this little thing. I place in nomination Comrade Gill of J. W. Geary Post.

Com. Allen—I move nominations close and the A. A. G. be instructed to cast the ballot of the Encampment for Comrade Gill. Carried. The ballot was so cast.

CHAPLAIN.

Com. McDevitt—I place in nomination for Chaplain a comrade from Cushing Post—Geo. C. Hall.

Com. Dealy—I place in nomination for Chaplain—Comrade Grannis of Geo. Wright Post.

Department Commander—Comrade Hall is not here and can not be a candidate.

Com. McDevitt—A comrade was elected last year in his own absence; why not carry out this plan this year? I am positive he will accept.

Department Commander—Rules of last year will not be carried out this year.

Com. Shaw—Comrade Wiley Knowles is a member of this Encampment and is a minister and will add dignity to the office and I nominate him.

Nominations closed.

Vote standing—Grannis, 26; Knowles, 88.

Department Commander—Comrade Knowles having received the majority of all the votes cast is declared the Chaplain for the ensuing year.

Com. Grannis—I now move that the nomination of Bro. Knowles be made unanimous. Carried.

Department Commander—We have now three delegates to the National Encampment to elect and three alternates.

Com. Borthwick—I rise to place in nomination for representative to the National Encampment a comrade who assures me if elected will attend to the duties. It is well known that we have elected representatives to the National Encampment for time almost out of mind, the honor has been held by the officer but service has not been rendered. It is the duty of the delegate to the National Encampment to attend and this comrade says he will attend. I place in nomination Comrade J. P. Galbraith, of McPherson Post, for Delegate at Large.

Com. Whiting—Comrade Galbraith is a member of my Post, he having fought over the very same ground as I did. J. P. Shaw was in the same regiment—formed the first Camp in '61—Camp Dick Robinson. Comrade Shaw remembers our breaking in new there.

Com. Olmsted—I desire to place in nomination a comrade who I can assure you will attend the National Encampment at Washington. In 1887 it became my duty to represent this Encampment in the National Encampment; the Pacific coast had a small representation, and when the Department Commander of California was called upon to form his division he stated we old veterans were too valuable on the Pacific coast to march in such inclement weather. It was then that Comrade Baily took the colors of the Department of Oregon as my A. A. G. and made the remark: "He be—if he had not marched in worse weather at Dumfries, in old Virginia, and he be—if he wouldn't carry the colors of Oregon in the procession, rain or no rain." (Cheers.) I nominate for Delegate, Comrade Baily.

Com. Caukin—I desire to say a few words in seconding the nomination of Comrade Baily. You take him to be an older

man than I am? He is the older Grand Army man. He assisted in mustering me into the Grand Army. I know him of old. What he says he will do, he will do. He went there once to represent us and he did it, and you elect him again and he will go there again. I heartily second the nomination of so true a comrade as Comrade Bailly.

Com. Wright—As the representative I place in nomination one whom I am sure had he been in command of the man of war Baltimore at Valparaiso would have demanded the surrender of our sailors at once or shelled the city, and that man is Capt. J. E. Lombard (cheers) of Geo. Wright Post. I place him in nomination; he says he will go and I want the Secretary of the Navy to see the man who would have settled the Chilian business in short order. It would have been the opportunity of a lifetime. (Applause.)

Com. Hardesty—I place in nomination Comrade J. P. Shaw, of Lincoln-Garfield Post, another true and tried comrade. He will go if elected.

Com. Northup—I take pleasure in seconding the nomination of Comrade Shaw. Without being a representative he has already attended three National Encampments. And that is an earnest that if elected he will attend this one. We want men who are on the go.

Com. Cooper—There were several who pledged themselves that they would go last year. I believe I was elected and I went. I was the only delegate from the State of Oregon. Comrade Tuttle was there as an alternate. I believe the representatives should be scattered throughout the small Posts. I second the nomination of Comrade Galbraith.

Com. Heller—I take pleasure in placing in nomination the oldest of the old veterans of Oregon, the Father of the G. A. R. of Oregon. Honest, tried and true—Frank Story, of George Wright Post.

Com. Wright—I rise to place in nomination Comrade Hardesty, of Cushing Post.

Nominations closed.

Com. Borthwick—I suggest that the comrades vote for three names as their choice, and the one receiving the highest number be declared the Delegate at Large, and the other two be declared the Delegates of the Department. So ordered.

IN MEMORIAM.

Com. Olmstead—I move the A. A. G. call the roll of the Posts and each answer to their names in their order. Carried.

ROLL CALL BY POSTS.

Geo. Wright No. 1—Comrade Borthwick: Comrades our roll of the dead as published by the Post contains the names of Curtis Trissler, who died Feb. 22, 1891, just shortly after the last Encampment. He was formerly a private in Co. K, Second Dist. Columbia Infantry; was a member of Geo. Wright Post. A quiet member and a worthy one; seldom had much to say, but was quite constant in his duties—whatever was for him to perform he did it thoroughly and easily. Came to the Post quite frequently. He occupied a subordinate position as a rule and made as you might term it, the bone and sinew of the Post.

Also William Emken, who died 14th of July, 1891. He was janitor of Park school. His service in the army was a private, Co. I, 6th Indiana Heavy Artillery. He had been a member of our Post for ten years. One of the unwritten laws of Geo. Wright Post was to present to a comrade to whom was born a male heir, a spoon. I remember that Comrade Emken some years ago had a boy addition to his family, and he thought so much of the Grand Army and of his Post as to name his boy George Wright Emken. That boy still lives and we hope he will grow to be a worthy successor of his father. Comrade Emken suffered for many months with a painful disease, dropsy, and he passed away July 14th.

Meade Post—No deaths to report.

Lincoln-Garfield No. 3—Comrade McDevitt: I have the names of two comrades who passed away. One is R. R. McGregor; was a very quiet comrade; did not have much to say, but was very intense in connection with patriotic duties. He joined our Post at the time Cleveland issued his order, returning our captured rebel flags to the South. I can see him now, how mad he was when speaking of it. He died of heart disease and was ready to go when summoned. Comrade Cook was an unfortunate man who killed another comrade, and then committed suicide. He was of a sensitive nature and had been goaded on to madness, and took the life of a comrade. At heart he was a good comrade. We must make allowances for an insane man.

McPherson Post No. 5—No deaths.

J. B. Matthews Post No. 6—No deaths.

J. W. Geary Post No. 7—Comrade Williams: I would state that J. W. Geary Post has lost two members by death during the past year. E. F. Stiles, 141st Penn., died at Santa Monica, Cal., from paralysis. He was taken to the Home and died shortly after being taken there. The second was Dr. W. T. McMurthy, surgeon of the 111th Penn. Inf. Died in August from cancer of the throat. Many of the comrades of this Department recollect Comrade McMurthy. Death at last relieved him of his sufferings. M. D. Baldwin, the only representative we had at Astoria has mysteriously disappeared some three months ago. The suppositions and indications surrounding the disappearance were that he was drowned in the Willamette river.

Custer No. 9—Comrade Cooper: We have to report the death of Capt. Medorem Crawford, who answered roll call Dec. last; well known through the State of Oregon as a man of great ability, one of the early pioneers, who came here in '42. He was commissioned by A. Lincoln during the war to escort the emigrants across the plains. Many an emigrant during that time remember his services. He joined with the urgent request of many comrades. He thought he was not worthy to be a member of the Post, where so many men were congregated who had been under fire and had seen their comrades fall in battle. We prevailed upon him to join and we found him a true comrade as we had always found him a good citizen.

Sedgwick Post No. 10—Comrade Ladue: I have to announce the death of F. J. Babcock. Died the 2d of November last, a member of Sedgwick Post. He was peculiarly a member of your Department. I ask Past Dept. Commander Caukin to make a few remarks. Comrade Caukin then read the following:

Department Commander and Comrades of the Department Encampment:

In responding to the invitation of the Commander of Sedgwick Post to pronounce a eulogy on our late Comrade F. J. Babcock, I feel that the choice was suggested not so much by the ability of the speaker as by his known friendship and appreciation of our departed comrade, and their intimate association together in the work of the Grand Army since organization of the Department of Oregon. The ties so engendered had been still further strengthened by their affiliation as companions of the Loyal Legion, another society whose object is to keep alive the memory of the times of trial and danger. It is appropriate that this Department in Encampment assembled, should officially bear tribute to the memory of one of its past department commanders, in order that all comrades may know that faithful service in the cause of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty is ever held in honor in the Grand Army. That we may thus honor the memory of our late comrade the following is offered:

IN MEMORIAM.

BABCOCK.—Died at Salem, Oregon, Nov. 2, 1891, Frelon Jesse Babcock, late Captain 41st U. S. colored troops, aged 48 years, 4 months and 18 days.

Frelon Jesse Babcock was born in Burke, Vermont, June 14, 1843, of sturdy old Green Mountain parentage. His education was acquired in the common schools of his state, and the outbreak of the rebellion found him at the early age of 18 full of patriotism and desire to serve his country in its time of need. He first enlisted May 10th, 1861, in the three months service, which he changed on June 1, 1861, to an enlistment for three years in the 3d Vermont Infantry Volunteers, in which he was promoted corporal May 1, 1862. His regiment was attached to the Sixth Army Corps, and the young soldier participated in all the fierce battles of the Peninsula—Warwick Creek, Williamsburg, Golden's Farm, Savage Station, White Oak Swamp to Malvern Hill. We next find him in the battles of Second Bull Run, South Mountain and Antietam, at the latter place receiving wounds which, combined with disease, caused his discharge for disability October 23, 1862.

Re-invigorated by the air of his native Green Mountains, we find him on August 6th, 1863, re-enlisted in his old company and regiment, in which he was promoted Corporal December 1, 1863, participating in the battles of Brandy Station and Mine Run, and in the campaign of 1864 was again wounded at the Wilderness, but was able to participate in the battles of Charleston, Opequan and Fisher's Hill in the Shenandoah campaign.

On Sept. 16, 1864, he was commissioned First Lieutenant in 41st U. S. colored troops and transferred to 25th Army Corps; appointed Adjutant of his regiment October 17, 1864, and participated in the siege of Richmond to Appomattox. Was promoted Captain July 8, 1865, and mustered out Sept. 30, 1865, by reason of the consolidation of the regiment.

Returning to civil life after the excitement and peril of more than four years of the clash of arms, the old east seemed too slow and tame for his ardent spirit, and in 1868 he sought a home on the Pacific coast, locating at Salem, where he resided until the time of his death.

He joined the Grand Army as a charter member of Sedgwick Post No. 10, 1882, and was elected its first commander and elected department commander February 22, 1884.

He was elected a companion of the First Class in the Loyal Legion through the Commandery of the State of Oregon, November 18th, 1885.

He gave to all the duties of life, as a husband, father, citizen, comrade and companion, the same conscientious devotion that in his youthful ardor was given to the cause of his country as a volunteer soldier. In the memory of those who best knew Comrade Babcock, one trait in his character will always stand out in bold relief, and that trait is best described by the good old American word "pluck." He never gave up a project in which he had once engaged with a determination to succeed, and though suffering from an incurable disease, he never abandoned hope so long as he had strength to rise to his feet and bid defiance to the grim destroyer. He left a wife and three children—a son and two daughters—to mourn his loss.

Geo. H. Thomas Post No. 11—Comrade Ormsby: In the absence of Post Commander the delegation asked me to announce the death of Chas. W. Parkhurst. He was a member of the 17th Ohio. He fought all the way from Bull Run to Appomattox. It was a satisfaction to him to uphold the principles of our Order. No object ever went unrewarded; no occasion of loyalty to our flag ever went unnoticed; he has gone before to that other army, where from heaven they look down and see those they redeemed by their sacrifices and their blood.

Sumner Post No. 12—Comrade Taylor: In the absence of our Commander, who is at home sick, I, as representative of Sumner Post No. 12, desire to inform the comrades of the death of one of our Post who was a noble, generous, true hearted comrade in every sense of the word. His name is Peter Steel, 5th Mich. Infantry. Died Jan. 5th, 1891. He served his country faithfully and well for over four years and since that time has

been a sufferer perhaps as much so as any comrade of this Department. He was a man of very few words. You could see very well when you came in contact with him that he was going very fast. He was a young looking man a little over 50 years of age; very little gray hair, but was as much used up from the effects of his hard service as any man you could find. When he came to the Post we always welcomed him as one of those living heroes who went forth in '61 at the call to arms of the noblest and grandest man that God ever permitted to live and work out his destiny, one of the few of the immortal names that were not born to die, that of Abraham Lincoln. Comrade Steel left a name with us and as comrades we should be proud of; and as comrades of Sumner Post we were proud of him.

Cushing Post No. 14—Comrade Hardesty: Our Post has lost during the past year two comrades. Comrade Duncan Douglass, U. S. Navy; died on the 8th of July, '91. He was one of the truest comrades I ever knew or met. Always in attendance at the meetings of the Post; always willing to do his duty. One singular thing about his death. He lost his eldest daughter five or six months previous and in a few days or weeks afterwards his wife died unexpectedly; and I met Comrade Douglass a few days afterwards coming from the court house and I stopped to sympathize with him on the death of his loved companion and he says: "Comrade it will be but a few days until I follow." Sure enough in a very few days he died, and died as unexpectedly as any death you ever heard of. Next following his death was that of J. G. Rollins, late of Co. A, 8th California Infantry. At the time of his death was Officer of the Day at our Post and had held that position for every term. Like his Comrade Douglass he was almost constant in attendance at Post meetings, always had an open hand for charity. He had served his country in the war of Mexico, and at the time of his death was about 65 years of age. Cushing Post in the death of these comrades have lost two of the most worthy comrades of the Post or as worthy as belong to the Grand Army of the Republic.

Grant No. 17—No deaths.

Preston No. 18—No deaths.

Ellsworth Post No. 19—Comrade Small: In the absence of our Commander, and he is like the comrade from Sumner

Post at home sick, it devolves upon me as a representative to say there have been two members of Ellsworth Post gone over the river of death since our last meeting. Comrade J. B. Nicholas was at Post meeting Friday night and on Tuesday morning he was a corpse. Comrade Nicholas was one of those men always at his post; he was a worker in whatever station he was placed; he was a man that was a great sufferer. When he went, he went all at once. He said at the grave of Comrade Gerard in June: "I wonder who will be next?" In two weeks from that time Comrade Nicholas was laid away.

Joe Hooker Post No. 20—Comrade Olmstead: In the absence of our Post Commander it devolves upon me to say that twice during the last year it has been our sad duty to follow to the tomb comrades of our Post. The first was J. P. McGuigan who died August 28th, '91. He was with us about three months and mustered out at the final roll call and laid to rest. The second was that of Harry McCann, Jan. 14th of this year. He rendered signal service in the State of Oregon during the Indian troubles in Rogue River. In 1861 he was engaged in mining in California. He joined the 2d California Cavalry as Adjutant of that regiment and served during the enlistment of that regiment. Was generally known throughout the country and by the boys of the regiment as "Light Horse Harry." A man of soldierly attainments, chivalrous instincts. Born in the south land, with a true soldier's heart; always in sympathy and step with the Grand Army of the Republic.

General Crook No. 22—No deaths to report.

Kit Carson No. 28—We have to mourn one of our charter members gone to the beyond—Comrade Jesse Lonan. He went to the State of California over a year ago, carrying money with him—leaving his wife in the vicinity of Spokane Falls. Was taken sick in the mines and died there without a single comrade near him. It was some three or four months after we learned of his discharge and muster out in this world, and got this word through his wife. He was a pensioner. She wrote to us for a copy of his descriptive roll to draw his pension. He was one of those who went to Tennessee and enlisted in the famous regiment raised by Parson Brownlow. He was in many great engagements that took place in the war. After coming back to

our place he became a charter member; was dearly loved by all of the boys. His loss was a sad one; I don't know of a death in all the country in or out of the army that caused as much comment when we consider the circumstances, as the death of Jesse Lonan.

Reno Post No. 29—No deaths.

Rawlins No. 31—No deaths.

Gettysburg No. 33—No deaths.

S. A. Hunter No. 37—No deaths.

Gen. Logan No. 39—No deaths.

M. A. Ross No. 41—In the absence of our Commander Stephens I mention the death of Geo. Call May, 1891. I joined the Post after his death; I can't give his regiment. I knew him as a neighbor; he had a chivalric, generous, soldier spirit. Like thousands of other soldiers alive to-day he was a slave to that baneful habit—drink. He died at Pleasant Home in care of comrades.

J. F. Miller No. 42—No deaths.

I. I. Stevens No. 51—In the absence of the Adjutant I would announce the death of our Comrade Geo. W. Goodwin, who died August 26th, 1891.

McCook No. 54—In the absence of the Commander it devolves upon me to announce the death of our Comrade H. T. Morris; was a native son of Oregon. He joined Custer Post as one of the charter members. When McCook Post was about to be formed he got a withdrawal card and joined McCook Post at Lafayette. On account of sickness—Bright's disease—he was a great sufferer. He suffered for nearly a year and a half, consequently he met with us but few times; but his heart was in the work of the Grand Army. He was a constant member of the Order in good standing and an honorable gentleman.

Donelson No. 55—No deaths.

Department Commander: I believe it is the first time in the history of this Encampment when comrades have made as good reports and as many of them as have been made at this time. I trust that more particular attention will be made of the individ-

ual death record of comrades and more attention paid them in future than has been done heretofore.

Moved and seconded that when this Encampment adjourns that it do so to meet again at 6:30 P. M. in this place. Carried.

Department Commander, H. H. Northup, on taking the chair made the following remarks:

Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, Ladies of the Relief Corps, Ladies and Gentlemen: It may perhaps be permitted for me to say a few words at this time, although the time for speech making is limited. Permit me to thank the comrades for the honor conferred upon me, an honor not inferior to that which can be conferred by any body, and one which I feel that I am not worthy to bear. As I enter upon the duties of this high office, I feel the burdens that will rest upon me. As I attempt at the head of the Grand Army in this Department to be its guide and to direct its affairs, I feel that it is a great responsibility.

I think that you will bear me out in saying that during the election for this office no one can say that I have requested from him his support. Neither have I at any time made any promise to anyone and I now make the first request and the first promise. The request is that you will bear with me in the discharge of the duties of the office and will assist me in the same; and the promise is that I will fulfill the position to the best of my ability. (Cheers.) It has frequently been asked why does the Grand Army exist? The war is over. Peace has come. No longer treason walks defiant abroad over the land; and it is said that the work of the old soldier is done. It is idle say many for these Encampments, for the meetings of the Posts; for the old soldier to make so much ado over that which is passed?

It is nothing but an attempt at self-glorification, and offers but so many pretexts to get money from the U. S. treasury. It is not for me; it is not for any comrade of the Grand Army to offer an apology for its existence. The cause of that existence arose more than thirty years ago, when throughout the nation, from east to west, as one man, the Grand Army arose and responded to the demands of the government; and the work of the Grand Army is not done so long as a remnant of secession, so long as a taint of treason remains; or so long as the rebel flag shall be raised in sport or in remembrance of "the lost cause." And the old soldiers work will not be done until he shall be called hence to answer to the roll call of the Grand Army upon the other shore. The generation that is coming on has to be educated. Soon the veteran will be gone; the place that now knows him will soon know him no more forever. And the memories he has left and the lessons he has taught and the work he has done are the glorification and the unification of our country. Comrades, I ask you to support me in this office. I will visit all the Posts that I can. Again, I thank you. (Cheers.)

Comrade Chamberlin — Just at this moment before we adjourn I would like to make a motion; all the delegates here present have been struck with the gentlemanly and soldierly bearing of our Officer of the Day during this Encampment. I feel it is our duty to thank not only the Officer of the Day who has performed in a proper manner his duties, also the Officer of the Guard and Guards. The service has certainly been better than we have ever had it done in my experience, or in any Encampment, and they deserve thanks.

The motion was put. The Officer of the Day and Guards are hereby thanked by this Encampment for their faithful and soldierly services during this Encampment. A voice—Officer of the Guard included in that motion?

Officer of the Day—Anything that includes the Officer of the Day includes the Officer of the Guard, Comrade Jones.

Com. Jones—I feel heartily thankful than I can appear before you. (Note—Comrade Jones is a colored brother.)



No. 3. }

I. Once more the fragrant blossoms of spring remind us that we are approaching Memorial Day with all of its recollections of the causes that made it our anniversary of sober thought of the scenes and sorrows of the strife of 1861 to '65.

Let us renew our allegiance to the memory of those who died, that the Nation might live; let us encourage, by our patriotic devotion to the memory of departed comrades, a truer devotion to the principles of our government, and show to the rising generation the benefits of the great blessings that they now enjoy and which were purchased at so terrible a price.

As we pause by the mounds, and scatter flowers over the new graves that have been made since our last Memorial Day, let it be a reminder to us that each year is now rapidly recruiting to the silent ranks of our departed comrades, and that it is only a question of a few more Memorial Days, when we, too, must leave to others to carry out this our National offering. Then let us discountenance by every means in our power anything that tends to turn this our sacred day into a gala or holiday.

II. The several Post-Commanders of this Department will cause their Posts to make arrangements for some form of divine service on the Sunday preceding Memorial Day. These exercises are a part of our Memorial Day, and should be attended by the several Posts and Relief Corps in a body, uniformed as far as practicable, with their badges worn on the left breast. Post Colors should be carried on all occasions.

III. In compliance with Par. III, General Orders No. 22, National Headquarters, all Posts in this Department, that can conveniently do so, will detail worthy and competent comrades to appear at some stated hour and time before the Public Schools in their districts, for the purpose of explaining the object of Memorial Day, and to deliver short addresses of patriotism to the school children and requesting of them contributions of flowers for Memorial Day services, thereby interesting them in the patriotic principles of our Order.

IV. The Department Encampment, at its last session adopted suitable forms to be used in making reports of Posts on the observance of Memorial Sunday and Memorial Day and also for making returns in case of the death of a comrade in any of the several Posts of the Department. Post Commanders will cause these reports to be made out promptly. Reports on memorial exercises must be made out not later than June 10, 1891, and forwarded through the Asst. Adjt. General R. S. Greenleaf, to Comrade R. E. Clapp, Department Chaplain, who will make a consolidated report and forward the same, at once, to Comrade Myron W. Reed, Chaplain-in-Chief, Denver, Colorado.

V. Frequent applications have been made to these headquarters in regard to headstones furnished by the government for the un-marked graves of our dead comrades, and the Department Commander desires the Post Commanders to keep a record of all such graves in their respective localities, so that when the proper information has been received requisitions on the Quartermaster General U. S. A. may be made out promptly.

Any further information in regard to this matter will be promptly furnished from these headquarters on receipt of request for same.

I. Gen. Lyon Post No. 26 having surrendered its charter and other properties of the Department in compliance with Art. I, Sec. 2, Rules and Regulations, the same is hereby approved, and the disbandment of this Post will date from May 16, 1891.

II. Charles M. Lindsey, late private Co. G, 14th Ill. Cav., who was illegally mustered into Geo. Wright Post No. 1, of this Department in direct violation of Art. IV, Rules and Regulations, the official record having come to the knowledge of that Post that he served in the 10th Tenn. C. S. A. Inf., and bore arms against the U. S. Government, the Post Commander having ordered his name stricken from the Roll of that Post, the same is hereby approved, and comrades throughout this Department are cautioned against having any G. A. R. relations with him.

III. The Department Commander takes this opportunity to call the attention of all Posts in this Department to use great care as to the recommendation of application for membership in our Order. Art. II, Sec. 3, provides the duties of comrades on the committee of application. Every old soldier should have an honorable discharge or indisputable evidence that he is eligible to membership in our Order.

IV. Joseph Bucher having been appointed Adjutant of J. B. Matthews Post No. 6, of Forest Grove, vice Wm. H. Crosley, resigned, he will be respected and obeyed accordingly.

V. In accordance with General Orders No. 18, National Headquarters, Post Commanders were requested to forward to Department Headquarters a full report of the meeting on the evening of April 6th, 1891, the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the formation of the Grand Army of the Republic. These reports were to be consolidated, briefed and summarized by the Department Commander and forwarded to National Headquarters. A number of Posts in the Department have failed to comply with this order; those who have not already forwarded such reports will do so without further delay.

VI. Post Commanders will find enclosed herewith blank requisitions for supplies required for Post use. Also attention is called to the several Post Commanders that they can obtain the late edition of the "Blue Book" on proper requisition. No Post should be without a copy of this book, as it is a good guide and of great value to Post Commanders; the price to Posts is \$1.00 each. All requisitions *must* be accompanied with the requisite amounts. All money orders and requisitions must be made payable to the Assistant Quartermaster General, D. H. Turner, and forwarded to him through the Assistant Adjutant General, R. S. Greenleaf.

VII. If comrades will be sufficiently thoughtful to put the number of their Post on every communication sent to these Headquarters, it will be a great convenience in many instances and save much time that is now wasted searching through roster and records.

VIII. Everything now points to this year as being a very successful year in recruiting into our ranks, and the Commander feels confident that there is to-day within the borders of our State, hundreds of old boys who wore the blue, who are eligible to become comrades with us. There is also a large immigration of our comrades who have been members of other Posts in the east, who are out here and amongst us. 15. Soon the presence of a G. A. R. comrade in a Sons of Veterans' camp room will be a rare feast to our Order. Our relation to the G. A. R. as our sire is a proud and noble relation. It behooves us to prove ourselves worthy of our sires by acts of politeness and deeds of kindness. Let us avail ourselves of our *duty* to them, and have a *great* many rare feasts in our camp-rooms before these noble sires are beyond our recall.

VI. By request of the Commander of the Department of West Virginia, attention is called to the fact that a medal was awarded by that State to each soldier who served in a West Virginia Regiment, and also to the family of each soldier who died while so serving. Thousands of these medals are undelivered, never having been called for. Comrades to whom they are due, or the families or heirs, in case of deceased soldier, should address George B. Crawford, A. A. G., Dept. West Va., G. A. R., Wellsburg, W. Va., giving name, company and regiment, and inclosing stamp for reply.

VII. Post Officers are again reminded that all requisitions for supplies should be addressed to the Assistant Adjutant General. When sent to the A. Q. M. General the order is forwarded to the A. A. G., and some trouble and delay occasioned. Blank requisitions, which were sent to every Post in May, and will be sent free on application at any time, should be used in ordering. Mistakes and misunderstandings will be thereby prevented.

VIII. All communications must be sent to these Headquarters written in ink, (not lead pencil), and contents stated briefly, as well as writing to be in as plain a hand as possible. By following out these instructions you will greatly assist in the work of this Department as well as insuring a prompt and intelligent reply.

IX. GENERAL ORDERS }
No. 7.

I. The annual election of Post officers for the ensuing year occurs on the first stated meeting in December, as provided for in the Rules and Regulations. Great care should be exercised in the selection of such comrades as are so situated that they can and will do honor to the positions which by the suffrages of their comrades they have been called to fill. Post officers (the Adjutant, Sergeant-Major and Quartermaster-Sergeant excepted) must be elected by ballot, unless a ballot be dispensed with by unanimous consent, and they shall be installed into their respective offices at the first stated meeting in January following, unless the installation be conducted publicly, when a special meeting may be called for that purpose.

II. Representatives, and an equal number of Alternates to the Department Encampment, to be held at Salem, February 11th and 12th, 1892, shall be elected at the same time and manner as Post officers. They shall be furnished with credentials signed by the Post Commander and Post Adjutant, a copy of which must be immediately forwarded to Department Headquarters. Blanks for that purpose are herewith enclosed. The number of representatives to which each Post is entitled is based upon the semi-annual reports for the term ending June 30, 1891, and will be as follows:

The above representation is on the basis of one delegate to 20 members or major fraction thereof.

III. The following named comrades are entitled to seats in the Department Encampment, viz.: Representatives, Department Officers, Past Department Commanders, Council of Administration, and the following members of the Department Staff: Assistant Adjutant General, Assistant Quartermaster General, Inspector, Judge Advocate and Chief Mustering Officer; also Post Commanders and Past Post Commanders.

IV. The Post Commander is responsible for prompt reports from his Post, and Posts in arrears for reports or dues will be excluded from representation in the Department Encampment. The Rules and Regulations make it the duty of the Post Commander to see that the Adjutant's and Quartermaster's Reports are properly made out, certified, and forwarded *by him* with per capita tax (ALL IN ONE ENVELOPE) to the Assistant Adjutant General. An addressed envelope will accompany the blanks.

V. The following Posts have been duly organized into this Department since the last General Order:

Prairie Grove Post, No. 26, at Woods, Tillamook county, Oregon, was organized by Post Commander J. W. Maxwell as a Special Mustering Officer on August 20, 1891, with ten comrades. A. D. Sanders, Post Commander, and W. R. Roberdee, as Adjutant.

F. J. Babcock Post, No. 30, at Beaverton, Oregon, was organized by Assistant Adjutant General R. S. Greenleaf, as Special Mustering Officer, on Nov. 11, 1891, with eleven comrades. A. B. Cady, as Post Commander and Jno. N. Fisher as Adjutant.

VI. Capt. Zody Post, No. 36, at Althouse, surrendered its charter to date from Nov. 2, 1891.

VII. Souvenirs of the 25th National Encampment, also the printed proceedings of the 10th Annual Department Encampment, together with General Orders No. 1, 2 and 3, from National Headquarters, have been distributed to the several Posts of the Department.

VIII. The attention of the Post Commanders throughout the Department is called to take prompt and necessary steps in the county where the within Post is located, and appear before the County Judge of said county on or before the annual tax levy is made in January of each year, and see that the necessary provisions are made on the tax roll of that county for a suitable fund to be set aside for the care of Indigent Old Soldiers or their families as provided for in the Northrup Act, passed at the 15th session of the Oregon Legislature and approved Feb. 25, 1889, to be drawn through the Post Commander in the regular manner as provided by law.

IX. Comrades throughout this Department are cautioned to be guarded in their fraternal relationship with one Geo. P. Baker, now in the State.

X. The appointment of Comrade R. S. Littlefield as special Aid-de-Camp on the Commanding Staff is vacated at his own request.

GENERAL ORDERS }
No. 8.

I. At 5 o'clock Monday morning, Nov. 2d, 1891, at Salem, Oregon, Past Department Commander, F. J. Babcock of this Department, was finally mustered and was honorably discharged from all the cares and sufferings of this life, after a most useful and upright service as a citizen, soldier and commander.

II. He served this Department during his term as Department Commander for the year 1884, with rare executive ability.

HIS ARMY RECORD.—Frelon Jesse Babcock was born in 1842, at Burke, Vermont, and received only a common school education. June 1st, 1861, he enlisted as a private in Company I, 3d Vermont Infantry. He went into the Army of the Potomac and took part in the Peninsular campaign, when he was discharged on account of disability caused by pulmonary consumption, a sister taking him home from the camp. He went home not expecting to reach there alive. But he gathered strength in the invigorating and loyally inspiring atmosphere of his Green mountain home, and re-enlisted Aug. 6, 1863, same company and regiment, with which he served as a private until Sept. 26, 1864, when he was discharged as corporal to accept promotion to the first lieutenancy in the Forty-first colored infantry. He served as regimental adjutant and acting assistant adjutant-general. When he finally retired from service in the Union armies, he had earned his commission as captain, his discharge dating Sept. 30, 1865. He was in numerous battles on the Peninsular and all through his first enlistments he was in Sedgwick's Sixth army corps. He was all through Sheridan's campaign and was wounded first in the battle of the Wilderness; and again at another engagement. He still has in his possession the old corps flag of Sedgwick headquarters and had the G. A. R. Post named after his chieftain. He was instrumental in organizing Russell Post at Salem, Department of California, which was afterwards merged into Sedgwick Post, organized Sept. 26, 1882, of which he was elected first Post Commander. He was elected Senior Vice Department Commander in 1883, and Commander of Department of Oregon in 1884. He assisted in organizing the only commandery of the Loyal Legion on the north Pacific coast.

As a public official Captain Babcock has also an honorable career. He was elected a member of the city council, city treasurer, and in 1888 he was elected county clerk and re-elected in 1890 by a largely increased majority. Owing to his increasing infirmity from incurable consumption, he has attended to his official duties since 1st July only in a formal manner. At the last term of the county court he sadly took leave of his old associates at the court house.

III. As a mark of respect to his memory, Post charters will be suitably draped for the period of thirty days.

IV. Past Department Commanders N. S. Pierce, G. E. Caukin and E. B. McElroy will draft suitable memorials and present the same, under the proper Order of Business at the next annual Department Encampment to be held at Salem, Oregon, on Feb. 11 and 12, 1892.

GENERAL ORDERS }
No. 9.

I. Blanks are enclosed herewith for reports from Post Adjutants and Quartermasters for the Second Term of 1891, covering the six months ending December 31, 1891. These reports should be made and given to Post Commanders at the last Post meeting in December; and the Commander, after examination and approval, will at once forward to the Assistant Adjutant General, for which an addressed envelope is furnished. The Adjutant *must in no case change* the figures found on this blank report, as they show the exact "number remaining in good standing" as reported by him June 30, 1891. Quartermasters will also find "Balance on hand" in blank reports as shown by his report of June 30, 1891, and these figures must in no case be changed.

Blanks are also enclosed for Post Roster. This is to show name, number and location of Post, names of Past Post Commanders, names of officers for 1892, time of meeting of Post, names of members, alphabetically arranged, giving company and regiment or vessel. This Roster is to be made up after close of last meeting in December, 1891, and forwarded to these Headquarters in same envelopes with reports of Adjutant and Quartermaster.

The attention of Post officers—and especially of Post Commanders, with whom rests the authority and the responsibility—is especially called to the necessity of making these returns *promptly and correctly*. Every Post Commander should carefully revise the "Recapitulation of Muster Roll," in his Adjutant's report, and see that "gains" and "losses" are fully accounted for by name; and that the "losses," taken from the "aggregate" of the "gains" added to the "number remaining in good standing last report," will leave the number now reported as "remaining in good standing." It is also necessary to designate on the muster roll of new members whether they are admitted by muster or by transfer. Also to see that *twenty cents* is transmitted for each comrade reported as "remaining in good standing." Much trouble and correspondence will be saved by attention to these points on the part of Post Commanders, Adjutants and Quartermasters.

II. During the term ending June 30th, the Department gained 193 by muster, 122 by transfer, 70 by reinstatement. It lost 10 by death, 9 by discharge, 100 by transfer, 117 by suspension and 2 by dishonorable discharge, showing a net gain of 147. The report should show a net gain of at least 500. Many new members may be gained by proper effort, but the great opportunity is furnished by the "suspended" list which now numbers 229. This should not be. All true and worthy comrades should be brought back into good standing; and the others, if any, should be formally "dropped from the rolls." The reinstatement of comrades dropped for non-payment of dues has been made easy by an amendment requiring the payment of but one year's dues. Let us have a general effort from Post officers and from all the comrades who love our grand old organization! The Department of Oregon is certainly not yet ready to halt its onward march and begin the retreat which time will inevitably demand.

III. Attention is called to General Orders Numbers 4 and 5, from the Headquarters of the Grand Army of the Republic, transmitted Nov. 16th. No. 5 will be found to contain the prescribed form of Post inspection in full. Also to the page containing the amendments to the Rules and Regulations which were adopted by the Twenty-fifth National Encampment. The latter should be fastened into copies of the Rules and Regulations for reference.

IV. Notwithstanding the fact that Post Commanders have been frequently reminded that it is their plain and imperative duty to have all General Orders read to the Posts under their command, the Department Commander regrets to have to say that in many Posts this matter is yet evidently neglected. General Orders are promulgated for the information and guidance of the Posts, and it is hoped that in future every Post Commander will bear this matter in mind, and no longer neglect a plain duty which among others he has pledged his sacred honor to faithfully perform.

V. For the purpose of preventing the improper use of information that was sometimes obtained from unauthorized inquiries in the past, the War Department has decided to furnish an official statement of an ex-soldier's record only upon the request or approval of a Department Commander. All such inquiries, therefore, should be sent through Department Headquarters, where they will be approved and forwarded.

I. A general inspection of this Department will be made in compliance with General Orders No. 5, National Headquarters. D. Carlos Sherman, Department Inspector, will furnish to the Assistant Inspector, in duplicate, printed inspection form as furnished in General Order No. 5, National Headquarters. The Assistant Inspectors will provide each Post Commander with a duplicate form of inspection exercise, that a uniform system may be carried out on night of inspection.

II. The Department Inspector will make prompt return of his consolidated inspection on regular form, as provided from these headquarters, not later than January 25th. He will cause a thorough inspection of all Muster Rolls and Record Books and make such recommendations as he may deem proper to these headquarters. It is important that this inspection be complete in every respect, as it will be the basis of annual reports to the Department Encampment.

III. All the old Rituals and Cards which were, or are now in the possession of the several Posts of this Department prior to Jan. 1, 1891, must be returned to these headquarters by the Post Commander, as provided for in Rules and Regulations. The Inspecting officer will see that this order is complied with.

IV. Since publication of last General Order No. 9, O. P. Morton Post No. 36, of La Grande, was mustered in with 21 comrades, by Junior Vice Department Commander C. P. Holloway, Dec. 1st, 1891.

V. For the purpose of officially carrying out the installation of the new officers of the several Posts in this Department, the officers hereafter mentioned will be authorized to conduct the installation service as provided in the

Book of Services: Any Past Department Commander or Past Post Commander, when chosen by the Post to perform the service. When not so designated, then they shall perform the service by seniority of rank.

VI. Posts may conduct the installing of officers publicly when so desired by the Post. All officers conducting the installing of new officers will make prompt returns to these headquarters by certified copy of all officers so installed.

No. 11.

I. The 11th Annual Encampment, Department of Oregon, G. A. R., will meet at Salem, Oregon, on the 11th and 12th days of February, 1892, for the transaction of such business that may properly come before the Encampment. The Encampment will be called to order at 7 o'clock P. M., Feb. 11, in the legislative hall at the capitol building. The Encampment will open in regular form, and the order of business heretofore in use by the previous Encampments will be the regular order of business.

II. The Eleventh Annual Encampment promises to be one of the most pleasant ever held in this Department, and all comrades are urgently requested who can conveniently do so, to gather with the comrades on that occasion, as the comrades and general committee of arrangements of Sedgwick Post No. 10 will spare neither time nor means to make all who are in attendance feel at home, as well as glad that they were there. The following is a partial outline of the programme: The Department Headquarters will be established at the Willamette Hotel. At 1 o'clock P. M. February 11th all comrades will assemble at Sedgwick Post Headquarters, when they will escort the W. R. C. and others to the opera house, where an interesting programme has been arranged by the comrades and loyal citizens of Salem.

III. Immediately after the close of the public exercises at the opera house the Council of Administration will meet at Department Headquarters, at the Willamette Hotel, to make up their report upon the accounts of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Quartermaster-General.

IV. The Assistant Adjutant-General, R. S. Greenleaf, will be in attendance at the Headquarters' rooms with the roster of all comrades entitled to a seat in the Encampment, and all delegates and others entitled to do so will call and see that their credentials are properly entered, when they can procure a Department badge from the Assistant Quartermaster-General, D. H. Turner at the same time and place. All comrades are requested to procure these badges and to pay particular attention to this paragraph in order to avoid confusion.

V. All Department officers of the Encampment will appear uniformed and equipped, as near as possible, as follows: Black slouch hat with G. A. R. wreath and cord, single or double-breasted blouse, black belt and sword, dark trousers and white gloves, badges to be worn on left breast.

VI. The commander of Sedgwick Post No. 10 will cause a detail to be made from his Post of one officer of the day, one officer of the guard, and twelve comrades for guard and such other duties as may be required of them during the Encampment. The officer of the day will cause a thorough inspection to be made preceding each session of the Encampment of this guard and see that they are properly uniformed and equipped with arms, and in fatigue uniform, with white gloves, badges to be worn on the left breast; and see that they are thoroughly instructed in countersigns. The officer of the day will report for full instructions to the Assistant Adjutant General at the Willamette Hotel at 12 M, February 11th.

VII. The new national countersigned is issued with this order, and the several commanders of this Department will see that all comrades of their respective Posts who are entitled to receive the same are provided with this countersign as speedily as possible, as all delegates and other comrades will be required to give the countersign at the opening or upon entering the Encampment. Comrades outside the Department having the national countersign will be admitted to the gallery.

VIII. Any Post of this Department who is in arrears for the last semi-annual report for 1891 will not be allowed any representation in the Encampment. This rule will be strictly enforced.

IX. The following rates over the U. P. R. R. lines to all comrades and ladies of the Relief Corps in attendance at the Encampment has been granted on the following conditions: Fare to be one and one-fifth for the round trip, good from Feb. 9 to Feb. 14, providing that all purchasers of tickets shall procure a receipt from the agent at the point of starting showing that they have paid one full fare to Portland, when, upon their return home, they shall have their receipts signed by the Assistant Adjutant General, R. S. Greenleaf, and presenting the same at the Portland ticket office and paying one-fifth the regular fare their receipts will be taken up and provided with a return ticket in full. Comrades are cautioned to observe these conditions, thereby avoiding trouble.

X. The following rates over the S. P. R. R. and its branches to all comrades and ladies of the Relief Corps in attendance at the Encampment, have been granted on the following conditions: Fare to be one and one-third for round trip, good from Feb. 10th until Feb. 13th.

Members coming from points on Woodburn-Springfield branch will require two certificates, one to be presented to agent at Salem for return tickets to Woodburn, and the other to be presented to agent at Woodburn, for return tickets to destination.

Members coming from points on West Side Division, via Portland, will also require two certificates, one to be presented to agent at Salem for return tickets to Portland, and the other to be presented to agent at Portland, No. 134 First street, corner of Alder, for return tickets to destination.

Members coming from points on the Narrow Gauge, West Side Division, and P. & W. V. Ry. will also require two certificates, one to be presented to agent at Salem for return tickets to Portland, and the other to be presented to agent at Portland depot office, foot of Jefferson street, for return tickets to destination.

The proper certificates will be furnished and signed by the Assistant Adjutant-General, R. S. Greenleaf, to all comrades and others entitled to receive the same.

XI. All posts and others in need of, or anticipating any additional supply from the Assistant Quartermaster's Department are requested to forward requisitions not later than January 30, in order that this officer may have his accounts with the several Posts and the Department closed up in proper manner to date.

POST COMMANDER :

I. It is very desirable that this year shall show a great increase in strength in the Department of Oregon G. A. R.

The Department Commander believes that there are many localities where it will be possible for organizations to greatly increase their numbers, and Post Commanders are earnestly requested to use their utmost efforts by all proper means to obtain recruits.

There are many veteran soldiers who are in sympathy with us, but who are not in our ranks. To these direct appeals should be made to join our camps and councils, and the results will not be doubtful.

A good working committee in each Post may canvass the locality, report, and make plans which will at least either secure valuable recruits or ascertain the reason why such men are not connected with the G. A. R.

Circulars will be furnished from Department Headquarters, on application of Post Commanders, to aid in this work.

II. The Commander earnestly desires to see yet closer bonds of sympathy exist between our Grand Army Posts, the Women's Relief Corps and the Sons of Veterans. Many of our Posts are now in close working sympathy with one

or both of these valuable auxiliaries. It is a fact, demonstrated beyond peradventure, that the stronger and more useful Posts are the ones that are assisted in their charitable and social work by these strong organizations composed of our wives, daughters and sons.

Under the efficient management of Mrs. President Lounsbury, the work of the W. R. C. is in a flourishing condition. The work can but continue to prosper, and as prosperity for them means prosperity for us, shall we not join hands with them and bid them godspeed in their noble work.

CIRCULAR
No. 4.

For the information of all Posts in this Department, and for a more uniform system of obtaining the benefits of the "Act for the relief of all old soldiers" entitled to receive the same, the following legal opinion of Judge Advocate General H. H. Northup, of this department, concerning series of questions asked by the Department Commander, is hereby published for the future benefit of all concerned:

BRIGADIER GENERAL O. SUMMERS,
*Commander of Department of Oregon,
Grand Army of the Republic:*

GENERAL—In response to your request that I give a form of procedure to obtain the relief contemplated by the act entitled "An act for the relief of indigent Union and Mexican war soldiers, sailors, marines and Indian war veterans, and for the relief of their indigent widows and minor children, and to defray the funeral expenses of such indigent soldiers, sailors, marines and volunteers," approved February 25th, 1889, found on page 52 of the Session Laws of 1889, in order that the same may by you be embodied in a general order, for the benefit of the organization throughout the Department, I proceed to answer the questions seriatim propounded by you:

Question 1. Who is the proper officer to make the application for relief?

Answer. Section 2 of the Act declares that "the Commander of any Post of the Grand Army, * * * shall file with the county clerk * * * the names of the Commander * and other officers of such Post * * and the names of any relief committee thereof, and shall also file a notice in writing that such Post * * will undertake the relief of the indigent persons provided for in the first section of this Act, and by the third Monday in January of each year shall file a similar notice." Said section further provides that the Commander shall file with the county clerk a bond to be approved by the county court or the judge thereof. "On the approval and filing of said bond, and on the recommendation of the relief committee of any Post * * orders shall be drawn in favor of the Commander."

It is apparent from the reading of the law that the Commander is made the responsible party and that the county relief orders are drawn in his name and made payable to his order, that the Commander is the proper officer to make application for relief. This application, however, should be "recommended" or approved by the relief committee of the Post.

The object of this latter provision is, to remove the whole labor of looking after cases of relief from the Commander to the relief committee, where it more properly belongs; and also to serve as a check upon the distribution of relief funds, if intrusted to the judgment of one person alone.

Question 2. When and who should appear before the several county courts and ask for and see that a special tax is made?

Answer. This is a matter that is left entirely to the judgment of the Posts. It is presumed that the officials of the county court desire information as to the amount of funds that may be desired for relief. The members of the Posts should be advised in this matter, from experience and from knowledge of the wants of the class of persons who are beneficiaries under this law. Those persons, therefore, who will have most influence with the courts in presenting the needs of the indigent persons who are sought to be aided by the statute, should be constituted a committee, to attend upon the courts.

The time of action, of course, is when the levy is to be made for state and county taxes. It is usually made in January. Time varies somewhat with the preparation of rolls.

Question 3. Are the county courts of the state compelled to make this levy, and if they decline to make the levy, what course should be pursued to compel them to carry out the intent of the law?

Answer. The law states that the board of commissioners of the several counties are authorized to levy, in addition to the taxes now authorized by law, a tax not exceeding two-tenths of one mill upon the taxable property in their respective counties.

If any tax therefore is levied by the county authorities, it is presumed that the tax for the indigent persons set forth in this act, is included. The effect of the provision just quoted is to limit the amount that can be expended in any one year, in this behalf, to the amount realized by a tax of two-tenths of one mill upon the taxable property of the county. Warrants are drawn as in the case of other persons requiring aid. Whether or not, therefore, the county authorities had in mind the class of persons for whom relief by this act is provided, so long as the amount drawn in any one year is less than the maximum amount authorized by law, the county must respond. This is upon the well known principle that public officers are presumed to do their duty; and the law does not contemplate that a special fund shall be kept, separate from all other funds, to be drawn on in case of demand.

If, however, the county authorities should specially set forth, in the commissioners' journal, a less amount than the maximum sum named in the act, to-wit: two-tenths of one mill, as the levy for any year, it is probable that the courts would hold that the expenditure for such year must be limited to the amount realized therefrom.

But where no special finding is made, it is conclusively presumed that the authorities—in the performance of their duties as public officials—included the maximum amount allowed by law. And this is a presumption too, that no official is permitted to deny. The courts therefore, cannot decline to make the levy, and the only point that requires attention, is to see that a special finding of too small an amount is not made.

Question 4. Is the amount to be expended in any one case limited; if so, what would be the amount?

Answer. The law places no limit upon any case; but it is always to be presumed that a reasonable amount will be expended, consistent with the economy which is always exercised in the distribution of public funds in cases of this character. A limit of thirty dollars, however, is placed upon the amount expended for funeral expenses in any one case. In administering relief, it is likely that the amount allowed for funeral expenses would be taken as an index for allowance in other matters under the act.

Question 5. Can the county court be compelled under the law to grant this relief out of any funds in the county treasury not otherwise appropriated, where no special tax has been levied for the purpose?

Answer. Yes. The answer to this question has been anticipated in the answer to Question 3, *supra*.

Question 6. Who should give the bond to the county court, and what is the best form for such a bond which is legal and brief; and would the county court be authorized to dictate how the funds should be expended or relief granted in individual cases.

Answer. This question is three-fold, and I answer each part separately.

Answer a. The Commander of the Post is the person required by law to give the bond, and he is the person held responsible under the law for the proper application of funds so drawn. Otherwise he is subject to a penalty in the enforcement of the bond thrice the amount mis-appropriated; and besides, he would be subject to criminal prosecution.

Answer b. The form of bond heretofore used and kept for distribution at Department Headquarters, I consider a good and legal form. Where a form has been adopted and proven acceptable to the authorities, I would not deem it advisable to suggest any change therein.

Answer c. The county court is not authorized to dictate how the funds should be expended or relief granted in individual cases, unless it is apparent that the relief afforded has been used in an extravagant and useless manner, amounting to negligence. Then the court could say, and very properly, the funds demanded are not to be used for relief, but will be wasted, therefore, they will be withheld.

The law contemplates a careful, economical and judicious expenditure of money in this behalf. Under such an administration the county court is not authorized nor will it be disposed to interfere in the particular manner in which the relief is used.

As requested by you in your communication, I herewith submit a form to obtain from proper authorities, the relief contemplated by this Act. I remain,

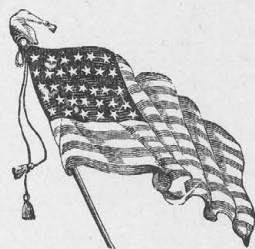

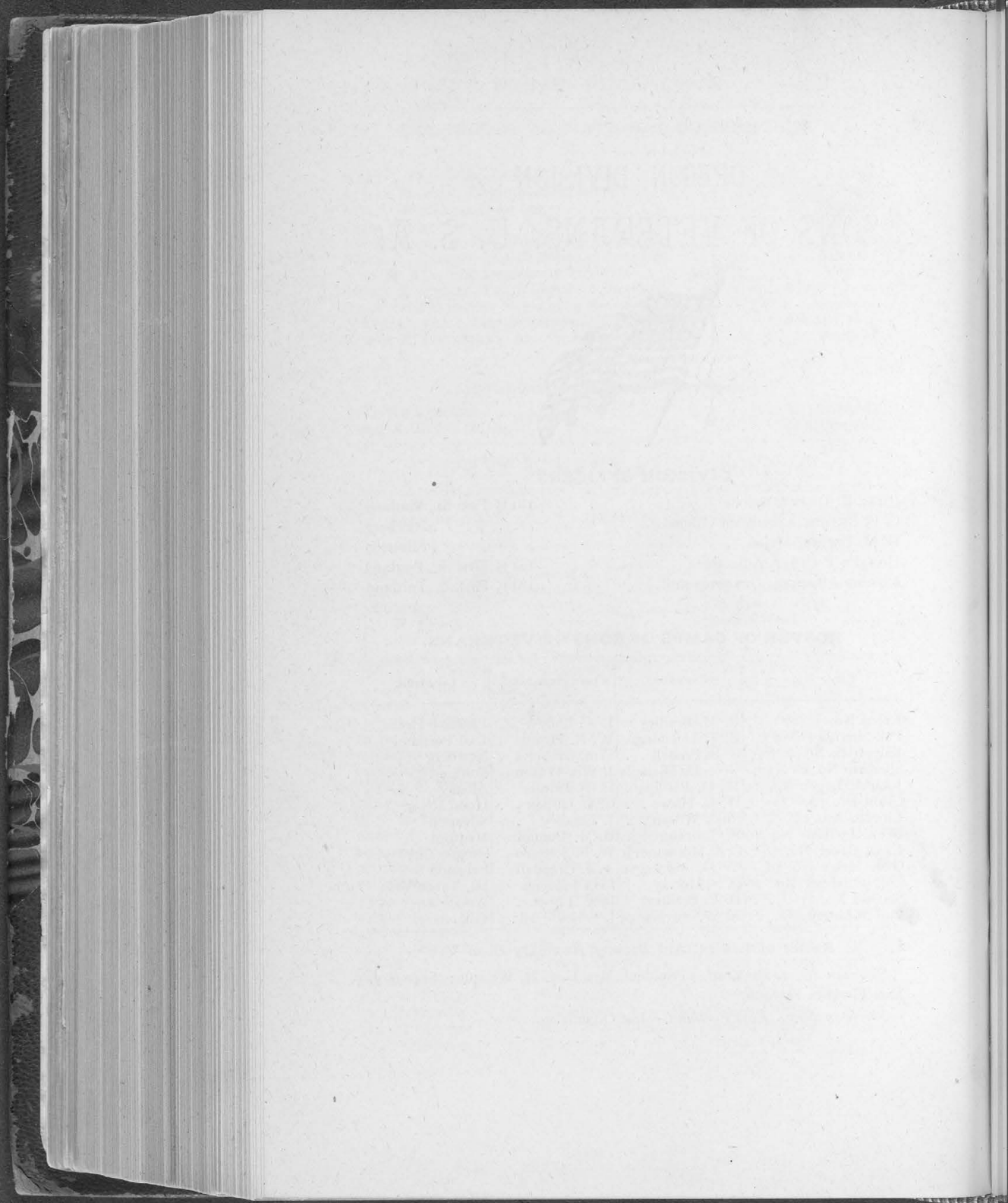
