ST. PAUL WOMAN BEATEN TO DEATH; MAN HELD

VICTIM'S NUDE BODY FOUND IN STALLED TRUCK

Ex-Convict Confesses Murder After Attempting Suicide on Way to Jail.

SUBDUED IN FIST FIGHT

Killing Follows Drinking Party at Farm Home and Quarrel Over Money.

A 42-year-old St. Paul mother was beaten to death Thursday afternoon on a farm in Dakota county and a few hours later Harry Lorenz, farmer near Rosemount and Lorenz, farmer near Rosemount and former convict, was discovered carrying the victim's nude body in an old truck. Subdued in a fist fight after he had attempted to take his own life, Lorenz was arrested and confessed the killing.

The woman is Mrs. Mary Tschida, 1377 Schletti street, who had been cited to appear in court here today for neglect of her 7-year-old son, Frank. Her body had been placed in the truck and covered with tree branches.

Overpowered near Shakopee by Sheriff Arthur Mesenbrink of Scott county, Lorenz, who has served wo terms in St. Cloud reformatory, pulled four poison pills from his socket and swallowed them. The poison was pumped from his stomach a few minutes later and he was taken to the Scott county jail.

Captured After Chase. Lorenz' capture came after a 25-mile chase by South St. Paul po-lice, Dakota county deputy sheriffs and agents of the State Bureau of

H. A. Irwin of Shakopee, Scott county attorney, said that inasmuch as the crime was committed in Dakota county Lorenz will be turned over to authorities in that

Lorenz told Irwin he knew the woman was dead and that she was in his truck but that he "didn't remember killing her." He said she

The former convict, who was shot in an attempted burglary at Red Wing a few years ago, said he was en route to the home of his father, August Lorenz, at Mayer, near Shakopee, when he was intercepted by the sheriff.

"I don't want to live so I might as well kill somebody before I die," Lorenz told Sheriff Mesenbrink as he was scuffling with him.

An anonymous telephone call, informing Mesenbrink that "a woman's body is in a truck on the highway," led to Lorenz' arrest. The sheriff, observing a truck with two flat tires near the farm home of Charles Kopp, two miles east of Shakopee, stopped to investigate.

Mesenbrink saw Lorenz, carrying a pail of water for the overheated radiator of the truck. The sheriff approached him, Lorenz started to swing, but after a few blows the sheriff knocked him down, handcuffed him and took him to a hospital where the poison was pumped from his stomach after he had attempted suicide.

Injured in Brain.

Dr. H. W. Reiter, Scott county coroner, following an autopsy, announced Mrs. Tschida's death was due to injuries to her brain and multiple hemorrhages.

Mrs. Tschida was the former wife of Frank Nychetta of St. Paul who was shot and killed about five years ago by officers investigating the theft of a car at Lake Elmo. Lor-enz was with Nychetta at the time of the shooting.

According to Lorenz' story at his farm when Mrs. Tschida, a frequent visitor at his home, in company with Helen Nygaard and Victor Branch and Victo

pany with Helen Nygaard and Victor Bambanek, both roomers at the Tschida home, and Joe Luba, 868 Gaultier street, came to his place and suggested they all go fishing. Lorenz said he told them he could not go because he was busy harvesting, and at that Mrs. Tschida stayed at his place while the others left for a nearby lake. After they had gone, he said, he and Mrs. Tschida obtained some liquor and started to drink.

Woman on Floor.

Then. Lorenz said, he and Mrs. Tschida went to the home of James Fitzgibbons, half a mile from Lorenz' farm. The next thing he remembered, he said, was that Mrs. Tschida was lying on the floor and Fitzgibbons told him she was dead.

"I then dragged her body out to my truck and put it in the back." Lorenz told Irwin. "I started to drive. Two of my tires were flat so I couldn't drive very fast. I in-Mayer. But here I am now. I don't want to live anyway."

Lorenz said he drove through Savage. He said he remembered missing his pocketbook and accusing Mrs. Tschida of taking it but that he did not recall beating her.

Questioned by police, Miss Nygaard said that Mrs. Tschida remained at the Lorenz farm when the others left to go to the lake and that when they returned about 10 A. M. Mrs. Tschida and Lorenz were a St. bill which quarreling over a \$5 bill which Lorenz asserted Mrs. Tschida had taken from him.

They stayed some time, she said. and finally, becoming tired of the squabble between the woman and Lorenz, left for St. Paul. The two were at the farm home, she said. when they left.

Wife Slayer's Term Doubled

Harry Lorenz Given 2 to 30 Years - Father Charged With Jury Tampering

Harry Lorenz, Barnesville township farmer convicted of second degree manslaughter in the death of Mrs. Mary Tschida of St. Paul, was brought into District Court at Hastings and given a doubled sen-tence of from two to 30 years in prison, while his father was charged with attempting to tamper with

the jury at his son's trial.

A sentence of from one to years in prison was first imposed on Lorenz, after his conviction. He was returned to court, however, when officers discovered he had served a prison term in 1928 for grand larceny. Under the Minnesota habitual criminal act, his sen-

tence was doubled. Mrs. Tschida, a resident of St. Paul, was beaten to death after a drinking party at the Lorenz farm last July. Authorities captured Lorenz as he was driving toward Shakopee in a truck. The body was found in the rear of the truck, covered with branches from a tree.

Lorenz was charged with second

degree murder, but a District Court jury found him guilty of second de-

gree manslaughter.

The normal penalty for manslaughter is from one to 15 years in prison. Lorenz' sentence was doubled, however, because he had been

previously convicted of a felony.

Lorenz' father, August Lorenz,
was charged with contempt of court after the court had heard that the father had attempted to influence members of the jury. He is to appear in court tomorrow for a hearing.

them. When they reached the farm, Her face was punted up and it was both Lorenz and Mrs. Tschida had disappeared and they found the boy wandering in a nearby field, crying.

Immediately after discovery of the slaving, the boy could not be found and it was feared he might have been harmed. He later was found at the Luba home and taken to police headquarters where he was questioned as were Miss Nvgaard. Bambanek and James Fleming, another roomer at the Tschida home.

Juvenile officers said Thursday night that Mrs. Tschida was scheduled to appear today in juvenile court on a charge of neglecting her son.

H. E. Stassen, Dakota county attorney, announced Thursday night he had questioned Lorenz and obtained a full statement from him. admitting the killing. Lorenz, Stassen said, had signified his willingness to plead guilty to a murder charge. He will be held pending presentation of the case to the Dakota county grand jury when it convenes this fall, the county attorney said.
