





It claimed nearly a dozen reasons why his confinement in prison for a maximum of 80 years on a 1953 kidnaping charge violates his constitutional rights.

His feet chained and his wrists manacled during the 25-mile automobile trip, Lupino appeared in Judge Edward J. Devitt's court to press his claims that pre-trial publicity, judicial errors and other alleged irregularities during his trial should void his 80-year sentence for the kidnaping of Tony DeVito, St. Paul, then 24. DeVito allegedly was killed by Lupino and several others. Lupino has been in prisons in South Carolina, California and Minnesota the past 10 years in connection with the DeVito case.

After hearing arguments, Devitt was expected to take

the case under advisement. SDEC

The Minnesota Supreme Court Friday rejected another appeal from Rocco "Rocky"

Lupino, convicted of a St. Paul kidnaping 16 years ago.

Lupino c o ntended he was subjected t o d o u ble jeopard y because he was convicted on both kid-



naping charges Lupino in state court and on federal fugitive charges.

In a two-page, unsigned opinion, the high court reject-

ed the claim.

"It is clear that the two prosecutions in the present case were not for the identical act," the court said.

Lupino was charged in the disappearance of Anthony DeVito, alleged to have been kidnaped and murdered Sept. 28, 1953. His body was never found.

Lupino was sentenced to 80 years in prison on the kidnap charge and was given a five-year term for fleeing Minnesota to avoid prosecution.

Earlier appeals had been rejected by the Minnesota Supreme Court and the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Lupino's latest effort came under Minnesota's postconviction remedy law, a statute under which convicted persons get a second chance to raise appeal issues. SDEC

Rocco (Rocky) Salvatore Lupino, 55, was arrested at a north Minneapolis residence Wednesday atfernoon for alleged illegal possession of a firearm.

Lupino is on parole from Stillwater State Prison where he was serving a sentence for kidnaping since 1955 in the Tony DeVito case. DeVito's body still has not been found.

Joseph Walbran, assistant U.S. attorney in Minneapolis, said Lupino, who was arrested at about 5:30 p.m. by U.S. Treasury agents, will appear before a federal magistrate in Minneapolis today.

Walbran said Lupino will be charged under a federal law probibiting convicted felons from possessing firearms.

Rocky Lupino is found hanged in jail shower

The crime career of a Northeast Minneapolis police character ended Monday in a jail in Springfield, Mo., when the body of aging Salvatore (Rocky) Lupino was found hanged in his cell.

Greene County Coroner Dr. Erwin Busieck ruled the death a suicide. The body was found about 7:30 a.m. hanging from a sheet that had been fashioned into a noose and thrown over the top of a shower stall, according to Sheriff John Pierpont.

Lupino, 65, had been in the jail since Dec. 14, transferred there from the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners in Springfield. Busieck said Lupino was scheduled to return to Indiana sometime this week to face a murder charge in the May 1980 slaying in Crown Point, Ind., of a jeweler who had been carrying \$75,000 in gold jewelry.

Lupino's death ends a chapter in Twin Cities crime annals, punctuated by numerous arrests and court trials. His death is the second in about six months of principals in the 1953 disappearance of Tony DeVito from downtown St. Paul. The body of Tony Legato, a former St. Paul police character, was found last August in the trunk of a car in Chicago.

Legato was believed to be the finger man in DeVito's disappearance.

Lupino and Johnny Azzone, Minneapolis, were tried in 1958 in connection with DeVito's kidnapping and were found guilty and sent to prison after several appeals. Lupino later was paroled.

Lupino's record, dating to his youth, ranged from burglary and robbery to kidnapping and murder.

More often than not, authorities had to search for the elusive Lupino, who was adept at flight to avoid prosecution.

He was paroled in 1979 and returned to Northeast Minneapolis, where he lived with his sister until his parole was revoked for possession of a firearm.

Because DeVito's body was never found, Lupino never charged was in the murder, but Alex DeGoode of Detroit testified against Lupino and told a jury that DeVito was slain.

DeVito, Lupino, DeGoode and two others were arrested in South Carolina in the summer of 1953 for a supermarket robbery. All were charged in that crime, but DeVito and one other suspect signed statements.

It was alleged that DeVito was slain because the others involved thought he might testify against them. DeVito disappeared a week before the group was scheduled to go on trial in South Carolina.

Following Lupino's release from prison in 1958 after serving a term for the supermarket robbery, federal authorities charged him with unlawful flight in connection with DeVito's disappearance.

Lupino was sentenced to five years in Alcatraz, but was returned to St. Paul the same year to stand trial in Ramsey District Court for DeVito's kidnapping. He then was returned to federal prison to complete the unlawful flight term before beginning the term in Stillwater Prison on the state conviction for kidnapping.

He was released in June, 1979, then was sought in 1980 for a gambling offense. He and a compatriot were charged in December, 1980, with the slaying and robbery in May, 1980, of Giovanni Macaddino, 56, a jewelry salesman from Skokie, Ill.

Busieck said he had talked with Lupino's son, James, a Miami attorney, and expected the body probably would be shipped there for burial.

Era ends with Rocky Lupino's death

Salvatore Rocco Lupino, a career criminal who never sought notoriety yet gained it through his misdeeds, hanged himself Monday in a jail in Springfield, Mo. He was facing extradition to Indiana on a murder charge.

Lupino was 65 and had spent almost

half his life in prison.

Known as "Rocky" to cops and criminals alike, Lupino reached the peak of notoriety in 1962, when he was convicted in St. Paul for the 1953 kidnapping of criminal compatriot Anthony DeVito, and again in 1980 when he was indicted for the murder of an Illinois jewelry salesman strangled during a \$75,000 robbery.

Lupino was found hanging from a torn bed sheet that was fastened to a shower stall in the Greene County Jail, according to Sheriff John Pierpont.
"His feet were barely off the floor,"
Pierpont said.

Dr. Erwin Busiek, Green County coroner, said Lupino had been dead less than an hour when he was found by a jailer.

Lupino left a onepage, handwritten note that "indicated he intended to do this, that's all I can say," Busiek said. "It (Lupino's note) locks

up the decision that it definitely was a suicide."

A native of Northeast Minneapolis, Lupino was primarily a safe burglar who had a string of arrests that stretched from Minnesota to the southern United States. A Minneapolis police officer once remarked that Lupino's luck was good in Minnesota, but that it turned sour in the South.

What became known as the DeVito kidnapping case had its roots in the summer of 1953, when DeVito, Lupino and three pals were arrested in South Carolina for cracking a supermarket safe. All five men were charged with burglary, but DeVito and another man signed statements. During subsequent trials, it was alleged that DeVito — his body was never found — was slain because Lupino and others feared DeVito would testify against them.

DeVito disappeared on Sept. 19, 1953, while he, Lupino and the other men were awaiting trial on the burglary charges. A week before Lupino was to stand trial on that charge, he was arrested in South Carolina for two other burglaries.

Lupino was convicted of the South Carolina supermarket burglary and sentenced to five years. When he was released in 1958, federal authorities arrested and charged him with fleeing from murder and kidnapping charges in the DeVito abduction, which resulted in a five-year sentence. He was at Alcatraz for only 14 months when a Ramsey County grand jury indicted him for the DeVito kidnapping. Before starting a 2-to-80-year Minnesota term for kidnapping, he was returned to Alcatraz to finish the federal sentence.

"The record will show you what kind of guy he was," said Ralph Merrill, retired St. Paul detective lieutenant, and one of the men who investigated the DeVito kidnapping. Merrill, once assistant chief for the police depart-

ment's detective division, said, "The peculiar thing is that after he was arrested back in 1958, I thought there was some possibility he might go straight. But he was a member of a crime syndicate and he continued on in that vein; he wasn't about to be changed."

AT STILLWATER Prison, Lupino was the "old type of con who stayed to himself and didn't stir up trouble," said Capt. Chuck Ferrise, who is in charge of security at the prison.

"In the five years that I had him, he came to me once and that was when someone stole his wristwatch," Ferrise said. "He was really upset about it because he always left his cell open and everyone knew him and would not go into his cell."

Released from Stillwater Prison in 1971, Lupino was free for only two months when he was convicted of possessing a handgun, which meant nine more

years in prison.

Released Jan. 22, 1980, Lupino was free for seven months when a federal fugitive warrant for parole violation was issued.

NINE MONTHS later, Lupino was arrested in Chicago and authorities were again questioning him about a disappearance. This time it involved a jeweler from Skokie, Ill., whose body was found buried in a field in rural Kentucky.

Lupino and Raymon Clark Ferry, 34, eventually were charged with federal racketeering charges in that murder and robbery. Lupino gave a full account of the murder and robbery to a federal grand jury and was supposed to testify against Ferry but reneged on the deal. The federal charges were dropped but Lake County, Ind., authorities then indicted Lupino and Ferry for murder.

Last November, Lupino was transferred from the federal Metropolitan Correctional Center in Chicago to the Medical

Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Mo., where he was held until Dec. 14, when a federal parole violation sentence expired.

THE SAME DAY, Lupino was transferred to the Greene County Jail and Jack Crawford, chief prosecutor for Lake County, Ind., started extradition proceedings. On Jan. 22, the governor of Missouri agreed to hand Lupino over to Indiana authorities, and an extradition order arrived at the Greene County Jail last Saturday.

Lupino is survived by two daughters, Roxene Adler and Cherlyn Lawrence; a son, James, an attorney in Florida; five grandchildren; three sisters, Rose Lupino, Spasmina Hill and Anne Addington, and a brother, Anthony.

Funeral services will be at 8 p.m. today at the Washburn-McReavy Funeral Chapel, 2901 John St. N.E., Minneapolis. Visitation will be from 6 p.m. today at the funeral home.

Rocky Lupino found hanged in jail cell

Rocco Salvatore (Rocky) Lupino, a Minneapolis crime figure since the early 1930s, was found hanged Monday in the Greene County jail in Springfield, Mo.

Lupino, 65, had been transferred to the jail in December from the U.S. Medical Center for Federal Prisoners in Springfield. He was fighting a transfer to Indiana, where he was wanted for trial in connection with the killing of a jeweler.

A Greene County sheriff's deputy said Tuesday that Lupino was sharing a cell with four other prisoners, all felony suspects, when he died.

When his cellmates went to sleep about 1:30 a.m. Monday Lupino was "on his bunk, and he didn't have any conversation with anybody," said James Kitchell, chief deputy in the sheriff's criminal division.

At about 7:10 a.m., Kitchell said, one of the prisoners entered the cell's toilet and shower area, which was partitioned with a sheet.

"He went to use the toilet, and when he pulled back the sheet Lupino was hanging from the corner of the doorway," Kitchell said. He added that some thick books were found lying on the floor, suggesting that Lupino had stood on them and then kicked them aside.

Dr. Erwin Busieck, Greene County coroner, ruled it a suicide. But in a telephone call yesterday to the Tribune, a woman identifying herself as Lupino's daughter, Cheryl, said the family suspected foul play.

"We do not feel that he hanged himself," she said. "I want you to know what our feelings are, and we're going to look into this.'

She said the family had received letters from Lupino saying that "there was trouble down there." She declined to discuss Lupino's death further, and would not say from where she was calling.

Lupino, of northeast Minneapolis, first was arrested in 1933, and he spent most of the last 30 years in prison. He was reputed to have connections to the organized crime "syndicate," and by the 1940s Minneapolis police were calling him the city's "No. 1 police problem."

In 1958 Lupino and John Azzone were convicted of kidnapping in the disappearance of Tony DeVito, an informer whose body was never found. A witness at the trial said that the body had been buried somewhere in Washington County

In 1960 Lupino began an 80-year sentence at Stillwater State Prison for the DeVito kidnapping. He was paroled in 1971 and spent the last decade in and out of prison for parole violation and other charges.

"They had a slick gang," recalled Capt. Tom Whelan of the Minneapolis police department, who was a patrolman on the city's east side 30 vears ago.

"I used to see him on the beat," Whelan said last night. "He always said something like, 'Hello, officer.' He was a pretty classy guy."

Authorities suspected for years that Lupino ran a local burglary and safecracking operation. In 1960, during the kidnapping trial, Lupino at one point told a prosecutor, "I don't go in for robbing; for burglary I go."

Whelan said police believed the gang at one time had a radio that could monitor police calls, and they knew when roll call was, so "they could be sure that roving squad cars couldn't catch them in the act."

"We weren't speaking acquaint-ances," said Deputy Chief Leonard Brucciani, a patrolman in the early 1950s. "Rocky never gave me a hard time. He was on the other side of the law, that's all. I was leery of the guy.

"When I was a patrolman in the Fifth Precinct we had suspicions that he had something to do with some burglaries, but we could never prove

In 1953, Lupino's wife, Mae, told a reporter that Lupino was a good husband and father to their three children, and accused the police of harassing him.

After his parole in 1971 Lupino was convicted on federal gun charges and sentenced to nine years. In 1979 he was released again.

In 1980 Lupino and Clark Ferry of Hammond, Ind., were arrested in Chicago and charged in the killing of Giovanni Macaddino, 56, a jeweler from Skokie, Ill. Macaddino, who was carrying about \$75,000 worth of gold chains when he disappeared from a jewelry sale, was found dead on a Kentucky farm 11 days later.

Last year federal prosecutors in Hammond dropped the murder allegations against Lupino and charged him instead with robbery and related offenses in Maccadino's death.

Lupino: 'Why couldn't they leave him alone?'

When Rocky Lupino grew up in Dogtown, the name then for the Italian neighborhood of northeast Minneapolis, the juvenile court judge was the cop on the street. And the punishment was a kick in the butt.

It was Depression time, and just about everybody around that area was poor. Lupino and others were tough kids, but they were good sons.

They committed serious crimes, but they were good to their parents and later to their wives and children.

First Ward Alderman Walt Dziedzic can testify to Lupino's concern for his wife. When Dziedzic was a student at the College of St. Thomas, he got \$2 each time he delivered flowers to Mae Lupino on her birthday and wedding anniversary and other occasions. The flowers were from Rocky Lupino, who was in prison at the time.

Gang fights were common in Rocky Lupino's younger years. The dividing line was E. Hennepin Av. The enemy for the northeasters were those in southeast Minneapolis, and vice versa.

"It wasn't ethnic; it was territorial," a Minneapolis grain broker said Wednesday. He was a southeaster as a kid. The Italians and the Poles and the Irish in northeast fought side-byside against the Italians, Poles and Irish in southeast.

The street toughs then had rules. No

knives or guns. Just fists. Only sissies and crazies, as they called them, used weapons.

In those days, the cops knew the territory. They had street beats then, and they watched the tough kids grow up. Sometimes, as in the case of Lupino, they watched them grow into criminals.

Elmer Nordlund, former Minneapolis police chief and now captain of the second precinct (northeast Minneapolis), remembers the first time he saw Lupino. It was a strange sight.

"I was patrolling near Eighth and Chicago and I saw this car chasing some chickens," Nordlund said. "It was weaving around after them. I

stopped the car and there was Rocky behind the wheel."

In those days, there were residences in the area, and people who raised chickens. Some got loose.

There are those who doubt that Rocky Lupino, 65, hanged himself Monday in the Greene County Jail in Springfield, Mo. He was there fighting transfer to Indiana on robbery and other charges involving the slaying of a jeweler.

Lupino was in a cell with four felony suspects, who said they were asleep when it happened. Authorities said Lupino tore a sheet into strips, made a rope out of it and attached it to the corner of a doorway. He had apparently pited up some books to stand on, then kicked them out from beneath him.

Marge Mancino, of northeast Minneapolis, has trouble believing that:

"He was at our house in 1969 or '70 and I poured him a highball," she said yesterday. "It slipped through his hands and smashed on the floor. He apologized and said: 'I can't hold nothin' with my hands.' "She said he blamed it on arthritis.

Paith DeVito, a waitress at Marino's Cafe, 2205 Central Av. NE., also spoke of Lupino's hands. Her husband is a cousin of Tony DeVito, who was kidnapped in 1953 and who disappeared. His body never was found. Lupino was convicted of the kidnapping in 1959 and spent 11 years in Stillwater State Prison, one of several times that Lupino did time.

"Rocky's hands were bad," said Faith DeVito. "He'd been down at Mayo Clinic and everything. They thought for a while he had Lou Gehrig's disease, but they never did find out exactly what it was." Both wondered how a man with such hands could hang himself. A woman who said she was Lupino's daughter, Cheryl, told the Tribune the family suspected her father was killed. She said the family was going to look into it.

I met Lupino once in the early '50s, when I was a police reporter for the Tribune. He was in the office of Eugene Bernath, chief of detectives, now dead. Bernath called Lupino in a lot.

Lupino said hello to me, gave a short dissertation on how horribly the press misunderstood him, and then said to Bernath: "Let's get it over with, Gene. You list the jobs I'm supposed to have done, I'll deny it, and then we can go to lunch." The three of us went to lunch.

Northeast is different now. Most of the joints where Lupino and the others hung out are gone. Including the Bonfire at Broadway and Johnston St. N.E., a bar that Lupino was alleged to have owned.

Maple Hill Park, where the Dogtowners loitered a lot, is now called Beltrami Park, and gang fights are as scarce as warm days in January.

The family ties, however, still are strong northeast. As they were with Lupino. His mother, Jenny, a long-time widow with five children, said Rocky was a "good boy" just before she died about a year ago. She often called him the "baby of the family," and she never turned against him.

At the DeVito kidnapping trial in 1959, Jenny testified for her son. She gave him an alibi, saying he was with his family the night of the crime.

Lupino's wife, Mae, offered the same alibi, only she added two more days Before the trial, Mae Lupino gave an interview to the Tribune about her husband. She said their two daughters and son "adored" him. And, she said, "Rocky worships those children. I'm the one who had to discipline them. He spoiled them."

She showed pictures of the children and added:

"A lot of people have said I ought to leave him. Why don't I? Because he's so good to us. He pays all the bilis, does all the grocery shopping, buys all my meat. He never tells me where he goes when he goes out, but he's quiet and gentle around the house.

"Minneapolis' No. 1 hoodlum? That's a laugh. The cops made him what he is. Why couldn't they leave him alone?"

There was a lot of talk on Broadway in northeast Minneapolis yesterday. Much of it was about Rocky Lupino.

An elderly man waiting for a bus at Johnson St., about two blocks from where Lupino grew up, said: "Rocky was bad, I guess. And tough. But they were different times, you know..."


