Goff Wants Him Held

How to keep a convict in prison after his term has expired is the problem with which County Attorney Ed J. Goff is struggling.

Frank McCool, slayer of George Connery, Minneapolis policeman, in 1917, will be released November 17, after serving nearly 20 years of a 30-year sentence.

"McCool is too desperate a man

to be let free," Goff said.

He wants to prosecute McCool on a robbery charge, but doubts whether a conviction can be obtained because Frank Brunskill, former police chief and John Galvin, former detective inspector, who saw McCool rob Patrolman Connery of his gun before he killed him, have both died.

In addition to the murder of Connery, McCool, according to a confession he gave police, previously was implicated in the murder April 26, 1917, of Mrs. Alice McQuillan Dunn, estranged wife of a St. Paul teaming contractor.

McCool told police he was a lookout during the murder which was committed by Joseph Redenbaugh, and that both of them were in the pay of Dunn, who had conspired his wife's death. Dunn and Redenbaugh received life sentences for the crime.

He walked out of Stillwater prison's gates into the arms of 10 deputy sheriffs. Manacled, he was whisked to Ramsey county jail.

An hour after he saw the "out-side" for the first time in 20 years, he was arraigned on a murder charge—a charge accusing him of participating in the hired killing of Mrs. Alice McQuillen Dunn in 1917.

1917.

He had just completed a 20-year term for a part in the murder of Patrolman George Connery of Minneapolis April 24, 1917.

McCool was arraigned before District Judge John W. Boerner, accused of the Dunn murder. A

grand jury reindicted him yester-day. The arraignment was continues to give McCool time to ar-

range for an attorney.

When he left the prison, he left behind him two men against whom he appeared as a state witness. They are Joseph Redenbaugh, convicted in the Connery murder, and Frank Dunn, husband, who, Mc-Cool had testified, hired Redenbaugh and McCool to kill his wife.

Mrs. Dunn was stain as she lay

in bed beside her sister, Katherine McQuillen. McCool served as lookout while Redenbaugh stood above the two women and pulled the fatal gun's trigger.

M'COOL AWAITS

Hearing Set for Monday After His Arrest at Stillwater Gates.

In a cell at the Ramsey county In a cell at the Ramsey county jail to which he was taken after his release from Stillwater penitentiary earlier in the day, Frank McCool Wednesday night calmly awaited a hearing on charges of murdering Mrs. Alice McQuillan Dunn, wife of a St. Paul contractor 20 years are tor 20 years ago.

He was taken into Ramsey coun ty district court for arraignment, but because he had no lawyer Judge John Boerner set the hearing for Monday. Booked at the jail to await prosecution on the old charge in the Dunn slaying, Mcneither denied nor admitted the crime.

McCool, who was re-indicted in the Dunn murder case Tuesday to meet any technicalities that might arise, was brought from Stillwater during the day by Ramsey county authorities. He was released from the prison after serving 20 years for the murder of Patrolman George Connery on April 24, 1917.

The cold-blooded murderer and The cold-blooded murderer and bank robber of 20 years ago is now a mild-mannered and soft-spoken little man who blinked and gazed curiously at newspaper photoggrapher's paraphernalia during his few seconds of "freedom" before he was hustled away from Still-water to face the new charge.

He is charged with the slaying of Mrs. Dunn with the assistance of Joe Redenbaugh, a pal of McCool during his bank looting days, and Tacoma Johnny Doyle. Redenbaugh, Doyle and Dunn are serving life sentences in the Dunn murder. Two of the men, Redenbaugh and Doyle, are expected to be called as witnesses in the trial of McCool. witnesses in the trial of McCool.

Jail Mc Cool on Murder Charge

Associate Justice to Be Witness for 9 State

An associate justice of the State Supreme Court, a Ramsey county District Court judge and three former Minneapolis policemen will be among witnesses aga nst Frank Mc-Cool when he goes on trial for the murder of Mrs. Alice McQuillan Dunn, it was reported late today.

They were understood to be among the dozen persons who testified before the grand jury which reindicted McCool on the 20-yearold murder charge, which, earlier in the day, brought his arrest as he left Stillwater prison after serving 20 years for murder of Patrolman George Connery of Minneapolis.

Peterson May Be Witness

Harry H. Peterson, associate justice of the State Supreme Court. was first assistant Ramsey county attorney when McCool testified against Frank Dunn, St. Paul teaming contractor, who hired three gunmen to kill his wife. Judge Hugo Hanft presided at the trial. Both were believde slated as prosecution witnesses.

The former Minneapolis policemen understood to be scheduled by the state included Lewis Harthill, then Minneapolis police chief, and Charles Ziegler and F. X. Kort.

McCool was back in Ramsey county jail late today after being granted a stay of arraignment until Monday in order to give him a chanceto arrange for an attornev.

After brief further discussion, the judge thanked jury members for their services and dismissed

Murder charges against McCool should be dismissed, DeCourcy insisted after the jury was discharged.

DeCourcy was unsuccessful in attempting to wring a motion for dismissal out of James F. Lynch. first assistant Ramsey county attorney.

"In view of the fact the state has virtually admitted a promise of immunity to this defendant, and in view of the failure to agree, I think this case should be dismissed," DeCourcy said.

The jury in the murder trial of Frank McCool started out with a bare majority of seven against five for conviction, it was learned today. As deliberations progressed three jurors swung over to favor conviction, making it 10 to 2 and most of Wednesday the vote stood 11 to 1. The last vote could not be won over,

Apparently hopelessly deadlocked, the Ramsey District Court jury in the Frank McCool murder case was still out late today almost 48 hours after it received the case.

Judge John W. Boerner sent the jury back to its deliberations last night after jurors reported a deadlock. Since then no word has come from behind the jury room door.

The jurors deliberated until 11 p.m. yesterday, were then locked up for the night and resumed work today without giving any signs of being closer to agreement.

McCool Found Guilty; Given 7 to 30 Years

Connery Killer Convicted of Third Degree Murder in Dunn Case 1/10 12

The second jury to try Frank X. McCool for the slaving of Alice McQuillen Dunn today found him guilty of third degree murder. He was sentenced immediately to 7 to 30 years in prison.

His sentence came less than two morths after he stepped from Stillwater prison in November, at conclusion of a 20-year term for the murder of Patrolman George Connery, Minneapolis.

Upon his release from prison after serving for the Connerv slaving, McCool was arrested for complicity in the sensational Dunn ner fore reopening its inquiries into murder in St. Paul in 1917.

A jury which tried him last month on the new charge disagreed.

Jurors who heard the retrial received the case in Ramsey county District Court at 1 p.m. Saturday and returned with their verdict at 10 a.m. today-45 hours later.


