St. Paul Po Figure Slai and Shooting

Herman Paster, one-time Upper Midwest pinball machine boss, was shot to death Friday night as he sat reading a newspaper in his fashionable Highland park home.

Three bullets slammed through the window of Paster's den at the rear of his home, 1752 Pinehurst Av., about 7:35 p.m. One struck him in the head. The other two apparently missed, police said.

Twenty minutes later Paster, 57, died in an ambulance en route to Ancker hospital. St. Paul police said last night it was a gangland

murder.

Police Chief William Proetz said: "This killing reaches high into the circles of national crime.'

Paster, involved in a sensational slot machine case in 1954 which resulted in a twoyear prison term for him, had

returned home only a few minutes be-fore he was shot, police reported.

He and his brother-in-law



and partner,
Allen Nilva,
1830 Hillcrest
Av. had arrived at Wold-Chamberlain
airport, from Milwaukee, Wis., about 6:30 p.m. Paster's son Arnold, a high school student, met them at the airport.

Nilva was let out at his home, two blocks from Pas-ter's, and Paster and his son arrived at their home shortly after 7:15 p.m.

Paster, in his shirtsleeves, seated himself on a couch in the den, facing the window 10 feet away. There is an alley behind the house and neighboring homes on either

side are no more than yards away.

Paster's killer fired the three shots into the lighted room. The bullet holes in the glass were clustered within six inches of each other.


Police said they believed the slayer used a .38 caliber pistol, and that he may have stood on a small cement stairway leading to a porch near the den window or on a narrow sidewalk under the window.

feet from the ground, police said.

THE BULLET that caused Paster's death smashed into his right cheek, pierced his head and lodged in a wall.

His wife, Celia, and Arnold were hom e when he was killed. They called the ambulance and police.

Minutes later dozens of policemen, including Chief Proetz, were in the area. They roped off the yard as hundreds of spectators, attracted by sirens, milled around Paster's brick home.

Police searched for footprints or cartridge cases in the backyard.

THEY ALSO tried to find residents in the neighborhood who had heard the shots or seen the murderer.

Officers dug through the blanket of dead leaves over the yard and searched garbage cans in the area for the weapon.

The St. Paul fire department brought in a searchlight to aid in the search and officers went over the alley inchby-inch in an effort to find footprints.

Several neighbors said they heard "car backfires" at the time of the shooting. But police said last night they could find no one who had heard anyone running or had seen suspicious persons in the area.

Shortly after the slaying, St. Paul police were ordered to stand watch at Paster's office, Paster Enterprises, 2227 University Av.

Paster had served at least three terms in federal prisons — once for liquor black market activities during World War II and twice for illegal gambling device shipments during the 1950s. THE LIQUOR operation was said to be in league with Sammy Taran, who was described as the "king of St. Paul hoodlums" in the 1930s and '40s. Taran, now reportedly living in Miami, Fla., has for several years fought a federal order which seeks to deport him as an undesirable alien.

Paster was a nephew of

In 1952 Paster was charged with illegal shipment of pinball machines from Illinois and Iowa into Minnesota. At the time he was president of Mayflower Distributing Co., 2227 University Av., St. Paul.

He was found guilty in St. Paul federal court and sentenced to two years in prison. The case was in the courts until late 1954. Paster's attorney claimed that the law under which he was convicted was unconstitutional.

THE APPEALS were lost and Paster became an inmate at the Leavenworth, Kan., prison.

At the same time Paster's appeals were in higher courts he was involved in another gambling device case.

Paster and the attorney general of North Dakota, Elmo T. Christianson, were charged with conspiracy to bring gambling machines into North Dakota. Both were found guilty in Bismarck federal court in April 1954.

They began a series of appeals and went to the United States supreme court where they were denied a hearing. All appeals were denied subsequently, and both were ordered to serve their prison terms.

PASTER WAS sentenced to two years and fined \$10,-

Also involved in the North Dakota case was Nilva. He was sentenced to a year and a day in prison for contempt of court in connection with the trial.

Last year he was barred from practice before federal courts.

After release from prison

the second time, Paster returned to St. Paul and began a new operation, Paster Enterprises, 2227 University Av., St. Paul.

This was basically a real estate operation and the firm reportedly owns a number of shopping centers in the Twin Cities area.

IN 1959 Paster and his wife were involved in a dispute with federal tax officials. Internal revenue agents claimed the couple owed \$57,827 back taxes and penalties for 1952 through 1955.

The Pasters also protested a government claim that they owed \$20,250 in taxes during 1947 to 1950.

About a year ago, police reported a plot to bomb Paster's new offices. A dynamite charge was found in the mail box of the building. It was discovered before it blew up.
