

Introduction

This was the year we visited the old Skartvedt and Brorby homes near Decorah, Iowa; and I supervised the construction of a retaining wall at Fish Creek, Montana, in October and November. I had three trips to the Coast, and helped make the Eastern District fall bridge inspection.

For the pictures I used mostly the 2/4×3/4 Voigtlander that I got last year. Then, this year, I got an old 3/4×4/4 Graflex. I made a small dark room in part of the coal bin and mounted my enlarger there. I also got a Weston exposure meter, a letter press and a 10 paper cutter.

I completed the pictorial part of this book early in 1935, without any narratives or frontispiece. The pictures were somewhat out of sequence. Most of them had been mounted with library paste and pressed flat before binding; but towards the end I used some rubber cement which eventually stained the prints, and came loose. So, in 1958 I remounted, reprinted and rearranged, as needed, and added narratives. For the remounting, I used Borden "Elmer's" white asset glue. A bookbinder put on the cover, after I stitched the pages, in 1935.

January 1934

I reached home the 4th after brief reinspection at Vakima and Missoula. Then I was busy a couple of weeks writing reports, in the office, and making photos of the washouts, in the dark room. I also completed a picture for Allan Siems, collected \$100 and got an order for another.

The weather in St. Paul was the best kind of winter weather, 10° to 20°, calm, some pale sunstine. The children, on skis, skates and toboggan, tried to make up for the winter months they'd missed in Seattle. We took a couple of hikes along the river and on its ice. I helped build a snow fort, and then Billy built one right across Mrs. Holman's front walk. The 20th, the thermometer was up to 45°.

Then Mr. Clements sent me to Seattle again, to join Mr. Blum in Car 12 for a post-flood inspection. For a week I had a bedroom on the car. In Portland, Sam Murray of the O-W. entertained us with some of his best yarns. We saw the Orofino Branch as far as the first big washout. Sunday the 28th was a big day in Missoula. First, I walked out to Bridge 4 & inspected the Howe trusses. Then Erickson showed us how well his electric refrigerator cooled beer. Then we drove to a doctor friend, in Stevensville who obligingly opened a bottle of whiskey, (medicinal, of course) then Blum served dinner to Erickson, Superintendant Johnson and me, with a different wine with each course. I was paralyzed, but could still tell who was soberest.

At Wallace, a couple of days later, I left Car 12 and went to Spokane to arrange further inspection of the swrecked Orofino Branch.

While in Portland I had an evening with Uncle Tom and Aunt Lillian Keeney.





The month began with a strenuous walking inspection of the much-washed out Orofino Branch with High Tremaine, Jim Baldwin, and two packers. We stopped overnight in a goldminer's cabin. From Pierce we drove to Orofino, and I was home the 5th, met at the depot by Bertha.

The rest of the month I wrote washout reports and estimates, made photos to accompany them, began estimating the renewal of a big section of the Superior one dock trestle, & drew up a joint-facility maintenance contract with the M.& St. L. The 16th, at Duluth, Denny Fairchild drove me across the Bay on the ice and was annoyed because his car wouldn't go into a spin when he made it skid!

After the spring weather out west, 20° above seemed cold but by the 11th it had turned warmer and the snow soon vanished. Towards the end of the month it dropped to a little below zero: as usual, this brought car trouble. For that reason our planned anniversary—a downtown movie and a dance at the Masonic Temple, didn't materialize.

I reduced the coal bin by a third and started building a darkroom in the space vacated - a very dirty job. Other photographic news: I bought, second hand, a $3\frac{1}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ Graflex camera and a ten inch metal paper-trimmer. Thousand Dennis was out a couple of times showing me how to use the Graflex.

We saw a few movies, danced at the Auto Show and attended a St. Olaf Choir concert.



BILLY ON THE RIVER JANUARY

March 1934

No extended trips: an inspection in Minneapolis one day, another in Northtown, a day in Mandan in the coaldock half a day in Duluth. The 13th-14th at the A.R.E.A. convention in Chicago with Peterson. Saw some camera stores & tried

night photography unsuccessfully.

The weather was springlike at first, trying to rain, then froze, dropped to 2° above, went up to 54°, then freezing with occasional light snow until the 30th when we had a 5 inch snow-storm (Peggy shoveled the walks.) Perhaps because of the changeable weather Bertha had a very severe cold, lame back and ton-silitis and then Billy had a couple of trips to the doctor, with swollen neck glands. During the mild weather Ibegan to spend most of my noon hours walking.

In the office my most interesting project was making sketches suggesting architectural treatment of the proposed Minnesota. Transfer Ry. bridges over University Avenue (a suggestion of mine

was used)

Donothy arrived from Tacoma the 11th and stayed on with us. I went to two camera club meetings. Jack Phillips and his wife, Thornton Dennis and Wilbur Nelson were active. Kenneth Wright, the speaker at one meeting, did not impress me. We saw a good pictorial exhibit from Milwaukee.

Homework included a bridge picture for Allan Siems's office,

near completion of my new dark room.

The 10th, Ekbergs and Petersons were here for bridge. The 26th, I bruised myself and scared Bertha and Billy, by falling down stairs in the middle of the night.

April 1934

I spent the month in the office - except for a trip to Sartell one to Northtown, - and the night of the 29th I went to Fargo to inspect the turntable at Dilworth and the ties on the Valley City viaduct, getting home May 1st. Office work was mostly on the bridge list and locomotive ratings.

The First was Easter. Bertha and I to Plymouth Church. The children had two live Easter chicks.

2nd, bought a letter press. Camera Club in evening.

4th, back yard's a lake.

7th, Fullers and Harold Peterson played bridge with us.

8th, moved enlarger into new dark room.

11th, brief snowstorm.

4th, to Grandview theater.

17th, to Camera Club with Phillipses, Dull program.

18th, raked leaves. Every one's cleaning up yards.

21st, Arthur and Mollie over this evening,

22nd, drove to parks, looking for a golf driving practise place, 28th-29th, removed kitchen radiator and book up the linoleum.

This month, I bought a Weston exposure meter.

This was a very hot, dry month- a record-breaker, I believe..
80° to 90° right along, and the 31st it went to 106.4°. Garden required a good deal of care, including reseeding a good deal of the lawn. Peg

and Bill were my willing helpers.

In the office, I put in some time tracing plans of the University Avenue Minnesota Transfer bridges. Then, I drew up some engine—rating charts, was in Duluth the 24th, and the 28th I began inventorying tracks crossing University Avenue in the Transfer Yard. This was a good hot weather job because we could get a drink of ice water every time we passed the office, and could take a shower at the Midway YMCA, very near by, at the end of the day.

Dorothy was with us all month. She was feeling well and began

to look for work.

Social life: We went over to Arthur and Mollie's the Fifth...
The 6th, Mrs. Clay, Donna and Richard, called, back from a visit to Atlanta. Tetricks were over, the 12th. Last PTA meeting the 16th. An evening picnic at Minnehaha Park the 19th. Smiths, Mannerses, Trygve Johnsons, Featherstones and Mrs. Peterson and girls were there, Fullers gave us a ride in their motor boat, on the Minnesota River, the 20th.

On Bertha's birthday, the 23rd, we went to the Paramount Theater with Dorothy and Billy, then had cake at home. Next day, Bertha's girl friends gave her a surprise party.

A family evening picnic and swim at Nokomis the 29th.

I was home the 30th, a holiday, saw the memorial service at Summit and River Drive, went for a swim and ate dinner on the back terrace with Mrs. Clay, Mrs Peterson and their children.

In removing the old kitchen linoleum, I got a finger infected, and as a result I had to spend two nights in the N.P. hospital.







The first half of the month I was working in the Transfer yard, except for the 11th and 12th, when I was in Winnipeg, inspecting Midland Railway structures. The old Assiniboine Howe truss bridge took the most time. Weather in St. Paul continued hot and dry until the 13th. Then showers brought cooler weather. Second half month I was in the office making estimates & engine ratings, till I left, the 25th, for Missoula and Spokane. By motor car from Lind to Pasco with Art Ainslie. Saw Eddie Hanson on the train, enroute to Seattle where Saturday the 30th I saw Stotler, Curtiss, Herider, George Hopkins and all the drafting room friends. Also out to see the Skartvedts-mother, Agnes and Norman. (Elmorès up on the Alaska Railway and father was in South Dakota.)

Father Skartvedt came to the church convention. When that was over, Bertha, Dad and I drove to Iowa for a three day trip to visit relatives, and see father's and mother's birthplaces and other family landmarks. Mother's cousin Jens Bilden kept us for the two nights we were away. Weather was fine. Dorothy was at home with kids....


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On our drive up the Marine road, the 30th, we took turns driving the car ahead, then getting out and walking.

I was in St. Paul only the first nine days: Merle Carman arrived by motorcycle the 1st, to attend the University. We had a birthday surprise party for Tryg Johnson, with Smiths and Mannerses, the 6th. I was on terminal bridge inspection the 5th. 6th and 8th.

I left for Missoula the 9th, went out to Fish Creek viaduct and finding the situation satisfactory, went on to Seattle. On the train I visited with Andrew Gibson, who told me the very interesting story of how he started with the N.P. in 1883.

At Seattle I heard that my old friend Springer had had a stroke. I was at Adamses overnight and spent Sunday with Skartvedts. I saw Aunt Mamie Handsaker: she is feeble and discouraged, I was also at Hopkinses, with Freemans.

Back in Spokane the 15th, I got a sizzling message from Mr. Clements. He disagreed with my conclusions at Fish Creek, & ordered me to go there and stay until a concrete wall was built along the creek.

I lived with Jim Deeny's gang, but I had a room to myself, in the commissary car. We were on a siding next to the main line, and mile-long freight trains went by, every hour or so, but after the first night I never heard'em, snug in my feather-bed... Mrs. Deeny cooked, and meals were good. Scenery's fine, all along between Rivulet and Fish Creek, and my inspection duties left me time for a little exploration. I was still there at the end of the month.

I was with Jim Deeny's outfit at Rivulet, Montana when the month began, and didn't get home until the 21st. In October we only got the equipment and material assembled at Fish Creek, and a start on excavation. By the 3rd we had poured the concrete footing of one end section and by the 10th it was all above water and the shaft was going up. The 5th and 6th, Espeland and I made a motor car inspection trip to Paradise and back. to Rivulet; and, the 12th, I left for Spokane and Tacoma, where Paul Simpson went with me to Kelso, to see Curtiss's bridge job. I saw my old college friend Sam Demoss at Longview. Seattle the 16th (evening at Hopkinses,) and east to Ellensburg and Yakima to inspect two bridges. I stopped over at Fish Creek, finding the work nearly done, so I returned to St. Paul.

Rest of the month: The 24th we went to a dinner-dance at Ancient Landmark (80th anniversary.) The 26th, Henry Davidson started working in our office. We're very busy with a big Federal grade separation program. The 29th was Thanksgiving—Day. Home all day. Had neglected to get a turkey, so we had chicken. We had a blizzard the 30th; snowed all day and by night, street car service was demoralized and it took me an extra hour to get home.







Beginning with the snow from the blizzard of Nov. 30, we had 18 inches more on the 3rd, and fresh snow the 18th, 20th and 31st; and it never got warm enough to melt. Five below the 7th; 12° below on Christmas and 19° below, the 26th. Our Studebaker didn't like to start and 1 got some exercise with the crank, usually in vain. But Merle Carman did most of the shoveling. The kids love winter, they frequently went to-bogganing. Spangenbergs had a hill for the neighborhood, but it was disused after an accident, the 16th.

I enjoyed the weather, too, and got out with Peggy and Billy when I could. Betsy was usually up to something with her schoolmates. I had two attacks of "flu" which made me so weak and drowsy that I went to bed, the 7-8-9th, and 18-19-20th.

The 15th, Saturday, we all met at 12:30, and while Betsy shopped with Bertha, Peg, Bill and I shopped." We hunted up all the store Santas, saw Santa's Theater in Schuneman's, had a 20¢ turkey dinner at Scott's and rode home on the street car without buying a present. My Christmas preparations did not get off to a good start, and I sent only a few cards. Put up the tree the 22nd, wrapped gifts and filled the children's stockings Christmas eve, and got our gifts Christmas morning, Arthur and Mollie had us all for Christmas turkey dinner.

We were at a dinner party at Rev. Elwicks of Plymouth, the 5th. To the Grandview once. Party at Beans the 15th. George, Margaret and Sally Hopkins were here for just one evening, the 20th (were visiting Looms at Brainerd.)

I did a lot of dark room work.






