

did not add to my collection of cameras in 1940: in fact, the only new equipment was a better projection screen, and a Kalart syn-Ehm-flash outfit Which was used only once or twice this year My colored pictures were taken With the Compur-Leica; the others with the 21/4 x 31/4 Kawee and the 15/8 x 21/2 Ihagee The prints are nearly all on Velour Black I The tinted ones have been steamed to increase their luster.... As indicated in the footnotes, I experimented with several kinds of adhesives ...

Postscript 25 years later:—
As I noted in the 1939 volume, this book too had fallen apart from the use of rubber cement, and in 1965 I made it over, using white casein glue. Style, same as before, but sequence improved, monthly summaries added, and a few 1940 pictures not in the original volume.

The great and tragic world event of '40 was the conquest of most of Europe by the Nazis. The redection of Roosevelt was our national calamity. Our greatest personal loss was the death of Arthur Savold Nov. 11 (the day of our record breaking blizzard) An event of interest was the fall of the Tacoma Narrows bridge November 7th Home events included the building of an extension on the kitchen which made room for the Norge refrigerator which we got at the end of the year. Family travels included Bertha's visit to Seattle in January, a drive to Itasca Park in June and the usual Sunday trips, most noteworthy being a trip around Lake Pepin on Oct. 13. My railroad travels included three trips to the Coast, three others as far as western Montana and a couple of dozen shorter trips. ... Bill got his dog at last; I had my first airplane ride, Le Moyne graduated and got a job; Agnes Mills visited us a week in March, Dorothy a couple of weeks in July and Elma about two weeks in October Most of these events are reflected in the pictures on the following pages,



We were all here at home, including. Cemoyne Carman. He was in his fourth year at the U., Betsy in her second. We had a backyard rink for the children, JANUARY and I had meetings of the Cubs in the basement. Moynie, Betsy and Bill Hennon went skiing, the 7th. We had some zero weather, then heavy snow the 11th. Berthas stomach bothered her, but she was recovered by the 15th when she went to Seattle because of her father's severe illness I worked in the office, mostly on bridge and culvert work summaries, until the 22nd. Going west, I stopped over a day in Bismarck, between trains in Missoula, then to Spokane and Sand Point; there I walked on ice most of the length of the long bridge. The week-end of 27th and 28th, I was with the family. Bertha's father was nearly well; Elmas family, Lola and Mart, and Agnes, visiting from Alaska, and Norman's family The 30th, I was at Astoria, inspecting the old Young's Bay drawbridge with Curtiss and Gerst



FEBRUARY 1940

First fifteen days, I was out west: around Seattle, Tacoma & Puyallup the first week inspecting bridges & turntables, but getting visits with Bertha's folks, Ama and Ralph, Hopkinses, Curtisses, Aunt Alice and others, Bertha shared in the visiting, but started back to St. Paul the 4th. I was driving to Adrian & Coulee Dam with Tom Stang the 8th-9th; Missoula the 10th; Lewiston & vicinity, 11th-12th; then Billings 2 days and home The next week I was fighting a very bad cold We had a visit from Herbert & Ethel Beers, three days There was a well attended Cub dinner at Plymouth Church the 22nd. We spent evenings at Arthur & Mollie Savold's and Mannerses -Bob has built a model railway clear around his basement A one-day trip to Duluth the 26th

My work at the office was preparation of AFE" estimates for authorizing bridge work, and making a list of weak steel bridges to be inspected regularly Weather, mostly bad: melting, freezing, iced-up walks and two big snow storms Tome work, a lot of photography & work on this book; planning an enlargement of the kitchen for the electric refrigerator we intended to buy; and Cubs. They met regularly, and there was a Pack meeting Bertha & I attended a smorgasbord with Danish folk-dancing, at the Pillsbury Settlement House, Mpls, the 9th.... 

APRIL 1940 Mostly very good spring weather, with a fair amount of rain. I was in St. Paul except for two quick trips: Mandan, 2nd3rd; Duluth, 25th- 26th In the office, I was making charts showing bridges & engines by districts..... Didn't feel very well, the first week; Bertha had a severe cold, too..... Betsy was initiated into IIB\$\Phi\$, the 7th... I raised Peg's allowance to a dollar a week, and Bill's to 40 cents....... Other family news: to Hertsgaards, 14th; Owenses here 23rd with Mrs. Stang, 23rd; to Ericksons, 21st; saw two movies, continued looking at refrigerators; I did quite a lot of darkroom work, including railroad pictures.....



Railroad travels: St Croix Howe trusses at Rush City, the 4th, (Bertha & I drove up & had a picnic, too;) two trips to North Dakota, the 10-11th and the 15th-17th; Duluth the 23rd, and western Montana the 24th 30th. One of my errands on the latter trip was to look at a pumpcrete tunnel lining job on the Milwaukee.

Most of my spare time at home was spent in trying to get the refrigerator corner completed, before winter, but we had time for a drive to Northfield the 6th, and Lake Pepin and Winona the 13th; beautiful fall color on both trips; & to Lake Minnetonka the 20th. 



The first half of the month I had the "flu," losing some time at the office. Shoveling snow after the record-breaking blizzard of the 11th didn't help any. The rest of that week was vacation; I tried to work on my refrigerator cupboard but couldn't get much done.

My collision, Oct. 31 at St. Clair & Prior cost \$45 in car repairs. We had the car back in time for Arthur Savold's funeral the 15th.

I was at Red Lake Falls the 6th-7th and left for the West, the 26th, to make extensometer tests on the Columbia River bridge at Pasco. Delay in getting a locomotive gave me time to visit friends and relatives in Seattle and Puyallup again.

Thanksgiving Day was the 21st. We all ate turkey at home, and had Mollie

Savold with us.


