



SUMMARY OF THE YEAR

NINETEEN FORTY TWO was the first full year of the war... We were fighting at sea and in the air against the Japs, and building up an army in England. We lost the Philippines: Bill Hennon and a few others escaped from Bataan and retreated, fighting, to Australia. The Battle of the Coral Sea in May was the first good news. Bill came home in October and won Betsy's consent to an early wedding next year.

I did some more back yard work, built a concrete back porch step & a stone wall and rubbish burner. Bill and his pals finished the tree-shacle.

JANUARY:

A very mild month. Spring-like weather, as shown in the picture opposite; the biggest Ice Palace, in Highland Park, melted so that it had to be abandoned and on the 22nd the temperature reached 52°.



There was a fatal fire in the Athletic Club annex on the 9th. The Scouts visited the University observatory the 19th; I saw Saturn and his rings. Betsy had a phone call from Bill Hennon in Java the 28th. I tried to set up a portrait studio to practice on the folks, but their patience gave out. The Winter Carnival parade occurred the 24th, & the night parade the 28th. Bertha and I took a few dancing lessons.







The 2nd, we attended the Festival of Nations at the Auditorium: a unique civic pageant. Early in May the naval Battle of the Coral Sea was reported, the first hard jolt to the Japs. Peggy visited Grinell College. Bill and his gang worked on the tree shack. I spent several evenings at Groveland School helping Miss Smith enroll sugar rationers. I relaid some bricks in the terrace, built the new concrete back porch step and moved the railing, getting everything almost neat for Bertha's party the 14th. That was also the day of the University Cap-and-Gown parade. Betsy being in it, I played hookey and attended. We had a picnic on our terrace with Perkinses on the 23rd, and there were no mosquitoes. Bertha got her plants at the Garden Club sale the 22nd and I had work to do for a week, setting them out. My only railroad travels were a quick trip to Bismarck the 15th and a drive to Big Lake with Art and Mrs Ainslie the 28th, but we took a family trip to Bayport the 24th and ate at White Pine Inn. It was the end of a weekend overnight trip for Bills troop; we were supposed to bring some of the boys home, but got to their camp too late. On the 31st, the British in a huge air raid nearly destroyed Colognesis.







Spent my noons pretty regularly at the second hand book stores On the 9th we visited Fullers' new summer home on the south shore of White Bear Lake. See opposite. On the 14th I was in Duluth: ore dock, turntable -- and steel engravings. From the 15th on, my spare time was taken up in building a new stone rubbish burner, fireplace and wall at the back gate..... On the 19th the British invaded Dieppe for a raid (See above) It seemed like the real invasion. had started, at first

I was in Grand Forks the morning of the 2nd; Ainslie & I rode a motor car to Brg 70, Red Lake Falls & back. Home that night, on GN sleeper. Another quick trip, to Rush City & the old St Croix trusses, the 9th. And I started west on No. 1 the 11th. Straight thru to Portland, Mrs Bjorklund & son, also Adolph Menjou and Walter Pidgeon were on board. Train 2hrs late morning of 13th, so I saw all the scenery from Wishram to Portland without getting up early. Visited Tom, Jane, Howard & children: & Lillian, who had pleurisy. Next day, to Vancouver to look at rail locks. Seattle 15th: Freemans for supper, Lucky to get in Frye Hotel - town's crowded, a can't even reserve an upper on train. The 16th, to South Tacoma & back with Ornburn, driving, supper at Elma's, and on train to Spokane. The 18th, on #2 with Ornburn, to Thompson Falls. With Walt Stalnaker to look at contractor's very slow work on falsework piers. At Missoula 19th, & on in on *2 when I couldn't arrange an inspection trip with Footer On the way east we took siding at Sunny for Roosevelt hush-hush special. Home, heard that Beach is no better and intends to retire. Rest of month, at home and office except the 30th in Duluth, at the drawbridges. Weather the last 10 days was chilly, with raw winds, a snow flurry the 24th (none stayed on the ground) frost the 25th, snow & sleet on the 26th, broke branches and wires. I started to build my stone burner again, but weather interfered. In my travels I visited old book stores, got more steel engravings, and spent some time cataloguing and mounting them,



Home from Duluth the 1st. Went to Minnehaha Falls the 4th-Sunday, with Bets & Peg for autumn views Indian Summer was beautiful. The 11th, we picnicked on Minneapolis River Drive: see opposite. The 18th, we took Ama, who arrived the day before, on a drive to Forest Lake, Scandia and Marine. Peggy got her bid to Pi Phi-her first choice- the 10th. I took a couple of vacation days to do fall home chores, and also worked on my back yard stone fireplace, Then on the 19th I left for Butte, taking the bus from Logan, Met Footer; on motor car to the viaducts, where I really had to work: my assistant is not a climber. I took No. 2 to Bozeman overnight; then to Helena, where Murray Brown helped survey the turntable. I got an upper on 2 for my return trip, with Safety Supt. Flanagan on board. Home night of 24th. Rest of the month on routine office work; had freezing weather. Spent the 28th in bed - just a lazy cold that made me weak. Betsy got a phone call that day, - from Bill Hennon, in San Francisco on his way home. He arrived in Manneapolis, the 30th, and General Mills gave Betsy a raise to \$125 and the afternoon off. Bill's a war hero, but the same unspoiled kid he was before he left the University.





The first half of the month was good hunting weather. Bill Hennon, back from hunting Japs, kept us supplied with pheasants. He took all Betsy's spare time and a good deal of mine, for I copied a whole album of Philippine pictures taken by a friend who was killed in the first Jap attack. Betsy decided to marry Bill, and it may be Christmas. Bill went on duty at Spring field, Mass. Aside from Bill's pictures, I worked on paving around the stone burner with broken sidewalk tile, and cut down the east plum tree. (it was mostly dead) ~ I had a touch of lumbago, and Bertha had one day flu and wasn't quite over it by Thanksgiving, It was a white day—snow fell the 25th. We had Mollie,

and two of Betsy's General Mills girl friends, for guests. I did not go out of town for the N.P., but I spent a couple of days at Comolat with Clycle Smith, making concete test specimens (Stontite.) My principal office job was revising bridge restrictions. ~ Saw Beach at the Hospital. The 30th I was in Millwaukee in the morning and in Chicago, afternoon and evening; I was looking for steel engravings. ~



My office work was routine, budget, engine restrictions; at home, I made a Christmas card featuring Betsy as a little tot, in anticipation of her wedding and departure. On Christmas eve we went to Aldriches' open house, then to Ralph Smith's wedding reception, then to church, It was a white Christmas season, with fresh snow daily. The Hennons called, the 27th, to get acquainted before the wedding We ordered Betsy's sterling silver.


