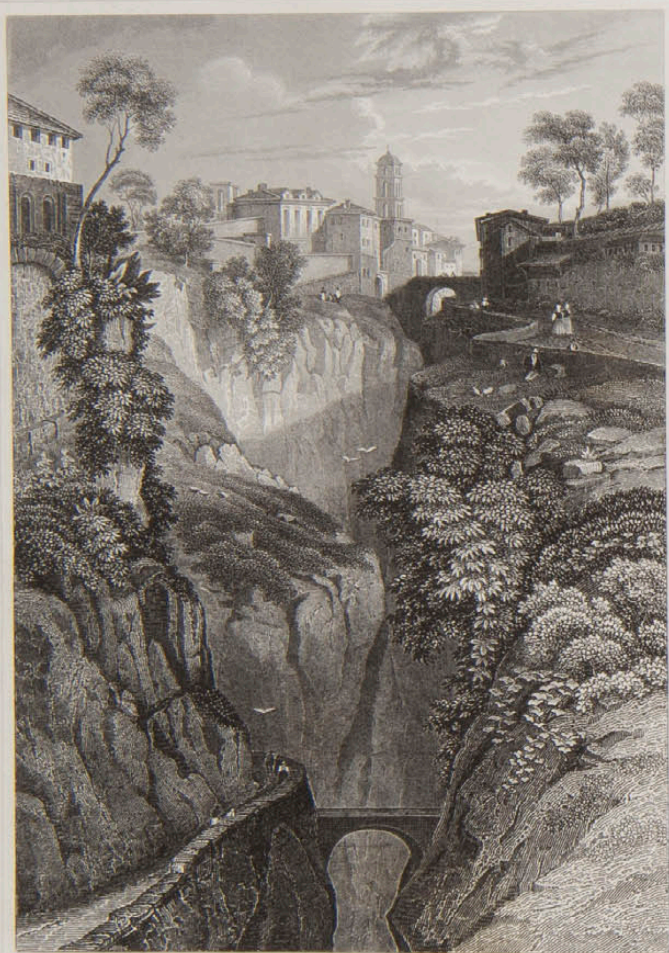

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR

NINETEEN FORTY TWO was the first full year of the war.. We were fighting at sea and in the air against the Japs, and building up an army in England. We lost the Philippines :!!!! Bill Hennon and a few others escaped from Bataan and retreated, fighting, to Australia. The Battle of the Coral Sea in May was the first good news. Bill came home in October and won Betsy's consent to an early wedding next year.

My travels began in March with a trip to Missoula and another to Seattle. In May, two short trips and in June, after seeing Betsy, Peggy and Bill's graduations, I went west for over a month; Bertha and Peggy came to Seattle, and Mart and Lola treated us three to a trip to Victoria :!!!! (Betsy stayed home with a job at the U.) In August I had 2 short trips & a 10-day trip to the Coast. I inspected the ^{line} Butte viaducts in October and had another trip to the Coast the first half of December.

I did some more back yard work, built a concrete back porch step & a stone wall and rubbish burner. Bill and his pals finished the tree-shade.

JANUARY:

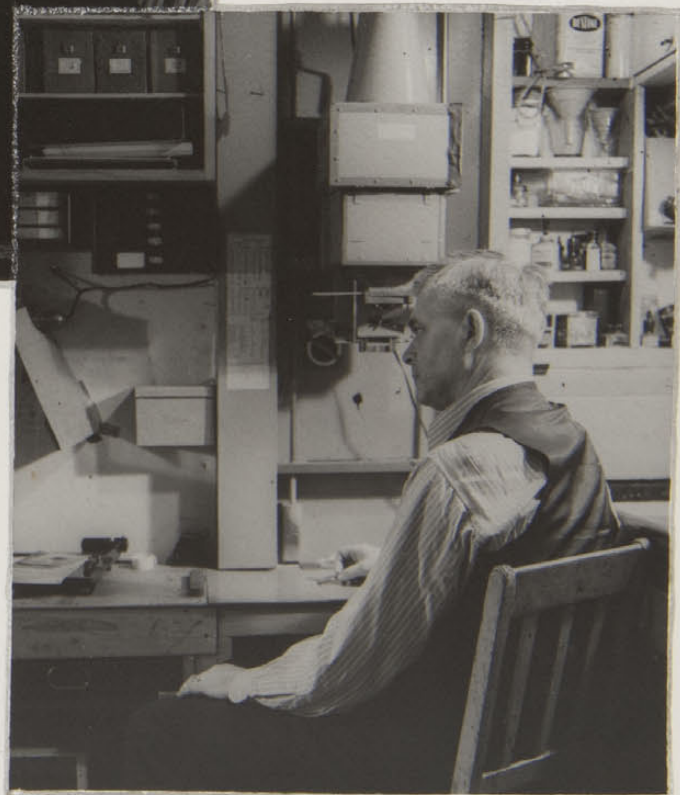

It was the end of a weekend overnight trip for Bill's troop; we were supposed to bring some of the boys home, but got to their camp too late. On the 31st, the British in a huge air raid nearly destroyed Cologne.
