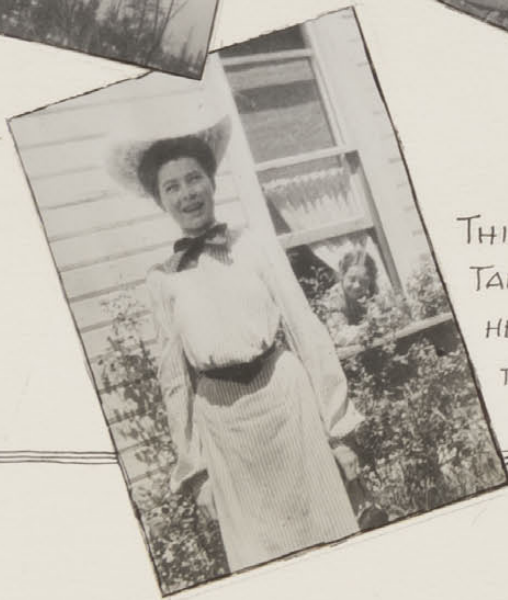

Nineteen Four: Fifty years ago.

I was in the second half of my junior year at High School, becoming a Senior in the fall. Our gang's ties were strengthened by our hand published "Cotidianus Puckus," which soon became a weekly to which we all contributed. When others started the S.S.M. as a joke, we took it over and had our name.

I took many walks, both in the woods and on city streets, using my new pedometer and a pocket compass to map roads. Skunk Hollow and the School section wilderness were being invaded by houses; Mentzer's mill and its tracks were entirely removed. The woodsy block behind our alley was cleared for a cow pasture.

In the rainy season I had my usual troubles - colds, tonsilitis, fever. Papa was in the hospital four weeks in April and had two shorter sessions there. Mama was never well, but kept on her feet even when really ill, in November.

In March I spent a week with Mr. J.E. Grant in a construction camp at Hope, Idaho. In June I went to work in Gus Stotler's maintenance party, mostly setting track centers between Tacoma & Portland. Nearly 3 months at \$35 a month and a dollar a day expense allowance.

Thanksgiving and Christmas feasts were at Grandpa's, next door, with Uncle Lester's family and Uncle Maurice, too, and, at Christmas, Uncle Theodore and Aunt Mamie were over from Yakima. During the year, cousins George Handy, Maggie Horner and Leona McDonald made long visits.

Photographically, I took my snap shots with a $2\frac{1}{4} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ Brownie box camera; developed and printed my own films, together with papa, who took some good family portraits with his 4x5 focusing Bulls-eye Special box camera. Non-curling films were introduced this year.

10. Sun. Walked to Shadow Falls with Bill. 0° to 10°; north breeze, mostly dull.
11. Tonight Bill & I to depot expecting Norman & Agnes returning; they did not stop.
12. Drove to Stillwater with Riley. Minimum 15° below; 5° below yesterday, to 0°.
13. Started tallying Form 134. Got the new suit. 10° to 18° above.
14. Revising bridge list, tallying F. 134. 18° above; 2" of fresh snow last night.
15. Estimate for filling Norwegian Gulch bridge. Raw, cloudy.
16. Saturday - at home, some work on '53 album 15°-20° below zero.
17. To church. Mollie Savold, & John Keppel here for dinner. Minus 24° last night.
18. Dick Pepper died unexpectedly yesterday. 12° to 20° above.
19. Tallying last Form 134. Packed up for New Orleans. Colder.
20. Morning Zephyr, and Panama Ltd. Blizzard and zero this morning?
21. New Orleans, Committee 29, boat ride for women. O'Briens bar tonight. 77° and damp
22. Inspection bus trip, lunch at Arnau's. Early to bed. Frost threatened tonight.
23. Old cemetery; Audubon Park with Brueske, waterfront. Bedroom on Panama Limited.
24. Chicago 9:30 to 3 - to Rosenwald Museum. Home on the "400". Nearly frosty in Chi...
- 25-26. Back to office & Form 134. Dull, 10° to 14°. Missed 14° below while down South.
27. Bertha and I saw "The Robe" in wide screen. Late home supper. Weather unchanged.
28. My first deacons' meeting. Saw Dr. Edwards about new glasses. 20°-25°, cloudy.
29. Started on Mullar Tunnel estimates. Lee's, we three, for dinner. 20°-30°, fair.
30. Chased Winter Carnival parade. 20° & sharp wind too much for Korelle shutter.
31. Sunday. Church and some album picture work.

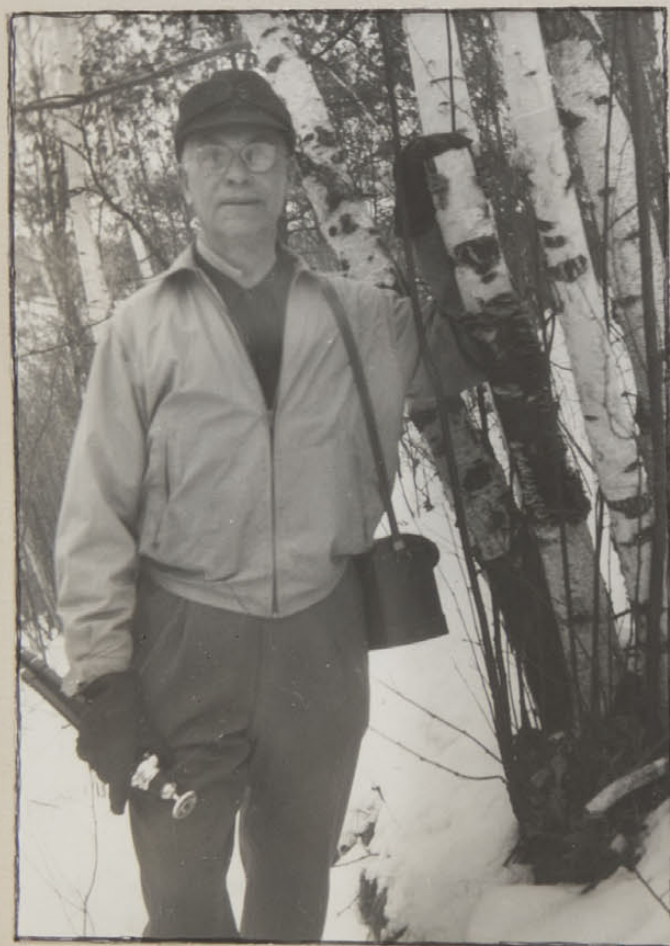

February

A rather mild month; less than a third of the days went below freezing, but it got down to 5° the 11th. Up to 48° the 9th, and 54° to 56° the 16th to 19th. No new snow and not much old left, but I went thru a small blizzard west of Madena, going west the 22nd.

Uncle Al Keeney died in Seattle the 5th: Ama phoned and Frances wired. He was 87; born December 14, 1866.

I worked mostly on Mullan Tunnel estimates the first 3 weeks, then went to Sandpoint to try to inspect the bases of the Lake bridge piers; but the water was too high. Art Ainslie and Jim Young were there. Jim drove me to Spokane, where I saw the modernized depot and new Bridge 1.4. On to Seattle that night to get some tunnel repair data, went to Grays Harbor with Geo. Hopkins and a Dixon paint man. It rained. Saw Ocosta Branch Bridge 1 being razed and ate 50 oysters at Olympia. I had 2 nights with Hopkinses & a big evening with Bertha's folks at a reunion dinner at Bernice's.

I got my trifocals the 8th. My right foot was a little lame, but it didn't slow me down much. Bertha and I called on Potters the 12th. Our gang ate at Lee's and bridged at Thomas the 13th. We had supper at Magraws with the Kelleys, Carlsons, Smiths, Thomas and Mrs. Neff. Sunday the 21st we had Curtisses over for supper (Bill & I walked to Highland that afternoon.)

I got a \$30 Flexichrome outfit, and made my first attempt the 14th. It is an all-day job. Other busywork was making some progress on my '53 album.

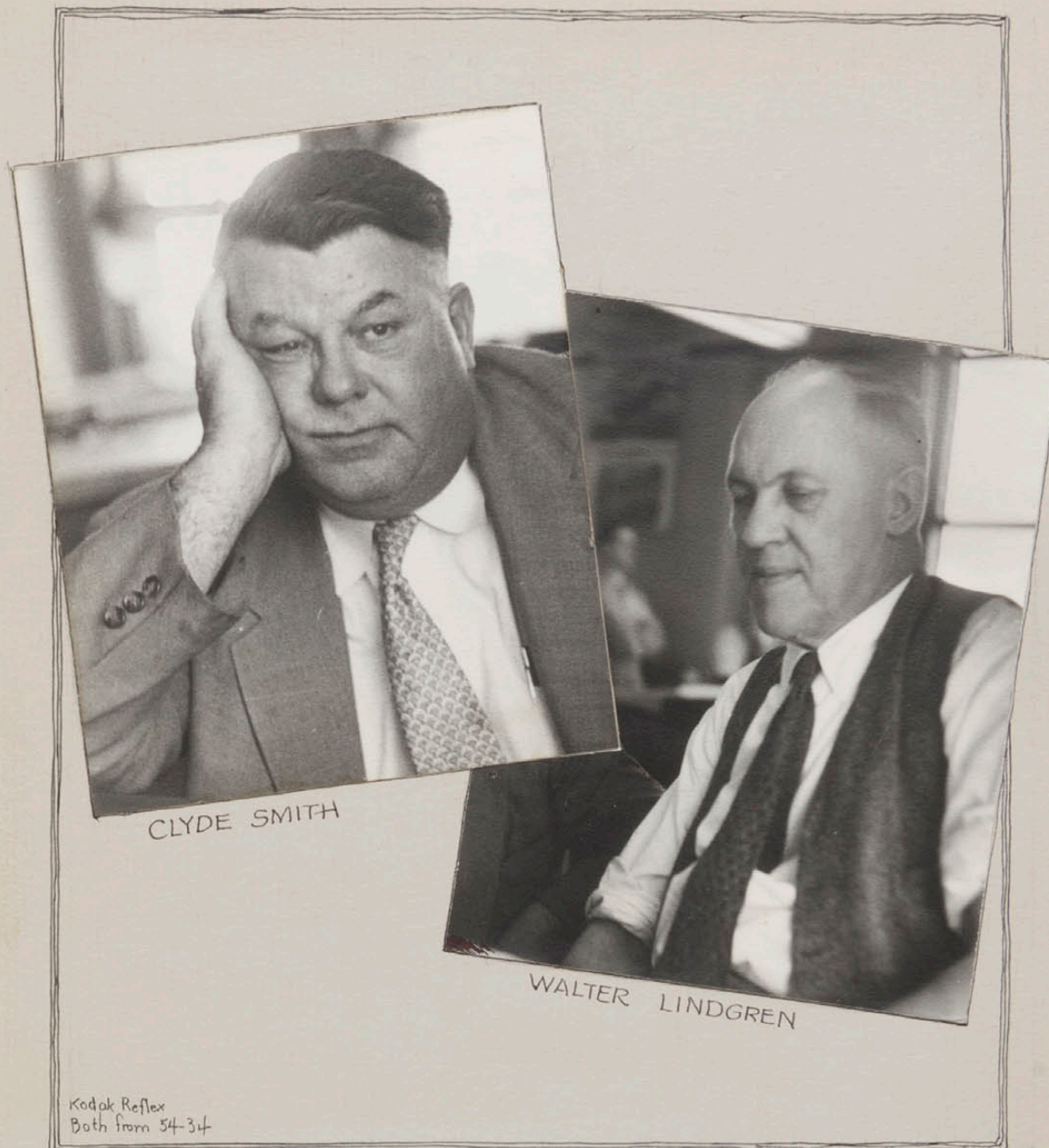


MY FIRST TRIP WEST...

March

I got home the 1st from my trip to Seattle. & was surprised to find the Oak-Harriet line ends at Washington Ave., but Bill found me. Concrete Institute the 2nd and 3rd; lunch at Athletic Club, 2nd, had Pete Miesenhelder home for dinner the 3rd. Worked mostly on Mullan Tunnel estimates all month, and I photographed Mississippi St. diesel shop the 9th...

I was at the A.R.E.A. convention the 17th. Von Sprecken's green tie was a sensation. Returned, to find that a deck fire on the Wisconsin draw span had ruined the steel stringers. Schutt and I drove to Duluth & stayed 3 days.

Our gang had dinner - & Tom Collinses - at the Lexington the 6th, then to Smiths'. The 21st, Bertha & I called on Thelma & Leo Iverson (she's Krohn's daughter) Mrs. Pusch, Bruce and Fritz came over, the 28th, & Bruce showed us his fine Korean war slides. Bertha and I had supper at Lees Kitchen the 31st.

Bertha and I stood by the church door the 7th & 14th, then I got other couples as greeters. Church neighborhood meeting at our house the 9th... We attended a special Women's Club meeting on the Council for Social Action the 22nd. The first Lenten prayer service was the 24th. Deacons' meeting the 31st.

It was about an average March for weather: warmest, 46° the 7th & 20th, coldest, +2° the 4th... One big snow, all day the 12th, seven inches; Bill & I enjoyed digging out next day (Sat.) then we went for a hike in Minnehaha Park. Other snow flurries the 11th, 24th, 25th & 27th. Rain the 18th & night of 24th.

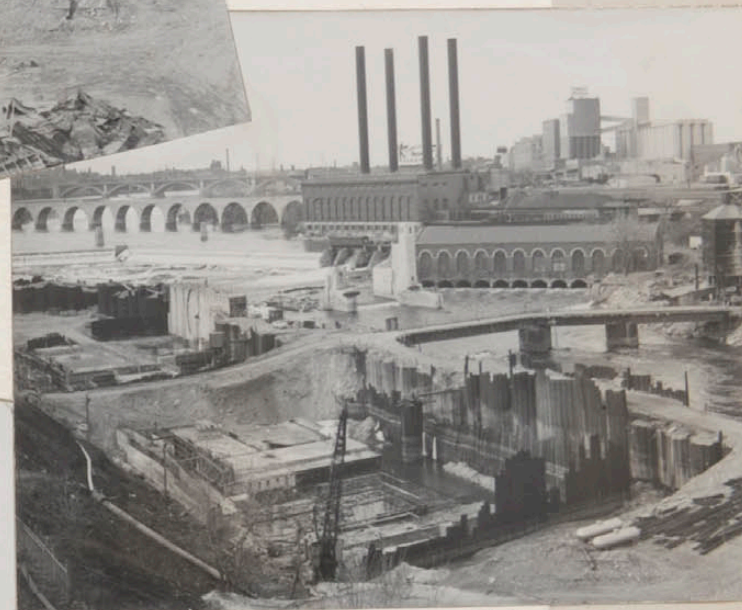
Bill drove to Telemark for skiing the 14th. He had a business trip to Chicago the last 3 days of the month. I met him at the airport, late the 31st.

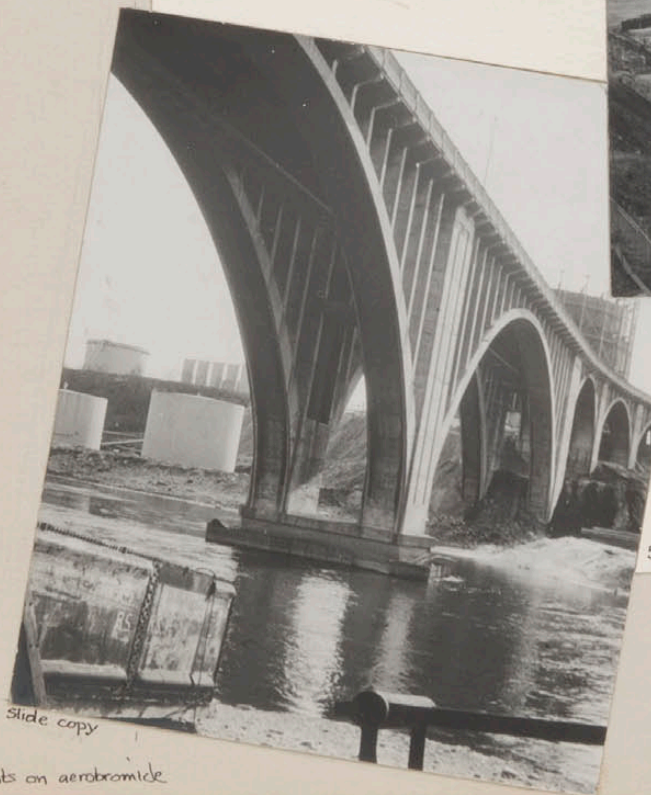

APRIL

Frosty, raw till the 5th, spring came suddenly, 32° up to 64°, and by the 14th it reached 86°. Rest of the month cool, with rain every 3rd or 4th day.

My principal event was a trip to Helena to inspect Mullan tunnel with Young, Seltzer & Gilbert Smith on a high car. I had an afternoon in Helena & another in Garrison, to photograph early wild flowers, stayed overnight at Butte, visiting Homestake tunnel and East Butte line change. Left St. Paul Easter Sunday morning the 18th & back the 22nd.

I took wild flower pictures also on the river path near home, and did quite a little hiking, including new Shepard Road past Robert the 1st & 5th, over to Pelham in morning, 6th & 13th, to Ford Road, morning of 12th & 16th.

The 25th was the big day: after church I set fire to the basement, the fire department and neighbors came, & later, Bertha cut her thumb so deep that it had to be stitched.

Bob & Mora Manners with us to "Here to Eternity" the 4th. We called on Fred & Mabel Coates the 11th (selling their new house out north) To Phil Thuma's wedding reception the 24th, then bridge with Magraws. Garden Club the 5th at Midway Y: Hawaii slides

Stanley Law's retirement dinner, 30th. Same day, Jim Derrig, Caleb Corser, W.W. Judson and T.M. Kane retired. It had been announced a week earlier that Hoving would succeed Derrig, Burgess would be Vice President.

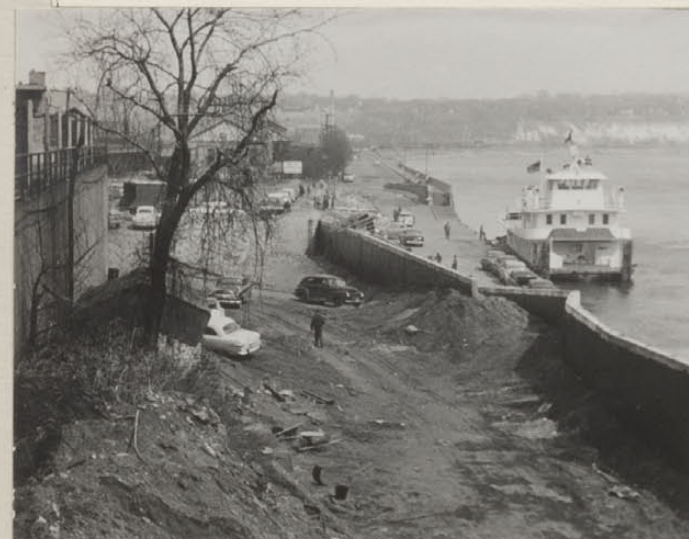
At the office I revised the bridge list, compiled system car limits, continued Mullan tunnel studies, wrote reports. At home, I made and bound this book.

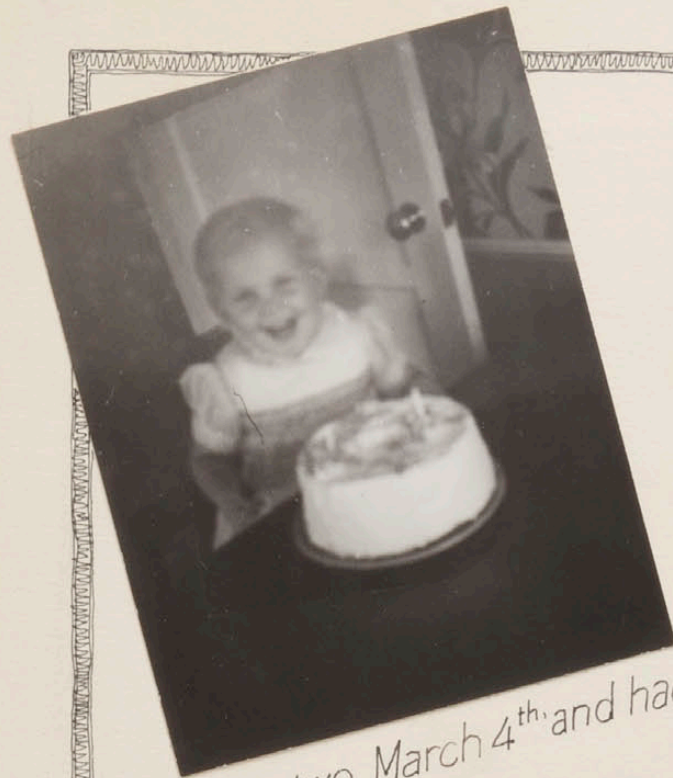

JUNE

PPrincipal events: Fuller-Schlichting wedding, AREA committee meeting at Purdue, walks morning and evening looking for wild flowers and a drive to Somerset, Osceola and St Croix Falls also for flower pictures, and our trip west, 21st-29th for me, longer for Bertha, and a total eclipse of the sun.

We had Mrs. Fuller and Herman Schlichting for dinner, the 1st, attended their wedding the 5th, and reception at Dr. Ben Fuller's.

I went to Chicago the night of the 8th and attended Committee 29's meeting the afternoon of the 9th and next morning, with the usual catfish dinner, at Purdue U.

Bertha picked me up at the office, Sat. noon the 12th, and we drove over into Wisconsin, partly to take flower pictures. Got half a dozen..... Also, going to and from work, I frequently walked the river path with my Korelle and found a surprising variety of flowers.

We had a "picnic" with Smiths, Thumas, Nienhausers & Arthur Hubbell at Gages' country place beyond the Auto Club, the 6th. Bill Jr was in Indianapolis the 18th.

On our coast trip, I went to Livingston, drove from Missoula to Paradise & found Bertha and Looms aboard No. 1 the 24th - all going to George Hopkins's retirement party in the office drafting room, the afternoon of the 25th. That morning I drove to Bridge 51 near Centralia, with Gaylord and Beers; then we drove to the party. Pete and Myrtle Finch were there, Ben Nutley and about 75 others.

We had visits with Hopkinses, most of Bertha's relatives, and Ama & Ralph. We went to Elmore's place on Bainbridge Island. I arrived in St. Paul, late the 29th and had 4 hours in bed before getting up to see the eclipse with Bill.

The weather was mostly fine, warming up, to 94° (at Livingston) but 90° in St Paul the 15th seemed hotter. Heavy rain several nights.

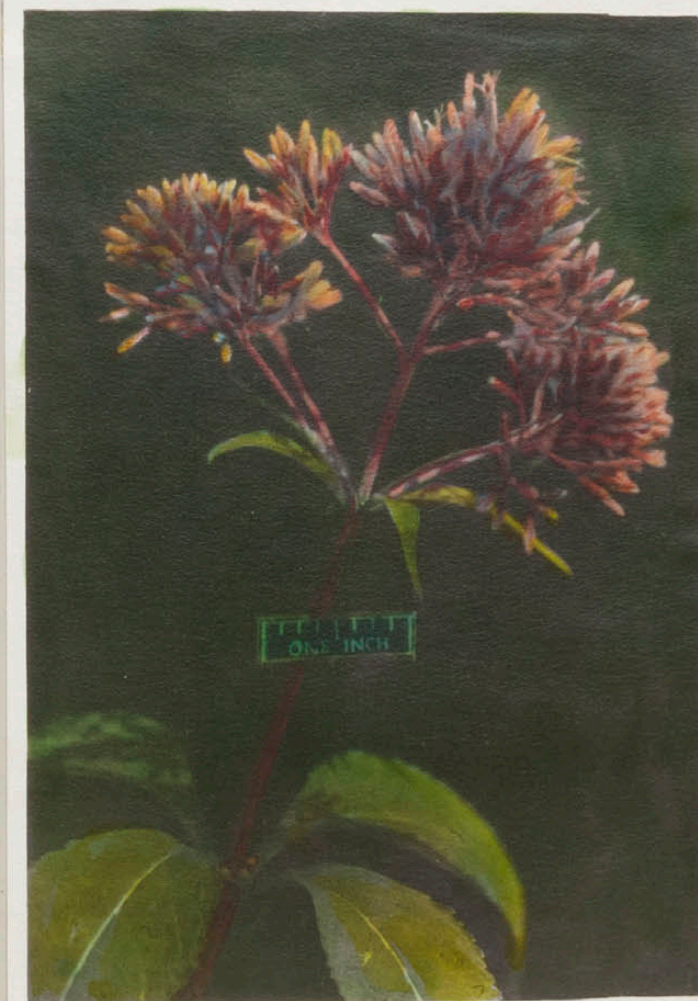

JULY

The 1st to 19th at home. Weather mostly fair; over 90° several times. Ekberg and Kempe took their vacations so I was busy. Out to Anoka with Panushka the 16th. Bertha got home from Seattle the 9th. I ran out of gas, bringing her home. Bill and I'd had several bachelor dinners, mostly steak. Sun. 4th I drove alone to Prescott, River Falls, & White Pine Inn for dinner. Not many pictures. Mon. was a holiday & I had lumbago, but I was called to Chatsworth St. on account of a derailment. The 6th, Bill and I celebrated his birthday, a week late, at the Lexington. Mosquitoes showed up the 8th. Later, one spraying fixed them. I did a lot of weeding. Bertha and I had supper on the terrace a couple of hot evenings. Bill got a boat and was afterwards away weekends, water-skiing.
