



Not only are we pleased with Penny's choice, but she has the same good fortune I had, of marrying a family of fine people. To attend the wedding, in Mills College chapel in Oakland, Bertha and I went west, for three weeks. In the North, Herb and Ethel Beers took us around the Olympic peninsula.

Bill Hennon's serious illness brought Betsy and the children to St. Paul, July 21st to August 9th. Mike and I had a very enjoyable

canoe outing on the St. Croix.

Retirement has been completely successful. Partly through my fault, my work had got in a rut, pleasant but not inspiring, so when I discovered I was already living within retirement income, I resigned, two years before I had to. In order to divorce my mind from the work, we took an autumn trip east, with George and Margaret Hopkins, lasting seven weeks and covering nearly seven thousand miles. Elmore, Bertha's brother, died suddenly on Bainbridge Island July 18th.

Photographically, no new equipment. Most of my photographs are taken as 2½ x 2½ inch color transparencies; then I copy some of the best of them for this album. This year I took an unusually large number of office portraits in black and white, so a third of my pictures in this book are from original negatives. I enjoy straight black and white photography most, but can't keep away from color.




FIFTY YEARS AGO.

Nineteen Five also was a very memorable year for me; for I graduated from High School, decided to be a Christian and joined the Methodist church, & went to work at a man's wages as a draftsman over in Idaho. While I was away, Father had the house enlarged. Previous to this, dad, mother, Erwin, Ama, Dorothy and I had lived in five very small rooms, at 1017 North "O" Street. Grandpa and Grandma Handsaker and uncles Maurice and Lester lived in the similar small house next door (but in June Maurice married Edith Locke, the girl across the street)

After three months of tent life in Ray's location party at Ilo and Kippen, I was made office man for T.H.Croswell in Lewiston, doing drafting, blue printing, typing and clerical work. By December, a full-time clerk, J.E.Grant, was added. We roomed together. I had a Christmas visit at home

Photography Fifty Years Ago.










Eunice Potter Early and Russ King were married at Plymouth the 10th; afterwards our gang dined at Conroys—east city limits—and bridged at Smiths.


7 Thousand Miles: 7 Happy Weeks: 7 Hundred Dollars

This was on Sept 22. The 23rd we came thru Superior and headed east, stopping for the night at an inferior cabin in Wisconsin


