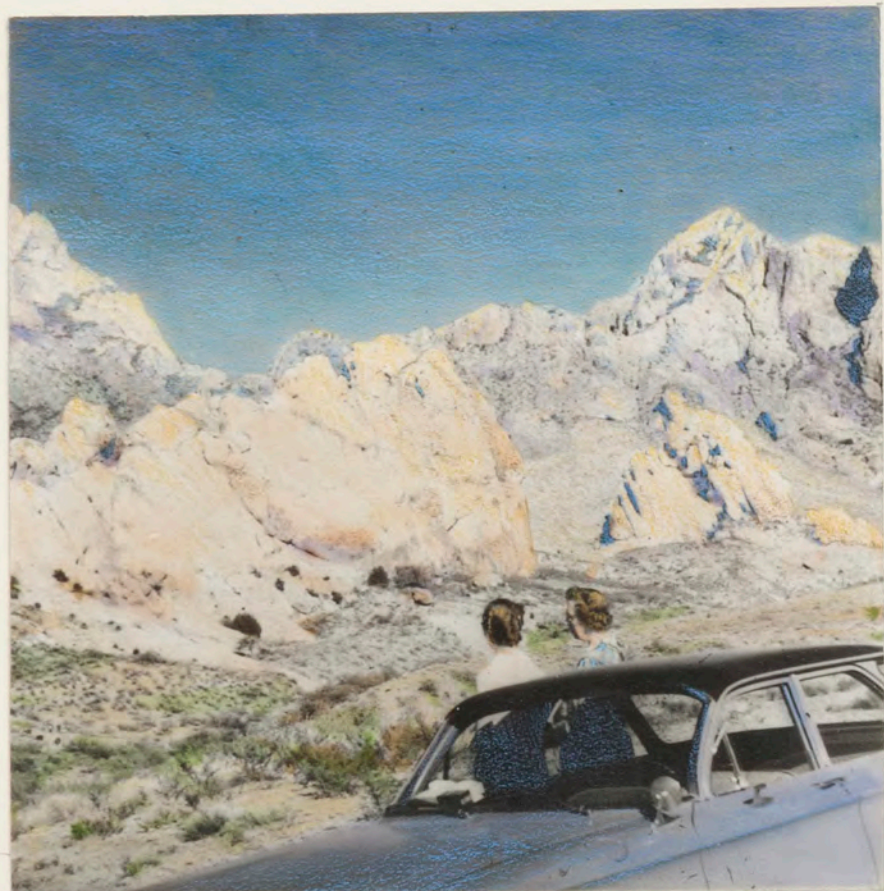
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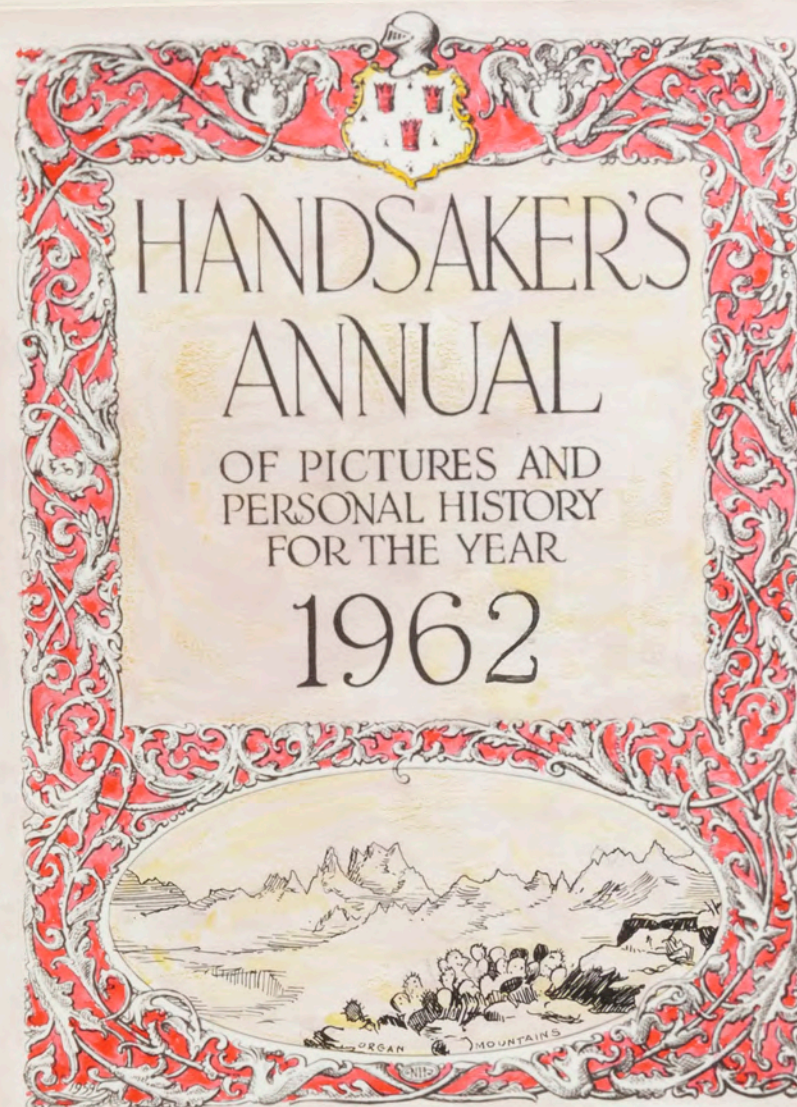

This Year:

We took two big trips by railroad: in March and April to Las Cruces & California; in October to the Seattle World's Fair.

Tom and Mary Handsaker of Colo, Iowa visited us in August, and Bob & Penny were here for a week at Christmas.

I was almost crippled with what the doctor finally called "old-age rheumatism," from May on, but when I started drinking a quart & a half of (powdered) skim milk a day, it improved--by the end of the year I was about normal.

During his summer vacation Mike, with a friend, paddled 1400 miles down the Yukon River in a canoe, and then saw Mount McKinley, Anchorage and Juneau.

Died: Bernie Ryan in January, Orrin Potter & Robert Naskin in July, Mrs. Summerfield in December.

Photography: I was given a second Miranda body for Christmas so I could switch films readily. Of the 225 pictures in this Annual, 180 are 35 mm. (110 with Miranda, 70, Ikonta.) Copies of color slides account for 140 pictures.

1912 ~ FIFTY YEARS AGO

I was still a roodman on the Auburn terminal construction of the Northern Pacific, coming home to Tacoma most week-ends. After mother's death last year, Ama was keeping house as well as going to high school; she graduated in June.

At Auburn, the railroad families and local citizens were having plenty of social life, with frequent dances. I attended a weekly dancing class and then a few dances, and discovered that dancing's fun and that girls can be good company.

In the fall I made financial arrangements to return to the University at Seattle. I decorated my little "dorm" room with paneling, burlap & Parrish pictures; at night I had a lot of very educational wrangles with AB and law students who drifted in; then studied engineering after bedtime. I ventured to attend several dances, with Houser's friend Lottie until he learned to dance.

Ama got a wonderful Thanksgiving dinner — "Cap" Nolan sent the turkey. Grandma was with us, and Hazel Locke, who was staying with her, and Uncle Theodore and Aunt Mamie.

Cousin Arthur Handsaker died in July. Al and Alice Keeney's daughter Frances was born November 13th.....

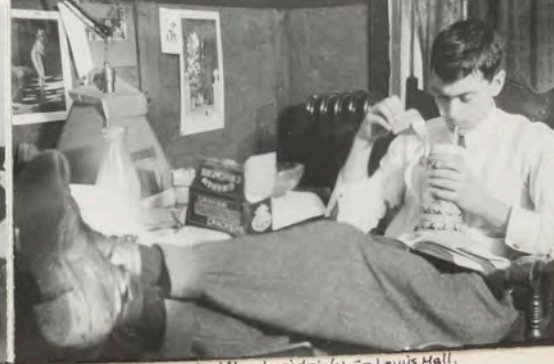

January 1962

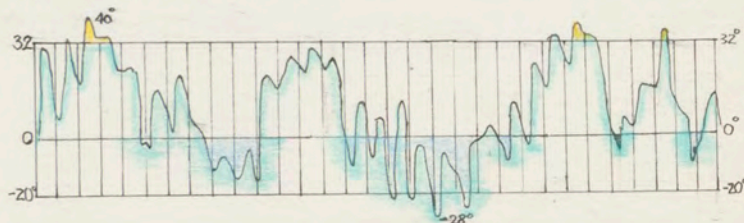

The 1st, we watched part of the Pasadena parade & all of the Minn-UCLA football game in the Rose Bowl; we won, 21-3.

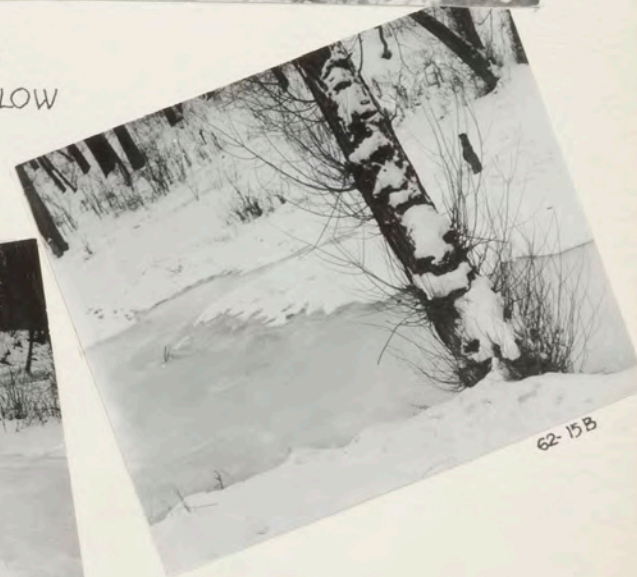

Bernie Ryan was found dead in his home, the 25th.

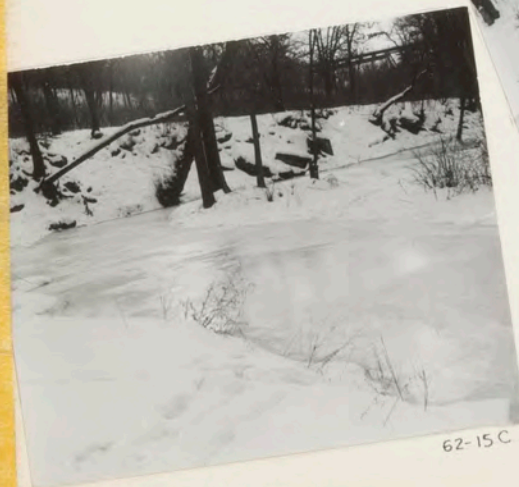

We got a start on church action committee's work, & I taught Henry Smith's Sunday School class once. Thomas & Potters here, 2nd; to night parade with Thomas, the 3rd. Al and Eva Owen here, 10th. Saw "Babes in Toyland" at Highland, 16th. Deacons' meeting, 19th; Men's Club dinner, 20th. Another movie, 23rd, with Magraws after dinner at Lee's Kitchen. Celebrating our 44th anniversary but I didn't know it.

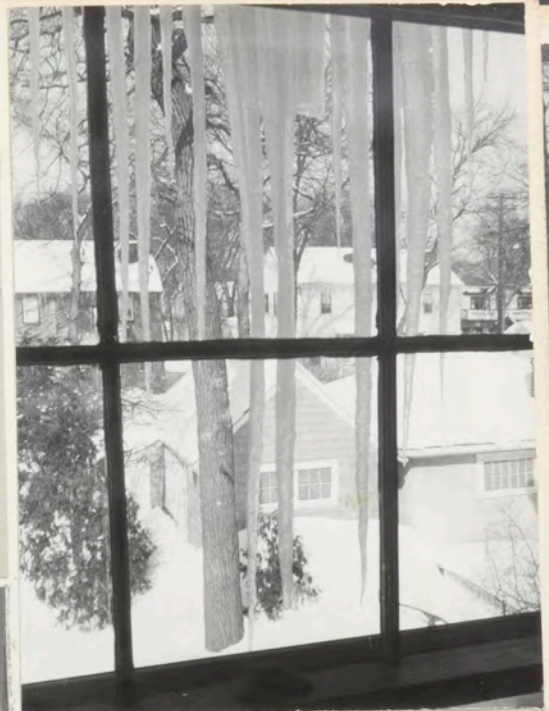

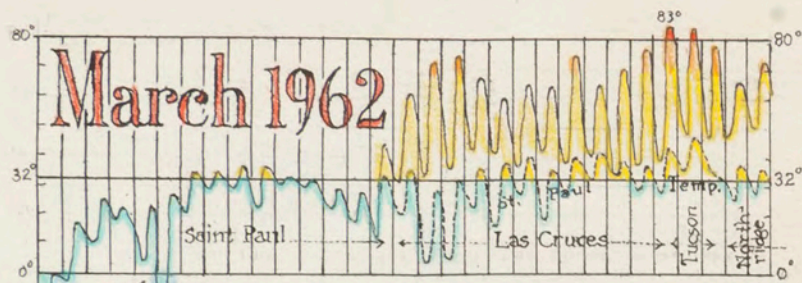

It kept right on snowing: 7 more inches the 4th; 6 more, the 11th; 4 more, the 12th; and none of it melted. Plenty of shoveling (I like it,) & the 13th was sunny, so I took a lot of pictures of our record snowfall.

Church action group pot-luck at our house, 2nd; Dinner at Mrs. Bean's, 6th. First Lenten meeting, 7th—I led discussion. Dessert the 9th, at Knights.

We left for the Southwest at noon, the 15th, by train: in Las Cruces next afternoon with Bob & Penny. Saw "Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme" that eve. To El Paso next day—to Mesilla, the 18th. I walked 8 miles the 21st. Bob was laid up a couple of days with an infected tooth.

The 24th, we drove thru mountains to Tyrone & Silver City; 26th, Penny & I hiked at Cuevas Rocks, and we all dined at La Posta.

On our way again the 27th, two grand days visiting & sightseeing at Tucson with Irving & Ethel Van Horn; and Betsy & Janet met us at Los Angeles the morning of the 30th. Next day, we visited the County Arboretum & Huntington Library.

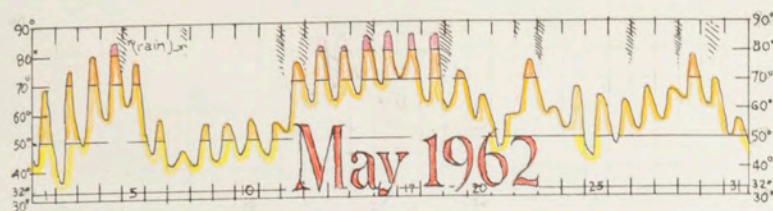

"Rheumatiz" restricted my activity, and the pills seemed to make me sleepy. As Dr. B.I. Derauf retired June 1st, I saw his son Don the 12th. I'm also reducing: down from 177 to 165. Walks were short and painful, but one day I enjoyed walking across the new Fort Snelling bridge & around the fort. And I got quite a little gardening done. Had to water the garden once, but not the lawn.

Church summer school, 9 days, 11th to 21st; Mrs. Swain taught, I made gimmicks like the "passports." Enjoyed it.

7th- called on Potters and Mrs. Haskin; Bob's dying of cancer. 10th. Bjorklunds' open house on account of John's graduation. 23rd- Barbecue supper at Magraws: Kelleys there. That evening we had a windstorm, which farther north in town was a terrific rain & hail storm. 24th- Communion; dinner at Lou Beans. 29th- for Bill's birthday we had steaks broiled on a hibachi grill we borrowed from Magraws. 30th- Dinner in Athletic Club Summit Room, then bridge on Magraws' porch.

Mike and his friend Dick Newby started from Whitehorse, down the Yukon in a canoe, June 29th.

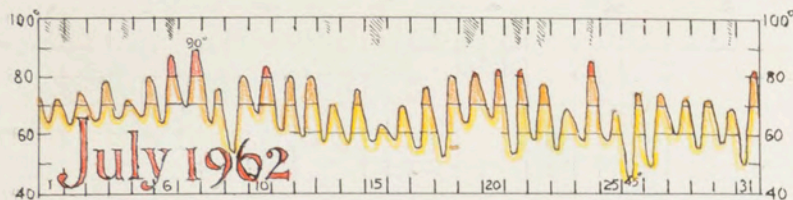

My back trouble bothered me all month. I took pills first 16 days, then Johanssen's physio-therapy, rest of month. Got some gardening and window-washing done, but mostly typing on my family history projects, etc.

We lost 2 good Plymouth friends: Orrin Potter died the 4th and Robert Naskin the 29th.

This was a cool, damp month; no sprinkling needed. Mosquitoes terrible.

Our principal diversion was a week-end at Beecher's resort on Clearwater Lake, with Smiths, Thomas and Millers, the 21st-22nd... Saw "Merry Wives of Windsor" on the Showboat the 18th; slides at Betty Bachmann's, 19th...

Mike and his pal, Dick, reached Galena, 1300 miles down the Yukon from Whitehorse, and were about stranded, with very little money.

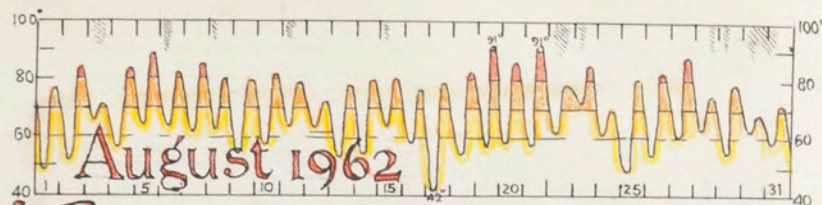

Collegians Paddle Canoe As Down Yukon In 28 Days

Bearded and almost broke, two California collegians arrived in Anchorage yesterday after a 1,400-mile paddle down the Yukon River in a canoe. The voyage started at Whitehorse, Y.T., on June 25 and concluded at Galena 28 days later.

"The river was at its highest in history," said Dick Newby, a 21-year-old physics major at the University of Southern California. "The biggest problem was finding a dry place to camp at night."

His partner, Mike Raudenbush, 18, who is studying mathematics at the University of California at Berkeley, noted that their only bad time was during a two-day storm on Lake LaBerge, north of Whitehorse some 50 miles. High winds and rain pinned them to the shores.

THE ADVENTURERS met last winter while trekking around Yosemite Valley. It was not long afterward that plans were laid for their Yukon excursion.

Headwaters of the Yukon are only 35 miles inland from tidewater at Skagway, they noted. Yet the river winds some 2,000 miles before emptying into Norton Sound in western Alaska.

It was necessary for the happy-go-lucky pair to paddle the entire time, averaging 50 miles a day. They portaged around the dangerous Five Finger and Rink rapids south of Dawson.

ASKED IF the mosquitoes were a problem, Newby answered, "Oh brother! Around the Yukon flats (Fort Yukon vicinity) they nearly drove us nuts."

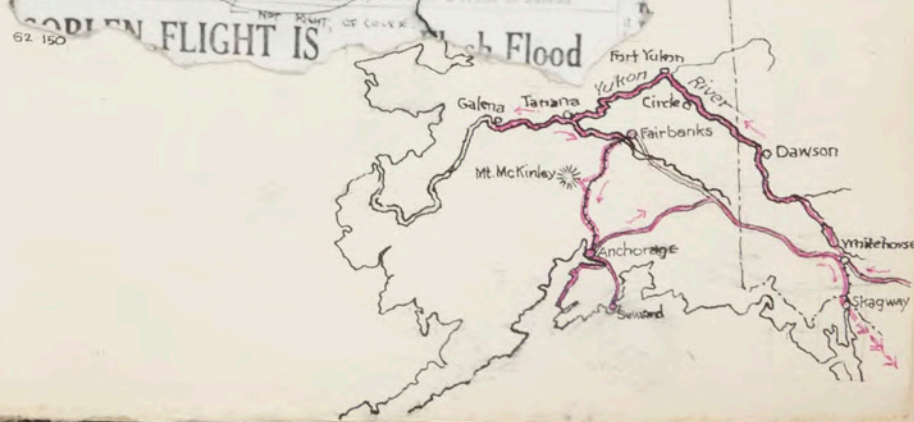
They spent six days camping at McKinley Park, and then continued to Galena where the trip was ended because time and money were

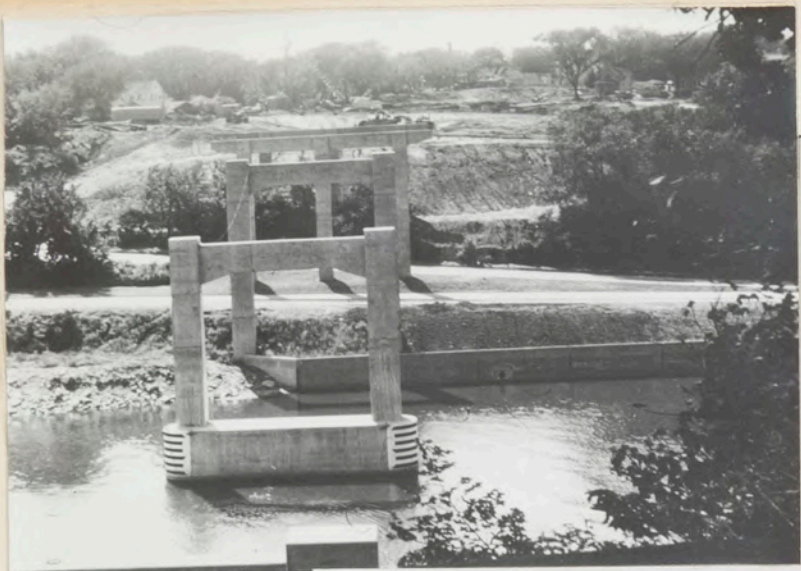


YUKON PADDLERS
