





ntroduction



As you can see, photogtaphy is an important part of my life, and most of it is 35-millimeter. Of about 160 pictures in this book, 107 are from 35 mm slides or negatives, and most of these were color slides. Copying slides and making enlargements gives me the darkroom work that I enjoy.
