

Mill City Looks Like Battlefield After Big Blow

Storm Levels Gospel Tower


in the dark, on the freeway. After a while it let up a little and Herman had no trouble going on

to Cretin Ave. South of Marshall a fallen tree blocked us and we had to try two alley detours.


The top of our oak tree snapped off alean, and filled half of the back yard, missing all our wires.
