

### Our Golden Tear

was our children's idea that we must do something special for our fiftieth anniversary. There was some discussion of Acapulco, Mexico, but we decided on Laguna Beach, a town we love. Betsy made the arrangements and she, Permy and Bill paid for the motel and banquet, gave us gifts and promised us a color television set. After the week in Laguna, we visited at Camarillo.

I attended the painting class at Leisure Age until July. In April, Ed Lewis fell from his roof and was in hospital and nursing home for six months. Plymouth Church solved its problems by merging its dwindling membership with Macalester to form a united church on September 1st. In August we visited our Seattle folks, and in October we went to Rockport to visit sister Dorothy and Paul.....


This was the year of national conventions and presidential election, and in November Nixon won narrowly over the Minnesotan, Dumphrey... The big news story was the looping of the moon by our astronauts in December, but there was more significance in the assassinations of Martin Luther King Jr. and of Robert Kennedy and in the riots in slums and on campuses; and a good many of us were trying to find any significance for good in our involvement in Vietnam.

We were finishing the records of last fall's surveys, I checked off every day on my calendar, in anticipation of my marriage to Bertha,

he morning of February 23rd, in the Davenport Hotel in Spokane, I found Dad, Dorothy, Ama, Bertha's father, George and Margaret Hopkins and, at last, Bertha. The wedding, at a tiny Butheran church at Washington and Sinto streets, was at 4:30, followed by a wedding breakfast," at the Davenport, Also present were Professor Thompson of Saint Olaf, and Bess and Franc Babcock of Ewan. All our folks left for home that evening. We went east the following right and reached the apartment I had rented in St. Paul, the night of the 26th. For recreation, we went to the theaters and took long walks. In March I began working in the general office building.

ited her sister Elma at Glenham, South Dakota for two weeks - I went there in time to bring her back. In June, Bertha started a business college course, mostly to have something to do, When I was sent to Duluth to inventory some terminals with Krogsti, Bertha was with me for a

few days. In July we knew that I would soon enter the Army. Bertha visited Elma again, returning just in time to start west with me the 17th. We visited in Tecoms and I introduced Bertha to the SSM. On the 24th, I was inducted at Camp Lewis; I was there just amonth, then went by troop train to Fort Benjamin Harrison near Indianapolis. I was there until December 24th, reaching sergeant's rank and finding a good buddy in Billy Kent. ### 1928-FORTY YEARS AGO


arch 1968 Betsy and I stayed with Don, Betsy and Janet until the 16th.





### September 1968

12 ight showers the first week, and rain off-and-on, from the 16th-to the 22nd. I wrote and typed church history, getting it nearly up-to-date; got most of the windows washed and storm windows in place, and took quite a few walks of a mile or so.

I went down town the 16th to photograph the big river boat "Delta Queen" on her final trip-these pictures didn't materialize. (all my September pictures were lost by failure of the film to wind.)

The North Shore drive with Magraws, the 26th to 28th, will be described elsewhere.


The last two days were spent in preparation for our visit with Dorothy and Paul at Rockport, Mass.



We were disappointed that Mike was having car troubles, so he couldn't drive up from New Hondon, as he had planned.


Bertha and I attended Congregational church services, the 6th. Paul goes to Boston to teach art, twice a week.






Top- First Snow: November 9th.




Left - Bertha on the Bridge which they added, across the Lagoon. A Japanese motif was used for the setting.

On their ten laps around the moon, they were too close for such full views, but took many pictures from their height of 60 nautical miles....




