DEFEAT OF TONNAGE TAX IS CHARGED TO NONPARTISAN BODY

Rudolph Lee, Long Prairie Editor, in Debate With Organizer Says Socialism Will Kill Farm Societies.

Long Prairie, Minn., March 24.—Rudolph Lee, editor of the Long Prairie Leader, tonight denounced the Nonpartisan league as the instrument responsible for the defeat of the tonnage tax bill by the Minnesota Legislature and declared the league is buried under a brand of socialism that ultimately will destroy every farmer's co-operative society in the state.

PITTED AGAINST ORGANIZER.

Mr. Lee made these statements in the course of a debate in which he upheld the negative of the question, "Resolved that the farmers of Minnesota should join the Nonpartisan league."

He was pitted against M. M. Randall, Minnesota organizer, in a joint debate here before 700 Platt county farmers, most of whom are members of the league.

"It's socialism and inactivity that characterize your organization," Lee asserted at a point where the argument had become anything but friendly.

PRINCIPLES THROWN OVER.

It's that same inactivity which defeated the tonnage tax bill in the Minnesota Legislature, a proposal for which your league previously had manifested favoritism and advocated as one of the principles of its platform. "It's the inactivity that resulted in the defeat of the I. W. W. bill in the North Dakota legislature and also the recent mileage proposal. Socialism is the thing to which all of your leaders are attached," Mr. Lee charged.

NOT READY TO ACT.

When the editor took to task the attitude of the league in I. W. W. matters, Mr. Randall said: "Remember, soon we will all be victims of the I. W. W. system." In reply to your charge that inactivity has marked the league, I say your organization is not yet ready for activity," argued Mr. Lee.

RIVER FALLS DIGS OUT AFTER 6 DAYS

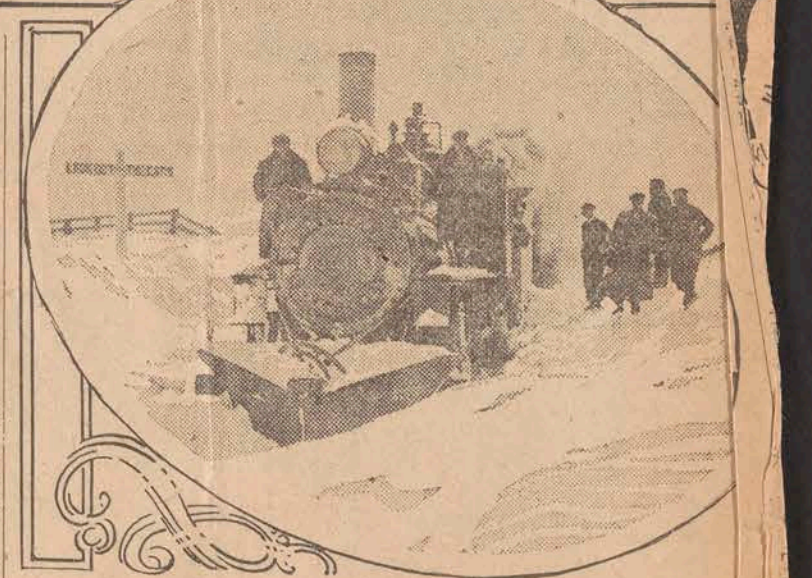
Snow Blocks North-Western Road From Hudson—Overland Mail Route Started.

(By a Special Correspondent.)

River Falls, Wis., March 24.—King Winter blocked the rails of the North-Western line between Hudson and Ellsworth, Pierce county, effectively for six days, and the train leaving this city for Hudson on March 16 became stalled in a drift four miles from the city.

Passengers were brought here on bob sleds and crews set at work clearing the track. Traffic was resumed last Wednesday.

While this city and Ellsworth were cut off from train communication with the outside world an overland mail route was established to Hudson, twelve miles distant.
