
AREA **PROFILE**

Located in the majestic Sierra Nevada Mountains, the breathtaking Reno-Sparks Lake Tahoe area is not your average destination. From the arts to the cultural splendor, from the casinos to its unprecedented natural surroundings, the Reno-Sparks area is rich in both tradition and fresh entertainment.

Minutes away from world-famous Lake Tahoe, the Reno-Sparks community is surrounded by natural beauty and limitless recreational opportunities. The Reno-Sparks Lake Tahoe region has over 18 world-class ski resorts, many just a short 45minutes from downtown, and 40-plus golf courses. The area also boasts 60 gaming locations, the National Bowling Stadium, the National Automobile Museum, Rancho San Rafael Park's Arboretum and Wilbur D. May Great Basin Adventure, the historic boomtown of Virginia City, and world-class fishing, hiking, biking, and numerous other outdoor activities. The quality of life in the Reno-Sparks area is tough to beat.

At 4,500 feet above sea level, the Reno-Sparks area offers four distinct seasons with few extremes. Average temperatures range from winter lows in the 20's to summer highs in the 90's. Low humidity characterizes the area, making the cool days seem not so cold and the warm days not so hot. Rain is scarce, and snow is certain. Here the sun shines more than 300 days a year.










SPARKS.

Since the 1990's, Sparks has grown tremendously, offering residents and visitors a wide variety of services and activities. Sparks was reported as the fastest growing city in Nevada between 1999-2008 and continues to grow. 

RENO/SPARKS ECONON

The Reno-Sparks Economy is principally based in the trade and service sector, with approximately 65% of the work force employed in these occupations. Although gaming and other recreational activities represent a significant portion of the growing economy and assessed valuation, the City is experiencing a gradual diversification of its business base with the expansion of distribution, warehousing, and manufacturing facilities. Approximately 25% of the workforce is employed in the fields of construction, manufacturing, transportation, communications, public utilities, and finance related services.

The Reno-Sparks area is serviced by two major highways, the Union Pacific Railroad and a number of trucking and airline carriers. This makes it possible to ship from Reno to 80% of the 11 western states on a next-day basis.

Nevada has no corporate or personal income tax, and is a right-to-work state. These factors have contributed to the state's tremendous growth in the 1990's and into the 2000's.

In addition to the accomplishments of the Economic Development Authority of Western Nevada in bringing new business to Northern Nevada, the City of Reno Economic and Redevelopment Agency has begun both entertainment and housing projects for in the City's downtown sector.

Over thirty million dollars of City and one billion dollars in private/other public investment have been made in downtown Reno to modernize and beautify infrastructure and facilities. A maintenance district was established to ensure that the downtown area will remain clean and beautiful. The City also established a police district downtown to ensure a safer environment.

NORTHERN NEVADA ECONOMIC GROWTH

Northern Nevada Economy Fueled By Growth in Tech and Manufacturing-59 Companies, 29 Headquarters and 5,600 Jobs Reach Unexpected Milestones During the Pandemic



RENO, Nevada (Dec. 16, 2021) - Fifty-nine companies that relocated to Greater Reno-Sparks-Tahoe, Fernley, Washoe County, Storey County areas and several local companies that expanded their workforce in 2020, and 2021, were honored at EDAWN's "10th Annual New and Expanded Companies".



Technology and Manufacturing, two of the fastest growing industry sectors in Northern Nevada comprised over 60% of all the companies that relocated and expanded here in the past two years. The influx of 29 corporate headquarters are strong indicators of their commitment to long-term growth and partnership in our community and with this, also brings many high-paying jobs. Approximately 5,600 new jobs over the next 5 years are directly attributed to these 59 companies and points to EDAWN's efforts and the support of the community to diversify and grow our economy. As efforts continue to move in the right direction, average salary also rose in 2021 to \$64,000 annually.



Our strong economic activity is a direct result of the diversification of our economy. Our manufacturing, logistics, distribution, and technology employees are working and spending money. Additionally, this economic activity coupled with our remarkable quality of life is attracting talent to the region. We recently received top ten rankings for the attraction of Millennials and Gen Z members to the region, and a top 50 ranking for best places to live.

"Despite the pandemic, our region has continued to grow," said Mike Kazmierski, CEO of EDAWN. "More importantly, we are attracting quality companies bringing the higher paying "jobs of the future" to our region. The continued development of our advanced manufacturing and technology sectors will continue our diversification efforts and lead our community to economic success for many years to come," he said.

TAHOE RENO INDUSTRIAL CENTER


Benefits of the Tahoe Reno **Industrial Center include:**

- The vast majority of industrial uses are pre-approved; rarely are special use permits ever required
- Grading permits issued within 7 days of application, building permits issued within 30 days of application. Yes, you read that right! Just imagine, you could have your site graded, built and open for business within 180 days following close of escrow.
- Roads and all utilities (power, gas, fiber, water, wastewater, reclaimed water) are in place and built for industrial capacity.
- A Berkshire Hathaway owned power plant is in the park with a capacity of 1100 megawatts.
- Ample water rights secured and banked.
- 12 Miles of dedicated frontage on the I-80 corridor and Union Pacific Intercontinental rail line, which is the central logistics corridor to and from the east coast.
- Located in Nevada where there is ZERO state income tax!

Tahoe Reno Industrial Center (TRIC) is the largest industrial park in the world. The massive 107,000 acre park encompasses a developable 30,000 acre industrial complex. The center is a 15 minute drive from the Reno Tahoe International airport.

Not only is Tesla Gigafactory 1 located here, but many of the foremost tech companies in the world, such as Blockchains, Google, Jet.com, Panasonic and Switch have recognized the unique location, development and business benefits of this park.

Another 10 million square feet of additional tenants signed recently, it is on its way to be the largest industrial complex in the world. With more major tenants scheduled to announce relocation to the Tahoe/Reno industrial center, it should produce over 100,000 new jobs to the Northern Nevada region.





TESLA BATTERY GIGAFACTORY

Tesla broke ground on the Gigafactory in June 2014 outside Sparks, Nevada. The name Gigafactory comes from the word 'Giga,' the unit of measurement representing "billions." The Gigafactory is being built in phases so that Tesla can begin manufacturing immediately inside the finished sections and continue to expand thereafter. Already, the current structure has a footprint of more than 1.9 million square feet, which houses more than 4.9 million square feet of operational space across several floors. Still, the Gigafactory is about 30 percent done. Once complete, Tesla expects the Gigafactory to be the biggest building in the world - and entirely powered by renewable energy sources. Designed to be a net zero energy factory upon completion, the facility will be primarily powered by solar, and installation is already underway.

In mid-2018, battery production at Gigafactory 1 reached an annualized rate of roughly 20 GWh, making it the highest-volume battery plant in the world. Tesla currently produces more batteries in terms of kWh than all other carmakers combined. With the Gigafactory ramping up production, Tesla's cost of battery cells will significantly decline through economies of scale, innovative manufacturing, reduction of waste, and the simple optimization of locating most manufacturing processes under one roof. By reducing the cost of batteries, Tesla can make products available to more and more people, allowing us to make the biggest possible impact on transitioning the world to sustainable energy.

SWITCH TAHOE RENO

The world's largest, most advanced data center campus is now located in Reno/Sparks' backyard. The first building in Switch's Citadel Campus officially opened at the Tahoe Reno Industrial Center in late February of 2017. It is known as "Tahoe Reno 1," the 130-megawatt facility is one of several data center buildings planned for the project. The Citadel Campus is Switch's response to the increasing demand for internet-connected people, services and devices. It is designed to be the world's largest data center campus built on the same designs as the campus in Las Vegas. Before Tahoe Reno 1 came about, the title of the largest single data center building belonged to the Lakeside Technology Center located in Chicago.

GOOGLE IN NORTHERN NEVADA

Google's Northern Nevada facility is shaping up to be a large undertaking as construction picks up at the 1,210-acre site inside Tahoe Reno Industrial Center. There is plenty of construction activity at the site on USA Parkway just a few miles south of the Switch Citadel data center campus and Tesla Gigafactory in Storey County. The frame of a two-story structure surrounded by cranes and other construction equipment can be seen at the site, which Google bought for \$29.1 million in April 2017. Google has yet to provide specific details about the facility, which is expected to be a data center.

Google bought the facility as part of a \$13 billion investment that the company was making across the United States, including in Nevada. At the time, CEO Sundar Pichai indicated that Google will be making major expansions in 14 states. "These new investments will give us the capacity to hire tens of thousands of employees, and enable the creation of more than 10,000 new construction jobs in Nebraska, Nevada, Ohio, Texas, Oklahoma, South Carolina and Virginia," Pichai wrote in Google's official blog. "With this new investment, Google will now have a home in 24 total states, including data centers in 13 communities."

The University of Nevada, Reno is the state's historic flagship institution of higher education. The University has a student enrollment of more than 23,000, including about 3,500 graduate students, and a total budget of nearly \$500 million.

The University provides a broad range of programs and degree options, ranging from baccalaureate degrees in more than 75 disciplines to more than 100 graduate-degree programs at the master's and doctoral level. The University of Nevada School of Medicine is a vital component of the University, with campuses in both of Nevada's major urban centers, Las Vegas and Reno, and a health network that extends to much of rural Nevada.

The University of Nevada was founded in 1874 in Elko as the state's first institution of higher education. Relocated to Reno in 1887, the University remained the state's only institution of higher education for 75 years. The first building on the Reno campus, Morrill Hall, is still in use today, and the campus has grown from a small cluster of buildings surrounding a central quadrangle (modeled after Thomas Jefferson's design for the University of Virginia), to a 290-acre site just north of downtown Reno. The University is one of eight institutions of higher education governed by the Nevada System of Higher Education.

The University has more than 145 undergraduate degree programs, and more than 150 graduate degree programs (57 master's, 80 doctoral and 24 professional graduate programs) from which students may choose. New majors approved recently include Atmospheric Sciences, Environmental Science, Forest and Rangeland Management, Wildlife Ecology, and Computer and Information Engineering. The University is also in the process of adding new Ph.D. programs in Mathematics, Statistics, and Geography, and a new interdisciplinary undergraduate program in Environmental Studies.

The tuition for Nevada resident undergraduates is among the lowest in the western United States and is a reflection of the Board of Regents' and state legislature's policy to provide access to as many Nevada high school graduates as are qualified. For example, the resident undergraduate tuition and fees total \$9,578 a year, which is lower than all but one of 15 western states. Non-resident undergraduate tuition and fees total \$27,720 a year, which is at the median for the western states.

Coupled with its status as a land-grant institution, the University has a statewide mission and boasts programs and activities in all 17 counties of the state. It has more than 700 employees outside the Reno area, most of them in Las Vegas. It plays a critical role in the promotion of health throughout the state through its Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health.

The University's athletics programs compete in NCAA Division I as part of the Mountain West Conference. The University fields competitive teams in 18 sports, with six men's sports and ten women's sports teams offering scholarships.

NEW SCHOOLS & EXPANSIONS

The District's first major expansion project was at Damonte Ranch High School, where in 2017, 22 classrooms were added. In August 2019, three new schools opened - the first new schools in a decade - Sky Ranch Middle School in Spanish Springs, Desert Skies Middle School in Sun Valley, and Nick Poulakidas Elementary School in south Reno. In August 2020, two more schools opened - Marce Herz Middle School in south Reno and John Bohach Elementary School in Spanish Springs. In August 2021, Michael Inskeep Elementary School in Cold Springs opened its doors.

The District also constructed a new high school to replace the current Procter Hug High School. Construction on the new O'Brien STEM Academy and new buildings at Swope Middle School are currently underway as well.









All of the new schools will comply with the most recent energy standards, and include energy efficient lighting and HVAC systems, as well as ground source heat pumps. The new buildings also include up to date safety and security features.



Pioneer Center for the Performing Arts (PCPA) is a private, non-profit 501(c)3 cultural organization. PCPA owns and operates the Pioneer Center, a 1,500-seat theater located at 100 S. Virginia St. in the heart of downtown Reno, Nevada. The largest performing arts facility in northern Nevada, the Pioneer Center features a distinctive gold-anodized geodesic dome and is an excellent example of mid-century Populuxe architecture.

Artown started in 1996 as a way to counteract suburban flight and revitalize downtown Reno by getting more people to visit the city center. An arts themed festival was created through the efforts of civic leaders, business people, and the arts community.

The flagship of the Reno Phil concert offering is a six-concert classical music series, Classix, performed on Saturday evenings and Sunday afternoons at the Pioneer Center. Music director and conductor Laura Jackson invites guest soloists of local and international acclaim. She thoughtfully selects programming that will inspire and challenge both the audience and the orchestra, balancing traditional with contemporary.

Food Truck Friday, Nevada's largest weekly food truck gathering, is at Idlewild Park in Reno every Friday during the summer. It transforms Idlewild Park into a sea of foodies and food trucks that features a weekly rotating list of food, drink and dessert vendors.

Reno Street Food is the original weekly gourmet street food event in Reno put on by locals for locals.









DOWNTOWN RENO'S LARGEST CONCERT VENUE

With 118,000 square feet of total space, Reno Events Center is the premier venue in Reno for concerts, community events, tradeshows, sporting events, conventions and conferences. It is conveniently locates near hotels and many dining options.

Popular events such as the USA Boxing Olympic Team Trials, Big Sky NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament and Reno Tournament of Champions have made their way to the venue. Concerts from Rod Stewart, Dierks Bentley and Tyler, the Creator have been hosted at Reno Events Center.





O SPARKS

Owned and operated by the RSCVA, the Reno-Sparks Convention Center underwent a major renovation and expansion in 2002, and continues to receive upgrades and improvements to its public spaces and technology offerings. Housing 600,000 square feet of meeting space, with 53 breakout rooms and 380,000 sq. ft. of contiguous exhibit space, the RSCC is the largest convention facility in Reno Tahoe. The convention center hosts a wide variety of events, including conventions, trade shows, corporate meetings, consumer shows, sporting events and competitions, and community events.

The Reno-Sparks Convention Center has also been home to various sporting conventions throughout the year, including the USA Karate National Championships and Team Trials, USA Judo Scholastic Championships, USA Taekwondo US Open, USA Weightlifting Series 1 American Open, USA Volleyball National Championships, USA Gymnastics Men's Junior Olympic Nationals, and the Amateur Athletic Union's Basketball Jam On It Memorial Day Tournament









The Reno Aces are a Minor League Baseball team of the Pacific Coast League (PCL) and the Triple-A affiliate of the Arizona Diamondbacks. They are located in Reno, Nevada, and play their home games at Greater Nevada Field, which opened in 2009. This 9,534 capacity stadium sets the standard for venue excellence with state-of-the-art technology, comfort and amenities.

The Aces have been members of the PCL since 2009, including the 2021 season in which it was known as the Triple-A West. They won the PCL championship in 2012 and went on to win the Triple-A National Championship Game.

The Recreation Area has individual picnic areas and one large group picnic area and a new trailhead.

Lazy 5 Regional Park

This park includes a 2,400 sq. ft. community center with outdoor patio and barbecue area, a water play park, two playgrounds, volleyball courts, horseshoe pits and two multi-use athletic fields.

Bowers Mansion Park

The Stately Bowers mansion is located in the center of the park and offers a rare glimpse into Nevadan life in the 1860's. The park also includes an outdoor swimming pool, playground, group and individual picnic areas.

Golden Eagle Regional Park & Sports Complex

This large outdoor artificial turf sports complex in Sparks has 1.4 million square feet of turf which currently makes it the largest single installation artificial turf project in North America.
