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Introduction

Welcome to your year-long journey of faith — a pilgrimage of heart, mind, and soul toward full communion with the Catholic Church. This guide is built upon three lights of wisdom:

- St. Thomas Aquinas for clarity of mind and truth.
- St. John of the Cross for purification and interior freedom.
- St. John Paul II for the dignity of the human person and the joy of believing.

The phrase "Ecclesia, Quid Dicis de Te Ipsa?" means "Church, what do you say of yourself?" This question will accompany you throughout these 50 weeks, helping you discover your identity as a beloved member of Christ's Mystical Body.

1 Weeks 1–10: Awakening of Faith

Week 1 — Seeking God

Scripture: John 1:38 — "What do you seek?"

Meditation: Faith begins with a question. What is your heart truly seeking?

St. Thomas Aquinas: "Faith is the beginning of eternal life." (ST II-II, q.4, a.1)

St. John of the Cross: "To come to possess all, desire the possession of nothing."

St. John Paul II: "Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises."

(Fides et Ratio, 1)

Reflection: Write what first drew you to the Church. What truth are you searching for?

Week 2 — Meeting the Living God

Scripture: Exodus 3:14 — "I AM WHO I AM."

Meditation: God is not an idea but a living presence. St. Thomas Aquinas: "God's essence is to exist."

St. John of the Cross: "God is silent, yet His silence is music."

St. John Paul II: "The revelation of God is an act of love." (Dei Verbum, 2)

Reflection: When have you sensed God's silent presence in your life?

Week 3 — The Word Became Flesh

Scripture: John 1:14

Meditation: God became man so that man might share divine life.

St. Thomas Aquinas: "The Incarnation was the most fitting way for man's restoration."

St. John of the Cross: "The Word of the Father now speaks in silence."

St. John Paul II: "Jesus Christ reveals man to himself." (Redemptor Hominis, 10)

Reflection: What does it mean to you that God became human?

2 Weeks 11–30: Growing in Understanding

Week 15 — Grace and Freedom

Scripture: Ephesians 2:8–9

Meditation: You are saved by grace — a gift, not an achievement. St. Thomas Aquinas: "Grace perfects nature; it does not destroy it."

St. John of the Cross: "Grace is the flame that consumes the soul with divine love." St. John Paul II: "Freedom finds its fulfillment in truth." (Veritatis Splendor, 87)

Reflection: How does God's grace free you from self-reliance?

3 Weeks 31–40: Purification and Illumination

Week 35 — Embracing Spiritual Darkness

Scripture: Psalm 139:12 — "Even the darkness is not dark to You."

Meditation: God often purifies through silence and difficulty.

St. Thomas Aquinas: "Faith is of things unseen." (ST II-II, q.1, a.4)

St. John of the Cross: "The dark night leads the soul to the light of union."

St. John Paul II: "In suffering is hidden a particular power that draws man close to

Christ." (Salvifici Doloris, 26)

Reflection: Where do you find hope in the midst of your struggles?

4 Weeks 41–50: Mystagogia and Mission

Week 50 — The Church and Your Mission

Scripture: Matthew 28:19-20

Meditation: The journey does not end at Easter; it begins anew. St. Thomas Aquinas: "The Church is the Mystical Body of Christ."

St. John of the Cross: "The soul united to God becomes a living flame of love."

St. John Paul II: "The Church is the universal sacrament of salvation." (Lumen Gentium,

48)

Reflection: How will you live as a witness of the Church in your daily life?
