⁴By faith Abel offered to God a more acceptable sacrifice than Cain, through which he was commended as righteous, God commending him by accepting his gifts. And through his faith, though he died, he still speaks. ⁵By faith Enoch was taken up so that he should not see death, and he was not found, because God had taken him. Now before he was taken he was commended as having pleased God. ⁶And without faith it is impossible to please him, for whoever would draw near to God must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who seek him. ⁷By faith Noah, being warned by God concerning events as yet unseen, in reverent fear constructed an ark for the saving of his household. By this he condemned the world and became an heir of the righteousness that comes by faith.

descendants as many as the stars of heaven and as many as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.

¹³These all died in faith, not having received the things promised, but having seen them and greeted them from afar, and having acknowledged that they were strangers and exiles on the earth. ¹⁴For people who speak thus make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. ¹⁵If they had been thinking of that land from which they had gone out, they would have had opportunity to return. ¹⁶But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared for them a city.


L A reading from Luke, chapter 12.



Accept, we beseech You, our bodies and souls, our hearts and minds, our talents and powers, together with the offerings we bring before You, which is our reasonable service.





Jesus Attacks Our Worry

A Meditation on the Word of God | Luke 12:22-34

In this morning's Gospel, our Lord launches a full scale attack on our worry.

Very simply, Jesus doesn't want us to worry or be anxious about anything. To help us with our worry, Jesus uses two examples from nature: the ravens and the lilies. Jesus says, let these be your teachers this morning. They have some wisdom to give to you, some knowledge to impart to you, if you will only consider them, study them, pay attention to how they live. Jesus says: Consider the ravens, they have neither storehouse nor barn. Remember the rich man from last week's Gospel? How God gave him a plentiful harvest, and he thought he needed bigger barns. Well, the ravens don't have any barns, Jesus says. Unlike us, they have no fridges or food pantries or extra storage space in their homes. When they wake up in the morning, they don't know what they are having for breakfast. And they don't know if they have enough for tomorrow. But they're not worried. They're not anxious. Why?

Because God feeds them—the Creator of heaven and earth, of whom David confesses when he says, **He gives to the beasts their food, and to the young ravens that cry**—the God we speak of in the first article of the Creed, when we confess: *he gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He daily and richly provides me with all that I need to support this body and life.*

So when Jesus calls us not to worry, he's not peddling vague optimism: "Don't worry, be happy." It's always darkest before the dawn," or other clichés. He is telling us, you really have a good reason not to worry. Why don't the ravens worry? They know something we know too, but are prone to forget for the fallen flesh. You have a Father in heaven. You have a God who loves you and cares for you: who has never ceased—not even one day of your life—to provide for you. So that every good thing you have can be traced back to his providence, his giving. Every blessing you have in your life is something you can acknowledge as a gift of the Creator God. God takes care of you. That's why you needn't be anxious.

And now, Jesus says, **consider the lilies**. These lilies Jesus has in mind, by the way, are not your hothouse grown florist flowers, made durable enough to be packed in the back of a truck and shipped across the country. No, these are the tenderest flowers that spontaneously grow upon Galilean hills. They are so fragile! Here today, and gone tomorrow. They bloom one minute and wilt the next. They don't worry. It's not that they have nothing to worry about.

They're not in paradise, the Garden of Eden. They grow up in this fallen world, like you do. To be trampled by children and dogs. Sprayed with weed killer and pesticides. Eaten by deer and rabbits. Gathered up with the grass and thrown into the oven as fuel. But ever year they return, like Christ risen from the dead, to remind us that death does not reign.

If death reigned, there would be no lilies. If Adam sinned, and God washed his hands of creation and gave up on us, there would be nothing beautiful, or excellent, or worthy of praise in the world. But even one lily in the field is testament to the fact that God hasn't given up on us, that he's still providing for us, still taking care of this broken creation. And why does God

love us so? Because of Jesus. If not for Christ, we would not have a God of love, only a God of wrath. If not for Christ, we wouldn't have any good thing, only the death we deserved for sin.

So even one lily in the field is a reminder, not only of our Creator, who provides for us, but of our Redeemer, who died so that we may have every good thing. Have you ever thought of that? Why do we get these blessings, down to the simplest pleasures like the beauty of a lily, or a cup of coffee, or piece of chocolate, the companionship of a pet, or the glory of a sunrise?

Because Jesus died on the cross. Without him, we have no good thing. So he says, **Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom**. What is the kingdom of God? It is nothing else than Christ with his righteousness, his forgiveness, his salvation, his life. That is what the Father loves to give you. It is a reminder **that life is more than food and the body more than clothing**. All the nations of the world are so obsessed with getting material possessions for themselves. Why? Because they do not know there is more to life than earthly treasure. They think the things of this world will actually satisfy them, and will protect them from their inevitable death, at which time, they will lose everything they have stored up for themselves here. But you have something greater than food and drink. You have the kingdom of God: brought into it when you were baptized, preserved in it through word and sacrament. And when your mortal life ends, you will be in the kingdom of God forever.

Here is Jesus' point: if God has given you the kingdom—if God has taken care of the big things—the great spiritual, and heavenly needs, why are you sweating the small stuff? Why are you worried about daily bread? St. Paul says the same: If he did not spare his only Son, but gave him up for us all, do you really think he is going to overlook the little things, like what you will eat, and what you will drink, and what you will wear? If he's got the big things covered you can be sure that he's got daily bread covered.

Why do we worry? We worry when we stop trusting God. We worry when we fall back into a trust and reliance upon self. We worry when we live under the illusion that we are in control of the world and our lives. We worry when we think that we are alone, and that if we don't care for ourselves, no one will. But Jesus says, Which of you, by being anxious, can add a single hour to his span of life? Worrying is futile. It's fruitless. It is unproductive. In fact, worrying destroys productivity. Because it eats away at you. It raises your blood pressure and heart rate. But you are not working. You are just spinning, your mind racing for no reason. And that's right where Satan wants you. Satan, your adversary, is a robber of joy. He wants to destroy your contentment in Christ. And he will throw anything he can at you to get you to worry. Money is often the easiest target. He would turn you to thoughts to how you will pay your bills, how you can get the stuff you want, how you can be popular or successful or just plain survive.

If he cannot get you to fret over your own desires, he will turn you to fear for others, to obsess and fret over your children or your country, to discourage you with gas prices, or scare you with what Russia might do. He will fill the broadcast news with tragedies and crimes and disasters. He will fill the book stores with lies, propaganda, and useless information. And all of it is a campaign to wear you down, to overwhelm you with sadness, to bury you with the impossibility of it all. Do not be anxious. Anxiety is useless and unnecessary. You are only hurting yourself, and the ones you love.

There is no doubt that today has its troubles. When Jesus tells us not to be anxious, he is not telling us there are no troubles in the world. He is not telling us that we shouldn't work, and are free to be idle. There are troubles that need your attention and action. Your children need their lessons and their teeth brushed. Your mother needs a phone call. Your husband needs a pat on the back. Your dog needs a treat. Even your country needs you. She needs your prayers, your involvement, and support. She needs you to pick up the trash and put it in the can, to vote for the best candidates, to watch out for your neighborhood. But those needs are small, nothing to be anxious about. The work God has given you today is well within the range of your talents and gifts. And the things you cannot control—like inflation or wars in distant lands—say a prayer, leave it in God's hands, and go to bed at once and in good cheer.

If you cannot fix geopolitical issues, it's no use worrying about them. Focus on what you're given to do, to the work God has entrusted only to you. Like a lily in the field, bloom where you are planted. Invest the gifts God has given you to love and serve your neighbor. And as you go to work and get busy, don't worry about tomorrow. Jesus lives. He will provide. The lilies do not toil or spin. The birds do not sow or reap or gather. And your Father takes care of them. How much more will he take care of you?
