Reading Genesis 18:17–33

L A reading from Genesis, chapter 18.

¹⁷The LORD said, "Shall I hide from Abraham what I am about to do, ¹⁸ seeing that Abraham shall surely become a great and mighty nation, and all the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him? ¹⁹For I have chosen him, that he may command his children and his household after him to keep the way of the LORD by doing righteousness and justice, so that the LORD may bring to Abraham what he has promised him." ²⁰Then the LORD said, "Because the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah is great and their sin is very grave, ²¹I will go down to see whether they have done altogether according to the outcry that has come to me. And if not, I will know."

²²So the men turned from there and went toward Sodom, but Abraham still stood before the LORD. ²³Then Abraham drew near and said, "Will you indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked? ²⁴Suppose there are fifty righteous within the city. Reading Colossians 2:6–19

L A reading from Colossians, chapter 2.

⁶Therefore, as you received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him, ⁷rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving.

⁴and forgive us our sins,


for we ourselves forgive everyone who is indebted to us.



Accept, we beseech You, our bodies and souls, our hearts and minds, our talents and powers, together with the offerings we bring before You, which is our reasonable service.





Abraham Intercedes for Sodom

A Meditation on the Word of God | Genesis 18:17-33

The historical context of Genesis 18 is that God is going to destroy Sodom soon. The destruction of Sodom will come as a result of God's righteous wrath against the wickedness of the people of Sodom, for "**their sin is very grave**" (V20). But Abraham has a nephew living in the city: Lot. Abraham desires that Lot would be spared. He asks if God would destroy a city if ten righteous people were living in it. God said, for the sake of ten righteous people, he would not destroy the city (V32). In the following chapter, Gen.19, the Lord destroys Sodom with fire and brimstone, but arranges for the escape of Lot and his family, who flee the city alive.

This is a story about prayer—intercessory prayer. Abraham goes boldly to God, praying for the salvation of his nephew. God hears Abraham's petitions and spares, not the whole city, but the righteous remnant living in the city, Lot and his family. Why could Abraham speak to God so boldly? Not because of his worthiness. We know that Abraham was a dirty, rotten scoundrel. Once, he gave his wife to Pharaoh, telling Pharaoh that Sarah was his sister, in order to save his own skin (Genesis 12). Once, Abraham committed adultery with Hagar at the instigation of his wife, in order to bring about a son by his own power (Genesis 16). Abraham is right to tell God that he is but "dust and ashes" (V27). This phrase is an acknowledgement that he is a child of Adam, and that the heritage he has received from his father Adam is sin which begets death. Abraham is unworthy to approach God in prayer on his own merit—this he knows.

So, then, how can Abraham approach God with such boldness? *Because of the Lord's grace*. God says of Abraham simply, "I have chosen him" (V19). Chosen Abraham for what? To be the father of a great multitude. All who share the faith of Abraham—faith in Jesus Christ—are the sons of Abraham. Abraham is chosen to be the father of that very Promised Seed who would come into the world to crush the serpent's head (Genesis 3:15-16) and save sinful Abraham and all of his descendants. Abraham, in prayer, does not cling to his own unworthiness and merit, but to the grace and promises of God. Abraham was a man of faith and was righteous not by works but through his faith in God (Genesis 15:6). Scripture calls Abraham a friend of God (Isaiah 41:8; James 2:23). Abraham was God's personal confidant (V17). God revealed his will to Abraham so that Abraham could tell his children about God's justice and mercy (V19).

This helps us understand what prayer is. Prayer is predicated upon previous knowledge of God. We will not pray aright unless we know 1. God has chosen us as his own in Baptism, and 2. His mercy to us in Jesus Christ. We share in the special status the Lord bestowed upon Abraham in Baptism. In Baptism we are all sons of God through faith. In Baptism, we become the friends and personal confidants of God. God shares his will and plans with us through his Word and we share with God our petitions in our prayers, fully expecting them to be heard and answered. Yet, like Abraham, we know that we do not deserve for God to answer one single petition we make unto him because of our wretched sin. Prayer does not depend on a status we have earned for ourselves before God or upon the beauty of the words we use. Prayer depends on the Lord's promise of his mercy. Though he is just and his judgment will come against all sodomies and wickednesses of men, he is gracious and merciful through the blood of his Son. Christian prayer clings to that mercy available to sinners through the blood of Jesus Christ.
