Brooks Community Hub signage has been installed and looks amazing. It is a beautiful building that is located in a neighbourhood that is flourishing. The Hub will provide much-needed primary health care, health promotion and wellness services, and additional programs designed to respond to community needs.

- The Consumption and Treatment Services opened at 70 James Street South;

The purpose of this program is to improve mental health access for Black youth ages 12-29 that will accelerate pathways to care and build the capacity of community services to deliver mental health services and decrease stigma

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR (INTERIM)



Another successful year was accomplished as we approached the recovery phase of the COVID-19 pandemic. This year we focused on stabilizing in our two temporary sites at 181 Main St West and 70 James St South while we await our final relocation to 430 Cannon Street East.

Our staff and leadership team have shown incredible nimbleness, innovation, and tenacity as we navigate this significant milestone in our organization.

The Hamilton Urban Core Community Health Centre continues to demonstrate our commitment to working with diverse communities in the downtown core to promote health and wellbeing, address health inequities such as poverty, racism, discrimination, unemployment, and homelessness, and collaborate with community partners to address emerging needs in our community. We recognize the intersectionality of poverty, housing, and health outcomes and take a holistic approach to our service delivery to ensure that no one is left behind. Our team was on the frontlines of housing advocacy in the city. We completed numerous housing and ID applications for clients to assist them with securing housing. Hamilton Urban Core Community Health Centre continues to be strong advocates to championing health equity in our community.



This year we broke ground and commenced construction of the Denise J. Brooks Community Hub at 430 Cannon Street East.

This building will be a welcoming and safe space for our community members to access a one-stop hub for primary health care, health promotion, and harm reduction programs and services.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR (INTERIM)



Our Primary Health Care, Community Health, Black Health, and Consumption and Treatment Services Teams have continued to champion health equity and provide much needed client-centered programs and services at our interim locations as well as delivering mobile services at partner locations in our new 430 Cannon Street East Neighbourhood. This year we had 8,155 active clients, 27,661 service encounters, 3,586 group program participants, and 250 group program sessions.

This year we received funding to launch the Hamilton Urban Safer Supply Program, the first safer supply program of its kind in the city with a mandate to reach BIPOC and newcomer communities who are often left behind in harm reduction efforts. We are very excited and looking forward to the launch of this program.

We remain grateful to our funders, donors, volunteers, community partners, and clients who had an input throughout our journey this year. We are thankful to our Board of Directors for their commitment in supporting the organization this year.

A special thank you to all the staff of Hamilton Urban Core for all the accomplishments.

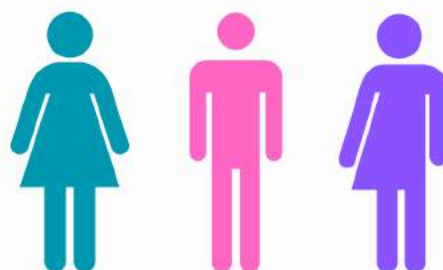

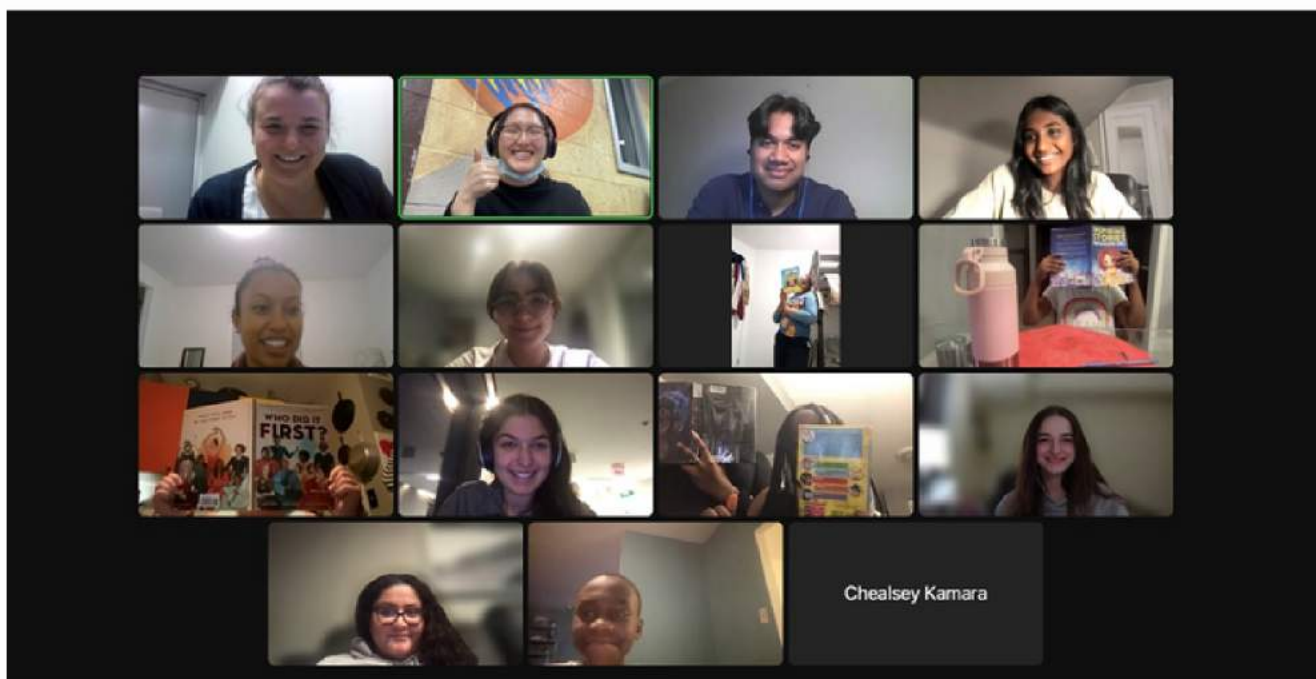

Community Health Programs

Homework Club Program

Our virtual homework club program provides learners to be paired up with an individual tutor who supports each of the learners with completing their school assignments and homework. This program runs from September to June on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.



Food Drop in Program

2022-2023 has been one of the toughest years for those facing food insecurity as it continues to be on the rise. We continue to see an increased need for our food programs. We have partnered with Zehrs in Caledonia as part of the Second Harvest Program. Weekly food donation pick up consists of fresh produce, bread, eggs, dairy and meats. Our team organizes and distributes food to our clients during this weekly program.



Housing For All! Rally at City Hall

The Community Health Team spoke some truth to power at Hamilton City Hall with our “Housing for All!” Rally. The stories that were shared were powerful and the news crew from CHCH TV was on hand to record those who spoke. As healthcare workers it is critical that we can connect with the community on advocacy events like this.

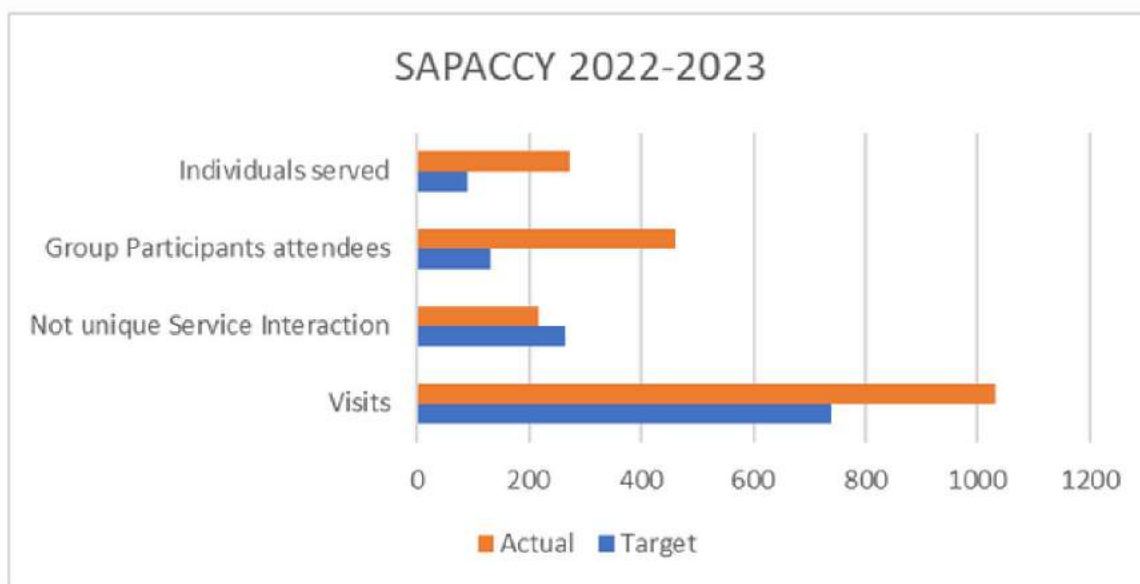
Black Health Program

The Black Health Program at the Hamilton Urban Core Community Health Centre (HUCCHC) has made significant progress in its efforts to provide health services and support to the Black community in Hamilton. The program has established a strong partnership with the Hamilton Black Health Community Leaders Forum (HBHCLF) and has been actively involved in outreach and engagement activities.

One of the notable achievements of the Black Health Program is the successful collaboration with Black African and Caribbean associations in Hamilton. The program participated in events such as Africa Week in May 2022, through conducting a week-long health promotion and awareness campaign. The campaign concluded with the Africa Day celebration and health fair, which also marked the official launching of the HBHCLF. Other partner agencies and the Greater Hamilton Health Network provided services onsite during the event.



Black Health SAPACCY Milestone Achievements for 2022-2023



Black Health surpassed targeted outcomes as shown in the above

SAPACCY - The program provides Africentric therapeutic services for black youth aged 12 to 29 and has also achieved significant milestones. Since April 2022, the team has engaged with various agencies and organizations, including the Hamilton Wentworth Catholic District School Board (HWCDSD) and YouThrive. They are also in discussions with Parole and Probation officers to explore partnerships in working with incarcerated Black youth. A three-year partnership with the HWCDSD has been signed, and positive therapeutic relationships have been established with youths at Cathedral High School.

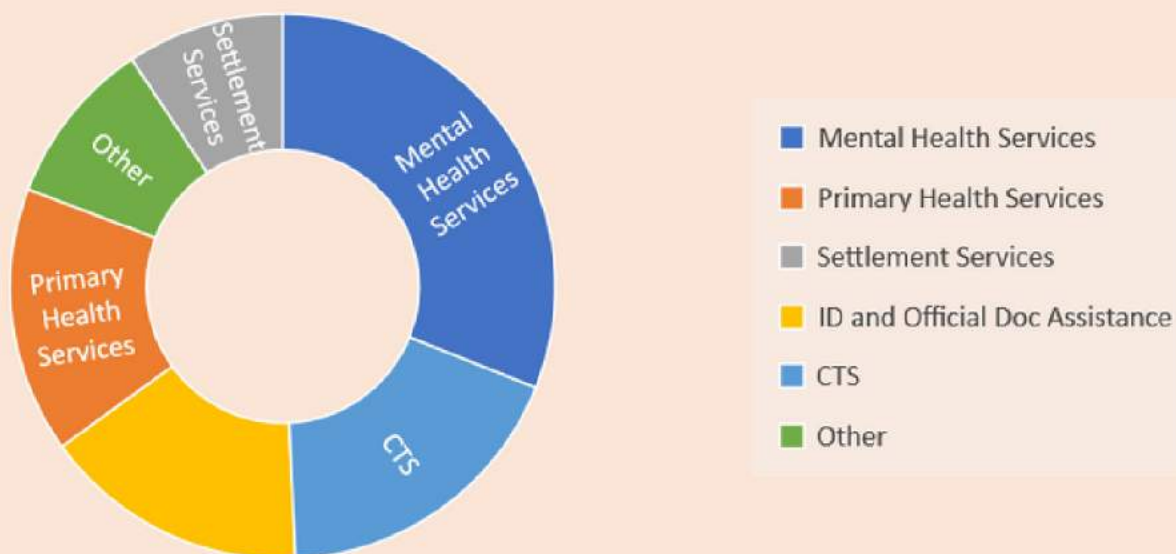
In February 2023, Black History Month, the Black Health Program organized successful programs for Black youth and their families, focusing on wellness, self-confidence, mental wellness, and community building. The programs included, "When the brothers speak" focusing on Black men's well-being and entrepreneurship, the Black Youth talent show, Black Youth Game Night, Sista to Sista event that encouraged those who self-identify as women to do self-care. The program also collaborated with the Black Alliance to provide youth wellness events provided in both French and English.



In addition to the Black Health Programs, the Pride Month Events Committee at HUCCHC organized events to raise awareness about Pride Month and provide education on serving the 2SLGBTQIA+ community. Guest speakers from organizations such as the Sexual Assault Centre - Hamilton and Area (SACHA) and the Hamilton Police engaged HUCCHC staff on the importance of sensitized communication and care for the queer community.

Data collected from 76 questionnaires during Pride Month highlighted the need for mental health resources and services targeted towards the queer community. Respondents also emphasized the importance of queer-friendly and safe Consumption and Treatment services.

PROGRAM AND SERVICES

Consumption and Treatment Services (CTS)

There were **8103** clients who visited the CTS Program. This year, our clients were still feeling the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic which led to clients experiencing increased barriers and challenges. Particularly, the growing housing crisis and drastic cost of living which meant for many of our clients there were simply no places to go.

The team did their best to respond to the constant demand for food, shelter and access to basic needs such as washrooms and hygiene supplies. But the resource never matched the need. All the while a new risk was identified a drug called xylazine resurfaced in the supply. This was and still is a great concern because overdose from xylazine cannot be reversed by naloxone.

Our Peer Support Workers and Harm Reduction Counselors were also part of an experiential learning organized by the Dr. Peters Aid's Foundation. This included a tour of Consumption and Treatment Services in Toronto. Giving them the opportunity to see how CTS spaces were run in different communities and organizations. They brought back great ideas and suggestions that have been incorporated within the CTS. Staff also participated in Train the Trainer Harm Reduction 101 in effort to be able to share this information with clients and community members there by expanding the understanding of what Harm Reduction is.

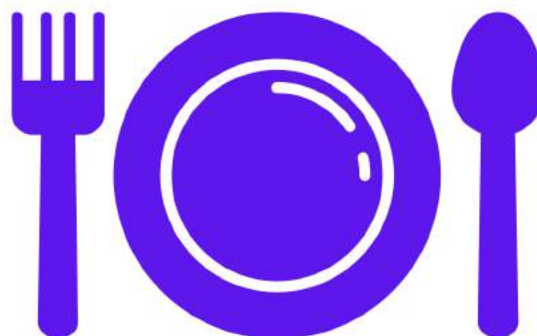


Last year the team gathered feedback from clients about how to make the CTS space more inclusive and safer for people who may be hesitant to connect. The clients shared that they wanted:

A place they can socialize



A place they can get a meal



A place they can create art



" POSITIVE SPACE "

As a result, the CTS team developed a program called "Positive Space" that will be launched in the new year. Where 2SLGBTQ+, non-binary, gender diverse and people who identify as women will have a safe space to connect and create together.

The CTS RN's have also been busy responding to the need for wound care and as such created "wound care" kits with health promotion information for people to take with them.

In response to the growing request for Naloxone Training the team also participated in Naloxone Train the Trainer thanks to The City of Hamilton Public Health.





Our team experienced a growing demand for hygiene kits, clothing and food which often outpaces the resources available.

The team is very grateful for the support from Helping Hands, City of Hamilton Public Health and The Hub who have always been available to help the team when they needed to find clothing, food and or protection from the heat.

The team also wanted to highlight the great outcome of the International Overdose Awareness Day events that occurred across the City of Hamilton on August 31, 2022. Hamilton Urban Core's event took place at the CTS location 70 James Street, St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. We are very grateful for the clients who participated in the Truth Hearing. Also, to Chris Cull who came all the way to Hamilton to share his truths and experience on his pathway using substances and in recovery. The leadership of the Greater Hamilton Health Network; Black Youth Leader; St. Paul's Presbyterian Church; Aids Network also attended and listened to as clients of the Centre shared their personal experiences. Curbside Eatery, the City of Hamilton Public Health, and TELUS Health graciously sponsored the event and provided delicious food for the event. The Centre worked with partners across the City to raise awareness and make #everydoor the right door.





The monthly Open Houses provided an opportunity to connect with students from Mohawk and Trios Colleges; community members; and other services providers who joined the team for a tour of the CTS space, ask questions and learn about Hamilton Urban Core.

The team also hosted the Winnipeg Free Press who did an article about Hamilton's response to the drug poisoning crisis including the Consumption and Treatment Services in effort to open their community discussion and develop action steps towards opening a consumption and treatment service in their community.

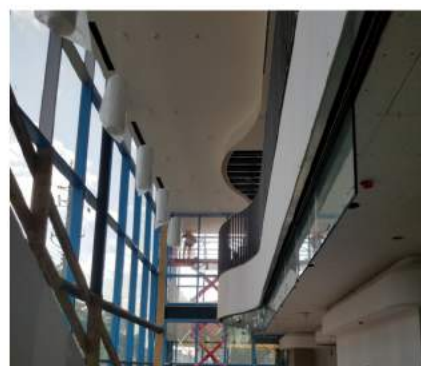
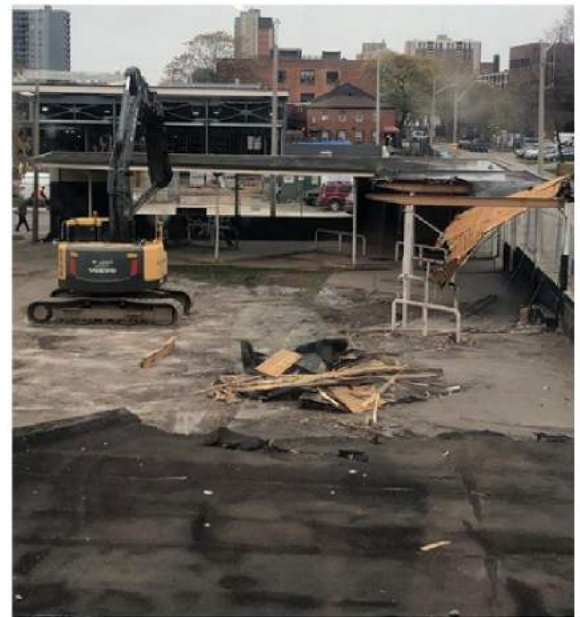
