## The Pile Up

by Robin Adolphs illustrated by Trevor Salter

Note: Some of these activities require adult supervision.

### **Discussion Ideas**

#### Knowledge and Literal Understanding

- Children playing outside, exercising and having fun.
- Safety What should the children be wearing to protect themselves? Look at the illustrations to see if they are wearing all the protective gear they need.
- Is it easy to see how many characters are in the story? Why not? The illustrator intentionally crowds the racers together to give a sense of chaos and jostling for position.
- What were the children riding? Can you think of anything else they could have used in the race? e.g. roller blades, skates, pedal car, unicycle. Discuss differences.
- Page 8: Where did the racers line up? Page 19: Did they line up properly?
- Pages 12 and 14: What were the markers the racers had to look for?
- Page 20: What happened to Bill?
- Page 22: What happened to Susie?
- Page 38: Who won the race and why was he able to win?

## Inferential and Critical Thinking

- Do you think 6:00pm was a good time to start the race? Yes or no. Why?
- If Bertie's brother had not won the race, which racer do you think would have won? Why?
- The author uses rhythm and rhyme. How does this help the reader/audience when reading/ listening to this racing story? Find the rhyming words and near rhymes in the story. (see Word Building/Rhyming Words)
- This is a make-believe story. Would you join in a race like this? Yes or no. Why?
- Page 19: When the racers are lined up at the start, why is there a 'FINISH' sign? Discuss
  how a race course design can have the finish line at the same place as the start line. e.g.
  circuit road, cul-de-sac or reaching a marker and coming back. (see Comprehension/map)

- Compound Words skateboard, driveway, everyone

- Text Vocabulary wordsearch (activity 2)

- Alliteration page 34:
  - **B**ikes, **b**oards and **b**odies, **T**wisted and **t**angled. Arms, legs and bike parts, **M**ashed up and **m**angled.
  - Whole class write a 'racing' sentence using 'r' words. e.g. *Ricky rode his racer around and around the roundabout.*
  - Examine Tongue Twisters. Children use their own name in a sentence. e.g. *Lovely Lily likes licking little Iollies*. (see Writing)
- Draw a bicycle, skateboard or scooter and label its parts. (see Writing)

#### Grammar

- Naming words nouns Mystery Word (activity 3)
- Contractions we're, we'll, won't, it's, they're, he's, she's, who's, can't, he'll, where's note: also words where 'is' or 'has' are missing. e.g. winner's, everyone's, Bill's, Susie's

## Comprehension

• Sequence order of events -

Make a map of the race course and add markers on the course. This could be turned into a board game by adding numbered squares. OR - Design your own race course. Use cut and paste pictures and/or sentences. (activities 4 and 5)

Missing Words and Cloze – comprehension (activities 6 and 7)

## Writing

- Write Tongue Twisters. (see Alliteration)
- Design a poster to advertise the race.
- Label parts of a bicycle, scooter (activity 8) or skateboard. (see Vocabulary)
- You were winning the race and Bertie's brother beats you. Write about the last moments of the race and how you felt when you saw him cross the line. Here are some story starters to help you:

#### Literature/Media

- Read non-fiction texts and research bicycles, scooters, skateboarding and racing.
- Compare other fiction texts e.g. Sally Jean, the Bicycle Queen by Cari Best (4+), Marta and the Bicycle by Germano Zullo (4+)
- Read *Mulga Bill's Bicycle* by Banjo Paterson ballad/poem written in 1896. Examine the vocabulary, rhythm/rhyme and 'olden days' differences.

### Cross Curricular

#### Maths

- Dot to Dot numbers 1 to 20 (activities 9, 10 and 11) numbers 1 to 100 (activity 12)
- Colour by Number numbers to twelve and basic colours including the use of dark and light. (activity 13)
- Jigsaw using cut and paste skills, spatial awareness and visual discrimination. (activity 14)
- Maze spatial awareness and visual discrimination. (activity 15)
- Finish the Picture using symmetry and a grid to finish the missing half of a picture. (activities 16 and 17)
- Make a Bike Tyre Trundle Wheel using measurement and construction skills and following instructions. (activity 18)
- Sequencing numbers on a game board. (see Writing)
- Children bring their scooters, skateboards or bikes to school. Measure the distance you can travel with one push on a scooter, skateboard or bike.

#### Science

• Force - examine cause and effect.

#### Art/Craft

- Examine the illustrator's work and how he is able to convey the rhythm of the race and also the sense of chaos, danger and climax at the end.
- Use the ideas from the illustrator to try and create an illustration for your story.
- Who's the Winner? paper folding fine motor skills and following instructions. (activity 19)
- Colouring-in (activities 20 and 21)

**Bike Tyre Trundle Wheel** Trundle wheels are used to quickly measure distance by pushing a wheel along a path and counting the clicks. You can turn your bike wheel into a trundle wheel.


## You will need:


- bike
- piece of cardboard or playing card
- tape measure
- sticky tape
- bike helmet



trundle wheel

- 1. Measure the distance around the front tyre (circumference) of your bike with the tape measure (A).
- 2. Sticky tape the playing card or cardboard to a spoke on the front wheel. The card needs to hit the fork of your front wheel each time it turns (B).
- 3. Ride your bike at a slow pace without being wobbly. Count how many times the card hits the fork frame. Remember to wear your bike helmet.
- 4. Multiply this by the measurement around your wheel and you will get the distance you have travelled on your bike.




