It is said that "when the going gets tough, the tough get going." Well, sometimes getting those longer speeches from the Levels 4 and 5 completed can seem to be tough going because when can your 15 to 20-plus minute be given during your usual club meeting time? As it often happens, Toastmasters International has the answer!

Actually, several options are available: a club meeting given over to only speeches and evaluations or a separate meeting with only speeches and evaluations. The latter can be planned for the fifth meeting period of the month—which usually occurs once per quarter during the year. This option can also be utilized to network with another club or clubs with only a couple of speakers but not enough to make an n entire meeting length get together. You could hold such a meeting online or hybrid depending on the needs of the group. All participants must give Pathways speeches and each speaker will

also be an evaluator providing written evaluations for their speaker. А Toastmaster and a Timer are also needed. The organizer of the Speak-A-Thon can also get Pathways credit for organizing the event or credit for organizing an online meeting depending on your venue. Therefore, at least four to six members can get Pathways credit for Project speeches depending on the Project on which they are working. For example, Giving Social Speeches requires two short speeches whereas Preparing to Speak Professionally requires a 20 + length presentation. There is also the Evaluate the Evaluator speech that can be attached to any of the other evaluators with their permission. The options are almost endless and are limited only by your imagination! Think about it: the Club Year is just beginning. You can schedule at least one of these speak-a-thons to ensure the needs of all your members can be met. All the best!

#### **CAN WE BE BETTER TOASTMASTERS?** ~ Simon Tremblay

The first land acknowledgement I heard was at an afternoon of holiday entertainment presented by the local L' Arche community in 2017. Recited after the singing of the national anthem, and before the first holiday carol, the land acknowledgement caught me off guard. It is a brief statement that acknowledges that the land we are working on, praying, playing on, or resting on is the traditional land of the First Nation people that calls it home. It also acknowledges that there is a treaty governing the land that we are about to employ and enjoy.

Land Acknowledgments are popping up more frequently at public gatherings: my daughter's graduation, Church services, and even on television news. It caught me off guard because it was unexpected and stirred up many questions. Do we not own the land we live on? Are we to forfeit the land to First Nations because of the actions of our ancestors?

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission, created in 2008, was launched to investigate the widespread abuse that occurred in residential schools and affected generations of

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First Nations persons across Canada. The recommendations of that report, published in 2015, come from an examination of the atrocities that took place in residential schools, but blossomed into a full blown examination of national conscience regarding the relationship between the First Nations persons and European settlers.

Justin Trudeau, Canadian Prime Minister, introduced the land acknowledgement to its broadest audience at a ceremony in 2016. "Before I begin, I'd like to recognize the Algonquin Nation, on whose traditional territory we are gathering. We acknowledge them as the past, present and future caretakers of this land." Canada has been a leader in promoting land acknowledgments, but the US has more recently adopted them in certain settings.

Do we own the land we have purchased? Yes, but we should acknowledge the history of these lands and whose they are Should traditionally. we surrender ownership of the properties we control back to First Nations? No need, since they were the first stewards of the land. Including land acknowledgements represent a concrete action we can take to make a difference. We may be unable to right the innumerable wrongs inflicted on our First Nations but brothers and sisters. we can acknowledge that they are the past, present and future caretakers of this land.

Should Toastmasters consider incorporating land acknowledgements into Zoom, hybrid or in-person meetings? As a leadership program we should do the right thing and lead others to do the right thing. Land acknowledgements are the right thing to do because they serve as a reminder of our ongoing responsibility to work towards reconciliation with our First Nations brothers and sisters, and they help us honor the First Nations people who cared for this land for centuries before we arrived. Do the right thing!


