The fifth point in the Toastmaster's Promise says, "I promise to help the club maintain the positive, friendly environment necessary

for all members to learn and grow". When you think of your club meetings, would you say that you are doing your part to ensure all members have a safe and supportive environment?

The promise directly speaks to the club environment, but shouldn't we be providing this outside of the club as well? All members should feel safe and supported within our Area, Division and District as well. When we provide a supportive learning environment, our members will thrive and continue to grow.

What can you do to provide a safe and supportive learning environment where you are? Here are a few tips that I have found helpful:

 Smile – body language tells others a lot about your current mood

- Offer to help as needed remember someone could be learning for the first time
- Be cooperative stay positive and respect difference of opinions
- Use mistakes as a learning opportunity – guide someone through their mistake and give them constructive feedback for the future

When someone feels safe and supported in their environment, they are more likely to open up and grow. As a Toastmaster, we promised to act within Toastmasters' core values of integrity, respect, service and excellence. Let's ensure that we are doing just that as we move through our journey together! By doing so, we can *inspire* others and *celebrate* each other's successes.



A VISION FOR SUCCESS

Each club has the same mission which is to provide a supportive environment in which members can develop their communication and leadership skills, thereby fostering self-confidence and personal growth.

Does your club have a vision? How does a vision differ from the mission statement? The vision states where you want the club to be at the end of the year or at the end of five or ten years. For example, the club vision could be to achieve Distinguished status or better by the April 30th every year. How does this vision relate to the club mission statement?

As previously mentioned, the club mission is to allow members to develop their communication and leadership skills. How do we know they have accomplished this? One measure of success is member progress. As members achieve various educational and leadership designations, we know they are progressing through the program. If they have received constructive evaluations, and have incorporated the advice from these evaluations, then they will have developed their skills. This fosters their personal growth and helps transform them into more confident individuals.

The connection between the mission statement and the vision is that six of the goals needed to achieve Distinguished status are directly related to members achieving educational and leadership designations. If you achieve these six goals (4 Level 1s, 4 Level 2s and 1 Level 3 and 2 Levels 4, 5 or DTM), you know your members are developing their skills and you will have achieved the vision of attaining at least Distinguished status.

This, however, can only happen if your members understand the benefit to them of achieving these goals. One of the roles of the club executive is to work with members and help them establish goals that will allow both the individual member and the club to be successful. Have you done this in your club?

Recently, a member of two weeks in the Schooner club, Indumathi Azhagesan was asked in a Table Topics how members could help the club achieve its goals. Her answer should be an inspiration to us all. She said there are four things that each member can do:

- 1) Make a commitment
- 2) Progress through your Path
- 3) Learn from your mistakes
- 4) Attend regularly

Members should know the goals for the club as a whole and the executive should know the goals of each member and ensure that opportunities are provided to ensure members can achieve their goals. Working as a team in this manner, everyone can be successful. Set your goals, work toward them and continue to *Inspire and Celebrate*.

Vision without action is a dream.

Action without vision is a pass time.

Vision with action can change the world!

PARLIAMENTARY MINUTE

In the November newsletter, we looked at main motions. We will now discuss amendments.

Amendments can be made to insert, delete, or change the wording of an amendable motion. However, an amendment is not to completely reverse the meaning of the motion. Amendments are made during discussion of the main or another amendable motion. For example, consider the following motion which has been made and seconded "I move that we hold an Open House." An amendment could be made to specify the date so the person making the amendment would say "I move an amendment to the motion to add the November 30 after Open House."

A second is required, it is debatable and amendable, a majority vote is required, and the amendment can be reconsidered. If made and seconded, the amendment must be discussed and voted on before going back to discussion on main motion. Why? Because it may change the main motion and change opinions on whether it pass or fail. Once the amendment is passed or failed, business proceeds back to discussion on the main motion as it was made or as amended. If amended, the Chair should state the wording of the main motion as amended. In this case, the Chair would say "We now have a motion on the floor to hold an Open House on November 30".

Amendments can be amended. The same procedure applies as for the amendment to a main motion. However, only two levels (an amendment to the amendment) are usually allowed – too many levels of amendments are confusing. Remember that the "amendment to the amendment" must be decided first (takes precedence), then the "amendment to the main motion," and then the main motion. And each level of amendment is offered, discussed, and voted upon during the discussion of the motion to which it applies. Once the amendment to the amendment is dealt with it is possible to move another amendment to the amendment (or the amended amendment). Similarly, once an amendment is either carried or failed, another amendment can be made before the main motion is discussed. For example, if the amendment to add the date of November 30 failed, another amendment could be moved for a different date.

Next month, we will look at the forms of voting.





NAVIGATING THE NEW TI WEBSITE

The new TI website takes some searching to find the things you are used to. Here how's to access some commonly used pages:



Club Central

To find Club Central, sign in:

 Go to My Home in the drop-down menu and scroll down. You will then see Club Central. You will only see this if you are a club officer.

DCP results

To find the Distinguished Club Program results for your club (you do not need to be signed in for this):

- Go to Membership/Leadership Central and the Distinguished Performance Reports.
- Put your club number in the search box at the top left corner of the page and it will bring up the DCP report for your club.

Pathways Information

To access Base Camp Manager or to choose a Path:

- Sign in and go to Education Programs.
- You will see Go to Base Camp at the top with a button that says "Access".
- Click on that button and it will bring up the boxes that allow you to choose a Path, Launch the Navigator and go to Base Camp or log in as a Base Camp Manager.

Continue to play around the with new website and you will become familiar with how to access all the information you're used to looking at.

INCENTIVES



Track Your Success Member Incentive – This incentive is to encourage members to participate in all facets of a meeting and to participate in events outside of the club. Each member should keep track of his or her results. The incentive runs from

January 1, 2023 to March 31, 2023. The completed form must be submitted by April 10, 2023 to <u>Paul</u> <u>Coddington</u>. The form can be downloaded from our website at <u>https://d45toastmasters.org/incentives</u>. It is an Excel spreadsheet which will automatically calculate and total your club's points. You only need to enter the number of members achieving/participating in the stated events. First place will receive a basket of varied goodies worth \$150 US; 2nd place - a basket of varied goodies worth \$100 US; and then 4 club names will be randomly drawn from the remaining entries for a basket of varied goodies worth \$50 US each.

Awards

Dave Rosvall Award –presented to a District 45 Toastmaster who has demonstrated long-term and meritorious service to the District above the club level. This can be for someone who has conducted Speechcraft or Youth Leadership programs, helped with sample meetings for a new club, has been a club sponsor, mentor or coach, served as a District leader at any level or for other activities beyond the club level. The recipient is determined each year by the Past District Governors and Directors. The recipient must have been a D45 Toastmaster for at least 10 years and must be planning to attend the conference. District Governors must have been out of office for at least 5 years before receiving the award.

Distinguished by April 30th award – this award is presented at the annual conference to any club that has achieved 5 or 6 points in the Distinguished Club Plan by April 30th and has the requisite number of members to qualify for Distinguished. This award will be automatically determined by the District based on the reports from Toastmasters International.

Select Distinguished by April 30th award – this award is presented at the annual conference to any club that has achieved 7 or 8 points in the Distinguished Club Plan by April 30th and has the requisite number of members to qualify for Distinguished. This award will be automatically determined by the District based on the reports from Toastmasters International.

President's Distinguished by April 30th award – this award is presented at the annual conference to any club that has achieved 9 or 10 points in the Distinguished Club Plan by April 30th and has the requisite number of members to qualify for Distinguished. This award will be automatically determined by the District based on the reports from Toastmasters International.

EVALUATING EFFECTIVELY

Do you remember the first speech evaluation you gave? How did that work out for you? I do. It was chaos. There was a lot going on. I had no idea what was needed to prepare a quality evaluation. I learned a few things since that first evaluation. Besides downloading the evaluation resource and reviewing the speech objectives, talking to the speaker helps me to see if they have specific objectives they want feedback on. The biggest learning for me though was (drum roll) --- limit the other responsibilities I take on during the meeting so I can focus on my evaluation. I needed to reign in my brain even in how I paid attention to the speech itself to honor the objectives. For me, this meant less chaos and more quality. Focusing to provide a quality evaluation is a strength I have gained in Toastmasters.

Soon there will be Evaluation contests leading to the District contest. Will you be participating? All members, except District leaders or those running for an elected position, are eligible to participate. Some clubs have a focus on evaluation that can help prepare you for the contest. Here's information on a couple of them.

Spotlight Toastmasters is an advanced club that offers 3D Evaluations to improve your evaluation skills. If you are interested, they would be delighted to have you as their guest. The club meets the first Saturday of each month at 8:30 am ET/9:30 am AT. Contact <u>vppr-9985@toastmastersclubs.org</u>

At **Toast of the Coast Advanced Club**, immediately following the regular speech evaluation, all attendees are asked for comments on the speech and the speaker can respond. Each speaker gets up to 20 minutes of feedback on their speech. This process benefits the speakers, and it also hones the evaluation skills of all members as we hear a number of different perspectives on the same speech. Past International Director and Past Region Advisor Monique Levesque-Pharaoh said she thought anyone interested in taking their evaluation skills to the next level should join Toast of the Coast. THE 5 W'S OF MEETUP

Meetup is a tool to assist clubs in attracting guests who may have never heard of Toastmasters. Is your club using the free District 45 Meetup group to advertise your club meetings?

What is Meetup?

Individuals and groups use Meetup to promote their events, activities, and meetings to people who have similar interests. Meetup is a social networking site that allows you to find and join groups related to your own personal interests. However, instead of just talking about these interests online, Meetup is used to organize online, hybrid and in-person meetings in your area of interest. Think of it like the equivalent to your local library's bulletin board.

Why a Meetup Pilot Project?

What

Meetup is not free - This is why so many clubs haven't been using it. District 45 is piloting a program for our clubs where the district absorbs the meetup subscription fee, and our clubs can join our account for free. Many other Toastmasters districts are already doing this. If the 6-month pilot project is successful – the district may extend the subscription.

Where do I find our Club?

Go to https://www.meetup.com/toastmasters-district-45-us-nh-me-vt-can-peinb-ns/ and click on Events. You will see a rectangular box on the left side of the page that shows List and Calendar. Click on Calendar. When the Calendar is populated with Toastmaster Club information, search for the date and time of your Club meeting. If it's there, your Club has a Meetup page!

Who should sign up?

Make sure there is at least one person in your club assigned to maintain your club's meetup account. If you are new to Meetup, you first need to create a free Meetup profile. Encourage all your club members to also create a free Meetup profile and sign up that they are attending all upcoming meetings – even if they are not sure whether you can attend.



When should we join?

Sign your club up as soon as possible to take advantage of promoting your club and attracting guests to your meetings. The district has committed to offering the subscription free of charge for 6 months and the continuation of this project will be determined by how successful we are at using Meetup.

Schooner Toastmasters #3978 was recognized at the Fall Extravaganza for achieving President's Distinguished Club status for at least the last 20 years. TI records don't go back before then but club records maintain it's longer than the 20 years. For 75% of those years the club has achieved 10 out of 10 DCP points. The club sets achieving President's Distinguished as their goal each year. In the past few years, staying at 20 members has been a struggle but the club has managed to recruit sufficient members each year to have at


