#### YOUR NEXT LEADERSHIP STEP

The mission of a Toastmasters club is to help us develop our communication and leadership skills. Do you know what leadership opportunities are available and how they may apply to your development and your goals? Within the club, there are leadership opportunities which are reflected in the club officer positions. Taking on these leadership roles will help you with teamwork, setting goals and priorities for the club, resolving conflict and helping others to achieve their goals.

There are also leadership opportunities beyond the club level. Four to six clubs form an Area, and there is an Area Director who works with the clubs to help them achieve their goals and acts as a resource for the club. The Area Director is considered a District officer and is the District officer with the most direct contact with clubs. The Area Director is also responsible for ensuring Area speech contests are held. An Area Director is responsible for conducting at least two visits during the year with each club. Area Directors are appointed by the District Director.

Three to six Areas form a Division led by a Division Director elected at the annual conference. The Division Director supports the Area Directors in their roles and ensures Division contests are held. The Division Director is not required to visit clubs, but rather acts as a link between the Area Directors and the rest of the District officers.

The Divisions (currently five) form the District. There are several appointed positions in the District leadership, namely the Public Relations Manager, Administration Manager and Finance Manager. In addition to the Division Directors, there are three other elected District officer positions — District Director, Program Quality Director, and Club Growth Director. Generally, one progresses through the offices to District Director but that is not always the case. Each officer has specific roles and as a team, they are responsible for the growth of Toastmasters through the building of new clubs and for ensuring District clubs provide the opportunities for members to achieve their goals.

If you have set achieving a Distinguished
Toastmaster designation as your ultimate goal, you need to serve a year as a District officer (any of the ones discussed above to the District Director level).
What are your leadership aspirations? It's never too early to decide what roles you may be interested in or what role you need to achieve your goals. If you are interested in a leadership role at the club level, let your club president know. If you are interested in a leadership role outside the club, even if it's not for the next year, let your Area Director or the District Leadership Committee Chair know. Taking on these leadership roles can be a great learning experience for you. Plan now for your next step in your Toastmasters leadership development.



There is no doubt that our Toastmasters world changed abruptly in March 2020. The beginning of what came to be known as "the pandemic" forced us into holding our meetings solely online. The response was quick because it was a "do or die" situation for Toastmasters International and its clubs. We reluctantly embraced that change, but serendipitously, learned some new skills!

Almost three years later, many of us are still wondering what the future will bring. Specifically, how do we run a club that has an online component, or one without? That decision will have a long-lasting impact on your club. Come to the *Striving for Success* webinar on January 11<sup>th</sup> and be informed, educated, and perhaps, just satisfied with your meeting format decision.

Wednesday night is the new day for these webinars, and the first one is January 11<sup>th</sup>. Please join us as Club Growth Director Paul Coddington, DTM presents four options for a Toastmasters club meeting format, and then leads a panel discussion with advocates and adopters of all four styles. There will be a question and answer segment with the panelists as well. Bring your questions about technology, expenses, and marketing for them!

Has the idea of attempting a hybrid meeting been nagging at your executive committee? Visit with us on January 11<sup>th</sup>, then go back to your clubs and have a Toastmasters life-changing discussion. Embrace the change!

Surround yourself with the dreamers and the doers, the believers and thinkers, but most of all, surround yourself with those who see greatness within you even when you don't see it yourself.

#### **PARLIAMENTARY MINUTE**

There are four basic methods of voting in a meeting:

#### 1. Voice

The Chair asks members to verbally say "Aye" or "Nay" to a motion. This type of vote is used when a specific count is not required. When used, the Chair must decide and announce which vote carried the majority and whether the motion passed or failed.

#### 2. Rising

Rising means standing or raising of hands. This method is used for a specific count and that count should be announced by the Chair along with the passage or failure of the motion.

#### 3. Secret ballot

The secret ballot is used to allow each member to cast their vote while avoiding undue influence by others. The Chair is allowed to vote when using this method.

#### 4. Roll call

The secretary polls and records the vote of each member. The Chair then announces the results, often stating which members voted for and against the issue.


Most votes require a simple majority, which is one more than half the members voting (**not** 51% of those present). For example, suppose there are 20 members

present at a meeting and a vote is required on a motion which needs a simple majority to pass. Fifty one percent of the members present would be 10.2 members. Since you cannot count a portion of a member, 51% would be rounded up to 11 members. However, if only 16 of the members vote on the motion, then one more than half of those voting would be 9 members. So, in this case, it would require 9 favorable votes to pass the motion (one more than half those members voting), instead of 11 (51% of those members present). A two-thirds majority is required for motions which limit rights. A two-thirds vote requires a rising or ballot vote.

The Chair does not vote during a voice vote to avoid undue influence by the power of his or her position. If the Chair cannot determine whether the "ayes" or "nays" have more votes, he or she may decide to call for a rising vote. In the case of a rising vote, the Chair may vote to create or break a tie, but not both. The Chair is free to vote in a secret ballot like any other member. In all cases, a tied vote fails to pass the motion.

If a member does not agree with the determination of the chair on a vote, they may call for a "Division of the House." If the Division of the House is called for, the Chair must proceed to a counted vote (rising or ballot).

Not all motions require a vote by the body, some are simply ruled on by the Chair (e.g. point of order).



#### Inspire Success through Celebrating with Recognition

As we start our second half of our Toastmaster year, we start to take notice of our individual club status. All clubs are striving to become distinguished. How do they become distinguished? The club needs to have at least twenty members or a net growth of five. They need to have received at least five of the DCP points. This is done through individual growth and success. Clubs should be encouraging their members to complete their open manuals and receive the educational recognition they deserve. Have your successful members and leaders assist each member with their personal goals to ensure each member is receiving the full support of the Toastmaster programs. Each member should work with the VP of Education to guarantee sufficient time with scheduling. Strong members make strong leaders.

The most successful method for encouragement is recognition! Here are several ways to encourage and reward your members to achieve their individual success:

<u>Trail Blazer Award:</u> A member who attains four or more Levels before the end of the current Toastmaster Year will be recognized as a Toastmaster Trail Blazer. It promises to be challenging – you need to attain any four Levels in any Path and/or your DTM. But with goal setting and commitment, it's doable! Here are some of the benefits:

- Individual recognition in the District 45
   Newsletter, distributed throughout the district.
- Recognition during award presentations.
- A binder and a pin for first-time recipients
- Certificates to be presented or mailed at the next conference.
- Most importantly: maximized personal growth through the Toastmasters educational program.

<u>Certificates of Completion:</u> As each member completes a Level in their Path Base Camp Manager should download the Certificate of Completion. Present this to the member during a club meeting to recognize their achievement.


<u>Toastmaster of the Year:</u> Reward that dedicated member that has supported your club by giving speeches, serving as an officer, participated in a contest and achieved personal education awards, with a positive attitude! Making strong members helps to develop our future strong leaders. Step out of your comfort zone and volunteer to do projects that will expand your development. Offer to participate in trainings and conferences where you will be reaching members you are unfamiliar with. Stepping out of that comfort zone will guide you to broader and brighter leadership paths!

Don't wait until you've reached your goal to be proud of yourself.

Be proud of every step you take toward reaching that goal.

#### **BELIEVE IT, ACHIEVE IT**



we believe in but many of the things in which we believe are achievable. Success in the Toastmasters education program is one thing that we can achieve if we believe in our ability to do so. The ultimate achievement in the Toastmasters education program is the Distinguished Toastmaster designation or DTM. Even that designation is achievable if you believe you can do it. However, it does require planning. There are requirements outside of completing two Paths that require planning and commitment on your part. This graphic illustrates what is needed to achieve your DTM. All the requirements outlined in the blue box must be met. Participating in the preparation of a Club Success Plan and attending a Toastmasters Leadership Institute should go together with being a club officer. District officer roles are Area Director, Division Director and the seven Senior Leader roles outlined in Your Next Leadership Step on page xx.

You must also complete one of the two requirements in the first box in the burgundy box and one of the three in the second box. Club mentors and club sponsors work with new clubs. Club coaches work with struggling clubs to help them achieve success. Over half the clubs in the District are currently eligible for a club coach. This would be a great opportunity for

you to work on this credit. It takes time and it takes commitment but it is worth the effort you put in. It's a great feeling of achievement when your coached club achieves Distinguished Club status. If interested in being a club coach, contact our Club Growth Director Paul Coddington.

Look for opportunities for a Youth Leadership Program – Scouts or Guides, church youth groups, at your local high school – these are all places where you may be able to run a Youth Leadership Program. For a speechcraft group, your work may be a possibility. Other opportunities could be your church, local continuing education programs and non-profit organizations.

The final requirement in the diagram is your DTM project. You must have completed Level 3 in your second Path before you can get this project. The project is intended to be one that benefits either your club or the District (including at Area or Division level). Talk to your club officers to decide what would be a useful project for your club or talk to a District leader if you're interested in doing one at that level. You do not need to have completed all your other requirements before doing your DTM project.

Achieving your DTM may seem daunting. However, it truly is a case of "If you dream it with all your mind and believe it with all your heart, you can achieve it with all your might."

INCENTIVES AWARDS

Track Your Success Member Incentive – This

incentive is to encourage members to participate in all facets of a meeting and to participate in events outside of

the club. Each member should keep track of his or her results. The incentive runs from January 1, 2023 to March 31, 2023. The

completed form must be submitted by April 10, 2023 to Paul Coddington. The form can be downloaded from our website at https://d45toastmasters.org/incentives.

First place will receive a basket of varied goodies worth \$150 US; 2<sup>nd</sup> place - a basket of varied goodies worth \$100 US; and then 4 club names will be randomly drawn from the remaining entries for a basket of varied goodies worth \$50 US each.



The Talk Up

campaign begins the
first of February and
runs until the end of

March. This is a campaign run by Toastmasters International. If you recruit five new, dual or reinstated members during February and March, your club will receive a ribbon for its banner and a discount on its next order from the Toastmasters store. To supplement this membership campaign, the District is also offering an incentive. There will be three levels of incentive for those clubs — one for recruiting 1 or 2 members, one for recruiting 3 — 4 members and one for recruiting 5 or more members. Talk Up Toastmasters and bring in those new members or reinstated members prior to the April dues renewal.

**Excellence in Education Award** - awarded to any club that has achieved the first four (4) education points in the Distinguished Club Program for the past three (3) years.

Excellence in Leadership Award – awarded to any club that has achieved points 5 and 6 of the Distinguished Club Program and has had at least four (4) officers trained in each TLI period for the past three (3) years.

Trailblazer Award – this award goes to individual members who achieve any 4 levels in Pathways during one Toastmaster year. The 4 levels do not have to be in the same path. First - time recipients receive a binder in which to store their certificates. Repeat recipients receive a certificate and a small gift. Only one Trailblazer award can be earned in one year.

Al Ferguson Memorial award – This award is presented to any club that achieves 10 out of the 10 Distinguished Club Plan awards. This is automatically determined by the District based on the reports from Toastmasters International.

Terry Chinnery award – this award is presented to the club with the greatest percentage increase in members from the previous April. This award is automatically calculated by the District based on reports from Toastmasters International.

MultiMedia Omnipresence award - this award is presented at the annual conference to the club judged to use all aspects of public relations to the best advantage of their club. Included could be newspaper, newsletters, website, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. Clubs (usually the President or Vice President of Public Relations) submit a portfolio of 8-10 samples of their public relations efforts to the District Public Relations Manager covering the time frame July 1st to April 15th. Deadline for submission: April 16th. The Public Relations Manager and a team comprised of Vice Presidents of Public Relations review and decide on the winner.


From there, we announced the results from our polling of:

Special thanks to Area Directors Ivona Cookson and Jenny Theriault for planning such a wonderful holiday celebration!


#### **CONTINUING TO LEAD FOR SUCCESS**

Four officers trained in each TLI – that's the minimum needed for the club to receive credit for the training point. It's **not** about the credit though. It's about having trained officers who can provide the supportive environment that will inspire all members to achieve success. Your next opportunity to benefit from training takes place during January and February. There are a total of five sessions including the club officer breakout sessions. You are required to attend all five sessions and possibly six if you hold more than one club officer position. As has been our tradition since we began the online training, you can mix and match the sessions to suit your schedule. You can find the dates for each session on the website at xxxx.

What are the benefits to you for attending the training? We will discuss the most effective ways to use social media to attract guests to your meeting. Once you have the guests, you need to know how to talk to those guests so you can convert them into members. The Division breakout sessions will explore this topic. Base Camp Managers (Presidents, VPEs and Secretaries) will be together in one club officer breakout session while the other 4 positions will be grouped together. You will have the opportunity to discuss your challenges and successes and learn from each other.

We are halfway through our club year. Are you where you'd like to be at this point? What are the tasks that need to be done before the end of the year? What do you need to continue to do or what do you need to change to ensure success? It's important to finish strong as that positions the club for success for next year as well. Session Four will examine the necessary tasks and optional events to help your club finish strong.
