Today, September 1, our District 45 website got a face-lift! Come check it out and see all the new features!










Learning Opportunities

All other members of the District Council shall be limited to a maximum of two votes.

Contests, Contests

It's that time of year again – to start thinking about contests! This year, our District will be hosting the Humorous, International Speech and Evaluation contests. Will you be a contestant, or will you be assisting as a contest official? Either way, there is a learning opportunity for you!

As we continue to navigate the pandemic, Toastmasters International advised us that we had to decide on the format in which we would host the contests this year. Keeping your health and safety at



the forefront of our decision, along with the resources available, the following format was decided by the District Executive Council:

- Area level all Area contests will be hosted online
- Division level all Division contests will be hosted online
- District level hybrid format as we are planning to host the conference in person this year!

At the club level, it is up to the membership to decide if you host your contest in person, online only or in a hybrid format. When making this decision, be sure to understand the public health guidelines in your community and take the necessary precautions to keep everyone safe.

The Area & Division Directors will be hosting their Humorous speech contest in the Fall, so please check in with the leaders in your area and plan your club contest accordingly. The International Speech and Evaluation contests will be held in the spring. Three is the Magic Number

Great news for all clubs striving for Distinguished. In the past to qualify for Distinguished Club, you had to have either 20 members or a net increase of 5 members. It was announced that effective immediately this has been changed to a net increase



of 3 members. You can achieve this while qualifying for an incentive during the Smedley campaign, Talk

Up Toastmasters and Beat the Clock.

Dues are Payable

It's time to pay up. Dues are payable to TI by September 30. If you haven't already done so, you

should remind members that dues are payable. Submit your dues as early as possible. The site tends to get very busy at the end of the month so it's more difficult to submit the dues online. Encourage members to pay yearly. This saves having to collect dues twice



and it gives you a better idea of how many more members are needed to achieve distinguished. Those clubs that do collect yearly find it beneficial to the members and to the club.

INCENTIVES AND AWARDS

The club level *Track Your Success* initiative is to track member engagement outside of the club along with member recruitment activities for the September 1, 2022 to November 30, 2022 period. The completed form must be submitted by December 10, 2022. The form can be downloaded from our website at https://d45toastmasters.org/recognition. It is an Excel spreadsheet which will automatically calculate and total your club's points. You only need to enter the number of members achieving/participating in the stated events. First place will receive a basket of varied goodies worth \$150 US; 2nd place - a basket of varied goodies worth \$100 US; and then 4 club names will be randomly drawn from the remaining entries for a basket of varied goodies worth \$50 US

Smedley award – this award is presented to any club that recruits 5 or more new, dual or reinstated members in the August 1st to September 30th period. Membership must be shown to start in August or September to qualify. The club will receive a District certificate and a "Smedley Award" ribbon from Toastmasters International to display on its club banner. In addition to the ribbon, qualifying clubs earn a special discount code for 10-percent off their next club order through Toastmasters International. The addition of transfer and charter members does not count toward "Smedley Award" credit. This award is automatically calculated by Toastmasters International.

To supplement the Smedley award, the District has a membership growth recognition incentive. If a club recruits one (1) or two (2) new members during the Smedley campaigns it will qualify for a draw of three awards of the equivalent of \$50 US. If a club recruits three (3) or four (4) new members during the Smedley Award campaign, it will qualify for a draw of three awards of the equivalent of \$75 US. Clubs that recruit five (5) or more new members during the Smedley Award campaign will qualify for a draw of three awards of the equivalent of \$100 US.

TRAINING AND CELEBRATING IN NASHVILLE



Your District leaders, Crystal, Tom and Paul, had the opportunity to attend the first in person District Leader training in over two years! They headed to Nashville and networked with other District Directors, Program Quality Directors and Club Growth Directors from around the world. They practiced team building with a tower building exercise and shared best practices on



common challenges clubs across the world are facing.



It was the first time for the team to attend the Toastmasters International Convention and it did not disappoint! From opening ceremonies to the World Champion of Public Speaking contest, the convention was full of energy! It was hard not to feel the excitement with approximately 700 people in the room.

When Tom was asked to share his thoughts on the trip, he said, "the opportunity to meet fellow Toastmasters from all over the world was an amazing experience! We shared best practices and great insights with each other – we are all storytellers!"

Did you hear?? Next year's convention is being hosted in Nassau, Bahamas – will you be attending?





At the Hall of Fame ceremonies on August 18 in Nashville, Immediate Past District Director Heather Perkins was presented with two awards representing District success in the past year. The first of these is a new award this year called the **District Club Strength award**. It is presented to Districts with an increase of 10% or more in average club size. Only 21 Districts in the world received this award. District 45 was number 7 with an increase of 13.79%. The second award was the



Pathways Adoption Rate award. This award is presented to the three Districts with the greatest percentage of members enrolled in Pathways. This year District 45 was third with an enrollment rate of 89.36%. These two awards recognize the efforts our clubs made to increase their membership this past year and the engagement of members in the Toastmasters program.

THE POWER OF THE PAUSE

Alan Alda says, "It is the space between the lines that make it a great performance." A pause isn't a moment of nothing. Used strategically, it is a tool to help you build an intellectual and emotional connection with your audience. When you pause, you give your audience time to think and catch up with you. A pause allows your listeners to stay engaged and enables them to follow what comes next. If you tend to speak rapidly, it is even more important to allow adequate time for pauses.

If your talk were written out, imagine where you would have:

- a comma
- a period
- an exclamation point
- an ellipsis (...)
- an underlined word
- a new paragraph.

Use this as a guide for pauses.

The late Ron Arden was a legendary speech coach with a theatrical background as an actor and director. He coached many clients on pauses. You may find this helpful explanation interesting:

Ron's nine types of pauses...and how and when to use them.

Sense Pause

The sense pause is roughly where a comma would be in writing; however, it occurs about twice as often. It is more frequent than the comma because in writing, if your audience cannot understand something, they can reread it. Since this isn't possible in speaking, you must allow time for your audience to process. This is a way of grouping words into **shorter sentences and phrases** so the audience can keep up with what you are saying. This pause usually lasts from one-half to one second.

Transition Pause

The transition pause is where a period would be in writing. It separates one thought from another. Many speakers are unaware that they are speaking in run-on sentences. Audiences are not able to process rapid speech as well as we might think they can, especially if the content is unusual, emotional, poetic, dramatic, or new. This pause lasts between one to two seconds.

Dramatic Pause

A dramatic pause is used to set up and spotlight what you will say next. For example, "Do you know what happened . . .?" (Pause, pause, pause.) This heightens

tension in your narrative and gets the audience involved. You have to highlight a dramatic pause by following it with a statement that

rewards your audience for following along with you. A dramatic pause can last anywhere from three to seven seconds.

Reflective Pause

A reflective pause gives your audience time to think. Complex or unusual statements need to be followed by time for reflection. This type of pause says to your audience, "This is important. Take a moment and think about it," or "I've left a space for you to think" A reflective pause can last from three to seven seconds.

Pause for Effect

A pause for effect is shorter, usually just one to two seconds. It creates the feeling that something is going to happen and lets words hang in the air so the audience can play with them in their minds.

The next four are advanced uses of the pause that you can implement to add finesse to your public speaking. These will be presented in the October issue of the newsletter.
