Just like public relations is important in many activities in your life, it is also an integral part of your club culture. After all, publicity, in many forms, is how you get guests to visit your club. If you do not do any publicity, how to you get guests to visit your club? Even word of mouth is a form of publicity.

WHAT IS PUBLIC RELATIONS?

Good public relations (PR) is the practice of creating,

promoting and maintaining a favorable image of an institution among its various audiences through the use of a variety of communication channels and tools.

The Let the Word Know Publicity and Promotion Handbook introduces you to public relations and how to attract attention for your club events through publicity. The handbook goes into more details on how to how to protect the Toastmasters brand, how to establish an *internal* communications program and how to develop an *external* public relations program for your club.

The handbook is divided into four sections:

- Section 1: defines public relations
- **Section 2:** explains how to craft an effective public relations program using fundamental tools and techniques

Section 3: offers proven methods for implementing a public relations program Section 4: provides tips on how to be a successful public relations leader in your club

COMMITMENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Commitment and accountability. What do those words mean to you and how do you see them connecting? To me, commitment is an integral part of accountability. Before we hold someone accountable for their actions, we need to be sure they understand the expectations, the time and have the ability/resources to do the job. There then must be commitment to the task.

Commitment means doing what we say we are going to do. When we join a Toastmasters club, we make a commitment to that club. We make a commitment to attend regularly and to be a fully engaged participant in meetings. When we take a

leadership role, we make a commitment to the entire team – both those to whom we report and those who report to us.

When my children were little, I told them that if they made a commitment to a friend, they upheld that commitment even if a "better" offer came along. Should it be any different when we, as adults, make a commitment?

What about accountability? To whom are we accountable? We are accountable to ourselves and to others who rely on us. If we make excuses to ourselves for not fulling a commitment, we will make excuses to others. When we make excuses, we are not being accountable for our actions.

Some may argue that we don't need to make the same commitment and be held to the same standards of accountability for a volunteer position. To me, we should be



held even more accountable because we took the position of our own free will and not because we are required to as part of our employment.



Are we holding each other accountable? We had the possibility of 186 President and VPE votes at our recent District Council meeting. Yet we only had 73 of those votes accounted for. I know some had valid excuses but 113? Will you hold your President and VPE accountable if they didn't attend? Who will hold you accountable if you don't attend your next meeting without telling anyone you won't be there? Will you hold your Area Director accountable if they do not conduct their visits? I know I will. Who will hold me accountable if I don't carry

through on my commitments to you? I hope you will. By expecting each of us to be accountable for our commitments, we will create a District where every club and every member achieves success.

THE MINUTE OF SILENCE

I recently visited a club and had the pleasure of taking on the Toastmaster role for the first time at this club.

There were two prepared speakers on the agenda. After the first one finished, I announced we would have a

minute of silence for the evaluator to finalize their notes and give other members the opportunity to type their feedback in a private chat to the speaker. Though surprised by this request, the Timer gladly accepted the challenge to stay focused!

During the general evaluation portion of the meeting, I was told that the club hasn't been giving the minute of silence recently, but that it worked well for two reasons:

 It gives the speech evaluator time to put their thoughts down on paper and not miss anything.
Scrambling to take notes means less attention to the speaker.



• It gives other members a chance to send their feedback in the chat without distraction.

Remember when we used to meet in person, and we would write our feedback out on a little piece of paper? With Zoom, we aren't doing that, so we need to make sure that we are still supporting our members by providing feedback in the chat or by email.

Does your club include a minute of silence after each prepared speaker? If not, perhaps you could try it out. As Toastmaster, don't forget to remind attendees to provide their feedback to the speaker via email or private chat during the minute of silence. This is how we support our members and help them grow!




Ken Hubley presented an informative session on "easySpeak" at our Sunday Webinar, this past September 27.

Join Deji Randle as he runs through the planning, promoting and execution of an open house, whether it be in person or online. Don't forget the follow up though – that's the most important part!



AWARDS AND INCENTIVES

There are a number of awards presented each year and the District also has various incentives during the year. Each month some of these awards and incentives will be highlighted in each issue so clubs and members know what there is to strive for.

Awards

Terry Chinnery award – this award is presented in the *spring* to the club with the greatest percentage increase in members from the previous April. This award is automatically calculated by the District based on reports from Toastmasters International.

Ted Nichols award – this award is presented in the **spring** to the club with the greatest membership retention. The base membership on July 1 is the starting point and is compared to the membership after the April renewals with new members being taken into account. A club must have a minimum membership number of 20 to qualify. This award is automatically calculated by the District based on reports from Toastmasters International.

Incentives

Youth Leadership Program - Be among the first twenty-five (25) Toastmasters to complete a Youth Leadership Program and you will be reimbursed for the cost of the YLP materials. This means that if you need sets of material for one YLP, you will be reimbursed for both.

Club Coach Recognition – To earn this incentive, you must serve as club coach for two (2) or more clubs and:

- Attend a meeting of the coached clubs at least once per quarter.
- Conduct a joint meeting with both/all clubs' executive committees once per month.
- Coaches must start in the club role no later than March 1st



The incentive is \$25 US/\$30 CDN per club served to be used for the benefit of Toastmasters.

Open House – this is for boosting your Open House on Facebook. You need to set up the Open House as an event. Boost the event and then submit the bill for boosting. You will be reimbursed up to \$25 US/\$30 CDN. This can be for either an in-person or online Open House.

Level 1 award – To be eligible for this award, complete a **first** Level 1 in any path by December 31, 2021. You will be entered into a draw for a Travel Mug. There will be two (2) winners per month.

DISTRICT COUNCIL MEETING



Worldwide Impromptu Speaking Extravaganza





For those clubs that need additional support in accomplishing goals and restoring club quality, the <u>Club Coach Program</u> offers the opportunity for experienced Toastmasters to assist clubs in achieving Distinguished status or higher in the <u>Distinguished Club</u> <u>Program</u>. Currently, coaches who help clubs achieve <u>Distinguished status</u> or better by June 30 earn club coach credit.

The Board of Directors is aware of the extra effort coaches must put forth as the pandemic continues to impact club meetings and membership growth. To provide additional recognition for coaches for the 2021–2022 program year, effective July 1, 2021, coaches can also earn District leader credit in addition to the club support credit if the club coach meets all the following criteria:

- Help the club achieve Distinguished or better status by June 30, 2022
- Help the club reach a minimum of 20 paid members by June 30, 2022
- Serve a minimum of six months in the coach role

We hope these additional considerations assist you and your club members in achieving the program year objectives and cultivate communication and leadership skills.



Of the 1,200 members in our District, 47.5% have been a member for at least 5 years, 25.8% have been a member for at least 10 years and almost 14.6% have been a member for 15 years or more.
