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TAKING THE NEXT LEADERSHIP CHALLENGE

Have you ever wondered what an Area Director does or how you become an Area Director? Have you ever thought about becoming an Area Director? Being Area Director can be one of the most enjoyable learning experiences you will have as a Toastmaster. Through your experience as an Area Director, you will learn more about your leadership style, your communication style, the clubs in your Area and the Toastmasters program generally.

Anyone can be Area Director. You will probably find the job easier if you've been a Club President or VPED but it's not necessary. You will receive training from the district, and you will be provided with resource material to help you fulfill your duties. You will also receive ongoing support from the Division Director and other District officers.

As with any role within Toastmasters, what you get out of it has a direct relation to the effort you put into it. The minimum requirements for an Area Director are to visit each club in your Area four times and to complete the visit form. You are also expected to arrange the Area speech contests. However, the District expects more from you as Area Director. We expect you to be in monthly contact with your clubs, either through visits or by phone or email. We expect you to attend and participate in both Toastmasters Leadership Institutes. We also expect you to attend the district training, the Fall Extravaganza, and the District Conference.

In addition to those expectations, there are other challenges we hope you'll accept as Area Director. Some of those additional challenges include holding regular Area Council meetings; attaining at least one Pathways level above your current level; identifying new club opportunities; helping to build new clubs when the opportunity arises or help rebuild weak clubs as necessary and identifying potential District leaders from within your Area including your successor.

This may seem like a big commitment. It is! It does require a significant time commitment, particularly if you have distant clubs but the rewards are worth it. You will have many more speaking opportunities than you would normally have just at your own club. These speaking opportunities are in front of Toastmasters other than your own members – this helps take you outside your comfort zone and grow as a speaker. You will also develop your leadership skills. Clubs will look to you for advice about their challenges and by helping them, you develop your leadership skills and your knowledge of Toastmasters.

If you're interested in continual learning and growth in Toastmasters, take the next leadership challenge. Become an Area Director.

WHAT IS A DTM PROJECT?

A DTM project in Pathways is one of the required steps to achieve your Distinguished Toastmaster designation in our organization. The purpose of the project is to demonstrate your skills as a leader and as a public speaker.

You are free to choose the topic of your project, but it is suggested that you choose something that will benefit an organization, whether it be Toastmasters or an organization that you volunteer for. During the project, you will recruit a team to help accomplish your project and your team members will be asked to do an evaluation on your leadership skills. There are various resources available to help you plan your project and you are required to give two speeches: one before and one after your project.

To access the DTM project, you must have completed one full path and the first three levels of a second path. Once you have achieved this, send an email to educationprogram@toastmasters.org to have your DTM Project made available in Basecamp.

Have you started thinking about what you might want to do for your DTM project? Maybe you are struggling with ideas? If you would like to do a project that benefits Toastmasters, specifically District 45, we have a couple of project ideas that we would love someone to take on and you can use it as your DTM project! What are the key responsibilities of the Vice President Public Relations?



- Publicize the club
- Keep club website current
- Safeguard the Toastmasters brand, trademarks, and copyrights

Are you sharing information with the public about an upcoming meeting? How will people know your club is having a meeting? How will they know to visit your club? Post on social


media. Share meeting information locally (community bulletin, media, etc.). It's important to share information about your club with the public so they know your club exists.

Are you sharing information about how a meeting went? What have you learned? If not, how will people know what your club members do at a meeting? Share information on social media or locally on aspects of the meeting such a fun and informative round of Table Topics. Don't forget to include pictures of the meeting.

Do you share member and club accomplishments and successes? How do people know your club members are supportive? Share when a member has completed an educational goal or completed a level. Share how proud members are when a club has reached a goal. Excitement is contagious!

Is your website link shared on the club's social media page? Are you keeping the club website updated? Members of the public may check out your club's website so make sure it is regularly updated. Add pictures of meetings, members achievements and/or examples of a *Word of the Day* to keep the information fresh and fun.

When sharing publicity information, be mindful of the Toastmasters Brand. Using Toastmasters Brand material ensures that we uphold the values and mission of Toastmasters International. Read the <u>Brand Manual</u> to find out how to use it effectively.

IGNITE YOUR SUCCESS FOR BETTER RESULTS, FASTER

I shared this secret to better results faster as a workshop at the D45 Fall Extravaganza. IF you missed it, or if you would like to review it again....

IGNITE

I: Identify Your Success

- Define your success on your own terms. What do you want? What do you need? Big picture - what do you want to accomplish? How will you know you have succeeded? What does your success look like? More importantly, what will your success feel like once you reach it? Do you have a pressing deadline? What date? Circle it. - - If you don't, choose one. Necessitate urgency! How will you BE different once you reach success? Step into that mindset NOW. Choose to look and feel you're successful right now. Why wait?



G: Goals are Targets

- Name & claim your goal. Set your goal as a post you can see every day. Reverse engineer HOW you are going to become the person that achieves that goal.
- 1. Benchmarks; 2. KPIs: Key Performance Indicators; 3. Tangible, detailed & personal. Align with target dates. Choose daily to move the needle 1% to improve everything you do.

N: Navigate Pitfalls

You might need a survival plan through the messy middle.

*Where energy & resources run short. *Where everything that can go wrong, does. *When you want to quit. Strategize! Your own personal Obstacle Elimination Protocol. A simple, IF this happens, THEN I will do this. What might prevent you from accomplishing your goal? What might derail you? While our goal doesn't change, we may need to adjust our approach. Having an Obstacle Elimination Protocol in place allows us to avoid getting emotionally derailed. It permits us to continue to choose smart. Instead of becoming surprised, overwhelmed, sidetracked, and defeated, we will be prepared.

I: Inspire Yourself Daily

Fall in love with your goals every day! Use Whatever helps you, get over-the-moon excited about what you're doing and why, every day! Affirmations? Podcasts? Coffee with mentor? Zoom with accountability partner? Whatever works for you!

T: Team Up

Shine with your strengths! Team up to make your weakness irrelevant! We ALL have weaknesses. There was a time when it was commonly taught to spend all your time improving your weakest competencies. I challenge that. Sharpen your best skills. Increase your weaknesses enough to get by. ADD a team member whose STRENGTHS counter your weaknesses. And BAM! Match made in heaven.

E: Execute

Execute action every day without fail. Build systems and processes that make execution easier. Create opportunities to build new habits, which frees up focus bandwidth while setting you up for a lifetime of achievement. **Let's IGNITE!**

DISTRICT INCENTIVES

Talk Up Toastmasters - Membership growth is important to ensure club success. The Talk Up Toastmasters Membership Building Campaign, which runs from February 1st to March 31st, is the second of three membership campaigns. In addition, District 45 is offering the following Incentives for clubs that gain:

- 1-2 new members draw for \$25 US/\$30 CDN [3 winners];
- 3-4 new members draw for \$50 US/\$60 CDN [3 winners]; and
- 5 or more new members draw for \$75 US/\$95 CDN [3 winners].

Membership Increase - Club increases its net membership (using club base) by 10% (rounded to the nearest full number) between January 1 and March 31 (with dues paid by March 31). Clubs will be entered into a draw for \$25 US/\$30 CDN [3 winners].

TLI Attendance - Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI) is a one-day leadership training and networking event that benefits all Toastmasters. It will help you learn more about and prepare for your Toastmasters club officer role! Officers who attend can help their club earn a point in the Distinguished Club Program. It is also an opportunity to share your own ideas and experiences with other officers during the interactive club officer training, as well as learn from others. Statistically clubs are more successful if their officers are trained twice a year. Clubs that have all officers attend the Winter 2022 TLI training session will be entered into a draw for a prize of \$25 US/ \$30 CDN. There will be six (6) winners.

Club Coach Recognition - An important aspect of helping clubs achieve success is the assignment of club coach(s). Club coaches can be assigned to a club with 12 or few members. There are many clubs in District 45 who have 12 or fewer members. This incentive is to help these clubs achieve success by having members sign up to serve as a club coach for two (2) or more clubs.

To earn this incentive, you must serve as club coach for two (2) or more clubs and:

- Attend a meeting of the coached clubs at least once per quarter.
- Conduct a joint meeting with both/all clubs' executive committees once per month.
- Coaches must start in the club role no later than March 1st

The incentive is \$25 US/\$30 CDN per club served to be used for the benefit of Toastmasters.

Youth Leadership Program - The Youth Leadership Program is a workshop that enable young people under the age of 18 to develop their communication and leadership skills through practical experience. This workshop helps young people learn valuable skills including:

- Evaluating their own speaking ability
- Preparing and giving speeches
- Giving impromptu talks
- Controlling their voice, vocabulary, and gestures
- Giving constructive feedback and more

This is a great opportunity to introduce the benefits of Toastmasters to our youth! Organizing a Youth Leadership Program is also a project in helping you achieve your Distinguished Toastmasters status. Be among the first twenty-five (25) Toastmasters to complete a Youth Leadership Program and get reimbursed for the cost of the Youth Leadership Program material.

DISTRICT INCENTIVES (CONTINUED)

Awards

Dave Rosvall Award - The Dave Rosvall Award is presented to a District 45 Toastmaster who has demonstrated long-term and meritorious service to the district above the club level. The recipient must have been a D45 Toastmaster for at least 10 years. District Governors and Directors must have been out of office for at least 5 years before receiving the award. The District 45 Past District Governors and Directors determine the winner of this award. Although the award is chosen by PDGs, if you know of a member you feel is eligible for this award, send the name along with the reasons why this person should receive the award to the Immediate Past District Director.

Shirley Kelly Award - The Shirley Kelly Award is presented to a member who exemplifies the mission and values of a Toastmaster and empowers fellow Toastmasters to be successful by sharing the spotlight. Nominees must be a DTM, served on the District Executive Committee, have been a Toastmaster for at least 5 years, and served the district in various capacities. Recipients must be nominated by at least two Toastmasters.

Darlene Dunn Outstanding Mentor Award - The Darlene Dunn Outstanding Mentor Award is given annually to recognize a member who has exhibited the heart and soul of what Toastmasters mentorship means: "Encouraging success of others before self".

Any member may nominate a mentor. All nominations must include a 200--500-word essay, focusing on 4 points:

- the commitment of your mentor
- how mentor helped you achieve your Toastmaster goals
- what you gained from the protégé/mentor relationship
- why you would recommend this mentor to others

The nominated mentor must have completed the Mentor Path in the Pathways.

Trailblazer Award - The cornerstones of our Toastmasters program are the educational and leadership designations and paths. We recognize and congratulate all our members who have completed these milestones this year. Members who achieve 4 levels in the Pathways program in one program year earn the Trail Blazer Award. First-time recipients will be sent a certificate and a binder for storing their certificates. Repeat recipients will be sent a certificate and a small token of recognition for their ongoing achievement.

Distinguished by April 30 - It is important that all clubs strive to achieve Distinguished Club status. The Distinguished Club designations recognize the achievement of club members in attaining educational and leadership awards, the success of the club in recruiting new members, and the commitment of club officers to their members by undergoing training and ensuring they submit dues and paperwork on time. We encourage clubs to strive to achieve at least Distinguished Club status by April 30th. In addition to a club ribbon for your club banner, clubs that achieve any level of Distinguished status (Distinguished, Select Distinguished or President's Distinguished) by April 30, 2022, will be entered into a draw for a prize of \$50 US/\$60 CDN. There will be 3 winners - one for each level.

DISTRICT LEADERS NEEDED!

The district needs committed, enthusiastic members to run for District office. Take the challenge. Put YOUR name forward to work with a group of like-minded individuals to help our clubs succeed and to continue to develop your communication and leadership skills. District future leadership members - don't miss this opportunity to start your journey with our District.

Recently the Leadership Committee team has been working to start interviews with candidates for the district team for the upcoming year. The team has been assembled the committee which will call for nominations, assess nomination papers, interview candidates, and then nominate a slate of candidates for your consideration at the Annual Business Meeting in May 2022. The voters at the Annual Business Meeting are the Presidents and Vice Presidents of Education in attendance. Because the District Council Meeting will be held online, Presidents and Vice Presidents of Education must be in attendance to vote. There is no proxy voting for an online meeting.

The District Leadership Committee has been finalized. It is required that each Division be equally represented, and this has been accomplished. Your committee members who will be working hard with the district to find the best candidates for the elected District offices are:

We are expecting to invite nominations from now with cut off submissions the end of February. Shortly thereafter interviews will begin, followed by considerations by the committee and internal voting by the DLC members. We are expected to propose a slate of nominations to the District Director at least six weeks prior to the Annual Business meeting in May. The slate of nominees will then be made available to you, the voters, at least four weeks prior to the Annual Business meeting.


DISTRICT LEADERSHIP BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP




Division C

- 2. Project Translation of the Welcome to the Greater Saint John area guide to Spanish, and
- 3. Support, network and grow the Southwest NB.

Extra, Extra Read all About It! Toastmasters Clubs in the News!

The Toast of the Valley Toastmasters Club was recently featured in an article in the *Vermont Standard* e-Edition. The article speaks about how the club has evolved and how it is keeping up with virtual communication - something that is more frequent nowadays with so many working from home or operating with various traveling restrictions.

Toastmasters Clubs in New Hampshire were also recently featured in news - more specifically, in the *New Hampshire Union Leader*. The article details how many members originally joined a club to improve their public speaking skills but stay for the leadership skills they learn.

Submitting a newspaper article provides great publicity for any club. I encourage clubs to work with their local newspapers to submit articles about their clubs and their meetings. You just never know how many guests, turned members, this will bring to your club!



COMMITMENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY REPRISED

Is every member showing commitment and are you holding your club leaders and members accountable? We are currently conducting our Toastmasters Leadership Institutes (TLIs). All club officers should have made the commitment to receive this training for their role. Out of 506 individual club officers, approximately 35% (180 officers) have been trained. There are two final rounds of TLIs upcoming for the remaining 65% to learn and discuss new approaches to succeed in their roles. Club officers not yet trained – will you make that commitment to attend training? Club members – will you hold your officers accountable and tell them you expect them to attend training?

Let's look at some of the commitments we, as District leaders, made to you and the progress that has been made in fulfilling the commitments:

- To build strong clubs, we committed to developing resources to support new club mentors and sponsors. Information has been developed and has recently been posted to the website.
- 2) To assist clubs with twelve or fewer members, we committed to develop club coaches. We hold monthly meetings for club coaches and monthly meetings for any club eligible to have a club coach.
- 3) To assist clubs in attracting new members, we committed to provide resources to help for recruitment. A document is in the works, but there is no specified delivery date for that document.
- 4) Further, to assist clubs to attract new members, we committed to market Toastmasters by sending information on Toastmasters to ten employers of any size each week. This has not yet been started.
- 5) To enable more training for all members, we committed to monthly learning opportunities, additional sessions for Pathways and special events. There have been learning opportunities on the 4th Sunday of each month and topics/speakers have been confirmed for the balance of the year. Pathways sessions have been arranged for the 4th Tuesday of each month. We held a successful Toastmaster Day event the first ever in District 45 and a very successful Fall Extravaganza. Plans are currently underway for the annual conference in May which will provide additional learning opportunities.
- 6) To assist clubs to achieve success, we committed to providing quality Toastmaster Leadership Institutes (TLIs) and we are halfway through the winter offering. Feedback to date is that the Program Quality Director has provided the best-ever training. It has set a high bar for the June TLIs, but we are confident we will meet that standard. Planning for the June TLIs is already underway but will start in full force once the current round of TLIs is completed.
- 7) To keep members informed of all this, we committed to a communication plan that includes creating awareness using social media. This year, we started posting weekly blogs on the website. We continue to send emails to all members, as well as the monthly newsletter. We have regular posts on the main D45 page on Facebook. We have not been as consistent as we would like with either our Making Your Club Successful Group or our LinkedIn account.

In addition to the work of the Senior Leadership Team, our Area and Division Directors have stepped up when called upon. The Area Directors completed 100% of their club visits by the deadline of November 30 and 83% were completed by October 31. Our Area 15 Director, Sarah Wright, is due to have a baby on March 4. To ensure she could compete her visits she scheduled all of them for January. Now, that's commitment and she's being accountable to her clubs and to the district.

Commitment and accountability are factors you should consider when electing your club and district leaders each year. Deciding for whom to cast your vote is one way to hold people accountable. We'd love to hear your thoughts on how we're doing! Send your feedback to info@d45toastmasters.org.


